

It would be injurious to the citizens of the Commonwealth to issue a license to HSP Gaming. For many reasons, including the following, HSP's proposal for the Sugarhouse site is the worst of any proposal for a facility in the City of Philadelphia:

- The Sugarhouse site has no buffer from the local residential section of Fishtown.
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- Traffic coming from northbound I-95 will have to be turned around to get to the site and will be funneled right in front of the only municipal park on the Delaware River. This will cut off the neighborhood from its park.

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Re: THE SUGARHOUSE SITE

I have a business in Fishtown on Frankford Avenue. I have worked hard to get this business up and running and I like to think I serve a need in this community.

The proposal to put the Sugarhouse casino at the end of Frankford Avenue (on Delaware Avenue) is crazy. Sugarhouse has said in its own report that it will cause traffic failure on Frankford Avenue. (This is without even counting the thousands of cars they will dump onto Girard Avenue and Frankford Avenue from southbound I-95 – traffic they didn't even tell the Board about in their traffic report.)

Clogging off the end of Frankford Avenue will cut off flow to our area of the City. This is the main way that people use Frankford to come in and out of our area. This will cut us off from most of the rest of the City and cause businesses on Frankford to wither.

In the past few years many of us have invested a lot of hard work and a lot of money to turn Frankford Avenue into a viable business corridor. Making this business corridor work would not only generate direct tax revenue for the City and the Commonwealth, but spur responsible development all along this area which would, in turn, generate more tax revenues. Sugarhouse's proposal - if for no other reason than its invasion of traffic - will crush our efforts.

Do not license Sugarhouse, and do not license any gaming facility on North Delaware Avenue until the Girard Avenue off ramps from I-95 are rebuilt so that casino traffic goes directly onto Delaware Avenue without invading our other streets.

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Do not license Sugarhouse casino. It has no way of getting its traffic to its site. It says it will send southbound I-95 traffic directly from the off ramp onto Aramingo Avenue and then out to Delaware Avenue. But there is not a way to do this. At the exit ramp Aramingo is an overpass and you can't get onto it. So, you have to drive down Girard Avenue and come across one of the small side streets that we Fishtowners live on. (Sugarhouse's own traffic report says you can't come across the one commercial road, Frankford Avenue, because it will be too blocked up with traffic already.)

The traffic coming to Sugarhouse from northbound I-95 will also find it nearly impossible to get there. If all that traffic ever manages to go from the exit ramp across two lanes of Delaware Avenue traffic onto Richmond, it still has to turn around and come back down Beach Street in front of our park. There is no way thousands and thousands of cars per week can get down Beach Street, turn left onto Columbia and right at the light to get out to Delaware Avenue – and Sugarhouse has done no study to see if they can.

Sugarhouse's traffic can't get to its site. But in trying to get it there Sugarhouse has shown itself willing to ruin an entire residential neighborhood. Do not give Sugarhouse a license.
