1 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Good
2 morning. I am Mike Edmiston. I will be the
3 presiding officer for the Pennsylvania Gaming
4 Control Board for this public input hearing
5 today.
6 I have a few housekeeping items that I
7 would like to mention at the outset; and we will
8 go on the record shortly.
9 As many of you may know, we have a
10 procedure whereby individuals or, for that
11 matter, groups can submit written comments
12 regarding the applications that are now pending
13 before the Commission in the lobby area outside
14 of the hearing room.
15 We have the Pennsylvania Gaming Control
16 Board staff to assist with that process. That
17 process can be used by any and all who would
18 care to make comments; and that certainly does
19 include people who have taken the time to
20 register, are scheduled to speak, but for
21 whatever reason may find that taking the
22 opportunity to speak today is something that
23 doesn't work for them. It's a matter of your
24 choice, certainly.
25 I would like to ask that you turn off

1 all cell phones, beepers and the like, as we
2 proceed into this hearing, and we will start
3 with the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag of the
4 United States. So if you will join me in
5 standing.

6 (All present complied.)

7 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

8 This may come as a great surprise to
9 all of you, but we just discovered the one thing
10 about which none of us will disagree in the
11 pledge.

12 All right. This April 7, 2006 Public
13 Input Hearing of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control
14 Board taking place in the Auditorium of the
15 State Museum of Pennsylvania, in Harrisburg,
16 regarding Crossroads' gaming application to the
17 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board for a Category
18 II operator's license will come to order.

19 This hearing is convened by the
20 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board pursuant to
21 the authority of Act 71 of 2004 and Pennsylvania
22 Gaming Control Board regulations, Section 441.2.

23 Our stenographer is seated at the front
24 table on my right, and our clerk to the Board,
25 Mickey Kane, is seated at the front table on my

1 These hearings will allow individual
2 members of the general public, as well as
3 community groups, elected officials and local
4 government representatives to express their
5 thoughts and share their concerns with the
6 Board.

7 The hearing today regarding Crossroads'
8 gaming application will end no later than
9 6:00 p.m. this evening. The hearing will
10 reconvene at 8:30 a.m. on Wednesday, May 17th,
11 in the Student Union Ballroom at Gettysburg
12 College, the 200 block, West Lincoln Avenue,
13 Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

14 The May 17th hearing will also begin
15 with the viewing of the videotape of Crossroads
16 gaming's April 5 presentation. You may expect
17 our schedule today will involve the following
18 short points:

19 First, for the convenience of the
20 members of this audience who could not attend
21 Crossroads gaming's April 5 presentation, we
22 will run a videotape of that presentation at
23 10:30 or rather near thereto. We will take a
24 10- to 15-minute break, and the hearing will
25 resume at 10:45. We will take a lunch break at

1 left.

2 I want to thank the State Museum of
3 Pennsylvania for making this facility available.
4 Museum's staff assistance and hard work has been
5 an important component of our readiness to
6 proceed with this public input hearing today
7 and, for that matter, the public input hearing
8 that took place here yesterday as well.

9 The Board has asked me to request the
10 administrator of assistant director to the
11 museum, Denise L. Smith; the museum's chief of
12 the division of education and operations, John
13 G. *lay how, Jr.; and the museum's billing
14 manager, Dwight R. Lindenberger, to inform your
15 workmates of the Board's appreciation for the
16 professional support you and all of the museum
17 staff have made to the Board, most particularly
18 for these public input hearings.

19 This is the third in the statewide
20 series of Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board
21 Public Input Hearings designed to allow
22 applicants for operator gaming licenses to
23 simultaneously present their plans before the
24 Gaming Control Board and to permit public
25 comment thereon.

1 12:30. The hearing will resume at 1:30. We
2 will have another short break in the afternoon
3 at 3:30. The hearing will resume at 3:45. And
4 if things go according to expectations, we
5 should be finished here certainly by 6:00.

6 Please keep in mind that the Board
7 panel members were able to observe the live
8 presentment of the videotaped material when
9 Crossroads gaming made its presentation on April
10 5; therefore, it is not expected that the Board
11 panel will join today's hearing until after the
12 videotape or a significant portion of it has
13 been played for today's audience.

14 The Board panel present today will be
15 introduced at the receipt of the presentations
16 being made today by the community groups and
17 individuals who have been registered and signed
18 in to speak at today's hearing. So I get to sit
19 up here all alone while the video runs.

20 The order of speakers, when we do
21 commence with our speakers today, will be as
22 follows:

23 Community groups will speak first, that
24 is individuals representing community groups;
25 and then second we will have individuals,

1 members of the general public, who will speak.
 2 Spokespersons for community groups may
 3 speak for up to ten minutes, and members of the
 4 general public, that is individuals, may speak
 5 for up to three minutes.

6 As each speaker begins his or her
 7 remarks, we will need you to state your name,
 8 the municipality and state where you reside, and
 9 the name of the entity on whose behalf you will
 10 speak.

11 Please try to remember this request. I
 12 don't want to have to remind you during your
 13 limited speaking period. I would have to
 14 interrupt you, tell you why I am interrupting
 15 you, hit this button, for which I am digitally
 16 challenged. So try and remember it, please.

17 All speakers will be sworn in at one
 18 time before we commence the live commentary for
 19 the group representatives and speakers.

20 The rules and code of conduct for this
 21 public input hearing are posted inside and
 22 outside of the hearing room and on the
 23 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board website, and
 24 they will be strictly enforced.

25 The Board expects, and it's my

1 To assist all of us in adhering to the
 2 time limits for each speaker and to assist us in
 3 having as many speakers heard in the time that
 4 we have available today, an electronic timer is
 5 located smack dab in front of me.

6 The green light indicates the speaker's
 7 time has started. When the light turns yellow,
 8 30 seconds remain of the allotted time, and the
 9 speaker should wrap up their presentation. When
 10 the light turns red, a beeping sound will begin
 11 and the speaker is expected to stop speaking and
 12 leave the microphone.

13 If anyone has any questions about this
 14 hearing or future hearings, please see a member
 15 of our staff stationed out in the hallway or in
 16 the outer room. We welcome and need your full
 17 attention and cooperation throughout this
 18 hearing.

19 We also welcome members of the media to
 20 the hearing and ask that they observe the
 21 guidelines distributed when they come in. In
 22 general, we ask that the media follow the same
 23 protocol that applies in any formal court
 24 proceeding.

25 In particular, we ask the reporters and

1 responsibility, to ensure that courtesy prevails
 2 among the audience, presenters and speakers;
 3 therefore, audience outbursts, including
 4 applause, are not permitted, and I respectfully
 5 ask for your assistance in complying with that
 6 essential courtesy for each speaker.

7 Vocal expressions from the audience
 8 complicate the task of assuring each speaker the
 9 use of the time for which he or she has
 10 prepared, and will make the stenographer's task
 11 more difficult.

12 Speakers who comply with the rules and
 13 code of conduct for this public input hearing
 14 will not be interrupted and will be permitted to
 15 speak no longer than their allotted time.

16 If I determine that this hearing is
 17 being disruptive, I will call a recess, and upon
 18 the restoration of order, resume the hearing.

19 Persons who refuse to acknowledge and
 20 obey the authority of the presiding officer may
 21 be asked to leave the room and the area.
 22 Incidentally, we haven't had that occur yet in
 23 the two preceding public input hearings, and I
 24 am hopeful that no one in this room is real
 25 interested in being the first.

1 photographers not to interfere with the hearing
 2 in any way, and that they conduct interviews
 3 with speakers outside of the hearing room.

4 Well, I haven't timed myself on the
 5 running of the introductory remarks, but we are
 6 now ready to have the tape roll of Crossroads
 7 gaming's presentation on Wednesday last, at
 8 Gettysburg College, for the benefit of those who
 9 were not there and might be interested in seeing
 10 it.

11 (Video was played.)

12 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Okay. We
 13 have been joined by our panel for this morning
 14 by Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board Members
 15 Sanford Rivers on my immediate left, Mary Colins
 16 on my far right, Jeff Coy on my immediate right.

17 And we have representing ex-officio,
 18 Board Member, Bob Casey, Jennifer Langan, in the
 19 audience.

20 We are about to commence with the live
 21 aspect of today's hearing, the personal oral
 22 presentations by community groups'
 23 representatives and individuals.

24 We will start this phase with swearing
 25 you in, and I would like to ask that all of

1 those who have registered to speak today, please
2 stand and raise your right hand.

3 Do you swear or affirm that the
4 testimony you are about to give is the truth,
5 the whole truth and nothing but the truth, so
6 help you God?

7 WITNESSES: I do.

8 (Witnesses sworn en masse.)

9 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
10 You may be seated.

11 Our first speaker for today speaking on
12 behalf of a community group is Chuck Teague.

13 MR. TEAGUE: Mr. Chairman, members of
14 the Board, good morning. I am Chuck Teague. I
15 am president of the Civil War Roundtable of
16 Gettysburg and am here speaking on their behalf.

17 I am a resident of the Borough of
18 Gettysburg and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
19 I am not here in my capacity as a park ranger or
20 in my capacity as president of Historic
21 Gettysburg Adams County, but am as president of
22 the Roundtable.

23 Where is the battlefield? That is a
24 question I often hear. In fact, when I am
25 walking the sidewalks of town and even in the

1 and restaurants and other necessary parts of a
2 local community be situated on parts of the
3 battlefield.

4 Immediately after the battle, the chief
5 engineer for the union army tasked his most
6 trusted cartographer to make a map of the
7 battlefield. Sergeant Emor Cope was assigned to
8 make the official map of the battlefield, one
9 that General Warren would later certify as being
10 accurate.

11 What I have here is a portion of that
12 map. This is part of the map made by Emor Cope.
13 It is an enlargement of a sector of the
14 battlefield showing the area which is around the
15 proposed site of the casino.

16 Now, I must say that I don't have the
17 resources available that the investors do with
18 the engineering and the electronics. I do have
19 this foam board map and Post-It notes that I
20 brought to illustrate.

21 By scale, by the way, this would be
22 about three miles from top to bottom, to give
23 you an idea.

24 Now, I am going to have the general
25 hold it this way because for some reason

1 stores out on York Street people will ask me.

2 Most people, including locals, simply
3 do not know the scope of the battlefield, and I
4 am surprised that the investors, most of whom
5 are outsiders, in fact, all but one of whom are
6 outsiders, simply do not appreciate the scope of
7 the battlefield.

8 When I hear someone say about the
9 proposed slots parlor, that the location is not
10 part of the Gettysburg battlefield, frankly I
11 cringe.

12 The battle covered an area much larger
13 than people comprehend and specifying the limits
14 of the battlefield is really a tricky issue.
15 Clearly, the battlefield extends beyond what the
16 park service owns and actually beyond the
17 boundary of the Gettysburg National Military
18 Park.

19 Because my community must remain viable
20 economically, the entire battlefield cannot be
21 sectioned off and converted into an artificial
22 Greenwich Village or a Williamsburg just for the
23 sake of tourists, so practical considerations
24 require that residences, including my own and
25 businesses and schools and medical facilities

1 Sergeant Cope had east on the right side of the
2 map, oriented to the compass, as you see here.

3 To give you modern-day references, this
4 is the York Road, the Hunterstown Road, this is
5 Old Harrisburg Road, this is the railroad track,
6 which heads east out of town, and the casino is
7 located at that site between the York Road and
8 the railroad tracks.

9 Now, military actions involved in the
10 battle of Gettysburg were extensive. When you
11 begin to calculate the troop movements, the
12 lines of battle, the deployments, the
13 redeployments, attacks, the counter-attacks and
14 retreats, they were very extensive and very
15 complicated.

16 Frankly, most people don't understand
17 that. I have been studying the battle for 50
18 years and I am still learning.

19 Imagine an area, if you will, where
20 160,000 soldiers are gathered and probably about
21 40,000 others in immediate support of those
22 armies. So spread out around my community,
23 200,000 men.

24 Let me identify, first of all, some
25 significant actions which occurred within two

1 miles of that battle. On July 1st, Jones'
2 Artillery Battalion set up their position right
3 here and were involved in heavy fire on the
4 afternoon of July 1st.

5 Shortly thereafter, Jubal Early's
6 division set up three brigades in line of
7 battle, that is 4300 men, attack in a heavy
8 action. Their line of battle being established
9 approximately in this position. (Indicated)

10 Barlow's Knoll, by the way, is off the
11 map Johnston's division of about 6400 men
12 arrived in the evening of July 1st and set up
13 their line of battle in a position down here.
14 (Indicated)

15 On July 2nd, Latimore's battalion,
16 several batteries of artillery, deployed on
17 Benner's Hill and were involved in heavy action
18 in this location right here -- (indicated) --
19 several batteries involved. Major Latimore was
20 killed in the firing upon his position.

21 In addition, Custer's brigade, federal
22 calvary deployed a line of battle and attacked
23 confederate calvary in the battle of Hunterstown
24 located in this position here. (Indicated)
25 That was on July 2nd.

1 Later in the day we have additional
2 action, which is occurring -- this is the
3 location of Latimore's battery. July 2nd, we
4 also have action down here on Brinkerhoff's
5 Ridge, where there were attacks and
6 counterattacks, union calvary and confederate
7 calvary involved in attacks against each other.

8 Then on July 3rd, we have the rebel
9 calvary involving Jeb Stuart in these woods
10 right here. (Indicated) Their force artillery
11 set up and would be firing and attacking and
12 receiving the attack of General Custer. His
13 troops would be in that position there.
14 (Indicated)

15 And then there is the horrible toll of
16 battle. For example, quite close to the casino
17 site -- and this was actually a fairly unusual
18 occurrence -- there was a home that was burned
19 down, note that, also field hospitals. We have
20 the Monfort Farm -- excuse me, General. I have
21 a lot to put on here yet.

22 We have the Monfort Farm, which is
23 located on Hunterstown Road at this location
24 right here. (Indicated) We have the hospital
25 at Shuler Farm, the hospital at the Weibel Farm.

1 We have the hospital at the Lady Farm. We have
2 a hospital at the Jameson Farm, although the
3 historians have yet to identify where exactly
4 that was located. But most notably the
5 Alexander Buehler Farm, which was the side
6 closest to the location of the proposed casino.

7 This is where we get the idea of what
8 happened in the vicinity of the casino. A
9 neighbor stated to John Hartzell, who was the
10 tenant farmer in that location, "was driven out
11 of his house by the rebels, who took it for a
12 hospital during the battle and used it for some
13 time afterwards."

14 We have further insight in the
15 government claim which was issued, which states
16 and I quote, "This premises, the premises were
17 within rebel lines during the battle and was
18 entirely overrun and the crops were trampled
19 down." It shows you a good idea of the heavy
20 movement of troops that were located, during the
21 battle, in this location.

22 In addition, in the aftermath of
23 battle, arrangements were made for troops who
24 were wounded to be taken out of the area to
25 hospitals in Baltimore, Washington, Philadelphia

1 and other cities, the United States Sanitary
2 Commission, and the hospital located here, which
3 is Letterman Hospital, and the cemetery, where
4 an estimated 600 to 1200 soldiers were, in fact,
5 buried after their death.

6 What's in a name? They've changed it
7 from Gettysburg to Crossroads. Notice the cross
8 road is the Lincoln Highway and what became the
9 blue and gray highway, Route 15.

10 Thank you for your attention.
11 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
12 Our next scheduled speaker is Marty
13 Qally. Good morning. You may proceed.

14 MR. QALLY: Good morning. Hello, my
15 name is Mike Qally --

16 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Could you
17 stop for a moment, please?

18 Sound, please make sure that
19 Mr. Qally's mike is working. How about that
20 microphone, Mr. Qally?

21 MR. QALLY: -- (inaudible) -- be on
22 the right or left.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Just as
24 long as it is not a battle, Mr. Qally. You may
25 proceed.

1 MR. QUALLY: Thank you.

2 Hello, my name is Marty Qually. I live
3 in the Borough of Gettysburg. I lived in Adams
4 County all of my life.

5 I am the first Green candidate ever
6 elected to Borough Council in Gettysburg, and I
7 am therefore the first Green to have had the
8 honor to vote against supporting this casino.

9 I do not come before you as a member of
10 the Borough Council of Gettysburg. They have
11 taken their stance. I come before you as an
12 appointed chair of the Adams County Green Party,
13 the County Green Party, which had the most
14 candidates in 2005 of any county in America.

15 We are one of the most energized and
16 sustainable Green parties in Pennsylvania; that
17 and a few bucks will get you a nice cup of free
18 trade organic coffee.

19 I have the obligation to represent the
20 200 registered Greens in Adams County. While
21 other county parties remain silent, I am glad
22 you are willing to listen to a third party's
23 thoughts on this matter.

