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CHAIRMAN DECKER:

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My name is Tad Decker. I'm the Chairman of the PA Gaming Control Board. I'd like to welcome a couple of my fellow Board members in the public meeting. A quorum of the present Board is present. I'll confirm that Commissioner Gary Sojka is attending by phone. Gary, can you hear me?

MR. SOJKA:

Yes, I can.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

11 Joining us again today as the Treasury 12 Department's representative is Keith Welks. Keith is 13 Acting Deputy State Treasurer for Fiscal Operations. 14 And joining us in the audience as representatives of 15 Acting Revenue Secretary Tom Wolfe are Stacie Amsler 16 and Andrea Mead. Stacie and Andrea, are you here. 17 Thank you for joining us. As always, let me ask 18 members of the Board, and particularly me, and the 19 audience to turn off their cell phones, Blackberries. 20 They interfere with our sound system. By way of old business, we have two

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   this afternoon to discuss various matters --- I'm
   sorry, this morning, prior to the meeting today.
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  Discussed various personnel matters and other issues.
  No business was conducted at these sessions.
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                Second, I want to clarify the
   announcement that was made at our last meeting
  regarding application period for Category III resort
   licenses. This application period will open tomorrow,
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  Friday, April 20th, and remain open for ten weeks
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   through Friday, June 29th.

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  motion to approve the transcript and minutes of our

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Motion carries. All right. New business. Let's start with --- Anne is already here. She's anticipated. May I have your report, please. That would be great.

MS. NEEB:

Good afternoon, Chairman Decker, members of the Board. I have several agenda items for the Board's consideration today, but before I move onto those, I just want to give you all a brief update.

As Chairman Decker just stated, the application period for Category III licenses will open tomorrow, April 20th and stay open through June 29th. Beginning tomorrow, these applications for the resort licenses will be available on the Board's website under the licensure tab. So if anyone's interested that's where they would find that, the application.

The Bureau of Licensing has updated the application to reflect the temporary regulation amendments approved by the Board at your last meeting.

Director of Licensing, Susan Hensel and her staff are available to answer any questions that

potential applicants may have as they go through the Category III application process.

Also, in the Bureau of Licensing, I'd like to update you on some developments involving non-gaming employees. First, the new streamlined, slots link application for non-gaming employees is now available at each of the operating facilities and has been well received.

Secondly, as you know, the Bureau of Licensing implemented a temporary registration process, and this was in response to feedback from the facilities and has received its first request for temporary registrants.

The new process allows certain non-gaming employees to begin working while undergoing their background investigation.

We will continue to make this process available, as new facilities come online.

Okay. I'd like to now turn our attention to operation issues at the casinos. The first agenda item that I have today is approval of the internal control submitted by Harrah's Chester. I'll turn it over now to our assistant chief counsel, Kevin Hayes for further explanation of this item. I'm sorry, and Denyse Miskin, who is the director of the Bureau of

Corporate Compliance and Internal Controls.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Denyse, thank you.

MS. MISKIN:

I would like to present for the Board's consideration the internal control system and audit protocols submitted by conditional Category I slot machine licensee Chester Downs and Marina, LLC, doing business as Harrah's Chester.

The internal control systems which
Harrah's Chester has designed and submitted to the
Board meet the minimum requirement set forth in
Section 1322 of the Act, including minimum design
standards for safeguarding assets and revenues,
retaining accurate and reliable financial records and
ensuring complete connectivity to the central computer
system.

As part of its initial internal control submission, Harrah's Chester provided surveillance system specifications, which provide adequate and effective surveillance of activities inside and outside the facility.

On September 27th, 2006, the Board approved Harrah's Chester's application for a conditional Category I slot machine license. As a

condition to its license, Harrah's Chester's

acknowledged that its initial submission of internal

controls are reviewed and approved in concept form,

and expressly agreed to immediately implement any

procedural revisions in its system, as requested by

the Board, which we've been doing over the past

several weeks with them.

After careful and full consideration of the proposed internal controls the Board authorized Harrah's Chester to commence operations on January 22nd, 2007.

I would like now to request that the Board entertain a motion to adopt the formal resolution, approving the internal control systems and audit protocol for a conditional Category I slot machine licensee, Chester Downs and Marina, LLC.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Thank you, Denyse. May I have a motion to that effect, please?

MS. COLINS:

Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board approve the initial internal control systems and audit protocols submitted by Chester Downs and Marina, LLC.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Do we have a second?

MR. SOJKA:

Second.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Thank you. Any questions or comments?

Hearing none, all those in favor?

MS. NEEB:

Thanks, Chairman. The next item before the Board would allow amendments to the Gaming floor plans to be approved by delegated authority. Kevin Hayes, who's with our Office of Chief Counsel, who heads up the casino opening team will provide additional details on this item.

ATTORNEY HAYES:

Thank you, Anne. Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, good morning. I'd like to present to the Board for their consideration an order which delegates the authority to the executive director to approve any changes or revisions to the square footage of the gaming floor or the number of slot machines on

the floor of a slot machine licensee pursuant to Section 467.1 of the Board's regulations.

