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PROCEEDINGS

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PRESIDING OFFICER:

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Good morning, everyone. My name is Linda Lloyd and I'm the Presiding Officer assigned by the Board today to conduct this Public Input Hearing regarding the petition filed by Washington Trotting Association to conduct table games at its casino. Before we begin, if you could please turn off, or to 10 vibrate, your cell phones, Blackberries, that sort of thing so we don't interrupt today's speakers. Somewhere along the line I caught a cold, so I'm 12 hoping my voice holds out through the hearing today. 14 Fortunately, I'm not the one that has to do most of 15 the talking.

I call to order this Public Input Hearing regarding the petition of Washington Trotting Association for approval and the Issuance of a Certificate to Conduct Table Games, which was deemed complete and filed on March 4th, 2010 at Docket Number 1321-2010. The date is Tuesday, March 30th, 2010, the time is 10:00 a.m. and the location is the Courthouse Square Office Building, Public Meeting Room 104, 100 West Beau Street, Washington, PA 15301.

The Input Hearing is convened by the

Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board pursuant to the authority found in Sections 1205(b) and 1314A(b) of the Gaming Act. This Public Hearing was advertised on the Board's website, announced at a previous Board meeting and was advertised in local newspapers. The Board members present today for the hearing are Chairman Greg Fajt, to my left.

The Board and its staff would like to thank the Staff here in Washington at the County Courthouse for making this space available for the Board today. Their cooperation has been essential in the organization and holding of this hearing.

Washington Trotting to present to the public its plan to operate table games at its casino and to allow individual members of the public, community groups, elected officials and local government representatives to express their thoughts and share any concerns about the proposed project with the Board. The hearing will continue until the last scheduled speaker registered has had the opportunity to speak.

The order of speakers is as follows.

Washington Trotting will make their presentation

first. We will then hear from any Legislators, local
government representatives, community representatives

and individual members of the public. Washington

Trotting will have approximately 20 minutes to make

their presentation. Each government official will

have approximately ten minutes to speak, each

community representative, group representative, may

have approximately five minutes and individual members

of the public about three minutes.

Each speaker should begin their remarks by stating his or her name, the municipality where he or she resides, and if they're speaking on behalf of an entity, the name of that entity. If you are speaking today and you have written notes of testimony which you will read from during the hearing, when you're finished if you could give a copy of the written testimony to our court stenographer, which is sitting here in front of me, that would be helpful to her.

This is an official administrative
hearing, so please treat this as if you were attending
a court proceeding. All witnesses speak loudly and
clearly into the microphone so that the court reporter
and all others here can hear what you have to say.
So, let's begin by having each of you that has
registered to speak today or will provide testimony on
behalf of Washington Trotting please stand and raise

your right hand to be sworn by the court reporter. 1 2 WITNESSES SWORN EN MASSE 3 5 PRESIDING OFFICER: 6 Before we begin testimony, I have several hearing exhibits to enter into the record. Hearing Exhibit Number One is the Notice of the Public Hearing sent to Washington Trotting Association. Hearing 10 Exhibit Number Two are the written comments received by the Board by the deadline established addressing 11 the petition. 12 (Exhibits Number One and Two 13 14 marked for identification.) 15 PRESIDING OFFICER: Comments received are as follows. 16 17 support of the project, from Joann Diesel, D-I-E-S-E-L. Opposed to the project, Donna Micklow, 18 M-I-C-K-L-O-W; opposed to the project, Eugene Parise, 19 P-A-R-I-S-E; opposed to the project, David Day; 20 21 opposed, Gary Scherer, S-C-H-E-R-E-R; opposed to the 22 project, John McCreight, capital M-C capital 23 C-R-E-I-G-H-T. We will begin the presentation of the Operator, Washington Trotting.

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6 BILL PAULOS, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED
7 AS FOLLOWS:

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MR. PAULOS:

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Good morning, Bill Paulos, principal of the Washington Trotting and principal of Cambria Casino and Resorts, living in Las Vegas. Good morning, Mr. Chairman, State Senator Stout, State Representative Solobay, Mr. Dillon, who is the Acting Executive Secretary of the Horse and Harness Commission, and everybody else in attendance.

Since September 27th, 2006 we have been 17 in partnership with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. 18 We take all our partnerships very seriously and work 19 20 very hard to make them successful for both parties. 21 To secure this partnership, we had to make very, very 22 serious representations and promises. If you 23 remember, there was a question with this Board whether we would be a financially-viable business. As we have 24 25 seen since the opening of the temporary in June '07,

and the perm in April of '09, we have had a very, very successful run.

From that temporary opening to January of '09, we have garnered revenues of over \$666,000,000. We have paid fees and taxes of over 310,000,000 or 16.4 million per month. To our other partners, the Horsemen of our historical Meadows Racetrack, we have given over 8,000,000 in that --- 80,000,000 in that same time frame. That's more than 4.2 million per month, not bad since that in 2006 the entire year's worth of purses were \$10,000,000.

Hopefully our partners are happy with our performance today. Of course we hope to improve on those results. There were many challenges over the past 12 months that we believe will be overcome in the ensuing months.

We also promised to be good corporate citizens. To that end, out of the Meadows' share of these revenues, we have given over \$775,000 toward philanthropic endeavors to over 25 organizations over the past two and a half years from the North Strabane Volunteer Fire Department to Washington County Food Bank to the Pennsylvania Special Olympics. Through a program we established called Neighborhood Partners, our patrons have spent more than \$2.5 million in these

Washington County businesses through points they 1 2 earned and redeemed for gift cards. This number does not take into account what they might have spent over 3 and above the gift shop --- gift card on that particular shopping trip. Yes, we take our partnerships and promises seriously and will continue to do so.

The issue at hand, however, is our capability to establish a Table Games Department at the Meadows that is successful in all aspects; training, game protection, revenue creation and a great entertainment experience for our patrons.

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On the next slide you will see our management's expertise. My partner Bill Wortman, who is in New Hampshire right now working on a Gaming Law, asked me not to read this aloud because he gets tired of hearing how long we've been doing this. personally have opened over a dozen major casinos around the world; Crown in Australia being the largest with 300 table games. However, the most similar might 21 be Greektown in Detroit, where we trained 2,500 employees who had never been inside a casino before. We also trained the professors at Wayne County Community College so they could provide casino career classes after we were open; something Sean will speak

to later in this presentation.

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2 Before I turn it over to Sean, however, I 3 will be remiss if I did not take time to thank our partners, the Commonwealth and the Board, for their help, cooperation and good faith in this endeavor. Also our partners, the Horsemen at the Meadows, who try to put the best possible product on the track each and every day. Thanks to the town Board of North Strabane and Frank Siffrinn, Township Manager, and to 10 all the folks down at the township offices who we've worked with on a daily basis. All Washington County 11 Board of Commissioners and the Greater Washington 12 13 County Chamber of Commerce, without their support we 14 would have not accomplished our lofty goals.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank our State Senator, Barry Stout, and State Representative, Tim Solobay. Their dedication to the Meadows over the last four years is absolutely unquestionable. Last, but certainly not least, I would like to thank the great people of Western Pennsylvania who support the Meadows every day, without who we wouldn't be here.

Now, I take great pleasure in introducing Sean Sullivan, the Vice President/General Manager of the Meadows Racetrack & Casino, to take you through

the Meadows Table Game Presentation. Thank you.

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SEAN A. SULLIVAN, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN,

TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

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MR. SULLIVAN:

Thank you, Mr. Paulos. A couple of quick things. Today is an exciting day for us at the Meadows. We're excited about the opportunity of table games coming. An interesting topic that we have with our table games management crew and those in executive positions is, the Meadows is proud to say that we've made promises and we've kept our promises. There's no question the Meadows has delivered on the things Bill mentioned. \$390,000,000 in taxes and purse contributions, that's astounding, that's fantastic, \$775,000 in charitable contributions, 2.5 million in 18 neighborhood partners. I mean, these are exciting big numbers that benefit all of our partners.

175 years of experience, a lot of it sitting at the front table, a lot of it within the organization. It's a fantastic wealth of knowledge.

The good news with table games, and then 24 I'll talk to you about some of those specifics, is now we're a full entertainment experience. A couple of

more things coming down the road, some surprises, but right now from bowling, to restaurants, to slot machines, to table games, to the racetrack experience.

Everything is woven perfectly together. We're going to be a complete full-entertainment facility. It allows us to keep some of those experiences going out of the state, to West Virginia, other places, even Las Vegas and Atlantic City to stay local. And that's an exciting concept.

The best news is we've got more jobs coming aboard. Right now we're looking at 549 jobs, a little preliminary, but we're in that range of 549 additional jobs at the Meadows. And these are family-sustaining jobs. We'll talk about that in just a moment. Very exciting, and I think it puts us up there, if not at the top Washington County employer, real darn close. So, we're excited about that.