24 So, the location of this proposal at
25 first glance seems ideal, with its overdeveloped

1 Almost from birth, locals learned to
2 survive summers by taking every side street,
3 back alley and dirt road to avoid the
4 battlefield and downtown Gettysburg traffic.
5 Those who do not adapt move. Those who are left
6 pass these survival genes onto their children.

7 In fact, I suspect Mr. Levan didn't so
8 much start his Harley dealership in Adams County
9 out of a sense of good business investment, but
10 instead out of an unconscious and evolutionary
11 response to local traffic. It is just easier to
12 avoid traffic on a Harley.

13 Susan Paddock, Jim Paddock and myself
14 obtained a copy of Chance's traffic report. Not
15 by asking the county or Chance for a copy,
16 although both should have had a copy, but
17 instead, by alternately guilting a very pleasant
18 Anne Neeb and browbeating an overworked Nick
19 Hayes with constant e-mails and letters.

20 I'm sure of the very few people
21 enjoying this hearing process, Nick and Ann are
22 just glad to be out of the office.

23 In the end, we were both confused and
24 shocked by the information in the traffic
25 report. What I found most disturbing is

1 nature, first to top the DC metropolitan
2 gambling bubble, easy access via routes 30 and
3 15, and a seemingly respectful distance from the
4 Gettysburg National Military Park. What could
5 be better?

6 Do not be fooled by the sped-up digital
7 exit ramp drive, Chance's presentations are
8 nothing if not entertainment.

9 Do not be fooled by the just plain
10 devious traffic report. I'm sure your staff
11 have already heard the munchkins chiming,
12 "Follow the yellow brick road," and they read
13 this report, and the ever fascinating
14 topographical displays of distance from hallowed
15 ground.

16 Not only will the site not attract a DC
17 crowd, this site will eventually cripple the
18 local economy of the Borough of Gettysburg and
19 will act like a sponge on all area benefits,
20 while it spills forth obnoxious side effects and
21 traffic, traffic, traffic.

22 Traffic isn't just something that you
23 learn to deal with near Gettysburg. It has
24 become a Darwinian adaptive challenge for
25 survival.

1 Chance's constant and continued stance that the
2 traffic levels would be forever acceptable to
3 Adams County.

4 Chance's traffic impact report was
5 based upon 3,000 slots, while at the same time
6 openly claiming that they would build to hold
7 5,000 slots. In fact, they have every intention
8 of building 5,000 slots as soon as possible, and
9 the State has every intention of granting each
10 request for additional slots.

11 The next shock came from their choice
12 of timing in determining baseline traffic
13 conditions. Unlike Mr. Fuller's overinflated,
14 Gettysburg/DC metropolitan revenue assessment,
15 Chance bent over backwards to downplay the
16 traffic assessment.

17 Their existing condition data was taken
18 from the entrance to Gateway Gettysburg across
19 the road from the proposed site, and from
20 traffic occurring at the entrance of the
21 Charlestown racetrack in West Virginia.

22 I can find no fault in their site
23 choices for the data, but their timing was a wee
24 bit off. They decided to set up their test in
25 mid-November.

1 I have lived near Charlestown for a few
2 years and I have lived in Adams County for most
3 of my life. No one in either place would tell
4 you that mid-November is typical. How does
5 November traffic compare to traffic in July in
6 Gettysburg or Charlestown?

7 Next, the traffic study does not reach
8 far enough from the site. Honestly, Route 15
9 will do just fine with its proposed improvements
10 in handling traffic going north and south from
11 the site, but apparently some of the visitors
12 will want to go to Gettysburg.

13 In fact, Chance claims visitation will
14 skyrocket. Here is another funny thing in
15 Gettysburg. And I mean no disrespect to our
16 tourists, but they can't find the battlefield.

17 To watch Chance's video, you would be
18 hard-pressed to know there was a battlefield at
19 all. Oh, it's over there somewhere behind that
20 accidental geography.

21 Regardless, tourists from all
22 directions seem to think that if they just head
23 to the center of Gettysburg, they are just bound
24 to find the battlefield.

25 So like so many Lemmings -- and, again,

1 Harpers Ferry, when the Charlestown slots were
2 built.

3 How could a casino way over there
4 affect us? Like I said earlier, a few years
5 back, I moved to Harper's Ferry, and the traffic
6 from the Charlestown slot is handled well in the
7 immediate vicinity.

8 The real effects take place six miles
9 away at Harper's Ferry. On a summer Friday, it
10 took me 20 minutes to get to work in Frederick,
11 but an hour to get back.

12 In Harper's Ferry, you just get used to
13 using a highway on weekends, weekend mornings or
14 on weeknights before the slots kick up the
15 traffic.

16 I doubt Charlestown's traffic report
17 was required to go six miles away, but to look
18 beyond the immediate area for traffic effects is
19 short-sighted.

20 It is like a heart surgeon only looking
21 at the heart for potentially lethal blockage,
22 and Gettysburg is the square that will become
23 that lethal blockage.

24 Harpers Ferry's businesses and the
25 national park are still taking nitroglycerin

1 I mean no disrespect -- they converge on the
2 square, lose all sense of driving ability,
3 especially when it comes to yield signs, and
4 just start wandering around asking, where is the
5 battlefield? To a person, we all wonder how
6 they got to the square and missed it.

7 In high school, a friend of mine made a
8 T-shirt which stated, Yes, I live here but no, I
9 don't give directions.

10 Since returning to town and becoming an
11 elected official, I have taken a much more
12 appropriate view of our guests. If you haven't
13 been to visit yet, please come and visit, but
14 depending on how you vote later this year, you
15 might want to make your visit sooner than later.

16 I live in Gettysburg but don't shop at
17 the Route 30 Wal-Mart. It is a Green thing. I
18 buy all of my groceries in town, another Green
19 thing, and in all ways avoid Route 30 like the
20 plague. Not really a Green thing, just a
21 Gettysburg thing.

22 So why should I care about Crossroads'
23 traffic? To look at Chance's traffic report,
24 all will be fine once you drive west on Route 30
25 into Gettysburg. I'm sure it seemed the same in

1 pills to deal with effects of the development
2 six miles away.

3 So if the faulty seasonal traffic
4 baseline wasn't enough to throw their data off
5 and the limited range of their traffic
6 congestion report wasn't enough, we still have
7 to deal with the inevitable 2000 slot machines.

8 In 2008, by their own report,
9 Crossroads will send approximately 8% more cars
10 towards Gettysburg than would exist if the
11 casino was never built. Mind you, I'm not sure
12 if this adds up to economic boom Chance keeps
13 reporting for Gettysburg, but that is someone
14 else's testimony.

15 Now to hear their report, by 2018
16 traffic drops to just 6 to 7% increase. In
17 reality, by then, Chance would have added their
18 additional 2,000 slots, and that number of cars
19 headed towards Gettysburg increases by 10 to
20 11%.

21 The year the additional 2,000 slots are
22 added is the year Gettysburg goes to the
23 hospital. Until then, the summers will just be
24 a series of chest pains, but by the time our
25 traffic cholesterol hits 5,000 slots, we are

1 doomed.

2 We cannot handle this kind of traffic
3 impact. Our roads will become parking lots,
4 longer and later than we can handle.

5 Our heritage tourist base will become
6 completely fed up with trying to shop downtown,
7 and will have to visit the civil war aisle at
8 Wal-Mart to purchase their authentic civil war
9 bullets, stamped "made in China".

10 Their expense report shell game doesn't
11 end with the traffic. The traffic is only the
12 most notable off-site expense of this
13 unsustainable casino.

14 Now it is time to briefly go on site.
15 An operator who specializes in local casinos is
16 looking forward to the challenge of attracting
17 the 50- to 100-mile-away visitor, an operator
18 who has never run a casino of this size and
19 never with the Union workforce.

20 For that matter, what is the point of
21 claiming great jobs when they will be Union
22 jobs, and we have little unemployment, let alone
23 unemployed Union workers in Adams County. So
24 the workers will be from other counties and will
25 also add to our road congestion.

1 the state to prosper.

2 In some areas, especially areas which
3 need revenue or tourist enhancement, I could see
4 where the local tax share of revenue would be a
5 windfall and would help to alleviate some of the
6 casino-associated costs.

7 We are not that area. We do not need a
8 casino, or more to your tasks, Pennsylvania does
9 not need Gettysburg and Adams County to have a
10 casino.

11 For to challenge the words of
12 pro-casino Adams County founder, Tommy Gilbert,
13 who claimed without Gettysburg, there is no
14 casino, I say the opposite. With a casino,
15 there is no Gettysburg.

16 You have better places to put a casino,
17 places with a future that need more revenue, and
18 can generate more revenue without costing the
19 local economy.

20 We have found our place. We are
21 working to develop a sustainable Adams County,
22 despite a storm of urban sprawl, but we are
23 charting that course, and a casino now would
24 sink us.

25 Please, each of you, think about what

1 Investors who mostly have no intention
2 of staying to see this project through, thus
3 placing more and more power in the hands of a
4 second rate operator, an operator that was fined
5 by the Michigan Gaming Control Board for kicking
6 out gamers who had the gall to win too much.

7 Investors that haven't bothered to
8 introduce themselves to the local population and
9 alleviate our concerns that they won't just cut
10 and run. Instead, they hide behind one of our
11 local heroes, David LeVan, using him like a human
12 shield.

13 This investor/operator relationship
14 does not bode well as a sustainable partnership
15 that will have the best interest of locals in
16 mind.

17 And don't get me started on the
18 politics of it all. We Greens have a thing
19 about money and politics. So far the only
20 political support Chance can muster seems to be
21 with their checkbook.

22 The intention of Act 71 was a
23 revenue -- was to increase revenues for the
24 state and thus reduce taxes. I doubt the
25 intention was to hurt a local economy, only for

1 your votes mean to Gettysburg and Adams County.
2 And to paraphrase a famous visitor to
3 Gettysburg, The world will little note nor long
4 remember what we say here, but it will never
5 forget what you, the Pennsylvania Gaming Control
6 Board, do here.

7 Do not let Gettysburg perish from the
8 state or this nation. Do not build a casino on
9 this ground. Pennsylvania does not need it and
10 we don't want it here. Thank you very much.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
12 Our next scheduled speaker is Mr. Keith
13 Miller.

14 MR. MILLER: Good morning. I am Keith
15 Miller, Ridgefield, Connecticut, representing
16 the Adams Rescue Mission.

17 For the last 25 years I have worked in
18 marketing, business development, mergers and
19 acquisitions, and ventured capital. Using this
20 experience, I prepared a cross-benefit analysis
21 of casino gambling for Adams County, which the
22 Board has.

23 This report explains that the costs of
24 the proposed casino outweigh the benefits eight
25 to one. Chance has continually claimed Adams

1 County faces no casino costs. For this
2 deception alone, the license should be rejected.

3 Although the cost issue is important to
4 Adams, it is not, as I understand it, the
5 primary concern of the Board. Your mission is
6 to maximize gambling revenues for the State of
7 Pennsylvania.

8 Just as Chance's presentation failed to
9 address the cost to Adams, it failed to
10 meaningfully address how their casino would
11 maximize revenues for Pennsylvania. I would
12 like to provide you with three reasons why the
13 Gettysburg casino will fail to do this for you.

14 Despite Marty's concern that this thing
15 could be wildly successful and jam traffic, the
16 reality is the Gettysburg available market is
17 simply too small to succeed.

18 There is no legitimate market theme
19 that will help them grow out of this small
20 market problem.

21 A Pocono casino would generate eight
22 times more incremental revenue for the State of
23 Pennsylvania than a Gettysburg casino, and this
24 is ultimately what you are looking for.

25 Let me address each of those issues

1 to go gambling.

2 Charlestown generated \$355 million with
3 2.2 million adults living within 75 minutes of
4 the casino. On a comparable basis, if
5 Gettysburg is convenient to less than half a
6 million adults, it would generate only \$78
7 million of gambling revenue. This is a quarter
8 of Chance's exaggerated forecast, a total
9 failure for the State of Pennsylvania.

10 Not only would Gettysburg generate low
11 revenue, but about a third of what it would
12 generate would be cannibalized from what
13 Grantville can do.

14 Grantville can reach down into York,
15 Cumberland and Adams as easily as the proposed
16 casino in Gettysburg. So it is not adding much
17 incremental revenue to the state.

18 As a small site, Gettysburg will be
19 economically disadvantaged. At Revenues of \$100
20 million, their effective tax rate is not 54%,
21 but 62% because of a minimum \$10 million local
22 market assessment for the host township.

23 Delaware Park and Charlestown casino
24 owners receive over 25% more of the gambling
25 revenues, which would give them a significant

1 briefly: First, Chance's addressable market is
2 simply too small. They have claimed that their
3 attendance will be 3.2 million people.

4 Attendance of 2.2 million is from the 1 million
5 people who live within an hour of Gettysburg,
6 another 700,000 come from adults that live 1 to
7 2 hours away, and another 360,000 are current
8 heritage tourists diverted into the casino.

9 They claim they would generate 300
10 million in revenue, based on this. Convenience
11 casinos, such as this one, don't generate \$95
12 per patron, they visit (sic) \$59. Based on \$59,
13 this casino would generate less than \$190
14 million in revenue, if they had 3.2 million
15 attendance, which they won't get.

16 The forecast appears to have been
17 produced in a competitive vacuum. Of the
18 million adults living within an hour of
19 Gettysburg, over a half live closer to
20 Grantville to the north, Delaware Park to the
21 east and Charlestown to the south.

22 It will draw on a few small rural
23 counties in the middle, less than half a million
24 people will come to this place -- or will be
25 drawn to this place as a more convenient place

1 competitive advantage over this small
2 unprofitable casino.

3 Many casinos looked at Gettysburg,
4 including Ameristar, and they all rejected it.
5 Chance failed to attract a casino investor and
6 instead has settled on what is basically a
7 third-tier operator with questionable track
8 record of success, Millennium. And they are not
9 investing. They have agreed to work for a fee.

10 Second, there is no workable marketing
11 theme for growing this market. Chance needs to
12 market to the Civil War tourists that come here.
13 They have said that they will divert 20% of
14 these people.

15 In testimony on April 5th, Chance's
16 architect Cope Linder said that the proposed
17 casino will have no theming which would
18 detract or trivialize the Civil War. They have
19 said -- they did not say there will be no Civil
20 War theming. They qualified that in their
21 opinion, it would not detract or trivialize.

22 Critical to capturing Civil War
23 tourists, which predominantly travel as
24 families, will be marketing to families. David
25 Levan of Chance has said they will provide child

1 care. But Bill Wortman of Millenium claims, I
2 don't think casinos are any place for kids. I
3 agree.

4 Clearly attracting attendance of the
5 Civil War tourists presents a theming conflict.
6 How can you bring in the families with the kids
7 without doing something which we all think is
8 wrong?

9 Marketing to families and children also
10 is inconsistent with marketing to the most
11 profitable segment of gamblers, young, adult
12 males who like to mix sexual themes with their
13 gambling; A La Borgata, which was designed by
14 Chance's architect Cope Linder.

15 Chance's tourism expert Duarte Morais
16 claims wild west towns like Blackhawk and
17 Deadwood were able to recreate themselves as
18 tourism gambling places with dancing girls and
19 old wild west themes. That is, in effect, an
20 appropriate theme for them. It would be
21 inconsistent and inconceivable for Gettysburg.

22 At times, Chance has said they will
23 market to older women, but this is a very small
24 market and a relatively poor niche as they don't
25 tend to lose as much as the young males.

1 The 2002 Bureau of Labor Statistics
2 data shows that arts and accomodation revenues
3 in the Lehigh Valley were \$830 million, the
4 Poconos 384, Adams only \$131 million. There is
5 not much to build on here.

6 The Poconos and Lehigh Valley are
7 larger travel and accommodation markets than
8 Adams, providing a better opportunity for
9 Pennsylvania to maximize revenue. Markets in
10 the north and east are also larger and face less
11 competition than those to the south.

12 There are almost 16 million adults that
13 live in and to the northeast of Pennsylvania, in
14 an area that runs from Wilkes-Barre to the
15 Lehigh Valley to New York City to Monticello.
16 This is 50 percent more than the 10.7 million
17 that live in the area around Harrisburg,
18 Philadelphia, wilmingon, Baltimore, Washington
19 and Charlestown.

20 Without the Poconos casino, if you look
21 at how many slots are targeted in the northern
22 area, you come up with 1.4 slots per thousand
23 adults. In the southern area, it's 3.1 slots
24 per thousand adults. Twice as many.

25 Adding a Poconos casino might bring a

1 So basically a Gettysburg casino faces
2 a cunundrum. How will they market to succeed in
3 this very small area? And basically they will
4 exploit everything they can to make it happen.

5 While you face an easy choice, this is
6 not the most profitable place for you to go. I
7 built a model to look at two scenarios for
8 Pennsylvania.