This delegation is to be exercised following a determination by the executive director in consultation with BIE, the Office of Chief Counsel, the Gaming Laboratory and the Department of Revenue that the proposed change to the gaming floor conforms to all the technical requirements mandated in the Board's regulations, including those provisions relating to complete surveillance camera coverage of the floor, minimum security staffing and complete connectivity to the central control computer system.

This delegation is further subject to the requirement that the executive director present to the Board at periodic intervals, a summary of the approvals granted pursuant to this delegation.

With that said, I now respectfully request that the Board entertain a motion adopting the order, which delegates authority to the executive director for approving all requested changes to the gaming floor of slot machine licensees. Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

May I have a motion, please?

MR. RIVERS:

Yes. Mr. Chairman, I move that the Board

MS. NEEB:

Thank you, Chairman. The next item and the final item I have today is consideration of the Shuffle Master product as an approved slot machine gaming device. We have here today, Michael Cruz, who is the senior manager in our gaming lab, and he will present this item with an explanation for your consideration. Michael?

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Welcome, Michael.

MR. CRUZ:

Thank you, Anne. Good afternoon,

Chairman Decker and members of the Board. I'd like to

take some time to give you a brief overview of the

prototype review that the lab submitted for your

approval in regards to use of the Shuffle Master TMS 300 slot machine with the use of a Royal Match 21 Blackjack game theme.

I'm not here to regurgitate the prototype report that I submitted to you, I'm just here to give you a brief overview of the particular points that are integral to the review of this product and to determine that it is a slot machine in this jurisdiction.

manufacturer will develop a product that pushes the technological envelope in the gaming industry. The lab believes that this Shuffle Master product fits the bill and that it will be a vital part of the growth of gaming in this jurisdiction.

what the lab did to review this product, I just want to mention that this product in certain versions, was approved in Nevada and by also independent test labs for use in other jurisdictions. It was the lab determination that we would do a full review of this product, given the nature of it in this jurisdiction.

Among all of the gaming lab tests, that the lab expects --- there's a particular minimum design standard that all slot machines must pass.

Chapter 461.7(b)(2) states that all possible combinations in a slot machine cycle shall be independent of each other and of all possible combinations from cycles and other slot machines.

Translated, this basically means that the play of one patron cannot affect the play of another. For example, you have a bank of ten slot machines, simple three reel sevens and bars slot machine bank. I hit three sevens on one game, that should have no effect on that person sitting next to me, their ability to hit those three sevens. So this is a rule that must be met by all slot machines to be considered for approval in this jurisdiction.

In addition to this standard, as opposed to a true table game, an electronic table game, based off of the blackjack game theme where depending on the player's position that the odds and probabilities are not equal for every patron. This is evident in a single deck game of blackjack where the first patron gets dealt a card, that affects every single other person's ability to achieve that same hand further down the line. So there's dependencies. And this is what we use to distinguish a slot machine from a table game.

So what Shuffle Master has done, they

have redesigned their software to preserve the independent nature and meet our regulation, preserving independent outcomes for all patrons and to preserve identical probability and odds for every single patron standing at that machine.

If the Shuffle Master product that was submitted and approved in other jurisdictions of the country was submitted to the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, it would fail these tests. That's why Shuffle Master redesigned their software.

The lab was engaged with Shuffle Master in discussions for over a year so that when the time came for them to submit their product for our review in the lab, it would pass without any major surprises from our lab.

The lab gave a demonstration to the Board members and executive staff of how Shuffle Master complies with our regulations during the executive session, although I cannot explain in detail due to proprietary information on the design of the game.

The lab was able to confirm that the software submitted to Pennsylvania was unique and meets all of our regulations regarding minimum design standards of a slot machine.

Once Shuffle Master was able to pass this

vital test of independent play between each patron,
the lab continued to perform its test that it performs
on every single prototype slot machine, which includes
but not limited to a thorough random number generator
analysis, forced emulation of game plan, game outcome,
the proper communication to the in-house slot
monitoring systems, as well as proper communication to
the state run central computer system, and full
accounting reconciliation.

We test accounting reconciliation between the game itself, the in-house slot monitoring system reports and the GTECH central computer system reports.

In addition to the full accounting reconciliation, each station on the Shuffle Master product is addressed individually to the slot monitoring system and to the GTECH central computer system, so that each station --- there's five stations on the product, has a direct communication line to both of the accounting systems, that it's not just a sum of the one machine being transmitted to the systems.

So to break it down even more fundamentally, Shuffle Master has joined five identical slot machines together so that each patron can play on a common play area and have a video

representation of a dealer interact, depending on what situation arises during the game play, whether it's a hit, stand, what have you.

machines put together. As I mentioned before, we were engaged in conversation with Shuffle Master for almost a year, so that when the time came that they could submit their product to our lab, we can turn around and review that product in a timely manner, because with new technology in the gaming industry, one of the biggest concerns for regulators, manufacturers and casino operators is the turnaround time from submission of product to approval.