And as Bill mentioned, we do consider this partnership a partnership with the Commonwealth, a partnership with the Gaming Control Board, a partnership with the Horsemen and a new partnership with our Community College of Beaver County. We'll hear a little bit about that, and then equally our guests. Our guests are part of this. They have to be on the same team. We want to provide winning

experiences for every one of our shareholders, our stakeholders, and I think we're doing that. And we will absolutely continue to do that going forward.

my feet, so I hope I don't ---. I can talk well.

I'll talk right towards you. But just quickly, this is just a quick, if you will, a timeline of the things we've accomplished. And we're very excited about this. We're already in the middle of training. We just finished our job fairs. We had job fairs down at the Holiday Inn, but we continue --- continue those job fairs in the property for a number of weeks.

Absolutely astounding results. I'll tell you momentarily how many candidates we had, over 2,000.

We submitted our petition not too long ago. Here we are today with our Public Hearing portion of the process of the journey. We started Craps' training just this Monday. We started our managerial training a week before that, so we're well on our way. We've got tables at the Meadows, we've got a great training center we'll talk about, but we're very excited Craps has already begun. We're about to embark upon Blackjack, Roulette and Baccarat, employee licensing. I mean, there's so many things that have to come together, and the team at the

Meadows is doing a fantastic job working with the Control Board and others to get this done.

You can just look at this very quickly, but setting up the devices will come in June on the main casino. All of this assumes a July go live date, if you will. That still fluctuates. We're not a hundred percent sure, but we're shooting for being prepared the 1st of July, so that's our goal.

Just a quick summary of the table game offering that we're going to provide. We've got 62 total games, 42 of those --- not including poker right now --- 42 of those will be up on the main casino floor. I'll show you a quick drawing of that right off center stage, very exciting location. Downstairs to enhance racing, to put those pari-mutuel type betters together, those that bet on races, those that bet on poker are often the same individuals, so we think we'll be drawing tons of people, if you will, to our hub of racing activity downstairs next to our bowling alley, our deli, the racetrack itself and our poker room.

In our poker room, we'll have 20 tables that are live action tables and six tournament tables. So, we've got a fabulous --- and I encourage everybody to come by --- a fabulous poker room, one of the best

I've seen in this industry ever. This gives you a --kind of a 30,000 foot look at the table games'
location on the main floor. This would be our valet
entrance, our main porte-cochere entrance where many
of you have come and experienced the Meadows.

When you come in, you'll be coming in not too deep into the property and bingo, you're right in the middle of our table games' setting. The greenish olive color represents smoking, the blue, nonsmoking.

Just so you know, we try to be accommodating to each and every guest that comes in. We have a large nonsmoking area. These will be --- these will be nonsmoking tables. And then, of course, we have smoking for our guests as well.

Our poker room, as I mentioned --- and this white space is all backhouse, our employee dining room, our offices, all those things that make this facility run. But down here in the public area, if you come down the primary escalator, you'll see our bowling alley, you'll see the poker room here. You can see 27 tables, I think that is. We have a beautiful bar in our poker room. We have a little buffet area for food. I mean, this is a first class, first rate poker room. We've got a race book area, we've got a great deli, Delvins Deli. And then right

out here takes you to the grandstands to our racetrack. So, we think we've enhanced the entire racetrack experience and brought the property together in a complete entertainment package, so we're proud of this effort.

A couple of things about establishing and sustaining jobs. We mentioned that a little bit earlier. Right now we're looking at 515 table game specific jobs. All those positions could be found on this side of this chart here. In addition, 34 supporting jobs. Those are things like the cage cashier, security officers. The whole area has to step up. Not on here, but what is expected is slots may also have to increase. We know that table games just isn't about table games, it's about enhancing revenues for the race book, it's about enhancing revenues for the bowling alley, for our restaurants, all the things we do.

And, in fact, we won't touch on it, I
won't get too deep into it, but we've got some
fabulous outdoor concerts scheduled this summer with
Willie Nelson, and Bobby Vinton, a local celebrity.
And our first one, Peter Frampton. So, we're very
excited about that. Again, pulling the entire
property together to be one giant entertainment

experience.

This talks about the average wage. This is just a quick pixel of what we know with that 175 years of experience, we know that we can expect a gratuity associated, the tips that people earn like great guest services, great skill in delivering the games, dealing the games. We know that they're going to be in this range of \$15 per hour. We hired a lot of people from Mountaineer and Wheeling and they tell us that their dealers are making \$17 an hour. So, we've actually been somewhat conservative here on this \$15 an hour. You add that to the all important \$7.25 Federal minimum wage, this is important.

Something you will see on the property, you will see in tip-related positions, people might come in at \$5 and hour, \$4 an hour and they may say, well, this compensates for that. Mr. Paulos and his team would never have that, they start at a fair wage. They start at the right wage. When you add that, this makes this a \$22 position, if you will, about \$44,000. If they're good and they practice their guest services and they're entrepreneurial and they really are in their game, this can go up; they can make a little bit more. But this is a conservative estimate of what we think annually a person is going to make.

In addition to that, they get a free meal in our EDR every day. Now, some properties, some areas, are charging for their meals and Mr. Paulos wouldn't have that. It's a free meal, enjoy it, you're on our facility, you're working on our behalf we want you to feel good about your experience.

This is interesting. \$350 it will cost for every one of our employees to be licensed for table games. Some properties are going to charge that to the employee who's going through the training. Mr. Paulos and Mr. Wortman wouldn't have that. We're going to pay that on behalf of the employees in training. Comprehensive benefits and paid vacation. So, family-sustaining job. All the elements covered, all those things taken care of so a person can come to work, be carefree, if you will, have their mind on the game of guest services, have their mind on protecting the game, you know, all the things that are important in table games.

Here's a little bit of a touch on our training effort, our diversity. Just quickly, we did have ten job fairs. We have we call it auditions. Momentarily you're going to see a little video clip that shows what ---. People came in and told jokes.

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1 We had employees come in and play a guitar. had ---. It was just enjoyable to see. And people 3 would come up to me and say, man, I didn't hit the note right. And then we say, wait a minute, we appreciate you doing it, we're not looking at how well you play the guitar, to be honest with you, we're looking to see your smile, we're looking to see your eyes. Can you make eye contact? We're looking for people that can be great guest-service employees. 10 We're not looking for how great your joke is. Actually, some of them, I won't go into it. There was 11 one that I will just not forget in the group, and I 12 laugh when I say it, but --- and I will tell you about 13 14 it. 15 But a little bit interesting. guy told the story so well, we wanted to hire him. 16 17 Okay. 2,187 applicants, we have a lot of people to 18 choose. We have a lot of people that want to work at the Meadows not because of these job fairs, not 19 20 because of the auditions, but what the Meadows stands for. So, we're proud of this and we're happy that we 21 22 had such a good turnout. 23 Training at the Meadows, this is one of 24 the most important things. Early on we had no doubt

in our mind, working with the Community College at

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1 Beaver County provided us tremendous opportunity. Ιt brought that administrative support that we got. brought that education and that training opportunity 3 to us. You know, we're table games' operators, we're operators of casinos, we're not necessarily teachers. So, bringing the Community College and really developing what we're extremely proud of, these great manuals on Craps, on Roulette, on Blackjack, these are what our students will learn from. When they hit the 10 floor with live games, they'll be ready. And Beaver County Community College or County College of Beaver 11 County is tremendously valuable in that effort. 12 13 Just quickly I'll let you look at this, 14

but we're ready to go. We already started and it's exciting stuff. A couple of clips.

MS. BELL:

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Move over American Idol, Western Pennsylvania Casinos are looking for some talented new dealers. Today at the Meadows in Washington County, applicants had to audition for the part. The untraditional job fair gave those in line just a few seconds to show off their talent.

MR. SULLIVAN:

24 The next one is a little bit of a news 25 story that we think summarizes the whole experience.

MS. BELL:

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Washington County announced tonight, in table games coming to Pennsylvania's casinos, hundreds of new jobs are opening. The Meadows in Washington County has completed its final job fair and more than 500 people are in line for a grand new career. Channel Four Action News reporter, Ari Hait, how do you think it looks, how those people will be trained?

MR. HAIT:

Full disclosure here. This is not my first time near a table game. What I can tell you, it's a lot easier playing these games than dealing them. Let's start with Blackjack instructor, Mike 14 Pool.

MR. POOL:

The first thing I'm going to do, naturally, is teach them to shuffle. It looks easy, but unfortunately it's not.

MR. HAIT:

Pool says it's important to shuffle the cards just at the corner. That keeps the cards in and keeps them from being bent. It takes weeks to learn how to shuffle cards properly. I am far from 24 proficient. Next up, exchanging money for chips and doing it as fast as possible.

MR. POOL:

Now, if I had a hundred, I could do it that quick.

MR. HAIT:

That is not as easy as it looks. He does show me how to load the cards into what's called the shoe, prepping for the first deal, and then it's time to play. This, believe it or not, is the easy part. The secret is just to make sure the cameras above can see everything.