9 The two scenarios both assume that you
10 would put one casino in the Lehigh Valley and
11 the other freestanding casino would either go in
12 the Poconos or Gettysburg. I did not consider
13 what would happen with Limerick as a third
14 alternative.

15 Historically, Adams is a smaller
16 tourism market. National Park Service data
17 indicates that the Delaware Water Gap, just east
18 of the Poconos, has an attendance of about 5
19 million, which is three times more than the
20 visitation to Gettysburg.

21 According to the 2003 Pennsylvania
22 travel profile, the Poconos drew 3.4 million
23 overnight leisure person trips, the Lehigh
24 Valley 1 and a half million, and Gettysburg
25 about 900,000.

1 little balance. It would bring you up to 1.7
2 slots per thousand adults, while adding a casino
3 in Gettysburg would simply oversaturate an
4 already well-served market.

5 Two comments on competition. Although
6 Maryland is debating adding casinos, they
7 already have 10,000, which depressed Maryland's
8 demand for casino gambling.

9 Harrah's 2004 gambling profile
10 indicates that Maryland and Washington, DC
11 casino gamblers may be worth a third less than
12 those gamblers coming from New Jersey and New
13 York City.

14 New York is looking at Racinos, but
15 they have been very slow to open because of high
16 taxes which are now set at 72%. These Racinos
17 have too few slots with limited hours of
18 operations to adequately satisfy New York City.
19 And they are not going to draw the northern New
20 Jersey gamblers, who can easily go to the
21 Poconos and Allentown, and want to go there
22 anyway to visit the tourist attractions.

23 I built a gravity model to basically
24 look at how Pennsylvania can maximize revenue.
25 The model consistently compares system revenues

1 based upon a distance of a population from a
2 casino site.

3 A Pocono casino addresses \$731 million
4 in incremental Pennsylvania gambling revenue. A
5 Gettysburg casino addresses \$159 million in
6 revenue, 65 million of which is cannibalized
7 from Grantville. So the incremental revenue is
8 only \$94 million. Comparing these opportunities
9 shows that a Poconos casino addresses eight
10 times more incremental system revenue than a
11 Gettysburg casino would produce.

12 As noted, Gettysburg could be far
13 worse. The comparison to Charlestown indicates
14 its revenue might only be \$78 million, which is
15 half the \$159 million I just described.

16 In conclusion, a Gettysburg casino is
17 wrong. It is an assault upon our nation's
18 heritage. It is wrong. It would harm a
19 valuable tourist industry, which employs 3600
20 people.

21 It is wrong because there is no
22 workable theme to maximize revenue, but mostly
23 important to you, it is wrong because it would
24 fail to generate the revenue you need to make
25 gambling successful for the State of

1 to speak on the impacts of the possible slots
2 parlor in Gettysburg.

3 Our ministry currently has programs in
4 11 of the 14 elementary and intermediate public
5 schools in the county. I believe I can speak
6 from a unique perspective because of my contact
7 with the children throughout the county.

8 I hear their concerns. I know the
9 cries of their hearts. I know what burdens them
10 as they share each week in our clubs and
11 classes.

12 The focus of my comments will be on the
13 impact of gambling upon children and their
14 families.

15 Dr. Valerie Lorenz, Executive Director
16 of Compulsive Gambling Center, not too far from
17 Gettysburg, down in Baltimore, said, compulsive
18 gambling is devastating to the individual, to
19 marriages, as well as to every single family
20 member.

21 I would like to touch on a few of those
22 areas of impact: Divorce. Divorce impacts each
23 member of the family, although only one person
24 may decide, the wife or the husband, to file for
25 divorce.

1 Pennsylvania.

2 This should not be a surprise. The
3 PCGB faces a relatively easy decision. The
4 application from Chance should and can be
5 rejected now, because there is simply not enough
6 market to justify it.

7 So the Board can productively focus its
8 efforts, and for the sake of Gettysburg,
9 Pennsylvania, and our country, I encourage you
10 to move now to terminate consideration of
11 Chance's license application. Thank you.

12 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

13 Our next scheduled speaker is Bruce
14 Hoover. Good morning.

15 MR. HOOVER: Good morning.

16 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may
17 proceed.

18 MR. HOOVER: Hello. My name is Bruce
19 Hoover. I live in the Borough of Biglerville,
20 Pennsylvania.

21 I am the Executive Director of Child
22 Evangelism Fellowship of Adams County, an
23 organization and ministry that has been serving
24 the community, especially children, for 53
25 years. Thank you for this time and opportunity

1 A study of 400 Gambler Anonymous
2 members showed that 28 percent reported that
3 they were either separated or divorced as a
4 direct result of their gambling.

5 The Rapid City Journal reported in
6 October of 1994 an article entitled Video
7 Gambling Roulette. It reported an increase of
8 more than 200 divorces per year in a
9 sparsely-populated South Dakota area after video
10 gambling was legalized there.

11 I know and I see the hurt that divorce
12 has on children.

13 In Harrison County, Mississippi, the
14 rate of divorce and other family problems
15 increased, not by 100%, not by 200%, but by 300%
16 since the introduction of casinos; that report
17 was done by the Mississippi State Department of
18 Health.

19 Domestic violence is another impact
20 upon families and children.

21 As a third-grade child in one of our
22 classes shared just the other week, she said
23 that her parents were arguing and fighting, it
24 made her uncomfortable. So she went to her room
25 and prayed that they would stop. Her heart was

1 torn by the way her parents were treating each
2 other, the people who were supposed to love one
3 another.

4 In the Mississippi Gulf Coast region,
5 it is reported that the request for assistance
6 by domestic violence shelters increased between
7 100 and 300% after the introduction of casinos
8 in the area.

9 while domestic violence is terrible,
10 child abuse and neglect are also serious
11 outcomes of gambling.

12 In Indiana, review of the State's
13 Gambling Commission records revealed that 72
14 children were found abandoned on casino premises
15 during a 14-month period.

16 In Louisiana and South Carolina,
17 children have died after being locked in hot
18 cars for hours while their caregivers gambled.

19 In Illinois, a mother was sentenced to
20 prison for suffocating her infant daughter in
21 order to collect insurance money in order to
22 continue gambling.

23 I know that these are extreme cases,
24 but there is no guarantee that these types of
25 child neglect and abuse will not happen in our

1 without him if he just took his own life.

2 I believe that I have clearly
3 demonstrated the adverse impact that gambling
4 has on children and families. It's an offense
5 to children as it harms them in so many areas of
6 their lives which they have no control over.
7 It causes children to stumble in their lives.

8 In light of this, let me close with
9 just one verse from God's word. He gives a
10 warning to those who would offend children. He
11 says, It was better for him that a millstone
12 were hung about his neck and they were cast into
13 the sea, than if he should offend one of these
14 little ones.

15 Thank you for your time and
16 consideration.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
18 Mr. Hoover.

19 Our next scheduled speaker is Michael
20 Siegel.

21 Good morning. You may proceed.

22 MR. SIEGEL: Good morning. My name is
23 Mike Siegel. I am speaking on businesses
24 against the casino, a group of approximately 100
25 Gettysburg area local businesses.

1 community. Gambling also has an impact upon the
2 finances of the family.

3 A study conducted by the Herald Sun in
4 1996 revealed that 45% of the money used for
5 gambling comes from housekeeping and living
6 budgets; that means the money that would be
7 used for housing, for food, for heat, for
8 clothing -- the needs of the family -- is used
9 instead for gambling. The next closest category
10 was household and personal entertainment, which
11 is only 22%.

12 Almost 50% of funds used for gambling
13 is taken away from the family living needs.
14 This cannot lead to even the worst
15 consequences for children.

16 In November of 2000, a man in Michigan
17 killed himself, his pregnant wife and their
18 three children. He owned a printing company and
19 used the funds from the company to support his
20 gambling. He amassed a debt of \$500,000.

21 A suicide note clearly indicated that
22 he was sorry he had to take the lives of his
23 wife, his seven-year old, his six-year-old and
24 his two-year-old children. The note suggested
25 that he felt that the family could not live

1 I have prepared written remarks that
2 were submitted to you. I am a public and
3 environmental finance and development impact
4 consultant. I build econometric and fiscal
5 impact and development impact models and do such
6 work for clients throughout the country and have
7 been doing so for about 28 years.

8 I think the best place for us to start
9 is actually in Vicksburg. We have been hearing
10 that the casinos there increased battlefield
11 visitation in Vicksburg, and if you'll -- I
12 don't think you have the handout. I asked the
13 clerk to give it to you. But you can see in the
14 first year --

15 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Hold on a
16 second, Mr. Siegel.

17 You may proceed.

18 MR. SIEGEL: Thank you. Just turning
19 to the first page, I have excerpted it from the
20 national park service, their visitation data.
21 It goes back even further, but just so it would
22 fit on this page, 1990 to 2005 visitation.

23 The first casinos opened in Vicksburg
24 in mid-August of 1993. A second one opened in
25 late November. This shows no impact on the

1 visitor season because, like here, their visitor
2 season starts now, April.

3 A third casino, the largest of the four
4 that opened, by far the largest of four that
5 opened in late February of 1994 and the fourth
6 opened in mid-July.

7 So the first opportunity for those four
8 casinos, the first three and a little bit for
9 the fourth one, to affect visitation at
10 Vicksburg National Military Park was in 1994,
11 and you see that visitation plummeted 21% on a
12 calendar year over calendar year basis.

13 Now, we have heard the applicants say
14 that, no, these casinos have added to the
15 visitation. And they have said, I think, 20% of
16 the casino visitors will go to Vicksburg, will
17 go to the battlefield.

18 Well, clearly if 20% had gone, that
19 number would have gone up to about 1.3, even 1.4
20 million. Well, they didn't go. This is a
21 subtraction, it is not an addition, and you see
22 that it fell.

23 200,000 people didn't show up that
24 year. The question is, where did they go? Not
25 only did they not show up that year, they only

1 times as large as the Borough of Gettysburg, the
2 Borough of Gettysburg. The battlefield
3 visitation is proportionately almost the same,
4 relative to the size of the county, and it is
5 also a smaller market area.

6 So we have statistical data, economic
7 data, where we can see impact of this, if this
8 were Chicago or New Orleans, Detroit or
9 whatever, it would be lost. We couldn't even
10 see it; but we will be able to see this and we
11 will be able to look at it in a moment.

12 But I want to go back to what is not
13 shown on this table. There were four other
14 times when visitation plunged 20% at their
15 battlefield, it was during the Iran/Iraq war
16 when oil prices doubled about and reached
17 today's dollars about \$85 a barrel, \$20 more
18 than they are now.

19 They plunged when they instituted a
20 visitor fee and started charging somewhere
21 around \$8 for each visitor to come in, plus \$4 a
22 head or more for any buses that came in and it
23 plunged, and it didn't recover until after the
24 recession.

25 It plunged again after the New Orleans

1 began to trickle back slowly.

2 In 1996, it jumped because of the
3 Atlanta Olympics, people on their way to the
4 Olympics were stopping over in Vicksburg so that
5 actually masked some of the negative impact.

6 What you see here is it took four to
7 five years, after those casinos opened, for the
8 battlefield visitation just to get back to go,
9 and it's been struggling ever since. Now, I
10 don't know how you count to 11 here, because we
11 have heard testimony given to you that in 11 or
12 12 years it increased.

13 Well, in a few years it just barely
14 managed to struggle back, but it has been
15 struggling and it took four years to do so.

16 Now, look at 2005. Look at that fall
17 off. That is Katrina. Katrina caused a 30 to
18 34% decline in visitation. The casinos caused a
19 21% decline. You can see the magnitude of the
20 impact on a small, comparable community.
21 Because Vicksburg, in Warren County, Tennessee
22 is the perfect laboratory for us. I am glad the
23 applicant selected it.

24 The county is about half the size of
25 Adams county. Vicksburg City is about three

1 World's Fair, which brought 7.3 million people
2 to that fair, many of whom stayed over in -- or
3 stopped over in Vicksburg and visited the
4 battlefield, but it plunged about 20%. Those
5 are shocks. One of those is a positive shock
6 and three of those are negative shocks. The
7 casino is a negative shock to visitation.

8 Now, that is one of the data that we
9 have to tell us what's going to happen, because
10 while it is important to the battlefield, the
11 integrity of the battlefield from an economic
12 standpoint, we want to know what happened to
13 those people and what happened to their
14 billfolds, because most people take their
15 billfolds and their pocketbooks with them. When
16 we look at some of the economic data, we can
17 begin to tell what is happening.

18 Now, my comments submitted to you noted
19 that Dr. Fuller's analysis does not account for
20 a single dollar, a single dime of diversion,
21 what is called diversion, substitution,
22 transfer, redistribution, there's a lot of names
23 for it, cannibalization. Not a single dime.

24 The applicant has submitted to you
25 materially and substantially false testimony

1 about the impact of these casinos on visitation.
2 We need to know why. What happened? Why? What
3 effect did that have?

4 We can see that in some of the economic
5 data, and if you will turn to what is labeled
6 page 33, there is very small-typed charts.
7 These are the Official Bureau of Economic
8 Analysis data that are used, basically, to
9 populate most econometric models, input/output
10 models, which is the kind of model that was
11 applied in Chance's local impact report.

12 What we can see is this history. You
13 know, we are going to the videotape, here.
14 Okay? This is history. This is data. This is
15 real. This is live. This is what happened.

16 What we see is in Warren County,
17 employment jumped up, certainly attributable to
18 3,000 jobs that were on site within the doors of
19 those four casinos. We know exactly how many
20 people are employed there, because I got the
21 data from the Mississippi Gaming Commission in
22 those two years.

23 After that, what happened? Well, we
24 were supposed to get, according to Dr. Fuller's
25 analysis, two off-site jobs for every single

1 Well, the data, the data tells us
2 something did happen. Not only was there no
3 multiplier effect -- and the analysis says it is
4 a 1.36 multiplier job for job -- I mean dollar
5 for dollar, and a 2.0 multiplier job for job.
6 Not only was there no job multiplier effect, but
7 we had a negative impact.

8 Now, there was a Wal-Mart that opened
9 there in 1998 and that took off some retail
10 jobs, about 300, but when we account for that,
11 we see zero net new jobs outside of the doors of
12 the casino. We are told there will be 2,000 of
13 them in Adams County. They didn't happen and
14 didn't appear.

15 If you turn the page -- and look at
16 Adam County. Adams County is one of the most
17 robust, dynamic, prosperous economies on a
18 county basis in the state. It compares
19 favorably to Montgomery County, suburban
20 Philadelphia, one of your most robust counties
21 and wealthy counties.

22 Look at its job growth. Healthy,
23 robust, dynamic job growth in all sectors,
24 pretty much across all spans of time. This only
25 goes up to 2000, but it is continued well into

1 on-site casino job in Adams County.

2 Well, did it happen in Warren County?
3 This is their example, Did it happen in Warren
4 County?

5 What you see, their employment actually
6 dropped, if you take out the manufacturing
7 employment, which is automotive related there.
8 It has nothing to do with casinos.

9 Employment dropped on a net basis.
10 There was not a single -- as close as we can
11 measure it, there is always, you know, 1 or 2%
12 error. But as close as we can measure these
13 things, there was not a single net, new,
14 off-site job added in Warren County through
15 2003. Ten years later, it hasn't happened.

16 Why? Why? Why? We must know the
17 answer to this. It is absolutely essential.
18 Not only because of the local impact on Warren
19 County, but your purpose, which is to try to
20 maximize revenues.

21 Well, there are two explanations.
22 Number one, diversion, something the applicant's
23 consultant says doesn't happen, won't happen, no
24 research, never happened, no support for it
25 whatsoever.

1 2003, which is the most recent data.

2 You can see that in two years they will
3 add as many jobs as we have vaporously projected
4 in the local impact report in two years.

5 Those jobs will be across all sectors,
6 and they will be jobs that will add and
7 complement the community. They are not going to
8 be jobs that are going to cannibalize

9 Now, cannibalization, we are told by
10 the applicant that it doesn't exist; but we have
11 a study from University of Southern Mississippi,
12 who said, Hey, there is something wrong with
13 Vicksburg. It is not doing like Gulfport or
14 Biloxi or Tunica. What happened? They
15 diverted. This study done right here is done by
16 the professor of Southern Mississippi.

17 The other thing that is very strange is
18 the overnight visitation figure that is used in
19 the LIR, cannot justify it. It cannot be
20 documented.

21 If you turn --
22 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Mr.
23 Seigel, we are ready for the next speaker.

24 MR. SEIGEL: All right. I will direct
25 your attention to the last page for that

1 information. Thank you.

2 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
3 Our next speaker for a ten-minute slot
4 this morning is Richard Randall. You may
5 proceed.