Shuffle Master has informed me that a version of this product took about a year to be approved in Nevada, which includes a 60-day field trial that they required due to their standards. Shuffle Master submitted their product to independent test labs, which took approximately three months to approve the product, given the various jurisdictional standards that they must go through.

The Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board lab took approximately --- including the one year that we were in discussion with them, from the time that an official submission was made to our lab, took three

months to review this product.

For comparison, a regular game theme that is submitted to our lab takes approximately one to two weeks between submission to approval. So three months might seem very short, but in the grand scheme of things, with all games that come through our lab, it was a very thorough review process.

And included in this three-month period, the lab was able to discover three deficiencies in the product that required immediate software revision to the Shuffle Master product and resubmission so that we can re-test these deficiencies so that the product will be --- will conform to our regulations.

So this goes to show that knowing our lab can outperform state labs, we can compete against most private independent testing labs in the turnaround time, and at the same time, ensuring the integrity and competitive advantage of gaming in Pennsylvania.

Given the lab's review of the Shuffle Master products, the lab does not interpose an objection to the use of this product in the Pennsylvania jurisdiction. It complies with all regulation standards in defining a slot machine in Pennsylvania.

MR. CRUZ:

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It's five individual slot machines where you're playing as a dealer. So it's player one versus the dealer, player two versus the dealer, player three versus ---.

MR. MCCABE:

So it's possible that if there are five players there, we could all get a king of hearts, an ace of diamonds, all five us get the same card?

MR. CRUZ:

The way Shuffle Master designed the program to meet our definitions of a slot machine, that is possible.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

You're really playing against the machine; aren't you?

MR. CRUZ:

You're playing against the machine. It's a random number generator that's in ---.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

It's a machine, it just happens to have a person's face on it?

MR. CRUZ:

Yeah. The dealer itself is just a video

clip, and it is just a video clip that's run in correspondence to what's happening during the game.

That dealer has no effect on game play. It's the player versus the computer, the random number generator.

MR. MCCABE:

So in this three-month period that we took to approve the machine, you didn't take any shortcuts or compromise security or our standards or regulations or integrity?

MR. CRUZ:

Oh, no. In fact, we went over this product a lot more thorough than we would just a regular prototype to ensure that every T is crossed, every I is dotted. And it shows that we found issues with the original software submission to our lab that other labs have not found yet. That just goes to show you the depth of our review of the product.

The product that was submitted to our lab was version 2.15. We are approving 2.17. So it went through two major revisions within our lab in order for it to comply with our regulations and the Act itself.

MR. MCCABE:

And the final point, I guess, is we're

not considering it as one slot machine, we're considering it as five?

MR. CRUZ:

That's correct. As I said during the accounting testing phase, even in the setup of the accounting, it's five individual slot machines. So when you run a report on the in-house system, when you run a report on the state run central computer system, you load it as five separate assets. And you can view accounting information individually of every station on that machine.

MR. MCCABE:

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN DECKER:

Any other questions?

MR. SOJKA:

For what it's worth, I've had an opportunity to look at a preliminary, purely statistical analysis of the program, and just perusing that, it's clearly a very, very thorough and impressive statistical analysis of the machine that's being looked at today.

MR. CRUZ:

Manish (phonetic) Pruitt, the manager of Siskel Review, did a very thorough RNG analysis. This

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1 is probably the most thorough RNG analysis that their
  product has gone through, and these are the steps that
  we took to ensure that this product, when it's
  approved in Pennsylvania, is basically the best that
   it can be.

MS. MCNULTY:

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Thank you, Mr. Chairman, and good afternoon, members of the Board. Today I'm going to present to you a combined statement of revenue and expenditures for the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board for fiscal year '06/'07 through March 31st of 2007. This statement was last presented through January 29th of 2007. So I'll be discussing the differences between this statement and the previous statement. The combined statement shows revenues of \$30.3 million as of the end of the third fiscal quarter. This is an increase of \$7.8 million since the end of January, when we last presented. The increase occurred in three areas. Charges to our licensees, Section 1401 accounts began during this period and totaled \$6.14 million. Investigative deposits and application fees increased by \$1.3 million, and \$218,000 was collected from licensees to reimburse the State Police for the cost of fingerprinting and photographing equipment located

at the venues for use in the employee background

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  investigation process.
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                Expenditures, as of the end of the third
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   fiscal quarter were $21.6 million. Of this amount,
   $12.2 million represented personnel costs, and $9.4
  million were operating expenditures.
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                Personnel expenditures increased $2.7
  million from the end of January to the end of March,
  while operating expenses increased by $2.1 million.
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                Revenues exceed expenditures after nine
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  months by $8.7 million. After reserving for
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   encumbered expenditures and transfers to the State
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   Police, the remaining budgetary balance is $5.3
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  million. That concludes my report.

MS. HENSEL:

Thank you, Chairman Decker and good afternoon, members of the Board. I have two licensing matters to bring to the Board's attention this afternoon. The first item concerns the recommendation of denials for 32 non-gaming employee registration applications.