Next up on our training list, poker.

Peter Lau is the trainer here and he also goes over shuffling and exchanging money for chips. But for him, dealing properly is vital; sitting straight and relaxed.

MR. LAU:

I'm not bending, I'm not stretching and I
don't feel tired after eight hours.

MR. HAIT:

Next up, Craps. By far this is the most complicated game in the house, that's why the training takes a month and a half.

MS. RANCHER:

Because the pass (phonetic), to my 25 knowledge, back here, are different than your

placement payouts, are different and everything up there is different.

MR. HAIT:

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Dealers will learn the odds for every bet on the table and how to pay them quickly. They'll learn bets on the table are placed based on where the player is standing. But above all, the one lesson all dealers here will learn, customer service.

MR. POOL:

It takes the dealer, you know, to be the ambassador of the game, to explain the game. We don't want anybody to feel intimidated, but --- you know, they can't play the game.

MR. HAIT:

Because Craps is so much harder to learn, they actually start teaching this game on Monday. The rest of the games in the casino, they will start the training for them a couple weeks after, in April. At the Meadows, Ari Hait, Channel Four Action News.

MR. SULLIVAN:

And that was actually a great clip because, you know, if you listen closely, it addresses guest services. And it addressed --- Peter talked about, we want our dealers to be comfortable. We don't want --- you know, being on their feet a long

time during the day gets difficult. So, they talked
about the eye in the sky or the camera. So, it's
really a complete picture of things that have to come
together to provide a great table games' offering, and
we think we're on our way.

Some quick things about --- here on diversity. And it's important for everyone to understand our corporation, our company is committed to diversity. We're absolutely going to continue the path that we've been on, and that is providing a diverse work environment.

A couple of things to chat about --- the Meadows workforce, just quickly, is 51 percent female, Washington County 52 percent, so we're right in that range. It talks about management, it talks about here minority, 5.6, Washington County 4.8. So, we're comfortable with this. We absolutely will continue this commitment.

We will see a little bit of a male shift here. Dealers in some of these games are going to be male, but we'll hopefully be, at the end of the day, in this race. So, we're happy with this and we're going to continue this diverse program at the Meadows.

The table games economic impact, this

talks just specifically about tables. We're expecting 1 2 \$37,000,000 in our first full year of table games' 3 operation. What that means is 5.2 million in tax dollars that goes to the Commonwealth. We'll also put up upfront monies, if you will, licensing fees, of 16.5 million. So, these are big dollars that come as a result of this new product offering, in addition to stimulating horse revenues, slot revenues and things that continue to give to the Commonwealth and our partners as well. Local authorities \$740,000, two 10 percent. \$30,000 to North Strabane, 549 jobs as we've 11 talked about, and a lot of money being spent on the 12 capital expenditure related to this, from uniforms to 13 14 all these things that we have to buy locally to make 15 sure --- many cases locally, some out of state. important things in dollars is being spent there. 16 17 Compulsive gaming, another commitment by 18

our organization committed to compulsive gaming, problem gaming. And this plan, if you will, is also making sure that we keep an eye out for minors. We're doing a good job at this, we're never going to lose our ball --- lose our eye on the ball. We're going to be focused on this, continue to try to do the very best job. Corporate is committed to it, the property's committed to it and it's worthwhile. It's

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extremely important.

Quickly before I end, and before we say concluding remarks, I just wanted to introduce a few of those 175 years of experience. And some of them just joined me, so forgive me for this. And if you could stand up and just kind of say hi. Lance Young is our Table Games Director, who just came in from Vegas. He's been with the organization for, shoot, seven --- how many years?

MR. YOUNG:

Ten years.

MR. SULLIVAN:

Ten years. So, knows this stuff upside down. He could have gave this much quicker than me and much better than me. Stacey Rancher over here, a Shift Manager. You saw her, she's famous, autographs after, I guess. Russ Traveke (phonetic) just came in from California, been in the industry a long time. Russ Koline (phonetic). And then Peter Lau, the celebrity of the day there in poker. But a great team. And there's other parts of our business team here. I won't go through it but we --- we're feeling good at the Meadows. It's a great exciting time. And thank you for listening.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

I'll now turn it over to Chairman Fajt 1 2 for questions for WTA. 3 CHAIRMAN: Thank you, Linda. Sean, just to follow 4 up on a couple of points that you made. On the 549 additional jobs, how many of those will --- are current employees or are they all new employees? 8 MR. SULLIVAN: 9 We have about 160 --- I'm sorry, 66, I 10 believe, that actually put in transfers. They're from security, different departments. So, 66 right now are 11 going through the training. We're going to do 12 13 everything possible to make sure they're successful. 14 We love to take care of our employees, love to make 15 sure that they get these opportunities, so 66. 16 CHAIRMAN:

17 Okay.

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MR. PAULOS:

But the jobs are still new jobs because we'll have to replace those 66.

CHAIRMAN:

Got it. That was my next question.

MR. PAULOS:

Yeah.

25 CHAIRMAN:

Thank you. Let me turn over to the 1 2 horseracing side. And for those members in the public 3 and also you. You've heard me say this before. don't mean to be a one trick pony. That pun was intended. But horseracing is what brought slots and table games and the casinos to Pennsylvania. anybody goes back to look at the original Act, it's the Racehorse Development Act and Gaming in Pennsylvania. Horseracing is very important and as 10 we, you know, move into first slots and now table games and make these full casinos in Pennsylvania, 11 12 it's very easy to lose sight of the racing side. 13 know it's not as sexy, we all get that, but it's very 14 important. And there are members of this Board who 15 are adamant about this, and I am one of them.

And so with that, could you tell us a little bit about what you've done for racing, whether, you know, attendance is up. As you know, there will be an annual report as required by the Legislature now to be filed by each of the Category 1 Racinos in Pennsylvania talking specifically about horseracing. But can you tell us a little bit, Sean or Bill, about what you've done to the backside, and what the impact has been on horseracing? Because, again, I can't overemphasize enough how important racing is to

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Pennsylvania. It has many, many sideline benefits, preservation of green space, you know, getting more benefits to the racing employees and so forth. So, if you could talk a little bit about the racing side.

MR. PAULOS:

My pleasure. And let me talk about that relationship from an enhancement of marketing perspective. Mike Jeannot up here may want to talk a little bit about the backside improvements and maybe attendance. But just quickly, we're committed to racing, there's no doubt about it. I was just telling Bill just standing here momentarily that we sent out a mailer to 130,000 of our guests. And racing has a dominance in that mailer. I mean, there's no question about it, they're in there, they're strong. And we know it's an attracting tool, if you will. It's one of our components to get people to come on the property.

I run into people all the time that have been working at the track 35 years, you know, and they're working for us still. You know, people that come to the Meadows to enjoy that ---. But I think that if you look at the very beginning, the Meadows Racetrack & Casino, you know, we're the only one in the state that put racetrack right up front and

center. We're proud of that; we don't hide it. If you look at the entrance, the first thing you see is the horse, you know. It's front and center. If you look at the way they designed and built the property, the grandstands ---. I mean, we were joking --- you walk out, you're on the track almost. I mean, you're almost --- be careful not to get hit by a horse, we're that close to the casino and the racetrack. So, we're proud of that.

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But from mailings to five time point promotions that we market around when you wager on a racetrack, you can earn five times points, we treat it just like we do our slot machines and our other venues. Delvins Deli down there ---. I mean, the owners have invested in that area, and there's not a shadow of a doubt, if you come by and you look at our property from the bowling alley to the Devlins and now the poker room, the racetrack is not a stepsister here and it's not a stepchild. It's right up front and center with us. And we're going to do everything we can to continue to market that relationship and use it.

I've talked to many of our management team. I can't tell you how important it is for these folks that have been raised in Western Pennsylvania

1 who have been brought up from being a little child to a teenager at the racetrack, what that means to us. 3 That creates good will, that creates a positive relationship, and we want to keep that going. So, we're proud about it and that's just a little bit of the marketing. As for backside, we've done a good job there.

CHAIRMAN:

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As far as ---. One second. As far as the ownership is concerned.

MR. PAULOS:

We now not only own but we operate the racetrack. That wasn't the case three years ago. So, we have a very vested interest in making sure it's a go. Also, we consider it very important because we have the president of our racing program sitting at the dais with us. So, it is very important to us. Mike.

MR. JEANNOT:

Thank you, Bill. And Mr. Chairman, to your point, last year ---. We're just about to hit one year of being located in the new facility. our live racing handle in that year has gone up 36 24 percent over the prior year. So, certainly these ---25 this is the beginning of success. The other thing

that's happened is our signal sales have gone up almost ten percent in the last --- compared to last year. And these fly in the face of, you know, declines in the industry that they're sometimes double digits. So, we're pretty --- we're happy about that.