6 MR. RANDALL: Members of the
7 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board. Thank you
8 for hearing what Freedom Valley Worship Center
9 Church has to say about the casino in
10 Gettysburg.

11 My name is Rich Randall, member in good
12 standing and living in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.
13 I was asked by the pastor to speak for the
14 church.

15 Freedom Valley Worship Center moved to
16 its current location at 3185 York Road in
17 Gettysburg six years ago, but the overall
18 mission is to help people who have given up on
19 church to learn about Jesus Christ and
20 ultimately to form a personal relationship with
21 him.

22 There are over 600 adults attending our
23 weekend services and about as many children,
24 over 100 teenagers attend our youth program each
25 week.

1 Jesus' parable of the talents indicates
2 that the good and faithful servants administer
3 the talents entrusted to them in a way that the
4 Master was pleased. The wicked and soulful
5 servant failed in his administration, suffered
6 the appropriate consequences.

7 The lesson is to place your time,
8 energy and money in good things and advance the
9 kingdom of God. Do not store up for yourselves
10 treasures on earth where moth and rust destroy
11 and thieves break in and steal, but store up for
12 yourselves treasures in heaven where moth and
13 rust do not destroy and where thieves do not
14 break in and steal.

15 The Bible instructs believers, whatever
16 you do, do it all for the glory of God. God is
17 not glorified when people put their trust in
18 chance rather than in the Lord.

19 Glorification of mere chance is denial
20 of the divine order of nature. To risk money
21 haphazardly is to disregard insistence of the
22 church in every age that possessions are a
23 trust, and that men must account to God for
24 their use.

25 Secondly, we emphasize the need for

1 Now, in the course of the discussion, I
2 will not cite references; however, they are
3 cited in a printed version. My three references
4 are, A Cost Benefit Analysis of Casino Gambling
5 in Adams County by Keith Miller, this blue study
6 pamphlet; A Biblical Perspective on Gambling, by
7 the Assemblies of God Council; and the Bible by
8 God.

9 Certain aspects of our church mission
10 are particularly important to the matter at hand
11 today. First of all, we test responsible
12 Christian stewardship in two ways. We teach
13 God's word about managing money and caring for
14 the family. We teach God's word about investing
15 in the kingdom of God.

16 Since all things belong to God, people
17 are placed in the position of stewards, who must
18 give a proper accounting for everything given to
19 them in trust. The earth is the Lord's and
20 everything in it, the world and all who live in
21 it.

22 We have great family programs at
23 Freedom Valley Worship Center. We always
24 emphasize that care for the family is a high
25 priority.

1 Christians to help others, to teach people the
2 habits of love, giving and the supporting
3 others.

4 We are home to dozens of ministries
5 that help people, ranging from visiting the
6 sick, through training prisoners for their
7 release back to society, hosting support groups
8 for recovering substance abusers and even
9 therapeutic treatment of children with
10 disabilities.

11 Not only is the Christian to love those
12 who are lovable but even the enemies. God's
13 people are to love their neighbors as
14 themselves.

15 The nature of gambling is such that a
16 person has a chance of gain only because others
17 have suffered loss.

18 The economic benefits come only to a
19 very few. The financial loss is borne by people
20 who often can least afford it.

21 Persistent appeal of gambling to
22 covetousness is fundamentally the opposite of
23 the unselfishness taught by Jesus Christ and by
24 the New Testament as a whole. The attempts to
25 make profit out of the inevitable loss and

1 possible suffering of others is the antithesis
2 of the love of one's neighbor, of which our Lord
3 clearly insisted.

4 Third, we teach the work ethic of
5 scripture. Throughout scripture, the importance
6 of work is emphasized. In several places, the
7 correlation between working and eating is
8 stated. He who works his land will have
9 abundant food. When we were with you, we gave
10 you this rule, If a pen will not work, he shall
11 not eat.

12 The Bible warns against something from
13 nothing, get rich quick approach. Gambling,
14 whether to secure wealth in a hurry or to place
15 bread on the table, is inconsistent with what
16 the Bible teaches about work.

17 Finally, we teach avoidance of
18 unhealthy habits and addictions. The word of
19 God points out that a Christian will refuse to
20 be brought under the power even of lawful
21 things.

22 The person that is indwelt by the
23 Holy Spirit will be characterized by temperance
24 and self-control. Paul described the condition
25 clearly when he wrote, don't you know that when

1 There will be over \$34 million in
2 abused funds each year, and that is money that
3 is required by families for basic necessities
4 that will be diverted to gambling losses.

5 I want to add at this point, Freedom
6 Valley Worship Center offers pastoral counseling
7 services to all comers. We help people
8 suffering from various problems and ailments,
9 divorces, bankruptcy, loss of loved ones, et
10 cetera.

11 We have, in fact, counseled compulsive
12 gamblers. So we must anticipate a huge increase
13 in the retirement for our counseling services as
14 a product of the gambling casino, while all that
15 we accomplish at Freedom Valley Worship Center
16 is largely subsidized by our tithing church
17 members.

18 In summary, the proposed slot machine
19 parlor and gambling hall is detrimental to our
20 church mission. God is not glorified when
21 people put their trust in shafts. God's word
22 concerning stewardship, consideration of others
23 and the indignity of honest labor is violated.

24 How much harder will it be for us to
25 teach our people Christian values with the

1 you offer yourself to someone to obey them as
2 slaves, you are as slaves indeed to the one whom
3 you obey.

4 It is obvious that habitual gamblers
5 are under the control of compulsion to gamble.
6 Rather than being servants of God, they are
7 servants of a desire they cannot control.

8 We must face the facts that good
9 people, good citizens of our own community, even
10 our own church, will become addicted at Chance
11 Enterprises and will be ruined.

12 A few of the things that we are worried
13 about that are described clearly in the cost
14 benefit analysis that I referred to: Gamble
15 addictions double within 50 miles of the casino.
16 There will be over 2,000 more pathological
17 gamblers in our county.

18 There will be nearly 3,000 more problem
19 gamblers in the county; and that is just a
20 degree of how much money they lose.

21 We can expect large increases in the
22 incidents of domestic violence, arrests,
23 incarcerations, crime, lost jobs, divorces, over
24 700 more of those; bankruptcies, over 400 more
25 of those; depression and possibly suicide.

1 presence of monolithic and legal gambling casino
2 in our front yard? We will bear the cost of
3 healing the damage to our people, financial,
4 economic and ethical.

5 We also lament the predicted decline in
6 heritage tourism which means fewer visitors to
7 the church and fewer people who will hear the
8 good news of the gospel.

9 The cost benefit analysis findings are
10 clear, and everyone should read this document
11 who has a stake in this matter.

12 Thank you for considering my inputs.

13 At this point, my remarks for Freedom
14 Valley Worship Center are concluded; however, I
15 have personal remarks, and I was advised by
16 Mr. Jack Simmons of your group that I could add
17 those remarks to my time period.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: If you
19 will just hold on a minute.

20 MR. RANDALL: Yes.

21 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Will it be
22 inconvenient for you to do so when we commence
23 with the individual remarks section? And you
24 might want to know that we have three other
25 ten-minute slot speakers scheduled here this

1 morning, and we are prepared to receive their
2 community group commentary before we shift to
3 individual commentary. I did stop the clock on
4 your ten-minute allotment. It shows a minute
5 and 35 seconds remaining.

6 Your choices would appear to be, shift
7 your gears to a minute and a half of your three
8 minutes now and proceed, or if it's convenient,
9 to permit us to go forward with the scheduled
10 community groups for the ten-minute slots and we
11 will afford you your three minutes when we come
12 to your individual slots.

13 MR. RANDALL: Yes, I would prefer to
14 speak separately.

15 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Very good.
16 Thank you.

17 MR. RANDALL: Thank you.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Our next
19 scheduled speaker is Francis Pennings. Good
20 morning.

21 MR. PENNINGS: Good morning.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may
23 proceed.

24 MR. PENNINGS: Thank you.

25 As you said, my name is Francis

1 feed mill and fertilizer supplier Ag Com is
2 located right off of Route 30.

3 If the casino materializes, there will
4 be other business interests introduced in order
5 to take advantage of the new guests. This will
6 put more development pressure on the land in the
7 area. The ag community is already feeling the
8 effects of decreased availability and increased
9 land costs. We think that a casino will
10 accelerate the trend.

11 Adams County currently has very low
12 unemployment. The majority of the casino jobs
13 that will be created will not pay enough for
14 people to make it feasible to commute to this
15 area for work. Therefore, we feel it will
16 create pressure for low-end housing. This
17 pressure will use more of our limited land
18 resources.

19 In conclusion, we do not want a casino
20 in Adams County because of increased traffic, as
21 well as increased development from new
22 businesses and housing. We wish to continue to
23 enjoy a rural county where agriculture is the
24 number one industry.

25 We feel that since growing food is

1 Pennings. I live in New Oxford. I am a dairy
2 farmer in Adams County.

3 Today I am here representing the Adams
4 County Farm Bureau. We currently have 934
5 members. At our annual spring meeting we voted
6 on and passed a resolution. Our new policy
7 states, "The Adams County Farm Bureau does not
8 support gambling casinos because of the impact
9 on the rural community and Adams County."

10 Currently, agriculture is the number
11 one industry in Adams County. We use the local
12 roads in our daily operations. The capacity of
13 the local roads is already being challenged due
14 to an increasing population and constant
15 residential development.

16 We use the local roads for our
17 tractors, equipment and farm vehicles. Like
18 many other businesses, agriculture is time
19 sensitive with the weather sometimes dictating
20 our schedule.

21 It could be argued that the casino
22 patrons will mainly use routes 15 and 30. This
23 is mostly true; however, we feel that the local
24 residents will use alternate routes to avoid the
25 new traffic congestion. Also, our busiest local

1 weather dependent, that is enough of a gamble
2 for us. Thank you very much.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

4 We are scheduled to take a break at
5 10:30 for 15 minutes, and we are going to
6 proceed to do that. We will resume at 10:45.

7 (Break.)

8 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Ladies and
9 gentlemen, we are ready to proceed. If you
10 would please have your seat. Our first speaker
11 post the morning break will be Laura S.
12 Pennings, M.D.

13 Ms. Pennings, you may proceed to the
14 microphone and we will start.

15 DR. PENNINGS: Good morning, Mr.
16 Chairman and members of the Board. My name is
17 Dr. Laura Pennings. I am a family physician
18 with a practice in Biglerville. I grew up in
19 Gettysburg and I live in New Oxford.

20 I stand before you today to present the
21 consensus opinion of the Adams County Medical
22 Society in regards to the presence of the
23 Crossroads casino in our community.

24 In order to understand our stance, I
25 think it may help you to understand a bit about

1 the history of the Adams County Medical Society,
2 and some of this information is actually taken
3 from the literature of the society.

4 County Medical Societies are local
5 partners of the Pennsylvania Medical Society,
6 who in turn are affiliates of the American
7 Medical Association.

8 In Pennsylvania, these societies were
9 formed over 150 localized public health crises
10 like tainted wells, rapidly spreading
11 contagions, et cetera.

12 They provided county physicians a forum
13 to educate themselves on problems and develop
14 coordinated solutions to improve the health and
15 welfare of their communities.

16 Gradually, these societies established
17 standards for the practice of medicine in their
18 areas, rooting out quacks and charlatans and
19 educating patients about the latest advances in
20 medicine and medical technology.

21 Eventually as medicine became more
22 complex, the County Medical Societies banded
23 together to form the PA Medical Society.

24 Today, the purpose of our group is to
25 extend medical knowledge, advance medical

1 impassioned about the issue for personal or
2 professional reasons.

3 The members of the Adams County Medical
4 Society are no different. We are men and women,
5 we are mothers and fathers, who live, work and
6 play in Gettysburg and Adams County.

7 We are professionals from primary care
8 physicians to specialists whose patients will
9 definitely be affected by the presence of this
10 casino.

11 In forming this consensus opinion, each
12 member searched and voted his or her own
13 conscience based on the information available
14 thus far; therefore, I do not presume to offer
15 expert medical opinion about the impact of the
16 casino on Gettysburg.

17 However, in my review of the medical
18 literature, there are ample studies,
19 particularly from the psychological body of
20 literature, that speak to varying levels of
21 detrimental effects of gambling on the physical
22 and mental health of the public.

23 I have not found a single study that
24 suggests that the public's health or mental
25 health has actually been improved by the

1 science, to elevate and maintain standards in
2 medical education, to uphold the ethics and
3 dignity of our profession and to establish
4 friendly intercourse among physicians with the
5 public.

6 We also strive to promote and enlighten
7 the public health and hygiene so that our
8 profession shall become most useful to the
9 public in preventing and managing disease and in
10 prolonging and adding comfort to the quality of
11 life.

12 Therefore, my purpose in testifying
13 before you today is in keeping with the above
14 principles. I would like to state that the
15 membership of the Adams County Medical Society
16 by a consensus vote does not welcome this casino
17 to Gettysburg.

18 In the media's coverage of this over
19 the last several months, conflicting expert
20 studies have been offered on support on both
21 sides of the issue.

22 One expert says the casino will have a
23 totally positive impact on our area. Another
24 expert says that the casino will have a negative
25 impact. And most everyone, of course, is most

1 presence of a casino or gambling.

2 When each of us physicians graduated
3 from medical school, we raised our hands and
4 cited the Hippocratic Oath, which has become
5 very familiar to the public.

6 In a paraphrased version of this oath
7 by Louis Lasagna in 1964, it states, and I
8 quote, I will prevent disease whenever I can for
9 prevention is preferable to cure. Above all, I
10 will do no harm.

11 You, the members of the Board, are
12 still in a position to do no harm by voting
13 against bringing a casino to Gettysburg.

14 The Adams County Medical Society does
15 not welcome this casino in Gettysburg.

16 Thank you for your kind attention to my
17 remarks.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
19 Our next scheduled speaker is David R.
20 Weber.

21 MR. WEBER: Thank you.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may
23 proceed.

24 MR. WEBER: Thank you. I am Dave
25 Weber. I am here representing the Kiwanis Club.

1 I am a charter member of the Gettysburg/Adams
2 Kiwanis Club.

3 Kiwanis is a global organization of
4 volunteers dedicated to changing the world, one
5 child and one community at a time.

6 Even though there is over 300,000 of us
7 Kiwanians or around there, the reality is that
8 Kiwanis is made up of small, local community
9 volunteer groups, sometimes as little as 10 or
10 15 people; but you will find us in Gettysburg
11 out there selling hot dogs and barbecue and
12 sodas to hungry shoppers and antique shoppers at
13 our fair.

14 We, in turn, turn these funds over to
15 local community groups as they pertain
16 particularly to children's issues: The
17 Children's Reading Program, the ball clubs,
18 anywhere that there is a need, these are the
19 funds that we raise, and also we volunteer our
20 time for reading and different organizations.

21 We are ordinary people, humbly serving
22 the needy children of Adams County, and we don't
23 have a million dollars to offer by way of any
24 type of influence. We simply have a voice and
25 we would like our voice to be heard.

1 this casino.

2 There may not have been a major part of
3 the battle fought there. I don't know. But I
4 do know that there is a battle being fought
5 there right now.

6 You may step down. Thank you, General.

7 I watched this morning and yesterday
8 morning the fantasy video, and I call it a
9 fantasy video of the beautiful, wonderful, happy
10 gambling people, eating and drinking and
11 winning, pulling their winnings out of the
12 machine, and I thought, what a wonderful,
13 wonderful thing.

14 But for any of you who have ever been
15 to a casino, and I can only speak for myself, I
16 have been there one time, in the early 1980's I
17 went to Atlantic City, and what I witnessed did
18 not resemble what I saw on that video.

19 The truth is, as so many people before
20 me have said, gambling is an addiction, drinking
21 is an addiction, and it's been very well
22 documented.

23 I would like to make one quote -- and
24 again, a lot of the information I was going to
25 give has already been presented -- but in

1 On behalf of Gettysburg/Adams Kiwanis
2 Club, I would like to say that we oppose and
3 reject the idea of having a casino in
4 Gettysburg.

5 A lot of the information that I was
6 going to present today has already been very
7 admirably presented by some of my predecessors,
8 so I am not going to be redundant.

9 I would like to offer one issue as it
10 pertains to children, and that is the proposed
11 site for the casino, which General Lee is
12 holding here next to me, the orange site here,
13 right across -- this is Route 30.

14 This green patch here is an existing
15 facility. It is not a factory, it is not a --
16 they don't build elevators or do anything like
17 that. What they do is play baseball right
18 there; that is the Straban Township youth ball
19 field, in existence, 13 acres.