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The racing at the Meadows --- the quality of racing has gone up astronomically. The Horsemen have done a great job of enticing extra --- better owners and trainers and drivers to the facilities. So, that's a big, big deal. That's gone up. Sean did a good job of describing how we're marketing the business. One of the things that we have now is we have the talent of the casino people. We've got graphic designers and people who do nothing but work on the mailings. So, we've got a lot more talent to focus on, on promoting the horseracing.

Clearly Senate Bill 711 refocuses the casino business --- or the racetracks and casinos on racing. And I fully understand that and we're committed to, you know, stick with that and grow the business. On the backside, improvements, the most visible sign of improvements so far is the \$3,000,000 paddock that opened up a couple of years ago. 24 paddock was relocated from the grandstand side, when the grandstand was demolished to make room for the new facility, that was relocated at the Horseman's request back to the ---.

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I was saying, the most visible sign of our backstretch improvements --- or backside improvements so far in this \$3,000,000 paddock, we opened up a ten-race --- ten-race building located on the backside, which was the Horseman's preference. are coming close to completing our plan with the Horsemen to build six new barns that will house 360 horses, to tear down 11 barns that were built in the '60s and '70s, and to upgrade the remaining -- every remaining stall on the property, which will bring us to -- somewhere between 825 to 850 stalls on the backside, all renovated, all first class. I think that puts us certainly at the top end of numbers of stalls on a racetrack, so that's a good thing.

And also the Horsemen are helping us. Our \$6.125 million is going into the project, of course, the Act 711 money, but the Horsemen are going to contribute some extra money through stall rent to make the --- to make sure we have --- or to enhance the project so we can cover all of the property.

CHAIRMAN:

Mike, when do you anticipate that those 25 six new stalls will be finished?

MR. JEANNOT:

The six new barns?

CHAIRMAN:

The six new barns.

MR. JEANNOT:

We plan to start the construction in June, and we plan to --- right now to have the construction completed by the end of 2011.

CHAIRMAN:

Okay.

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MR. SULLIVAN:

Chairman, if I could add just quickly.

The idea of these outdoor concerts is also that --you know, to work those out, you know, the details to
have the Horsemen train on the jogging track while
we're setting up the concert, we have to have a good
relationship. So, operationally it's going to be
important to us, too. But bringing 2,500 people to a
concert is going --- and putting it on the racetrack
is going to be another marketing effort where people
will say, wow, I mean, I didn't know this track
existed possibly. Wow, this is an exciting
environment. So, bringing those concerts --- three of
them, bringing, you know --- and maybe a fourth near
10,000 people and putting them on the track is a great

experience as well. I just wanted to add that. Sorry, Mike.

CHAIRMAN:

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A couple other questions. Sean, back to you on the table games impact, you mentioned earlier, And we heard anecdotally that the industry anticipates this. But can you give us a flavor --- and Bill, you can weigh in here, too, with your experience. How is it or why is it that table games could or will increase the number of slots players?

MR. PAULOS:

12 You know, over the years as we've layered 13 in tables to slot venues, what happens is, for 14 instance, some of our slot players would go to West 15 Virginia, okay, and bring with their husbands or spouses or boyfriends or girlfriends, okay, who play 16 17 table games. And they go down there and they're playing slots. We're going to get those people back. 18 They're going to make an extra trip. People that 19 20 wouldn't normally come, okay, to the Meadows, strictly 21 because they're table game players, they don't ---22 they're not going to come. They're going to come, 23 they're going to play table games and they also will wind up playing some slots at the same --- at the same 24 25 time. So, we'll get more customers, we'll get new

customers and we'll attract other customers.

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Also, we can, and we're able to now, take the Meadows as a destination. Okay? In the two and a half years that we've opened the Meadows, I believe something like a thousand hotel rooms have been built, okay, in the area. We can now bring --- we can now bring customers from Las Vegas, okay, to Western Pennsylvania, okay, as a bonus trip, and enjoy the --and enjoy the great Meadows that we have. We'll be bringing people out as rewards, our better customers, for instance, for the Willie Nelson concert and we'll bring 50 people out and they'll play. We'll be able to do much more of that. We'll be able to go up to Chicago, where some of our --- where some of our hosts are from, okay, and bring groups from Chicago. we'll be able to market much better the overall property, that way bringing more players that will play not only table games, spouses, girlfriends, boyfriends will play slots, ergo, everything lifts up.

CHAIRMAN:

Next line of questioning is on diversity.

Again, this is an issue that, as you know, is very important to the Board. It was important to the Legislature and there's some specific comments in the Legislation regarding diversity. I saw in your

presentation, Sean --- I saw the diversity numbers on

--- as to minority and also as to women. Can you talk

a little bit about your table games' hires and how

that fits into those numbers? I did hear you say that

there was a larger than normal number of male hires in

the table games' area but there will also, obviously,

be some behind-the-scenes employment in the table

games area. How are your numbers going to change once

you load in the table games hires?

MR. SULLIVAN:

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You know, I don't think they changed 11 12 dramatically. I mean, we're committed to our 13 diversification program. Stacey and Peter and ---. 14 You know, I mean, we will hire those folks readily 15 available. Now, it's preliminary --- and it's hard to tell, we just started our training school. At the end 16 17 of the day we'll end up with 515 table game positions. As I mentioned, there might be a slight skewing. 18 We're looking on our candidates right now and we may -19 20 -- we see a little bit more of a male audience, 21 especially in Craps, for example. But we're doing 22 everything we can --- and it's a conscience effort. 23 You can't just deal the cards and pick them up and see what you have. You have to take a look here. 24 25 it comes to a situation where, you know, there's

someone with a diverse background, if you will, and they're just as good as the person next to them, we're going to have to be considerate of that. We're going to do the right thing for diversification. We believe that we'll be very close to our current property statistics.

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And the one I didn't touch on, I think it was up there, was residency. We're already at 76 percent of our candidates living in the PA area, so we know that there's a three-year timeline for the residents to --- I think it's 85 percent to be in the area. We're on our way to that as well. But I think it's a consciousness. I think it's that crew right there taking a look at every candidate and understanding there's a lot of variables that play here when you make a hiring decision. And we will absolutely consciously try to hire those folks that will help maintain our diversification commitment.

CHAIRMAN:

One last question. Could you provide to the Gaming Board in the near future the amount of money that you are spending? And I saw a slide --- but, again, I think it's important for the public to understand that, you know, the casinos in Pennsylvania are spending money in the community not only for

charitable donations and things of that nature, 1 sponsorships, but also for, you know, baked goods and 3 dry cleaning and plumbing services, and snow removal and on and on and on. I thought I saw a number in there, but if you could give us what you've spent annually on average both in the contiguous Washington County area and then also for Pennsylvania, if you could give that to us over the last three years. we're looking for an annual number on average in this 10 geographic area and then Pennsylvania ---11 MR. SULLIVAN: 12 Sure.

CHAIRMAN:

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--- statewide.

MR. PAULOS:

When we built the permanent casino, over 90 percent of the money spent, which was \$180,000,000, was in the local area.

CHAIRMAN:

Uh-huh (yes).

MR. PAULOS:

So, they're big numbers.

CHAIRMAN:

Thank you.

MR. SULLIVAN:

Thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER:

And if you could file those responses with the Office of Hearings and Appeals (OHA), we'll include it in your record and make sure all Board members receive a copy of that.

MR. SULLIVAN:

Okay.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Do you have any ---? Does WTA have any follow-up testimony or evidence in relationship to the Chairman's questions?

MR. PAULOS:

No, I think we're good.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Okay. Then we will move on to the public comment portion of this hearing. As I call your name, if you would please come forward to the podium with the microphone to make your remarks. I remind you, if you could state your name, municipality. Spell your 21 name as well for the court reporter. If you're speaking on behalf of an entity, that name --- give that as well. Our first speaker today is Senator J. Barry Stout.

SENATOR J. BARRY STOUT, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

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SENATOR STOUT:

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Thank you. I'm State Senator J. Barry Stout, S-T-O-U-T. I don't have a nametag on this morning, but after 40 years, I think they know who I am. First, I want to welcome the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board and the Meadows to Washington County to this Public Hearing to discuss your application to be licensed to provide table games.

As my former colleague, Chairman Fajt, mentioned about the history of the Meadows, he's previously served in the General Assembly, and I worked with him, because he was in neighboring Allegheny County, on things important to Southwestern Pennsylvania. But as he talks about the history, when I first got started with the Meadows was in 1963. A few years after I got out of high school, there was a referendum question about the licensing of harness 21 racing tracks in the Commonwealth. Neighboring counties of Allegheny, Westmoreland and Fayette turned it down. It was really coming to the last chance, and Delvin Miller, who had been the advocate of bringing harness racing to the Commonwealth, that got a

referendum question on the Washington County ballot in 1963.

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A friend of mine from the local government in the Bentworth School District of Eastern Mon Valley portion of Washington County came to me and asked me to help get this referendum approved. the first political campaign I ever got involved, so I got together about six or eight of my high school colleagues and we marked ballots to vote for the referendum in the basement of an office building. They were paper ballots at that time, not high-tech voting machines we have today, to mark these paper ballots and we worked the polls. And my friend at that time is no longer with me, Charlie Faye (phonetic). And Charlie Faye gave me \$50 to work the polls and I split it up with my ten high school mates and we'd go upstairs to the seventh floor of this building to the Election Bureau. The Election Bureau up there, they have the records. So, you go back to 1963 and you'll see that the referendum passed by about a thousand votes and the majority of those votes came out of the Bentworth School District area, to bring harness racing to Pennsylvania, to Washington County.

And it's really had an impact over this

last nearly 50 years that the Meadows has had a 1 positive impact here in Washington County. And now some people said that harness racing was bad and so 3 forth, and gaming, but harness racing has helped Washington County. While we may be close to an urban county like Allegheny and Pittsburgh, we're still a lot of rural activity here in Washington County. And the agriculture community has benefited from having the harness racing track operate here and supplying 10 goods and services to the harness racing industry.

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I have lived my entire life here in Washington County. I did provide copies of my testimony to the Gaming Control Board and to the public. They're on the table here. So, I think I know Washington County residents pretty well, and I think I know a lot about Southwestern Pennsylvania because the 46th District, which I represent parts of --- most of Washington County, all of Greene County, portions of Westmoreland, Beaver and Allegheny County. So, I've been representing Southwestern Pennsylvania for four decades.

The constituents that I serve here, they They need jobs, family jobs with a 23 have needs. future. But most of all, they need hope. We all need new jobs and revenue to grow local businesses and to

serve the industry. We also need help to reduce tax 1 2 burdens. People need to be assured that state investments and their tax dollars are being put to 3 good use. You know, we had a very difficult budget year this current budget year that ran on from July of last summer and finally didn't get it resolved until we got the Table Game Legislation resolved in January of this year. That's just about two months --- two and a half months ago since that's been resolved. 10 But it's a thing that caused a lot of discussions and so forth that finally got implemented. And bringing 11 12 table games to the Commonwealth is very important in helping to resolve our 320-some million dollar 13 shortfall in the budget. So, the revenue from the 14 15 licensing fees and from projected tax revenue from table games has a big part in resolving our '09, '10 16 17 and '11 budget years.

Everybody needs to feel comfortable that
State Government is protecting them and regulating the
activities without stomping on their ability to
provide for their families. The Meadows' expansion
will help meet the needs of those I represent. The
expansion will create good jobs, hundreds of them,
here and create a future for working men and women in
Washington County.

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And we just saw a very excellent presentation by the Meadows' management group, and I welcome you here from out of state, from the West Coast, from California and Las Vegas here to Southwestern Pennsylvania. You're lucky about --- you missed about two-foot of snow here about a month ---. You're lucky you're here now in the latter part of March instead of the middle of February.

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And Mr. Sullivan identified as many as 550 jobs will be created with the licensure of table games here at the Meadows Racetrack. And 80 percent of those jobs are residents here in Washington County. And I have had the privilege of working with Mr. Sullivan as they started to reach out how to identify potential applicants for the --- these jobs and the training programs and so forth. And members of my staff, Charles Crouse, Sharon Russell and Joyce Popovich, we met numerous times and worked together in developing, with the county officials, a plan and their Job Training Committees to benefit Washington County and people here in Southwestern Pennsylvania. Local industries provide goods and services to the Meadows, and that's very important because what they do, they create job opportunities.

And I'm not going to read my whole

remarks here, but they're on the record and they are 2 submitted in my documentation. But that's a very 3 important thing to create here. There's not only the 550 jobs here in Washington County at the Meadows, but here in Western Pennsylvania we're projecting over 3,100 jobs here in Western Pennsylvania, and statewide a projection of nearly 16,000 jobs because the ratio from slot machines to go to table games would be about So, in order to put on table games you have 10 to have a larger employment force to provide table games to the public, so those jobs --- it's going to 11 12 increase our revenue to Pennsylvania in tax revenues 13 and in --- as money --- those taxes that go to help 14 offset property tax relief, school tax relief, to 15 citizens in Pennsylvania. And the projected increase in revenue from table games will help provide that 16 revenue, which is needed. 17

And then on the slot machines, as Mr.

Sullivan indicated, there would be about a three and a half percent increase in revenue from the slot machines because table games bring in a larger crowd of people wanting to have an opportunity for both slot machines and for table games, so ---.

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The statistics don't really --- they gave you some data about different things, advantages of

different things that doesn't really tell the story 1 2 exactly what it means to people, because I have a lot 3 of constituents that are looking for jobs. know, certain portions of Western Pennsylvania have been impacted economically over the last 25 or 30 years because of a decline in employment in the manufacturing area in manufacturing jobs and steel industry jobs here, but we have rebounded some because of tourism, and by entertainment. So, that has 10 created job opportunities here that are very important. And I have good faith that the Meadows, 11 their presentation, that they will live with that ---. 12

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I first met that gentleman, Mr. Paulos, about three and a half years ago, when he came to Harrisburg, when he put their application in for the first slot machine thing, I liked Bill because Bill was very straightforward. He didn't give me any BS. He told you what they were going to be doing and what he said they'd do, they did. And that's what I appreciate about the commitment you have kept to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. You created job opportunities and investing here, in my district, in the 46th District, so I appreciate that.

And I worked with Mike Jeannot. Prior to you coming on the scene, I worked with Mike when he

put the racetrack here. So, we've had a good relationship in trying to promote harness racing here in Washington County, as I said earlier, because of the revenue they provided for the agriculture industry, for the farmers who supply the services to the harness racing industry.

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And I've gotten to know Sean Sullivan since we now have instituted the table games. And as I said earlier, he worked with my office to help 10 identify a way to identify potential applicants and to develop a training program that was fair and 11 affordable to people here. And I'm glad that the 12 13 Meadows is going forth in providing the --- this 14 training to their employees and helping with the 15 licensing fees and benefit package. I think it's a good family-sustaining job income and a good potential 16 17 for jobs in the out years.

And besides jobs at the Meadows associated with table games, they provided a lot of jobs to other businesses for people who do work there in construction of the new facility and investing in goods and services, it creates jobs. And Washington County, because of the Meadows, the harness track, the slot machine casino and now the table games, Washington County has become a destination point here

in Southwestern Pennsylvania. And I really appreciate that because --- the casino, Meadows' casino being there on the racetrack, they didn't just put money and 3 bricks and mortar in the building itself, they helped pay for the rebuilding of the racetrack road interchange. And as Transportation Chairman, I was very supportive of the improvements they made. are nearly \$20,000,000 that the Meadows and Tanger Outlet shared to develop and upgrade the 79 10 interchange to provide a safe avenue access to the Meadows. So, that's the commitment above and beyond 11 12 what you said in your presentation, nearly \$20,000,000 13 invested in the roads of the Commonwealth. So, that's 14 very important.

And another thing is local revenue.

Under the Gaming Act, Washington County gets a certain amount of local share money. And I had the privilege of serving this past year on the local share round table Board, which is made up of various officials from government and from the business community in Washington County, and various Chambers of Commerce and so forth, and industrial development groups.

We distributed nearly 12 and a half million dollars to Washington County and issued a legislative delegation, my colleague and friend, Tim Solobay, and myself, a

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part of the Washington County Legislative Delegation. There's six House members and three Senators that 2 3 represent a portion of Washington County, so collectively the Washington County Legislative Delegation made changes in the distribution of local share money. And for the first time every municipality ---. Washington County has 65 municipalities, and every one of them will receive money out of the local share this year of \$25,000 per 10 municipality, plus \$10 per capita. That's going to come to about \$3.5 million that will be here in 11 12 Washington County to be used by the townships, the 13 boroughs and the cities. Something of public 14 interest. I don't care if they need it to buy a new 15 dump truck, snowplow to take care of the snow. they need to put a new roof on the township building, 16 it's a revenue source, and this has come because of 17 18 the Meadows Casino. That money is very important to the districts that we represent. 19 20 Then other money, about \$9,000,000 is 21 going to projects, applicants, for different things, 22 for an education and training program to help municipalities get infrastructure or to help in 23 24 economic development for jobs and so froth for 25 Washington County. So, the Meadows Casino had a very

important economic impact on --- in Washington County 1 and will continue for years to do that. And this 3 municipal distribution helps every person, whether you live in Avella, Northern Washington County or Sellersville in the south, from A to Z. Washington County benefits from West Brownsville to West Alexander, from east to west, north to south, it benefits Washington County. But these are very important contributions that the Meadows has made. And the licensing of table games will provide 10 additional revenue for the local share, Washington 11 County local share, and for the local municipal 12 1.3 distribution and for the host community of North 14 Strabane Township to receive additional funds for 15 public purposes.