20 As you can see from the diagram, it is
21 directly behind the casino. The parking lots
22 are adjacent to it, the view of the hotel rooms,
23 and you can also see by way of access, there is
24 no way that the families of Gettysburg can
25 access this ballpark without being influenced by

1 testimony before the tourism committee, Chance's
2 attorney, Ms. Simpson, tried to downplay
3 Gettysburg's family friendly atmosphere by
4 saying, and I quote, Not everyone has children
5 and Gettysburg ought to try to attract more than
6 families.

7 Well, Ms. Simpson, we do care about our
8 children. And I think the key word there is
9 attract. I think the fact that this baseball
10 field sits directly behind the casino is
11 certainly going to attract future customers, the
12 children of our community.

13 I moved to Gettysburg three years ago.
14 I am originally from Maryland, and I moved from
15 Maryland, the Washington suburbs, to escape the
16 crime and congestion and all of the problems
17 with that.

18 When I talk to my friends back in
19 Maryland and I describe to them small town
20 living in Gettysburg, and I say on Friday nights
21 the whole town goes to a high school football
22 game; and that we have a parade at Christmas,
23 and we have fireworks in the square at New
24 Year's Eve; and that you can go to the Wal-Mart
25 or anywhere you want to shop at 10:00 at night

1 without the fear of being carjacked or robbed at
2 gun point. This is the community I moved into,
3 and I think it is important.

4 When I think of the fantasy video, I
5 would like to present you with a thought, a
6 fantasy video that you might be able to take
7 home with you, and I want to relate this to a
8 movie that you have probably seen before, It's A
9 Wonderful Life starring Pennsylvania's own
10 native Jimmy Stewart.

11 You might remember from the movie,
12 Jimmy Stewart was the guy who always did the
13 right thing. He was an ambitious guy. He
14 wanted to see the world. He wanted to change
15 the world, but through circumstances, he gave up
16 his ambition for greed and he always did the
17 right thing.

18 If you remember in the movie, Clarence,
19 Clarence Goodbody, angle first class, came to
20 Jimmy Stewart's character, Mr. Bailey, and gave
21 him an opportunity to see what the future would
22 be like without him.

23 I want you to remember the scene of
24 Jimmy Stewart running through Bedford Falls,
25 what it had become after the Potters of the

1 My name is Dick Crozier, as you stated.
2 I am a United States Air Force veteran. I am a
3 trustee of the New York Civil War Roundtable,
4 and I am speaking on behalf of the Major Andrew
5 J. Grover Roundtable of Courtland, New York,
6 where I am from.

7 Our name sake Major Grover was the
8 Commander of the 76th New York Volunteers, and
9 in the opening minutes of the battle of
10 Gettysburg, he was shot through the heart and
11 killed.

12 That day, more than 60% of the 76th New
13 York, also from Courtland County, fell. My
14 great-grandfather, Private William Jarvis
15 Crozier, fell alongside Major Grover. He was
16 there on McPherson's Ridge that day, and he and
17 the survivors of the 76th endured heavy and
18 vicious fighting on Culp's Hill for the next two
19 days.

20 It is their legacy I am here to defend,
21 and you people have given me three whole minutes
22 to do it.

23 Well, the first time I visited
24 Gettysburg was over 50 years ago. My mother and
25 I walked down Baltimore Pike. We went to Little

1 world had gotten a hold of it. And I want you
2 to remember that vision of what Bedford Falls
3 had become.

4 My question to you is that you, as the
5 committee, hold in your hands the power to be
6 able to decide what the future of Gettysburg is
7 going to be. And do we want to live in Bedford
8 Falls or do we want to live in Pottersville?

9 I thank you.

10 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

11 We are now going to move to the
12 three-minute presentations on the part of
13 individual registrants and individuals who are
14 signed in to speak this morning.

15 Our first speaker will be Dick Crozier.

16 MR. CROZIER: Thank you for warming the
17 room up to remind me of Virginia.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: It has
19 something to do with the wool coat. And I am
20 delighted to discover that you are, in fact,
21 Dick Crozier, appearances aside.

22 MR. CROZIER: Appearances aside.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You are
24 ready to proceed?

25 MR. CROZIER: Yes, sir, I am.

1 Round Top. We went to the Jenny Wade House,
2 Culp's Hill; but the thing I remember the most,
3 the thing that stuck in my young mind was over
4 on Reynold's Avenue, when we saw the monument to
5 the 76th New York Volunteers.

6 My great-grandfather and his regiment
7 fought for the very ground that I stood on that
8 day. And despite a cute name change -- rather,
9 I flipped two pages here instead of one. Excuse
10 me -- my father's regiment defended that ground
11 and soldiers fought from Bull Run to Appomattox,
12 many of them, but the 76th New York Veterans
13 chose Gettysburg as the proper and fitting place
14 to put their hallowed monument.

15 Historically, there have been many
16 insults to the greatest battlefield, the
17 bloodiest battlefield in American history.

18 Near the Eternal Peace Flame during the
19 1930's, Roosevelt was there, there was also an
20 airport for sightseers on Reynolds Avenue.

21 During World War I, there was a tank
22 training track and during World War II, there
23 was a POW camp for German prisoners of war, all
24 on the field of Pickett's Charge.

25 On the Confederate right was

1 Longstreet's hamburger stand and souvenir shop.
2 You may remember the trolley that ran out from
3 Little Round Top or the despised Gettysburg
4 National Tower. These abuses are now gone. The
5 others exist, but I believe they too will
6 eventually be removed.

7 This casino is different. It is the
8 10-ton gorilla that sits in your living room and
9 just will not leave. And despite a cute name
10 change, the Crossroads Casino would evermore be
11 deluding the memory of the Gettysburg soldiers.

12 Truthfully, Gettysburg is sacred to
13 every single American, and I am one of them. It
14 was not just the Gettysburg on the maps. It is
15 the Gettysburg campaign. It is the -- I'm sorry
16 you did not give me ten minutes, but it is one
17 place I pray you do not do this to.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
19 sir.

20 Our next scheduled speaker is Charles
21 Alan Spears. Mr. Spears, you may proceed.

22 MR. SPEARS: Good morning. My name is
23 Alan Spears. I am from Washington, DC. I am
24 the Associate Director for Diversity National
25 Parks Conservation Association.

1 battlefield, those summer days we spent
2 wandering across the cemetery ridge and through
3 the wheat field, has sparked for me what has
4 become for me a lifelong passion.

5 Gettysburg for me has remained that
6 special place where I return frequently to
7 contemplate the American spirit and to reflect
8 upon the words of Abraham Lincoln, that those
9 who died for our country did not die in vain.

10 In 2003, park visitors spent more than
11 \$92 million at local businesses and supported
12 852 jobs. The combination of Civil War
13 preservation and interpretation and the
14 family-friendly nature of Adams County have
15 created a proven winning formula for the park
16 and its neighboring communities.

17 Since 2002, park staff and volunteers
18 have invested more than \$1.2 million and
19 hundreds of volunteer hours to rehabilitate the
20 battlefield and town to their historic 1863
21 appearance.

22 In the summer of 2005, officials broke
23 ground on the construction of a new \$95 million
24 visitors center and museum.

25 NPCA has strongly advocated in support

1 I am speaking today on behalf of more
2 than 300,000 members nationwide, some 13,000 of
3 whom are Pennsylvania residents, to express our
4 strong opposition to the proposal to allow one
5 of the country's largest slot casinos within
6 cannon range of Gettysburg National Military
7 Park.

8 The nonpartisan NPCA's mission is to
9 protect and enhance America's National Park
10 system for current and future generations.
11 Since 1919, NPCA has informed the American
12 public about the needs of the national parks and
13 empower a diverse, well-informed constituency to
14 be effective advocates for these priceless
15 national treasures.

16 As the nation's premier classroom on
17 the American Civil War, Gettysburg National
18 Military Park attracts 2 million visitors each
19 year and is the most-visited Civil War park in
20 the national park system.

21 My parents brought me to Gettysburg at
22 least once a summer from the time I was 6 years
23 old until the time I was 15. Although there
24 were times when as a young boy I favored the
25 gift shops and restaurants more than the

1 of the park services long-range rehabilitation
2 plans for the park's landscape, because we agree
3 that the preservation and care of Gettysburg's
4 history is the key to its future.

5 NPCA is concerned that marketing a
6 casino would conflict with and attract from
7 Gettysburg's unique and compelling history and
8 its proven economic engine - heritage tourism.

9 We urge you not to gamble with
10 Gettysburg's future and to deny the application
11 for a Gettysburg-based casino. Thank you.

12 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

13 Our next scheduled speaker is Linda J.
14 Perkins and you may proceed.

15 MS. PERKINS: My name is Linda Perkins
16 and I live in Mount Pleasant Township. I work
17 and own a business in Gettysburg.

18 The eyes of our nation are upon us,
19 upon this town of Gettysburg, this state, this
20 Governor and this Gaming Control Board. They
21 are looking to you to preserve and protect the
22 essence, the very heart, of what is deemed a
23 national treasure. We truly are America's
24 beloved town.

25 Some here would have you believe that

1 a casino in the most well-known battlefield in
2 our beloved town could coexist. Not only
3 coexist but feed off of each other.

4 This is simply not true. I am the
5 merchant coordinator for No Casino Gettysburg,
6 and I have been working with businesses since
7 July of 2005. We have 95 businesses against the
8 casino.

9 Our courageous merchants have stories
10 to tell of tourists stating that they will not
11 return to Gettysburg if there is a casino built.
12 The merchants hear this time and time again.
13 Heritage tourism and casino gamblers will not
14 feed off of each other.

15 In 1993, casinos were built in
16 Vicksburg, Mississippi. Vicksburg merchants in
17 1999 were looking to gather together \$1.5
18 million to put up billboards around the area to
19 advertise in the downtown area. They were so
20 lacking and their share of tourists and
21 businesses were dying and in trouble.

22 I invite you to come to Gettysburg
23 before you make your decision about a casino in
24 this great place. Meet the tourists and speak
25 to them yourselves, and ask them how they feel

1 moved from Virginia with our three young
2 children to make our permanent home in
3 Gettysburg because of its unique history and
4 heritage. If there had been a slots casino here
5 then with plans to start with 3,000 machines and
6 eventual plans for 5,000, we would not have
7 moved to Gettysburg, history or no history. We
8 would not have felt it was the place to raise
9 our children. Gettysburg welcomes heritage
10 tourists who come to study the battle.

11 During the battle of Gettysburg,
12 churches were turned into surgeries and field
13 hospitals, and private homes also became
14 hospitals or field kitchens, and the citizens of
15 the town nursed the wounded in their own homes
16 after the battle was over.

17 So this is another thing that draws
18 heritage tourists. They come to get a sense of
19 how this terrible bloody battle affected the
20 whole character of Gettysburg.

21 In July, an informal survey of 300
22 tourists was taken. The overwhelming majority
23 of the respondents were outraged and saddened,
24 and said if a casino came they would not return.

25 Why would they? Just the traffic alone

1 about Gettysburg and would they come back if a
2 casino were built here?

3 Come to the battlefield and let it
4 speak to you. Walk its woods, its fields and
5 its hills. Hire a park ranger to personally
6 escort you and listen carefully as they share
7 with you this story of great courage, of great
8 intellect and great men.

9 Think about the 2400 citizens who cared
10 for 21,000 wounded and dieing. Think of all of
11 this history. And then, then think of a picture
12 of a gambling casino at Gettysburg.

13 Governor Fordice of Mississippi said
14 about his town of Vicksburg in 1998, I think
15 Vicksburg has turned into a rather tawdry little
16 gambling town.

17 Sometimes it just cannot be about
18 money. Sometimes it has to be about soul.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
20 Mrs. Perkins.

21 Our next scheduled speaker is Kathleen
22 Platzer. You may proceed.

23 MS. PLATZER: Kathleen Platzer from
24 Straban Township, which is in Gettysburg.

25 Thirty-five years ago, my husband and I

1 from a slots casino would be horrendous, with
2 over 14,500 cars daily and up to 24,000 on
3 weekends. If a slots parlor comes in and
4 traffic increases and the whole fabric of this
5 community was affected, heritage tourists won't
6 come here, they will plan their vacations
7 somewhere else.

8 And let's not forget, every study shows
9 that people who come here for gambling will stay
10 in the casino. Even studies put out by the
11 gambling industries say this. They will eat
12 there, sleep there and gamble there and then
13 they will go home.

14 So, as I see it, if a casino comes in,
15 the heritage tourists will stay away and the
16 people who are visiting the casino will stay
17 there.

18 So what does that mean for Gettysburg?
19 Losses of revenue for our restaurants, shops and
20 hotels, all of whom benefit mightily each year
21 from the heritage tourists.

22 To bring a slots casino into Gettysburg
23 would be a desecration to the memory of the men
24 who fought and died here during those three
25 bloody days, 143 years ago.

1 There are other places in Pennsylvania
2 that want a casino to be built in their area.
3 In our town, there is just no question that
4 majority opinion is against this.

5 All 36 ministers and priests of the
6 Gettysburg ministarian came out unanimously
7 against a casino here. Civil War authors, the
8 friends of the National Park at Gettysburg and
9 other organizations whose mission is to preserve
10 history are vehemently opposed to a casino being
11 built here.

12 A Lutheran theological seminary is
13 opposed to a casino here. The faculty of
14 Gettysburg College made a public statement
15 opposing a casino here.

16 I am begging you all not to award a
17 license for a slots casino in the Gettysburg
18 area. It was the wrong place for a casino. It
19 is a terrible idea. Thank you.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: If you
21 would stay at the microphone for a moment,
22 please. If you would just restate your name.

23 MS. PLATZER: Kathleen Platzer, P --

24 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: I have
25 that but it seems as though I skipped Ms.

1 They speak of being either two miles,
2 in another page of a website they say three
3 miles, from the battlefield. No, they are
4 barely one mile from the Battlefield National
5 Park; that being the important part of it, East
6 Calvary Field, a place that Ed Bearss, the famed
7 historian, said no place on the battlefield of
8 Gettysburg possesses greater integrity to time
9 and place than East Calvary Field.

10 You could bring one of you Stewart's
11 and one of Custer's back and he would recognize
12 the landscape, the woods and the topography and
13 here today's visitor has an unsurpassed
14 opportunity to walk in the footsteps of history.

15 Now, the exact location map that is
16 shown on Chance's website does not seem to
17 indicate Calvary Field Road, which leads
18 directly into East Calvary Field, and that comes
19 from right near where the site of their casino
20 is.

21 As I said, we came here as tourists and
22 then so fell in love with the area that we
23 decided to invest and sell our house in New
24 Jersey, bring everything to Pennsylvania, and we
25 bought a historic house on Baltimore Street,

1 Leslie, and I just wanted to make --

2 MS. PLATZER: I'm so sorry.

3 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: It's on
4 me. Would you happen to be Elaine Leslie?

5 MS. LESLIE: I am. I couldn't get
6 right to the microphone because these gentlemen
7 sat up right in front of me.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: No
9 problem. We just didn't want to lose you.

10 And thank you for your clarification,
11 Ms. Platzer.

12 All right, Ms. Leslie, we are ready to
13 go.

14 MS. LESLIE: Okay. Thank you for
15 letting us all speak today.

16 My name is Elaine Leslie and I live on
17 Baltimore Street in Gettysburg. I am a fairly
18 new resident of Gettysburg, having come here
19 from Bergen County, New Jersey.

20 My family and I originally came as
21 tourists to Gettysburg. One of the first places
22 we visited, because we were Calvary reenactors,
23 was East Calvary Field, an area which Chance
24 Enterprises seems to have downplayed in
25 importance.

1 which we have been restoring.

2 We are now very worried about our
3 investment. We have extremely strong feelings
4 about the desecration of a battlefield that is
5 important to people all over the world where my
6 great-grandfather fought.

7 I have had people from Germany who come
8 to reenact the 11th Corps, which was mostly
9 soldiers from Germany. And their eyes wide with
10 awe. These are big German men saying, We are
11 here. We are in Gettysburg.

12 I mean, the world is watching you,
13 ladies and gentlemen.

14 As I said, it is really inexplicable to
15 combine history, tourism and the economic impact
16 from this area.

17 We respect history. We love history.
18 But it's important to our economy, and I am
19 frankly worried about my real estate investment.

20 Without the casino, I have seen three
21 businesses open up within blocks of me, a
22 museum, a small delicatessen, a book store, and
23 they will be detracted by the casino. People
24 will eat free food in the casino and not come to
25 the deli. They are certainly not going to come

1 from a casino to a Christian-commissioned
2 museum.

3 And I did have a quote from a man who
4 said --

5 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Ms. Leslie
6 --

7 MS. LESLIE: -- he would never take his
8 family back to Gettysburg again.

9 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: -- you are
10 going to have to submit the quote to the record.

11 MS. LESLIE: And I thank you.

12 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Our next
13 scheduled speaker is Mike Heitikko. And you are
14 ready to proceed, sir.