I know statewide the other areas have had an impact. I'm familiar with Luzerne County because one of my colleagues, a neighboring Senator in Harrisburg, represents Luzerne, and he's told me how much of an impact the Mohegan Sun has had on that area. So, I feel what they've done in Northeastern Pennsylvania, the Meadows will do here in Southwestern Pennsylvania to promote gaming. As I said earlier, Washington County has become a destination point. One of the reasons I said working with Bill Paulos and the

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Meadows Team, and so forth, they have always 1 communicated with local elected officials, with the 2 3 county officials, our County Commissioners. communicated with local township officials, municipal officials and with state officials, such as Representative Solobay and myself and other members of the Washington County Legislative Delegation. that's why you've been successful. You haven't tried to do things behind closed doors, you've been out very 10 upfront with the public, so I highly recommend to the Gaming Control Board that they act on the license 11 application of the Meadows, so ---. And I know the 12 13 training program is set up with the anticipation that 14 table games can start being rolled out at the Meadows 15 here this coming July. And I'm looking forward to the job creation and to the economic impact and the tax 16 17 revenues that will be made.

So, I would ask the Gaming Control Board now to process and review the Meadows' application as expeditiously as possible and to move forward and grant the Meadows a license to operate table games here at the Meadows Casino because I think it enhances the quality of life here in Southwestern Pennsylvania, creates job opportunities for my constituents. It produces revenue for tax relief for the Commonwealth.

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1 It produces services to local communities and host communities and to municipalities that are very 3 important today with this budget climate. about the snow, I wasn't joking. Many of my municipalities have lost --- they've overshot their budget with snow removal and they have limited resources so they're looking at this municipal-share money to help them get out of a very difficult winter budget situation. And I know when the Legislature 10 first considered gaming --- bringing slot machines in 2004, there was support from many members here from 11 Southwestern Pennsylvania that made this possible. 12 13 And we look forward ---. And with the approval 14 earlier this year with the table games, it's the 15 anticipation that I know I will not be disappointed that the Meadows will do a quality job. And I urge 16 17 the Gaming Control Board to grant the license to the Meadows. I thank you, Mr. Chairman. 18

CHAIRMAN:

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Thank you, Senator.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Thank you, Senator Stout. And your written comments will be entered into our record as Hearing Exhibit Number Three.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Our next speaker is Representative Tim

Solobay. 6

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REPRESENTATIVE TIMOTHY SOLOBAY, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY

SWORN, TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

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REPRESENTATIVE SOLOBAY:

12 Good morning. Representative Tim 13 | Solobay, S-O-L-O-B-A-Y. I represent the 48th 14 Legislative District where the Meadows Racetrack & 15 Casino is located. Mr. Chairman, welcome to 16 | Washington County. And I'm not quite sure after the 17 great presentation was given by the folks from the 18 | Meadows, as well as my colleague and mentor, Senator Stout presented, I'm not sure what's left to say as 19 20 far as the positive aspects of the experience we've 21 | had here in Washington County with the advent of the 22 Gaming Law being passed and the folks from the Meadows 23 being part of our community now.

I thought that a nice thing might be is 25 to bring a --- bring two pictures in here to show

everyone, one from about 25 years ago in that

corridor, a racetrack, road and a picture of that

corridor now, and the way things have changed over the

past 25 years. And I think everyone in the room would

say as --- to a great benefit.

One other comment I think I need to add is, and it's kind of been referenced before, is promises made have been promises kept. And it probably goes from the first day back when I first met Mike Jeannot 12 years or so back and we started talking this whole thing about gaming way back then to the days and nights that I know Mike spent in Harrisburg during the initial Gaming Bill that was presented, the impacts and the importance that they thought would --- this Gaming Law would make not only in our community here in Washington County, I know that's the preface of today's meeting, but what it would do for the Commonwealth. And the impacts and the commitments that they made all along. Again, go back to that phrase, promises made, promises kept.

You referenced in your questions about the importance about what this has all meant to agriculture. I've served for the past 12 years as a member of the Agriculture Committee in the House and I've seen firsthand the impacts and the concerns made

from four or five years ago before we were able to get the bill passed is basically how our track here in Washington County, the tracks all over the state were 3 basically hanging on by a thread being able to keep a ---. I mean, it had a very serious thought that racing would be completely leaving Pennsylvania because of the opportunities to compete just weren't in place because the revenues weren't there. bill, the impact that it has done, statewide as well 10 as locally, has done that promise that it made in the original legislation. You saw figures and you saw 11 12 facts of the impacts, the amount of purses, the amount 13 of revenue generated for the owners, for the individual folks that work at the track. That has all 14 15 been a very positive impact. Adventing and adding the table games is just going to increase that opportunity 16 and bring possibly a whole newer crowd to the --- back 17 to the track with the table games in place. 18

I know from a conversation with other agricultural venues across the country, we have owners and trainers and breeders, the whole works, migrating back to Pennsylvania, or even re-establishing themselves in Pennsylvania, from big states like Kentucky and Florida, where racing was --- is very, very prevalent. I don't know if we've got anything as

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far as California on the racing aspect, but those states, all major agricultural states dealing with horseracing, they're all coming to Pennsylvania.

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The opportunity for farmland and stall space, and barn space, as well as those indirect impacts of hay producers, people that work in the fertilizers and the feed mills, the different things associated --- the associated vocations that tie into the --- into the agricultural aspect of horseracing, they are claiming opportunities now that they have never had before. So, just fortify your concern and as well as my concern, because I think, again, we knew there were a lot of different reasons why we wanted to make gaming available in Pennsylvania, but on that agricultural component it has been doing what it has said it would do and the Meadows has ---. Again, to echo what Bill said, they were the only facility in Pennsylvania that put racing first and the gaming second whenever they had their name, when they had their promotions, whenever they'd talk about their facility, it's the Meadows Racetrack & Casino. So, that, again, goes back to my comment, promises made, promises kept.

The indirect impact that Senator Stout 25 mentioned, some of those things, with our businesses

and facilities in Washington County, the wave that 1 2 goes from the center hub of the casino out to the outlining communities, the outlining businesses goes 3 far reaching. I know I had a lot of folks when we first were working on the Legislation said to me, I'm scared that that place is going to put me out of business. I think we can safely say, going back to those same facilities, they say that place has made my business more than what's it's been, you know, in the past. So, again, the impact, the neighborly effects, 10 the program that they establish with local businesses 11 allowing for the usage of gaming coupons and things to 12 be played out in other facilities within the county 13 14 has just shown their willingness and their wantingness 15 to make this be a big happy family-type collection and not wanting to isolate themselves and forgetting about 16 17 the rest of the area.

The job opportunities have been talked about, you know, they're going to probably be number one --- number two in the county as far as jobs being produced. And not just basic summertime part-time jobs, these are good jobs that people are going to be able to raise families and stay in our area. They're going to be able to buy homes. They're going to be able to spend money in our stores. So, the economic

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impact has shown itself very, very good. Again, the adding of the table games, which is going to bring more --- additional folks in is just going to, I think, also add to that.

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Then a whole other aspect that really hasn't been touched on, but the impact with Beaver County Community College. It brings another educational facility within the county to be able to give other options and other opportunities for our residents of the county to have as far as educational opportunities. We've got a lot of great institutions here already within the county, but the commitment of Beaver County Community College to come within Washington County and establish themselves and to do that as an in-county type facility since Washington County doesn't have its own community college, we have relationships with Allegheny Community College, now Beaver Community College, obviously, WJ, Waynesburg, California, those type places. But this gives another choice, another opportunity. And, again, I think that just shows, again, broadens the opportunities that this whole gaming experience has done for our county.

As I wind down my comments, again, as the Senator said, being able to work in conjunction with the facility itself, with the County Commissioners,

the local government and the impacts on how this is done, I can't elaborate as much as Barry did on the fact of what we were able to do as far as helping all 3 the other communities, again, with economic impact by the revenues generated for the local share has been very sustaining. A lot of communities that were having a low tax base, being able to do anything, this, again, has also helped them. Again, adding additional revenue because of the table games is going to help even enhance that even more. 10

So, I would echo the comments of Senator 12 Stout and ask the Gaming Board to highly and strongly consider the Application for Table Games at the Meadows and help us to continue what's been --- what's going on already in the past four years to make an even better opportunity for the residents here in Washington County and a better opportunity for Southwestern PA. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

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20 Thank you. Our next speaker, J. Gregory 21 Sulc. And I hope I didn't mispronounce your name. 22 J. GREGORY SULC, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, 23 TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS: 24 25

MR. SULC:

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You did, but that's all right.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

I always get one.

MR. SULC:

I've been called a lot of things. morning. I am Greg Sulc. It's S-U-L-C. Chairman of the Board of North Strabane Supervisors, the host township of Meadows Racetrack & Casino. Ιt is an honor and privilege to stand before you to testify what a true neighbor Mr. Bill Paulos and his entire management team has been to North Strabane Township and its residents.