15 MR. HEITIKKO: Thank you.

16 My name is Mike Heitikko. I live in
17 Straban Township, which is actually just about
18 two miles from ground zero of this proposed
19 casino complex. Also, I am a Vietnam Veteran.

20 And since I have only three minutes to
21 express my objections to the proposed casino
22 complex to be built in Straban Township, I will
23 make my comments brief but hopefully clear
24 enough to be understood by the Board.

25 First, I sure hope that you don't base

1 any of your judgments on all of the buttons, pro
2 or not, and signs that you have seen in the
3 Gettysburg area.

4 I could tell you, being a privileged
5 volunteer on the Gettysburg National Military
6 Park, I could bring you any number of people,
7 visitors wearing no casino signs, but I will
8 tell you, the visitors I talked to, there are
9 any number, saying absolutely no. Absolutely
10 don't put a casino there. It is shocking even
11 to talk about it; and that you have to take my
12 word for.

13 I decided to show you a picture of the
14 monument on the Gettysburg Battlefield. The
15 monument has been recently damaged and it's of
16 the 4th New York Independent Battery, and I
17 presented it to the stenographer. I believe she
18 presented it to you gentlemen and ladies here.
19 If you want to look at it afterwards, I would
20 appreciate it.

21 The men on the right are survivors of
22 the 4th New York Battery greeting survivors of
23 the 1st Texas and the 15th Georgia. These were
24 soldiers who tried to kill each other during the
25 battle. Now they are meeting like they were

1 never enemies.

2 I show you this because I believe this
3 represents what Gettysburg National Military
4 Park really means to all Americans. War, then
5 peace.

6 The pro-casino people state that the
7 casino complex will be no threat to the
8 battlefield because it is not on the
9 battlefield.

10 Well, of course that is true, but that
11 is only because the federal law won't allow it.
12 The main problem is the traffic that will, of
13 course, come from the casino to the battlefield;
14 but there is also a large amount of battlefield
15 traffic already on there and also horse traffic
16 was fine, but for automobile traffic it adds for
17 great congestion that is already there and that
18 will create a major, major problem.

19 Also, personally, I am bothered by
20 Chance's assertions that just because he has
21 contributed moneywise he now should get card
22 blanche on any project he wants.

23 If I totalled up all the hours that I
24 voluntarily contributed over the years and
25 figured it out to a fiscal sum, I should claim

1 special privileges too. There are other ways to
2 contribute volunteerwise.

3 Once again, I would hope you would base
4 your judgments on the facts and not on the
5 rhetoric.

6 Thank you for listening.

7 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Our next
8 scheduled speaker is James Paddock. You may
9 proceed.

10 MR. PADDOCK: Thank you. I am Jim
11 Paddock. I grew up in Gettysburg. I am a
12 decorated Vietnam Veteran and registered
13 landscape architect and land planner.

14 I returned to our family farm in 1993
15 and have been very involved with county growth
16 and planning issues. As a professional land
17 planner, I can tell you that a casino does not
18 fit with our small rural historic community.

19 This graphic to my right shows the
20 casino in relationship to an existing 13-acre
21 township youth recreational park. The investors
22 have not identified this park on their maps.

23 It is not appropriate to locate an
24 adult business, such as a casino, this close to
25 a children's park.

1 This next graphic shows the casino in
2 relation to Gettysburg, the park and other uses.
3 The investors claim the casino is three miles
4 from the park. In fact, the casino will be one
5 mile from East Calvary Field and less than one
6 and a half miles from the main park.

7 The investors claim, under sworn
8 testimony, that the casino won't be visible from
9 the battlefields. In fact, the casino will be
10 clearly visible from Culp's Hill, which is
11 within the battlefield.

12 The investors claim there is no road
13 connecting East Calvary Field with the casino.
14 In fact, less than 3,000 feet east of the site
15 on Route 30 is Calvary Field Road, that leads
16 directly to East Calvary Field.

17 The investors claim there are no
18 historic significance on or near the casino
19 site. In fact, confederate General Jeb Stuart
20 fought and camped north of this site; and on
21 July 3rd, marched right past the casino site to
22 fight the Union at East Calvary Field.

23 The investors have not identified two
24 historic road corridors that intersect at the
25 casino site.

1 MR. GEREW: My name is Lewis Gerew, and
2 I am not only a resident of Gettysburg, I also
3 work at Gettysburg Hospital. I thank you for
4 this opportunity to speak in consideration of my
5 testimony.

6 Although we moved to Gettysburg with
7 full intention to buy a house, currently my
8 wife, son and I are renting an apartment just
9 off the town square. From our home, the
10 Gettysburg battlefield is only a five-minute
11 walk.

12 Also, well within walking distance is
13 the intersection of Routes 15 and 30, the
14 proposed location for the Crossroads casino.
15 The path to get there is so direct, the short
16 journey amounts, at least for me, to a mere
17 30-minute walk.

18 Despite that fact, investors have been
19 so convincing in the portrayal that their casino
20 is so far from the battlefield, I felt the need
21 to consult a map to reassure myself that I still
22 reside in Adams County. They almost had me
23 believe otherwise.

24 However, as a resident of both
25 Gettysburg Borough and Adams County, please do

1 In fact, the east/west Route 30 Lincoln
2 Highway heritage quarter is part of a national
3 and state effort to preserve and enhance this
4 historic road across America.

5 In fact, the north and south Route 15
6 journey through hallowed corridor is being
7 studied and initiatives developed to conserve
8 and enhance the unique qualities.

9 The main interest of the casino is
10 opposite the main entrance to the 92-acre
11 heritage tourism complex called Gateway
12 Gettysburg, a large conference facility, a \$7
13 million Civil War movie, eight movie theaters,
14 hotels, shops and related uses.

15 This is an enormous facility that will
16 --

17 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You can
18 finish your sentence, sir.

19 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: -- that
20 will attract local and heritage tourists
21 including families, church and school groups.

22 Thank you.

23 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

24 Our next scheduled speaker is Lewis
25 Gerew, II. You may proceed.

1 not let my voice or the voices of others be
2 trivialized through their attempts to separate
3 us. We are one and the same, a community.

4 A recent survey conducted by the
5 University of Massachusetts reveals that a
6 casino ranks as one of the top three
7 developments people do not want in their
8 neighborhoods. Such statistics illustrate that
9 communities are undesirable to move into or
10 live. Now a casino is being proposed in very
11 close proximity to a backyard I have long
12 desired to own.

13 Of all of the impact studies I have
14 dissected, pro, con and neutral, none have
15 indicated that a casino has contributed in any
16 way to the appreciation of property values for
17 homeowners sharing the community.

18 Rather, and to the contrary, those
19 studies that are considered enough to include
20 real estate value has cited an average decline
21 of 10 to 20 percent after a casino has opened.

22 When considering this collection of
23 information, one thing becomes clear, should the
24 Crossroads casino become reality, what will be
25 the largest investment of our lives, my family

1 purchasing a home will be too great a risk if we
2 were to buy a home anywhere in Adams County,
3 this includes Gettysburg and surrounding areas
4 and specially Straban Township.

5 Therefore, on behalf of my family, many
6 friends who I have spoken to, local and abroad,
7 who share in our concerns, we humbly ask that
8 you please deny Chance Enterprise and its
9 investors a license for slots gambling.

10 Thank you.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
12 sir.

13 Our next scheduled speaker is Todd W.
14 Gibson. You may proceed.

15 MR. GIBSON: Thank you. I represent
16 painters and drywall finishers and glazers who
17 live and work in the south central part of the
18 state.

19 I really come here to view my own
20 personal experiences. I have spent 13 years
21 living in Las Vegas, and in the late nineties,
22 actually late eighties, there was an area in the
23 northwest part of Las Vegas that was nothing but
24 desert. There was a lot of speculation of what
25 a casino would do in that area, and I seen for

1 would you want a casino here? And if I was
2 standing on the battlefield, I would probably
3 say no. But that is a little bit
4 misrepresentation, you know.

5 The casino is not going to be right
6 there on the battlefield. It is going to be off
7 and away. I believe it is going to help the
8 casino and help the battlefield itself by
9 bringing tourists to the area and provide good
10 incomes.

11 I hope that you guys have support for
12 the casino. Thank you.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

14 Before we proceed with the next
15 speaker, I simply would like to remind those of
16 you who are yet to speak to, please, begin your
17 remarks with telling us the municipality and
18 state where you reside. It will help our
19 understanding of your perspective, and it will
20 spare me the need to interrupt you and remind
21 you.

22 Our next scheduled speaker is Jane
23 Lordeman. Good morning. You may proceed.

24 MS. LORDEMAN: Thank you.

25 My name is Jane Lordeman. I am from

1 my own eyes, putting a casino in an area that
2 was basically very raw, with no businesses, it
3 was basically desert, and how those communities
4 formed around that casino, how it brought people
5 to an area that wasn't there before.

6 Because those people were there, it
7 brought other supporting industries, gas
8 stations, stores, whole communities, new homes,
9 how it provided jobs that was able to provide a
10 good income where people could put their kids
11 through a higher education, provide benefits
12 that protected those families if there was an
13 injury or an illness to that family, it provided
14 defined pension plans.

15 I have heard a lot of conjecture of
16 what gambling would do to the battlefield, and
17 all I can say is, I mean, a lot of that is
18 conjecture. I have seen the exact opposite. I
19 have seen good, positive things happen to the
20 community because of the gambling, the casinos
21 and the service industry that was put around
22 that area to provide services to the casino. I
23 believe it is a great thing.

24 If I was walking around the battlefield
25 and somebody came to me and asked me, well,

1 Straban Township, which is in Gettysburg, and I
2 have lived in Gettysburg for 19 years.

3 There are two things I would like to
4 talk to you about today. First is my viewpoint
5 as a parent and resident of Gettysburg; and
6 second, my viewpoint as a certified financial
7 planner.

8 First, I am a mother of three children.
9 I live in a residential area of Straban
10 Township, one and a half miles from the proposed
11 casino site. As a parent, I am not happy about
12 that proximity for a casino from my
13 neighborhood. This is a neighborhood where kids
14 play in the yard, ride bicycles up and down
15 streets named for Civil War generals, where
16 people take walks and have barbecues in their
17 back yards.

18 Standing in my own back yard, which
19 abuts national park service land, I have a clear
20 view of Gettysburg Area High School, where my
21 daughter is a junior.

22 Does Pennsylvania really need to put a
23 casino a mile and a half from this
24 historically-rich community neighborhood? Does
25 it need to be only a mile and a half from our

1 high school? I say no.

2 Other communities support their schools
3 and their police and fire departments without
4 the proceeds of a casino. The Gettysburg area
5 has been doing this too. Chance Enterprise
6 makes it sound as though Gettysburg would be
7 winning the lottery, having millions of dollars
8 come into their coffers with little or no stress
9 on the existing infrastructure.

10 It sounds too good to be true. It
11 sounds like a free lunch. Well, we all know
12 there is no such thing as a free lunch, and
13 statistics show that 80% of big lottery winners
14 file for bankruptcy within 5 years of winning.

15 Even if Gettysburg didn't become
16 fiscally bankrupt, it would be on the road to
17 moral bankruptcy for a casino to be built there.

18 As a parent and resident, this is not
19 what I want our community to become nor would I
20 want our community to become nor would I want
21 our nation's hallowed ground to be known for.

22 Second, I would like to give my
23 viewpoint as a certified financial planner.
24 Financial planning has some pretty simple
25 concepts: Pay yourself first. Spend less than

1 close to any residential area, especially not
2 this close to high school students.

3 Low wages and gambling are significant
4 obstacles to financial planning. As a certified
5 financial planner, a casino is not part of a
6 sound financial plan.

7 I know it is easier to give in to
8 high-pressure tactics, but please don't take the
9 easy choice. Make the right choice. It is the
10 harder choice but please say no.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

12 Our next scheduled speaker is Thomas A.
13 Laser. You may proceed.

14 MR. LASER: I am Tom Laser, a retired
15 Air Force officer, and I have lived in the
16 immediate Gettysburg community for the past 18
17 years, specifically Freedom Township.

18 This, I believe, a huge gambling casino
19 at Gettysburg, would be a terrible, terrible,
20 mistake. I will present three reasons:

21 First, it would not fulfill the very
22 reasoning that Pennsylvania is getting into
23 gambling. A key goal, as explained early on in
24 Act 71, is, and I quote, To provide broad
25 economic opportunities for the citizens of this

1 you make. If you save 10 percent of your pay
2 every year from age 25 to 65, you will be able
3 to retire with nearly 70% of your pre-retirement
4 income. Pretty simple. But is this easy? Just
5 because it's simple doesn't mean it is easy.
6 Life is about hard choices.

7 A lot of numbers have been talked
8 about, some that both sides of the issue
9 actually agree on. The average pay for full and
10 part-time workers at present in Adams County is
11 estimated to be \$30,000 per year and for a slots
12 full-time casino worker, about \$19,000.

13 What I ask you to think about is this:
14 what impact will these wages, wages that are
15 substantially lower than our current average,
16 have on our community? Will these workers be
17 able to save anything for retirement? Will they
18 be able to put their kids through even two years
19 of community college? I think you know the
20 answer is no.

21 As a financial planner, I have had a
22 client incur losses of over \$200,000 within a
23 12-month period.

24 Again, to summarize, as a parent and
25 resident, I say that gambling doesn't belong so

1 Commonwealth, end of quote. To pursue that goal
2 faithfully, casinos must be placed where a
3 citizen will benefit the most.

4 When we rank Pennsylvania's communities
5 regarding economic needs, Gettysburg is at the
6 nearly very bottom of the list. It has the most
7 unemployment rate in the Commonwealth. It has
8 the highest growth rate, almost overwhelming
9 local efforts to manage and direct it.

10 Across our Commonwealth, communities
11 are staggering economically. Steel mills are
12 shuttered, mining employment is down more than
13 90%, good manufacturing jobs are being exported
14 to China and India almost daily.

15 Gettysburg, however, is very fortunate.
16 It has the crown jewel of tourist attractions,
17 two colleges, a seminary and federal facilities,
18 all stable and all immune to outsourcing.

19 To conclude my first point, I believe
20 it both violates the intent and the letter of
21 Act 71, and be highly unfair to keep more
22 economic growth onto Gettysburg, while ignoring
23 all struggling Commonwealth communities.

24 My second point: Of all of the tourist
25 attractions in Pennsylvania, and perhaps our

1 nation, Gettysburg is the crown jewel,
2 wholesome, family-oriented and educational.
3 Of all of the places in our
4 Commonwealth, we should preserve and build on
5 the authentic history of Gettysburg, not destroy
6 it. To convert Gettysburg into a huge gambling
7 center would be a tragedy for our Commonwealth
8 and for our nation.

9 Point three, placing a gambling casino
10 at Gettysburg is risky business for our
11 Commonwealth. Much of the promoters'
12 justification is based on gamblers coming from
13 Maryland and Virginia.

14 There is a lot of pressure in Maryland
15 and nationally to spread large-scale gambling,
16 and that pressure will grow over the years,
17 especially as Pennsylvania becomes operational.

18 When Maryland spreads large-scale
19 gambling, it will certainly establish a major
20 facility near the Pennsylvania border to capture
21 every gambler destined for Gettysburg. The end
22 result would be the worst of all worlds.

23 Pennsylvania blundered into sacrificing
24 Gettysburg, its greatest tourism asset, for
25 temporary minor gambling gain.

1 Culp's Hill. Wolf Hill was subject to union
2 calvary skirmishes and confederate infantry
3 action on its eastern slope and multiple
4 confederate repulses from Culp's Hill on the
5 western side. The very spot on which my home
6 sits near the summit was a site for union signal
7 corps.

8 Today, the eastern slope is a housing
9 development. My pleas in the name of
10 preservation for saving not only the terrain,
11 but also a beautiful barn that housed horrific
12 action during the battle, fell on deaf ears
13 everywhere I turned.

14 I have the residential gift of viewing
15 approximately 80% of the battlefield. I cannot,
16 however, see East Calvary Field nor will I be
17 able to see Crossroads gaming. Neither will
18 anyone else, unless they are looking for them.

19 I love the stewardship of this
20 less-recognized portion of the battlefield. I
21 received the second-highest written score out of
22 132 applicants on the Gettysburg battlefield
23 guide exam in the year I took it. This is not
24 to suggest I am intelligent. I am not.

25 However, I have a spiritual passion for

1 To recap: Point one, a casino at
2 Gettysburg fails to meet a fundamental goal of
3 Act 71; point two, you would seriously damage
4 the character and worldwide reputation of
5 Gettysburg; and three, if it is successful in
6 the short run, it will probably be futile in the
7 long run, because Maryland will make its move in
8 this large state-versus-state chess match called
9 gaming.

10 Thank you very much.

11 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
12 sir.

13 Our next scheduled speaker is Virgil
14 Love. You may proceed.

15 MR. LOVE: Good morning. My name is
16 Virgil Love, and my wife Suzette and I are
17 president and secretary/treasurer of Glory Gym
18 of Gettysburg Incorporated, a not-for-profit
19 boxing gym providing after-school programs for
20 our local youth.

21 I grew up in Gettysburg and have never
22 had anything less than a spiritual desire to
23 live here.

24 In fact, I live on part of the
25 battlefield known as Wolf Hill across from

1 this place called Gettysburg and believe that
2 that is why I was successful in the exam.

3 I wonder how many of our alleged
4 visitors to the park who know casinos squares
5 will not only not support the casino but will
6 also refuse to come back to be considered
7 fickle?

8 I also wonder if they might have
9 considered whether or not Generals Armstrong,
10 and/or Lee entertained having a bucket of
11 chicken at the Colonel's, maybe some Chinese
12 take-out or even a bit of shut eye at the local
13 motel situated on the left flank before what was
14 launched as the most gallant charge in the
15 annals of warfare?

16 Thank God the businesses referred to
17 are not considered hallowed ground. I, of
18 course, refer to Pickett's Charge.

19 For the sake of brevity, I have left
20 out locations such as Wal-Mart, Giant Food and
21 strip malls over sites of much blood-letting,
22 which leads me to quotes like, just because an
23 area is not owned by the national park service
24 doesn't mean it is not hallow ground. Referring
25 to the proposed slots parlor site, with the same

1 location being within a mile of a portion of the
2 historic Civil War battlefield or East Calvary
3 Field, allows me to ascertain quotes like these
4 are the worst kind of prostitution over a
5 national park.

6 Case in point, my home is near East
7 Calvary Field. On an average of two out of
8 every three times I have traversed this portion
9 of the park, I have witnessed no traffic.

10 My guess is that two out of every three
11 vehicles I have seen were local traffic taking a
12 short cut. In other words, using the
13 battlefield to shield the area from casinos is
14 not exactly a noble or gallant defense for those
15 who can invalidate other's rights with their
16 moral beliefs and chastise --

17 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Sir --

18 MR. LOVE: I believe the lady -- excuse
19 me. I guess it is different.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

21 Our next scheduled speaker is Kevin M.
22 Cicak. You may proceed.

23 MR. CIIKAK: My name is Kevin Cicak. I
24 live in the Borough of New Cumberland in
25 Cumberland County, Pennsylvania.

1 Our international union and other
2 locations around the country is to negotiate
3 contracts and represent casino workers, and I
4 can guarantee you that they pay living wages,
5 they have contracts that provide health
6 insurance for the employee and their family and
7 also pension benefits.

8 We would be doing less than our job as
9 a labor organization if we didn't ensure that
10 contracts provided those things.

11 In Adams County, there has been much
12 made about the unemployment rate, and while we
13 recognize that the unemployment rate is low,
14 there is clearly currently underemployment and
15 many people in Adams County have to travel some
16 distance for decent-waged jobs, to Hanover --
17 I'm sorry -- to Harrisburg, York, to Baltimore.

18 Perhaps the sons and daughters of
19 Gettysburg College may not be interested in
20 these casino positions, other than in
21 management, but the sons and daughters of
22 Gettysburg High School or Littlestown High
23 School or New Oxford High School, who either
24 don't have wherewithal or the desire to go to
25 college, might be interested in working with an

1 I would like to applaud the panel for
2 their patience this morning and perhaps more for
3 their perseverance as you sat through some
4 history lessons and some political science
5 lessons, and now I just want to do some simple
6 math to explain why I am interested in this
7 project.

8 A thousand new jobs with a single
9 employer, and a number of other employers in
10 Adams County that have anywhere near that kind
11 of proposed job employment in the near future?
12 Zero.

13 For three years I worked as a Teamster,
14 representing Teamster members throughout south
15 central Pennsylvania. We have over 7,000
16 members in the area, and I personally represent
17 and negotiate contracts for employees in the
18 Adams County Court System. I also represent
19 other employees in Adams County.

20 We are interested in these jobs
21 because, number one, we think the applicant has
22 passed all of the requirements needed to obtain
23 a license before the State of Pennsylvania, and
24 also because they are interested in having these
25 employees represented by Teamsters.

1 employer that offers a living wage and a real
2 future, jobs that aren't going to move off shore
3 or go somewhere else, that aren't going to be
4 subcontracted, they might want to stay right
5 where they have grown up in Adams County.

6 A lot has been made about that people
7 in Adams County won't want these jobs. The
8 Teamster doesn't have a room somewhere with
9 1,000 people waiting just to come out of the
10 darkness here to take these jobs.

11 These jobs are going to be offered to
12 Adams County employees first. It is clearly in
13 the benefit of management and union to support
14 Adams County, and we are in favor of this
15 project, and we hope that when you consider all
16 of the facts, you will support it as well.
17 Thank you.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

19 Our next scheduled speaker is John
20 David Hoptack. You may proceed.

21 MR. HOPTACK: Thank you.

22 I am John Hoptack. I am a resident of
23 Gettysburg. I want to thank you first for the
24 opportunity to speak at this hearing. It is on
25 a topic of great importance to me.

1 No one could argue that there is an
2 indescribable allure about Gettysburg, along its
3 fields and ridges, running creeks and rocky
4 hills. It attracts millions year after year.
5 Those who come to Gettysburg do so for many
6 reasons, but most come to learn about the battle
7 and to honor the memory of those thousands who
8 here gave their last full measure of devotion.

9 It is clear to me that Gettysburg has
10 become much more than just a place, much more
11 than just a town in south central Pennsylvania.
12 Since those three days in 1863, Gettysburg has
13 become a symbol, a symbol of the nation and a
14 symbol of freedom.

15 There is an expression that says that
16 the United States was born in Philadelphia but
17 was preserved in Gettysburg.

18 This is the image that those in America
19 and those around the world think of when they
20 hear the word Gettysburg, and I am deeply
21 distressed that this image is now being
22 threatened to build a slots parlor here.

23 To me it is pretty one-sided. In
24 Pennsylvania and across the nation, that people
25 are generally opposed to this casino, and this

1 is a matter of national importance.

2 Gettysburg does not belong solely to
3 the people who reside there. It belongs to all
4 Americans everywhere, as much as Independence
5 Hall does in Philadelphia.

6 Simply stated, I am adamantly opposed
7 to the construction of a slots parlor here.
8 Civil war battlefields are disappearing at an
9 alarming rate, being paved over for strip malls,
10 convenience stores and so on.

11 We cannot further lose Gettysburg to a
12 casino and its inevitable sprawl. True, there
13 is development there, but saying it is already
14 there, we might as well keep building. It's the
15 same as if a criminal stole a car and said, I am
16 in trouble, let's elude the police on a
17 high-speed chase.

18 Let's not prove that Abraham Lincoln
19 was wrong when he said that we will never forget
20 what they did here. And the passage of time
21 does not minimize the significance of what
22 happened here.

23 Members of the Pennsylvania Gaming
24 Control Board, when they write the history of
25 our generations many, many years from now, would

1 you rather they say that we were motivated more
2 by money, more by greed or would you rather they
3 say that we cared deeply about those who fought
4 and died for our freedoms, that we valued their
5 service and sacrifice, and that we honored their
6 memory as was evidenced when we all rallied
7 together to prevent the construction of a casino
8 at Gettysburg?

9 The simple fact of the matter is that
10 there is only one Gettysburg. There is room
11 across the great state of Pennsylvania for
12 casinos, but there is only one Gettysburg.
13 There is only one. Thank you.

14 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
15 Our next scheduled speaker is Reverend
16 Dr. Randal Robert Huber. Dr. Huber?

17 DR. HUBER: Yes.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may
19 proceed.

20 DR. HUBER: My name is Randal Huber. I
21 reside in York Springs, Pennsylvania, and I
22 would like to thank the Pennsylvania Gaming
23 Control Board for giving me the opportunity to
24 speak. You have a difficult job and very
25 important decisions to make and I appreciate

1 your time.

2 On November 2nd of this year, I will be
3 celebrating the commencement of my 25th year as
4 a pastor in Adams County. Adams County is a
5 family-friendly county and I really enjoyed
6 serving here.

7 And as a person with a demonstrative
8 concern for persons in our community, I am
9 grievously concerned about the many potential
10 adverse effects of gambling upon our county.

11 Today I would briefly address just one;
12 and that is how problem gambling contributes to
13 divorce.

14 Not all gamblers will become problem
15 gamblers. Research by Dr. Earl Grinols suggests
16 that 52% of those who gamble at casinos are
17 problem gamblers.

18 Some might quibble about that number.
19 It seems high. Whether that number is 1% or 10%
20 or 25%, multiple studies indicate that problem
21 gambling does result in increased bankruptcies,
22 suicides, addictions, child abuse, domestic
23 violence and divorce.

24 A study conducted by Potenza and his
25 team reported in J General Intern Med 2002,

1 indicates that problem gambling increases the
2 divorce rate by 53.5% over 9 gamblers, 53.5%.

3 Other research validates the effects of
4 problem gambling upon divorce. According to the
5 National Gambling Impact Study Commission of
6 June 1999, 28% of Gamblers Anonymous members
7 report being separated or divorced as a direct
8 result of their gambling.

9 According to the Mississippi State
10 Department of Health, "Vital Statistics
11 Mississippi" for years 1991 through 1998, the
12 number of divorces in Harrison County,
13 Mississippi, which is the home to 10 casinos,
14 has increased by almost 300% since the
15 introduction of casinos. Hear that? 300%.

16 It's nearly impossible to overstate the
17 damage that divorce does to children. And
18 Judith Wallerstein began studying 131 children,
19 she found increased depression, greater learning
20 difficulties, more aggression towards parents.
21 Children were two times more likely to be
22 referred for psychological help at school than
23 those that were from intact families.

24 Since casino gambling provides the
25 opportunity for problem gambling and problem

1 operators, carpenters, plumbers, electricians
2 just to name a few, and the
3 post-casino-construction resort staff. Vendor
4 and service provides for products such as paper
5 goods, linens, laundry, et cetera.

6 You see the need for increased
7 staffing, increased sales and/or service from
8 construction and post-construction
9 opportunities, increased tourism.

10 Comprehensive work packages,
11 competitive wages and benefits, good hourly
12 rates, management rates, increased tourism.

13 Healthcare, the growing costs of the
14 healthcare makes it almost impossible to be
15 uninsured. Going forward with the construction
16 process would enable the locals to receive
17 health benefits and coverage for themselves and
18 their families. One trip to the hospital could
19 eliminate your entire life savings.

20 Travel expenses, reduce or eliminate
21 commuting to Harrisburg, York, Lancaster or
22 Maryland.

23 Based on current trends, with the
24 rising cost of fuel price, will reduce your fuel
25 expenses, cut environment pollutions and

1 gambling contributes to divorce and divorce
2 hurts children, I stand opposed to the gambling
3 in Gettysburg. Thank you.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
5 Our next scheduled speaker is James T.
6 Jones, Jr. Mr. Jones, you may proceed.

7 MR. JONES: Good morning, Mr. Chairman,
8 Gaming Board Members. My name is J. T. Jones,
9 Jr. You can call me Jim for short. Everybody
10 calls me Jim Jones so I am known as that too.

11 I reside in Oberlin, Pennsylvania,
12 Dauphin County, business representative for our
13 local union, local 542, operating engineers. We
14 are part of the building construction trades
15 council, and I just want to talk to you briefly
16 about the impact here from possible gamings.

17 The benefits of that project, if and
18 were it licensed: The employment, comprehensive
19 work packages, healthcare, reduced travel
20 expenses and tax revenue for Adams County.

21 Benefits, of course, the employment
22 during the construction phase, that will require
23 employees in many specialized construction
24 fields such as, without limited to, excavators
25 in the construction field as heavy equipment

1 decrease vehicle repairs.

2 In summary, by going forward with this
3 construction by gaming Crossroads and Resort
4 Spas would ultimately bring families and
5 communities closer together.

6 The potential construction
7 opportunities will alone impact approximately 50
8 families and this would trim down the travel
9 time and reduce fuel expenses, auto repairs and
10 allow locals to come closer to their home and
11 quality time with families and loved ones.

12 Thank you.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
14 sir.

15 Our next scheduled speaker is William
16 Dorward. You may proceed.

17 MR. DORWARD: Good morning and thank
18 you for giving me the opportunity to speak to
19 you today. My name is Bill Dorward, and I
20 reside in Salisbury Township, Pennsylvania.

21 I am the Central Pennsylvania business
22 agent for the sheet metal workers' local 19,
23 with our district office in Harrisburg,
24 Pennsylvania.

25 I have been asked by the members of

1 this local union in central Pennsylvania to
2 speak today on what we hope will be your support
3 for the granting of a slot machine license in
4 the Gettysburg area.

5 The men and women of local 19, many of
6 whom live and work in the Gettysburg area,
7 raising families, paying taxes and supporting
8 this community, believe that the new proposed
9 casino will greatly enhance the much-needed
10 economic development of the Gettysburg area.

11 We know it will bring good-paying
12 employment, as well as untold opportunities for
13 existing businesses and opportunities for new
14 businesses that are greatly needed in our state.

15 Jobs not at low wages but jobs that pay
16 a living wages and benefits that our residents
17 can better support their families on, and truly
18 take partnership in the American dream of
19 homeownership, sending their kids to college
20 and, of course, dignity in retirement.

21 Simply put, the promise that this
22 proposed casino brings to the economics of this
23 area is one we cannot afford to reject. We
24 support the idea of slot machine licensing in
25 the Gettysburg area and not only for the

1 business opportunities and good jobs it will
2 bring and create, but also for much-needed
3 revenue it will create for our schools,
4 communities and state; of course, lessening the
5 tax burden on our residents and businesses.

6 For too long we have lost incomes and
7 taxes to other communities and other states that
8 allow gaming. Every day bus loads and caravans
9 of automobiles leave Pennsylvania to travel to
10 these other and nearby states and with them goes
11 the much-needed funds of our schools and towns.
12 It is now time we reap the benefit of gaming.

13 Finally, I have gladly accepted this
14 directive by the members of local 19 to come
15 before you and speak today on an issue of great
16 controversy; that is, of course, the continuing
17 dignity and sacrifice of the Americans that so
18 bravely gave so much to test this nation's
19 resolve.

20 It must be known that we would never
21 accept or allow any individual or group to
22 diminish what was done here on this hallowed
23 ground so many years ago.

24 We believe that this casino will bring
25 even more visitors to this nation's battlefield,

1 and we feel the site selected will be far enough
2 away as to not distract from this nation's
3 treasure, yet close enough for everyone to
4 enjoy. Thank you again.

5 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,
6 sir.

7 Our next scheduled speaker is Daniel A.
8 Virtue.

9 MR. VIRTUE: Daniel Virtue, Perry
10 County, Marysville. I am the president of
11 Teamsters local 776 in Harrisburg, Pennsylvania.

12 We have 7800 members, 250 who live in
13 Adams County. Although 250 live in Adams
14 County, they all work outside of Adams County.
15 The jobs that are going to come with this casino
16 are, I hear different rumors saying that they
17 are not good-paying jobs. I happen to have a
18 contract or parts of a contract that Millenium
19 Gaming has in Detroit, Michigan, and I would
20 like to go over some of those issues.

21 First of all, they are guaranteed a
22 40-hour workweek. They are paid time and a half
23 after 8, they are paid time and a half after
24 40 -- he is probably getting nervous. Oh, did
25 he leave -- they get two 15-minute breaks that

1 are paid and one 30-minute break that is paid.

2 The part-time issue was brought up by
3 some people on the no casino. Out of that
4 group, 15% in that contract allow for part-time
5 people, 15%. For every 100 full-time jobs, only
6 15% can work part time.

7 There's 14 days a year for holidays and
8 personal days and sick days; in 1 to 6 years
9 they get 2 weeks; 7 to 11 years they get 3
10 weeks; and over 12 they get 4 weeks. Their
11 average wages go from \$22 down to 11 something.
12 The average wage is \$16.13 an hour; that is the
13 average wage.

14 Health and Welfare benefits, Blue
15 Cross/Blue Shield, PPO, they pay nothing for
16 that cost. The pension is a 401(k). Another
17 benefit they have is dependents care. They are
18 paid 35 the first year and 40 the second year
19 for each child they have in daycare.

20 What is good about the contract is if a
21 person is a valet and wants to become a slots
22 manager, they can move from within if a job
23 opens up. These are going to be excellent jobs
24 in Adams County. You need to look at that and
25 what it can do for your children.