I can remember attending an Easter egg hunt as a child with my grandparents at the Meadows in the mid 1970s. My grandfather always told me that the Meadows employed some great people. The standard has not changed. In actuality, the standard has been raised. When North Strabane Township had the privilege to meet Mr. Paulos for the first time, I 21 knew he was old school. It was not because of his age, but because when he shook your hand he looked into your eye and you knew his word was gold. commitment to not only the township but to the residents of the surrounding communities has been more

than we've ever expected.

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North Strabane Township will soon put up to bid a new public safety building directly across from the Meadows on land donated by the Meadows' Mr. Paulos. This public safety building will feature a substation for both our police and fire departments. The increase in business has also solidified the relationship between the Meadows Racetrack & Casino and North Strabane Township.

From the outset, North Strabane Township has emphasized the importance of public safety with the increase of traffic to special events held at Meadows Racetrack & Casino. The communication between the township and Meadows is very impressive. Both our police and fire chiefs are given detailed description of events planned for the upcoming month. The reports outline a detailed timeline by events and possible peak times. This detailed information is used to plan accordingly and maintain the safety of our residents.

During a recent visit to the Meadows

Racetrack & Casino, I was told by several employees,

which were also township residents, how they are

thankful of the entire management staff at the Meadows

and what a great economic impact it has had on their

lives. I personally know these employees, and they

were either downsized or lost their jobs prior to the Meadows opening. As one employee stated, I finally can sleep at night knowing that my place of employment will still be here tomorrow. The Meadows Racetrack & Casino is a true blessing to the more than over 1,000 employees that it's hired since opening North Strabane Township. As host township, North Strabane Township receives approximately \$2.2 million per year. The additional revenue source has enabled North Strabane Township to increase their road-paving allocation by nearly 125 percent, hire additional personnel and purchase key equipment for each department.

A key piece of North Strabane Township that had been missing for many years is a park. And in addition to the previously mentioned items, North Strabane Township is currently building an \$8,000,000 community park. This park had been made possible with revenue received as host township. This park will be viewed by all township residents and surrounding area residents. On behalf of the entire North Strabane Township Board of Supervisors, I would first like to publicly thank Mr. Paulos, the entire management team at the Meadows Racetrack & Casino, for maintaining their dedication to the township and keeping their promises. In addition, the North Strabane Township

1 Board of Supervisors support Mr. Paulos, his management team and Meadows Racetrack & Casino for the bid for table games. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Thank you. Next speaker is Joe

Forrester.

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JOE FORRESTER, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED

AS FOLLOWS:

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MR. FORRESTER:

Good morning. My name is Joe Forrester, 13 I'm President of the Community College of Beaver County. And for the court reporter, my first name is Joe. And as you can tell from the accent, I'm not from this area. Ever since I got here, people have been trying to get me to be Joseph. And with the accent, it's Joe.

and talk about the Community College of Beaver County 21 and talk about our relationship with the Meadows. We're located in Beaver County in Center Township. We 23 have our full campus there. We also have a facility in Chippewa Township, the Beaver County Airport, where 24 we train professional pilots and we train air traffic

It's my pleasure to be here this morning

controllers. We're one of the very few community colleges in the country actually licensed by the FAA to provide training in air traffic control. That's been our signature program up to this point and now we're not interested in trying to develop an additional signature program centered around the gaming industry.

Based on the testimony I've heard here this morning, apparently we've also been very quiet about our presence in Washington County. We've been here for a number of years. We've had a joint program with California University in criminal justice. We've actually offered the Associate in Applied Science degree at Cal U for, I think, approximately 13, 14 years now. We're in partnership with the Western Area Career Technology Center, running an Associate degree program in culinary arts within the community. We've done a significant amount of workforce training and development in the community in the work of local employers. And it was an extension of that work that brought us to the Meadows originally.

As a community college, we offer
Associate degrees in arts and sciences for students
who are planning on transferring into a Baccalaureate
training institution. We offer Associate in Applied

Science degrees for individuals interested in pursuit 1 of a particular career field. I've already mentioned air traffic control, criminal justice, culinary arts. We have a number of different business degrees, a number of health occupations' degrees. And we'll be looking at creating an Associate in Applied Science in casino management as part of our partnership with the Meadows.

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The college's Board of Trustees a number 10 of years ago adopted a vision statement for the 11 college that says simply, we will be an active partner in the educational and economic growth of our region. 12 And clearly we consider Washington County to be part 13 14 of the region that we serve through the college. 15 our conversations with Meadows' management, they've demonstrated what you've heard here this morning. 16 17 Paulos said earlier they take their partnership seriously and they want to be good corporate citizens. 18 When we first began the conversations, we were simply 19 20 talking about dealer training. Since that point in 21 time, the casinos have been allowed to do their own 22 training, so our partnership began to take a different 23 course. And in the partnership right now, the training is being conducted through the Meadows, but 24 25 we are transcripting all of that information and we

will actually be issuing certificates for the people
who complete the training. And should they elect to
move into our certificate and Associate gegree
programs, they will receive college credits at no
additional cost for the training that they have
received through the Meadows. So, we're very pleased
to be able to put that partnership in place.

But it was the conversation with the 8 Meadows that caused us to expand our thinking. 10 didn't come in necessarily thinking about a certificate in casino management. We certainly didn't 11 12 come through the door thinking about an Associate 13 degree in casino management. But being good corporate 14 citizens and being concerned about their employees, 15 they said, we want our employees to have an opportunity to progress in our industry and so would 16 17 you look at creating these other programs. And we've 18 certainly been willing to do so. And we will be 19 creating those programs as a result of this 20 partnership.

We're also looking at expanding our culinary arts program that I mentioned we were already providing. And we're having conversations now about perhaps creating a separate program in casino security. So, the initial conversation has taken a

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number of different directions, and I think it is a credit to the Meadows that they have asked us to look at things that we didn't initially consider. During the past two months we've helped them develop training materials. Sean earlier showed you some of the training manuals. Those have been submitted jointly from the Meadows and from the Community College of Beaver County. And we're receiving approvals on those and so we are staged and ready to go in providing that training.

The Meadows has been most helpful in helping us understand their industry. We didn't know the gaming industry. We still have a lot to learn.

But as our partner, they've stood shoulder to shoulder with us. And as they're implementing training, members of my staff are there witnessing the training, helping get things organized and getting us prepared to assume the operation of the training programs later on.

I mentioned earlier that the individuals going through the program now will be eligible to receive certificates from the college. They will be able to receive college credits. I think the video clip talked about the length of training for the Craps' dealers, 240 hours. We will equate that 240

hours to a credit-hour value and for individuals
wanting to come into our programs, then they will
automatically receive those credits and they can be
applied towards either the certificate or a degree.

So, it's a good partnership, it's a solid partnership,
and it's a partnership that I believe came out of the
Meadows stated interest in being good corporate
citizens and taking care of their employees and in
providing them opportunities to progress and move into
even better paying jobs in the industry.

So, in closing, I want to acknowledge the strong corporate support that we've received from the Meadows in developing the training program and the partnership that we've put in place. I think it will ensure that there will be growth opportunities for employees in the industry and they'll have the opportunity to move up within the industry as their interests and abilities might necessitate. So, on that, I again thank you for the opportunity to address you this morning. And if there are questions, I'll be happy to try to respond.

PRESIDING OFFICER:

Thank you. Our next speaker, Cheryl Randall.

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CHERYL J. RANDALL, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN,

2 TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

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MS. RANDALL:

Good morning. My name is Cheryl Randall, R-A-N-D-A-L-L. I live in Somerset Township, Washington County, and I'm the Executive Director of the Washington Area Senior Citizen Center. I'm here today to support table games at the Meadows Racetrack & Casino. After having worked with senior citizens for over 20 years, I've seen how they've been affected 12 by rising costs. In the past year, seniors did not get a raise in Social Security, and their health 14 insurance premiums went up, along with additional co-pays for lab work.

The Meadows Racetrack & Casino did help the seniors last year with a reduction in property taxes. As the Meadows continues to grow, more help will be available for seniors. Our senior citizens center is funded by a Block Grant from the state, and that grant has not been increased in over five years and, of course, that budget does not allow for capital improvements. Last year the Meadows selected us as one of their charities and their donation of \$15,000 enabled us to purchase new chairs and blinds for our

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dining area and replaced items that had been there
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   since 1977. We hope to continue to have a good
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   relationship with the Meadows Casino & Racetrack and,
   again, support having table games at their location.