1 I am a Teamster for 35 years. I am 57.
2 I can retire tomorrow with \$3100 and health
3 benefits. Thank you very much.

4 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
5 Our next scheduled speaker is George
6 Zalar. You may proceed, sir.

7 MR. ZALAR: Okay. I would like to
8 thank the Commission for giving me the time to
9 speak. I will be brief because I believe you
10 have heard it in and out all day.

11 I am George Zalar from Coal Township,
12 Northumberland County. I am president of iron
13 workers' union local 404, which represents 17
14 counties in Pennsylvania, Adams County being
15 one. I have several members through that area
16 and surrounding areas that work on construction
17 sites in the region.

18 I would like to applaud Crossroads
19 gaming for their investment, which all
20 investments they would like to see some type of
21 return. They are going to provide good paying
22 and living jobs through construction and
23 permanent positions after that.

24 I would also like to touch a little bit
25 on the visiting of Gettysburg. I myself have

1 though our office is based in Harrisburg.

2 I've got many members down there that
3 are waiting, hoping that Gettysburg gets --
4 Crossroads gets a gaming license.

5 Right now I have numerous members that
6 travel to Harrisburg. I have Bruce Orendorff,
7 who is a resident of Gettysburg working up here
8 at John Harris School. I have Wayne Miller
9 working over at the York College, who resides in
10 Gettysburg. Perry Sanders travels to Camp Hill
11 along with Stan Shrader. I have numerous
12 members. James Craig just came back from an
13 outing down in Maryland who lived in Adams
14 County, lived in Gettysburg. They all travel.
15 They are looking for the opportunity, for the
16 chance to work at the gaming facility and
17 constructing it.

18 We represent the general laborers,
19 construction laborers, which does anything from
20 cleanup, to assisting carpenters, to assisting
21 the bricklayers on masonry jobs. These guys
22 travel because there is not much work in Adams
23 County that goes on there.

24 A project of this size, with gas prices
25 the way they are right now, they are just hoping

1 visited other states with casinos and such, and
2 also I can see their concerns of Gettysburg
3 historically being -- not being visited or such.
4 I have to disagree with that.

5 Myself, even if I visit Las Vegas, I
6 didn't spend all of my time inside of casinos.
7 I took my family and us to Hoover Dam or the
8 Grand Canyon. There is a lot of attractions
9 that go with this, and I would like to say by
10 closing, that myself and the members who I
11 represent are fully supportive of this casino in
12 being at Adams County, Gettysburg.

13 Thank you.

14 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
15 Our next scheduled speaker is Joe
16 Wingert.

17 MR. WINGERT: Yes. Correct.

18 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may
19 proceed.

20 MR. WINGERT: Hi, my name is Joe
21 Wingert. I am organizer with labors local 1180
22 in Harrisburg. I reside in Dalmatia in
23 Northumberland County, but I represent workers
24 and laborers who represent union families from
25 Adams County. They are part of our local, even

1 and praying that they get a license. Others
2 have ensured me that their spouses are looking
3 to make career moves, hoping to get into the
4 Teamsters working at these facilities afterwards
5 because they are traveling to other areas. They
6 are traveling to York and traveling to
7 Lancaster.

8 I commend Crossroads gaming on wanting
9 to build a facility with strong living wages and
10 benefits with wanting to provide living wages
11 and benefits after the facility is up and
12 running.

13 The amount of jobs that it's going to
14 bring in, these aren't just regular jobs. They
15 are also considered careers, because they are
16 not working at Wal-Mart or Wendy's or McDonald's
17 for 7, 7.50 an hour and paying their own
18 benefits working there.

19 There are defined benefit plans and
20 healthcare plans, and the laborers of 1180 are
21 in full support of a casino, and wish that you
22 would proceed and grant Crossroads a license in
23 Adams County.

24 Thank you.

25 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you,

1 sir.

2 Before we proceed with our next
3 speaker, by way of announcement, we have four
4 more individuals scheduled to speak in a
5 three-minute time slot. Three of them have not
6 yet been sworn.

7 I will be calling your names, along
8 with another in a moment, to swear you in, then
9 we will finish with the individual speakers.

10 I will also be calling the name of one
11 speaker on behalf of a community group, who has
12 not yet been sworn, swear that individual at
13 this time, and then we will march right into the
14 resumption of the individual speakers and take
15 the community group speaker last.

16 So if I may have Adrian Scott Fine
17 stand, please.

18 MR. FINE: [COMPLIED]

19 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Diane M.
20 Berlin, stand, please.

21 MS. BERLIN: [COMPLIED]

22 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Elaine L.
23 Jones, stand, please.

24 MS. JONES: [COMPLIED]

25 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: And John

1 The National Trust and strong local and
2 statewide partners are reaching out to the
3 Pennsylvania leadership here to ensure that
4 Gettysburg and what it stands for is not marred
5 by incompatible development, especially to this
6 extreme.

7 The proposed casino with thousands of
8 slot machines, only a mile and a half from the
9 boundaries of this national shrine, would
10 blatantly exploit the name of Gettysburg. It
11 would stand in stark contrast to the sacrifice
12 that the Gettysburg battlefield embodies. It
13 would detract from Pennsylvania efforts to draw
14 heritage visitors to the Commonwealth and to
15 Gettysburg, and it would mar the experience of
16 visitors who are drawn by the historic and
17 educational experience of the battlefield.

18 Richard Moe, the president of the
19 National Trust for Historic Preservation states,
20 "All of us, and especially Pennsylvanians, are
21 trustees of this hallowed ground. I urge you to
22 ensure that proposed gambling casino is not
23 allowed at Gettysburg."

24 This year the National Trust announced
25 inclusion of "The Journey through Hallowed

1 Wenk, stand, please.

2 If each of you would raise your right
3 hand and answer the question: Do you swear or
4 affirm that the testimony you are about to give
5 is the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but
6 the truth, so help you God?

7 THE WITNESSES: Yes, I do.

8 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: You may be
9 seated. Thank you.

10 All right. Adrian Scott Fine, you may
11 proceed.

12 MR. FINE: Good morning. Adrian Scott
13 Fine. I am a resident of Lands Down, Delaware
14 County, Pennsylvania. I am here with the
15 National Trust for Historic Preservation, and I
16 thank you for the opportunity to speak today.

17 The National Trust has a long history
18 of working with historic communities and
19 especially communities that have been impacted
20 by gaming operations.

21 The National Trust for Historic
22 Preservation is here today to demonstrate our
23 opposition to this casino proposal with more
24 than 14,000 members in Pennsylvania and over
25 200,000 members nationally.

1 Ground" Corridor, on American's 11 most
2 Endangered Historic Places, listing Gettysburg
3 is the northern terminus of this 175-mile
4 corridor of our nation's history, through
5 Maryland to Monticello in Virginia.

6 What a tragedy that the opportunity to
7 link Gettysburg with the rest of the Route 15
8 corridor with its seminal Civil War
9 battlefields, American Presidents' homes and
10 centuries of history is now threatened by a
11 gambling casino at its most sacred point.

12 We are urging you, as members of the
13 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, to fully
14 consider the implications of allowing gaming to
15 come to Gettysburg. It is one thing to decide
16 that gambling is wanted for Pennsylvania. It is
17 another to denigrate one of our nation's most
18 sacred places in doing that.

19 Thank you.

20 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

21 As noted, we will be hearing from Diane
22 M. Berlin next and you may proceed.

23 MS. BERLIN: Diane Berlin. I live in
24 Manheim, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania,
25 the most historically significant state in our

1 nation.

2 I serve as volunteer coordinator for
3 Casino-Free Pennsylvania, a statewide coalition
4 of groups and individuals opposing casino
5 gambling in Pennsylvania. I am also vice chair
6 of the National Coalition of Legalized Gambling;
7 and, no, I am not here to debate that issue but
8 I could.

9 Fortunately, the site in my own county
10 was eliminated, but for the record I oppose all
11 applications, including Gettysburg.

12 The rest of my statement is to plead on
13 behalf of other ordinary citizens in this
14 process. People have panicked after finding out
15 that their community or neighborhood is targeted
16 by one of the gambling companies. Some have
17 just found out and are upset that they missed
18 the opportunity to testify in person.

19 The targeting of communities by the
20 gambling interest in these hearings has pitted
21 neighbor against neighbor, community against
22 community, making most of the comments look like
23 NIMBYS, when the majority of the opponents I
24 have met are NIMS not in my state; but that
25 issue is not yours to deal with.

1 Every member of this well-paid Board
2 should be in attendance at each hearing. It is
3 understandable that there is not unlimited time,
4 but three minutes is very little time to address
5 so many concerns.

6 The applicant is already given 30
7 minutes more than the individual citizens. They
8 should be -- should not be given more time at
9 the end of these sessions, unless citizens and
10 groups are allowed the same privilege.

11 The disadvantaged citizens are not
12 allowed to show videos, and yet videos are
13 allowed for the applicants. Applicants are
14 making a sales pitch. Citizens are trying to
15 deal with the prospects of uninvited gambling
16 establishments in a reasonable and credible way.
17 Most come and respond at great expense to
18 themselves.

19 I am asking that you give as much
20 weight to each citizen, if you want to --

21 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Ms.

22 Randal --

23 MS. BERLIN: Yes.

24 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Your time
25 is finished. Thank you.

1 These hearings are the first
2 opportunity for citizens to be heard on the
3 casino issue as Act 71 was passed with zero
4 citizen scrutiny, hearings or input. The
5 license applicants were given a deadline of
6 December 21st for their impact reports.

7 Those reports should have been made
8 available to the public at that time, but delays
9 continued, reports were changed and even now,
10 most are incomplete as they do not address the
11 negative socioeconomic impacts which do exist
12 despite the denial of the gambling promoters.

13 The citizens who are already placed in
14 the defensive position by Act 71, these hearings
15 should have been delayed to give them at least
16 two months to examine the impact reports.

17 Most citizens have little or no
18 experience addressing impact issues of gambling,
19 let alone addressing them regarding a casino,
20 which is targeting their town.

21 These important hearings should be
22 held -- should all be held in the community of
23 the proposed site. They should be scheduled for
24 both day and evening, which would allow more
25 community participation.

1 MS. BERLIN: Uh-huh.

2 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: I'm sorry.

3 That was

4 Ms. Berlin.

5 Our next scheduled speaker is Richard
6 Randal. Well, we will proceed with Elaine L.
7 Jones. Good morning. You may proceed.

8 MS. JONES: Good morning. I am Elaine
9 Jones from Arendtsville, Pennsylvania, near
10 Gettysburg, and a member of the Upper Adams
11 School Board.

12 I have lived in Gettysburg for 42
13 years. I drove nearly an hour today to come to
14 Harrisburg to speak for three minutes, because I
15 believe this hearing is one of the most
16 important events of my lifetime.

17 I want to thank each of you on the
18 Gaming Board for taking time to listen to local
19 reactions to having the slots parlor in
20 Gettysburg, and I am trusting that each one of
21 you has come here today with an open mind. And
22 I understand that your job is not to decide if
23 we should have gambling in Pennsylvania, but it
24 is simply to decide where the approved casinos
25 should be built.

1 My plea to you today is that you weigh
2 very carefully the power you have to change
3 history and to alter, forever, a place that is
4 known all over the world, Gettysburg.

5 We all know the words of Abraham
6 Lincoln from November of 1863, The world will
7 little note nor long remember what we say here,
8 but it can never forget what they did here.

9 For almost 150 years, the world has not
10 forgotten that Gettysburg is the place that
11 Lincoln memorialized as a final resting place
12 for those who gave the last full measure of
13 devotion to preserve a nation dedicated to the
14 proposition that all men are created equal.

15 Many millions of people from all over
16 the world have come to Gettysburg to visit this
17 battlefield just in the years that I have lived
18 there. We don't have amusement parks or any
19 fancy attractions.

20 We have been so protective of this
21 symbol that we demolished the national tower as
22 a blight on our hallowed ground, and the park
23 staff removed the balloons that my family had
24 placed on Battlefield Road to direct friends to
25 my daughter's wedding on the covered bridge

1 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Our
2 next-to-last speaker -- thank you, Diane -- is
3 Mr. Randall, who has the distinct fortune to
4 have addressed us before and maybe somewhat at a
5 disadvantage, and hopefully will be very brief
6 on his individual remarks. You may proceed.

7 MR. RANDALL: Members of the
8 Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, thank you for
9 hearing what I have to say about the casino
10 Gettysburg. I apologize for the mistake in
11 getting out of order here.

12 I am a resident of Gettysburg,
13 Pennsylvania. My wife and I moved to Gettysburg
14 from Laurel, Maryland in May of 2002. We
15 selected Gettysburg as our permanent retirement
16 location after a long search, visited a dozen
17 good candidate sites over the six-year period,
18 and we chose Gettysburg because it has the best
19 collection of attributes that we wanted:

20 The small-town charm and rural
21 surroundings, the wonderful American heritage of
22 National Battlefield Park, little traffic --
23 compared to the DC area, that is -- churches
24 galore, great people and favorable tax structure
25 for retirees on pensions.

1 adjacent to the battlefield, because they said
2 balloons violated the sanctity of the Gettysburg
3 National Park.

4 Perhaps we have gone through extremes
5 to preserve our heritage, but it takes extreme
6 resolve to resist the allure of a world class
7 gaming resort and millions of dollars that could
8 be generated by investors seeking to transform
9 Adams County into a, quote, unique, upscale,
10 recreational destination, unquote.

11 In just a few short months, you will
12 have to decide whether Gettysburg will remain a
13 small town and shine to history or whether we
14 will be forced to open our town to Chance and
15 the type of development that would make casinos
16 a profitable enterprise.

17 There are other Civil War battlefields,
18 but there is only one place that has remained a
19 shrine for Lincoln's legacy, and I implore you
20 not to make 2006 the turning point where
21 Gettysburg loses its soul.

22 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.
23 Our last speaker --

24 MS. DOMANSKI: Excuse me, Mike. We now
25 have 23, Mr. Randall.

1 We just love this small-town
2 atmosphere. We are proud to host friends and
3 former colleagues and relatives visiting our new
4 home and show them the sites. We really like
5 the idea that we can help raise our grandkids in
6 a place full of important American history.

7 Well-maintained park buildings and
8 historic buildings and rural streets, wooded
9 glens and farms surrounding the battlefield
10 park, signs of our heritage are everywhere.

11 We did not choose Las Vegas or Atlantic
12 City or any similar site, and now we see our
13 community threatened with this gambling hall on
14 the edge of our town, one mile from the Calvary
15 Field, one mile from Camp Letterman and just two
16 miles from our house.

17 We would have never moved to Gettysburg
18 if we knew the casino was coming to town. The
19 promise that we will receive tax relief is not
20 believable. It will be higher taxes to pay for
21 the damage caused by the casino in the future
22 due to bankruptcies, divorces, abandoned
23 children, et cetera.

24 Well over \$900 per persons a year are
25 what is predicted to pay in the cost benefits

1 analysis study, which I submitted previously as
2 evidence.

3 Severe hardship will come crashing down
4 on some of our friends and neighbors, who will
5 become addicted to the slots, the most addictive
6 gambling machine on earth.

7 We will have to pay and install -- pay
8 for and install a monitored security alarm
9 system. What will I say to my grandkids as we
10 pass by the casino on the way to church and the
11 ice cream cone?

12 We are too old to move again and we
13 will be stuck with this thing and we are very
14 sad about it. We feel like our peaceful
15 retirement is going to be ruined.

16 Thank you.

17 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you.

18 Our last speaker speaking for a
19 10-minute slot on behalf of community group, as
20 I understand it, is John Wenk and you may
21 proceed, sir.

22 MR. WENK: All right. Thank you.

23 My name is John Wenk. I reside in
24 Tyrone Township, and my business operates in
25 Tyrone and also in Merallen Township. I am here

1 built there; and that would not be very
2 acceptable.

3 Having personally visited areas
4 surrounding Atlantic City, I was appalled at the
5 economic blight, decay and filth the neighboring
6 areas have become. We have no desire to see our
7 county follow suit.

8 We also have concerns that the
9 increased costs will be absorbed by the
10 townships and counties, would not be offset by
11 the revenues received by this proposed facility.
12 Thank you for your time.

13 PRESIDING OFFICER EDMISTON: Thank you
14 for sparing me the embarrassment of an
15 uncooperative timer light.

16 On behalf of the Pennsylvania Gaming
17 Control Board, I would like to thank all who
18 participated this morning, for your cooperation
19 and for the information provided to the Board.

20 The April 7th, 2006 public input
21 hearing of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board
22 is now concluded. Have a safe and pleasant
23 weekend.

24 (Hearing concluded at 12:00 p.m.)
25

1 to speak on behalf of the Adams County

24 peak tourist months, and it would delineate into
25 a D rating with the proposed facility being