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   JEFF M. KOTULA, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN,
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  TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:
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                MR. KOTULA:
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                Good morning, Mr. Chairman, members of
24 the committee, of course, Senator Stout. My name is
25 Jeff Kotula, K-O-T-U-L-A. I'm the President of the
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1 Washington County Chamber of Commerce. On behalf of the Washington County Chamber of Commerce, I 3 appreciate the opportunity to submit my observations to the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board on the positive effects video gaming has had on Washington County, as well as our strong support for the introduction of table games. As President of the nearly 1,000-member Washington County Chamber, our business community and membership has witnessed the 10 positive impacts of video gaming in our county. you're aware, the Pennsylvania Legislature has passed 11 legislation allowing for the expansion of table games. 12 13 In our opinion and, of course, experience, this action 14 could only add to the business and economic 15 development of our county.

Washington County's economy has undergone a significant transformation in the past 25 years. Our county economy was once based on traditional heavy industries and mining, however, our county is now evolved into one based on advanced manufacturing, the development of our natural resources, such as natural gas and coal, and, of course, high technology. This transformation has brought new jobs, increased our quality of life and has attracted new companies to our county. And, in fact, Washington County now has the

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second highest number of Fortune 500 companies 1 headquartered in Southwestern Pennsylvania with, of course, Pittsburgh being the highest concentration. 3 Fortune 500 companies such as CONSOL Energy and Mylan Labs have chosen to locate in Washington County not only because of our low taxes, high quality workforce and competitive business environment, they have chosen to locate or expand because investments that we are making ourselves with the Meadows Racetrack & Casino 10 being one of our economic drivers.

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In addition to the hundreds of job, monetary investment and tax revenue the Meadows has 12 13 contributed to our economy already, we have also 14 utilized the facility to increase our own economic 15 development efforts. In a ten-mile radius of the casino, we have witnessed nearly \$1,000,000,000, \$1,000,000,000 dollars in new public/private 17 18 investments, projects such as Tanger Outlets, Southpointe II Industrial Park, Strabane Square and 20 Trinity Point retail centers as well as over five new 21 hotels, all within a ten-mile radius, are being driven 22 by the presidents and complementary effects of gaming 23 at the Meadows. With the expansion of gaming to 24 include table games, we expect the positive impacts to 25 increase even more.

In addition, the Pennsylvania Legislature in passing gaming, has also directed some of the gross terminal revenues to directly benefit Washington County. To the Washington County Local Share Program, the county receives two percent of the gross terminal revenues from the Meadows to be utilized for economic and community development projects. This program has allowed the Washington County Commissioners working with --- and I have to stress this --- working with our local legislative delegation and economic development officials to invest an additional \$100,000,000 in leveraging funds in addition to the \$30,000,000 that has come directly through this program to new infrastructure, municipal and, of course, economic development projects for our county.

In addition, all of Washington County's local municipalities are also receiving a direct monetary benefit from this program, which enables our struggling cities, townships and boroughs the opportunity to also invest in themselves. This program, which is funded entirely by gaming revenues, means jobs, it means a high quality of life, and it means new opportunities for our residents.

As you may suspect, the initial passage of gaming brought concerns of decreased customer basis

from our local small businesses. However, this did 1 not materialize. What did materialize was significant increases in our county customer base, especially from 3 visitors and tourists from bordering states such as Ohio and West Virginia, as well as the tremendous corporate partnerships and exceptional community commitments that we received from the Meadows itself. The Meadows Racetrack & Casino and video 8

gaming in general have been positive influences on Washington County and its economy. We are now supporting the addition of table games at the Meadows 12 as it will further benefit our economic-development efforts, our economy and our job creation efforts. We fully support gaming and encourage the Board to do so as well. Thank you very much for your time, Mr.

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23 KIM HANKINS, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED

24 AS FOLLOWS:

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MR. HANKINS:

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Good morning. My name is Kim Hankins. 3 I'm an Executive Director of the Meadows Standardbred Owners Association. It's spelled H-A-N-K-I-N-S. I'd like to thank you for the opportunity to speak here today. But first off, I'd like to thank Senator Stout for his many years of service to the citizens of Western Pennsylvania and specifically the Horsemen that race at the Meadows. Thank you very much for your service.

SENATOR STOUT:

Thank you.

MR. HANKINS:

And I'd also like to thank Tim Solobay for his guidance. I'm new to this area, so learning the legislative process in this area has been a little difficult, and I appreciate Tim's help. The MSOA greatly appreciates the efforts of the Gaming Control Board and its staff, especially Melinda Tucker, to maintain the Horsemen seat at the table and address our concerns. The Table Games Legislation has positives and negatives for Horsemen. Some of the positives, a review by the Gaming Control Board and Racing Commissions of promotional and marketing efforts of horseracing by Category 1 Licensees.

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1 I greatly appreciate Chairman Fajt and Executive Director O'Toole's attendance at a recent 2 meeting with Pennsylvania Horsemen and breeders' 3 groups to discuss the specifics of this new requirement. Hopefully the study by the innovative group that contends the slot playing will increase with the implementation of table games will be accurate. Also, the Health and Retirement Programs were held harmless from any decline in revenues due to 10 table games. The limitation of any more than two percent reduction of slot machines should be viewed as 11 12 a positive also.

I would be remiss if I didn't mention the Obviously, the 17 percent reduction in the natives. Pennsylvania Horseracing Development Fund is, in our opinion, contrary to the legislative intent of Act 71. The amazing growth of the industry has been severely hampered, but we will continue and we will move forward. We are greatly concerned that if table games do not increase slot play, there's no failsafe for the Racehorse Development Fund.

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In regards to local issues here at the 23 | Meadows, the MSOA continues to meet and attract 24 | management to conclude the Backstretch Improvement Fund Plan and the Horsemen's Live Racing Agreement.

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firmly believe the mutually beneficial plan and
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   agreement should be achieved by April 15th. One issue
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   of concern for the MSOA is any reduction of slot
  machines. We do, though, understand business trends
  and maintaining a competitive operation with local
  competition. We will leave the decisions in the
   capable hands and authority of the Pennsylvania Gaming
  Control Board. One suggestion for future Act 71
   legislation would be a requirement for all casinos, no
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  matter what category, to include racebook in their
  live licensing requirements.

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   SHIRLEY FIERRO, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN,
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   TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:
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                MS. FIERRO:
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                Good morning. My name is Shirley Fierro,
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F-I-E-R-R-O. I am making a statement from the
Washington City Mission. The Washington City Mission
exists to share Christ, to shelter, to heal and to
restore the homeless to independent living without
discrimination. We do not care who comes to us for
assistance, we only care how they leave. We have the
ability to house 56 men and 40 women and children in
our facility.

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We serve over 130,000 meals a year to our residents and to anyone who comes to us in need of a hot meal. Our samaritan services provides food baskets, clothing and furniture to the region's poor and working poor who do not reside with us. We also provide bus tickets and use of the telephone for those exiting the Washington County Jail. We provide over 4,000 free medical interventions through the James Arbuckle Medical Clinic, which is located on our campus. We are thankful to all the individuals, churches, companies, foundations and public and private grantors who provide the funding that enables the Washington City Mission to assist the homeless men, women and women with children we serve.

A contribution from the Meadowlands

Casino assisted us with the support of these programs.

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PEG WILSON, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS:

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MS. WILSON:

Well, I don't really know where to start first. So I don't forget, I'm thanking you for inviting us all and I want to honor our famous Senator here who nobody has said, we're losing him this year, and that's a very big thing in my heart. Barry, I appreciate your friendship. Okay.

I want to thank everybody. I really want to thank Mr. Paulos because I went to him for this food bank ---. Wait, I guess I'll start all over.

I'm Peg Wilson, W-I-L-S-O-N, and I'm State Committee 1 from Harrisburg and I'm also the Vice-President of The Greater Washington Food Bank, who I'm here today to speak on behalf of. And without the Meadows helping us so much --- they did a food drive for us with canned foods and paid the customers that come in. And we benefited from all this stuff. So, another thing that they did --- and they donated us money to buy Christmas turkeys, 15,000, which we

deeply appreciate, Mr. Paulos. And they're constantly --- anything --- they've just been very good to us.

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And I want to thank my old friend, Mike, whose helped me, and he is a wonderful adeus (phonetic) here that compares to the Kentucky Derby. I do want to thank you, Mike.

Now, the Meadows has done so much, brought a few notes here because I knew I was going to forget. You were asking about the senior citizens. 10 Well, I'm one of the ones that play there. I love to play and they've been --- like I said, they're just 11 12 like my second family. In fact, I celebrated my 13 birthday there. They go ahead now --- they've got the 14 hotels coming in, they've got the Tanger Outlet, good 15 construction, and I think somebody from North Strabane got the roads here and the tax ---. The most 16 17 important thing to me is the people of Washington 18 County have something to dream for now. We had no jobs and people were very destitute and so many people 19 20 kept calling and explaining their thanks to the Meadows because they've hired them for good jobs. 21 22 They pay benefits and a lot of places are getting hired at, they didn't have the benefits. 23

So, I think on that I'm very proud of the racetrack here. I've been going there for years. But

I'm going to make a statement. I've been traveling 2 ---. Mr. Paulos was saying he's going to bring the ones from Vegas here. I think it's time because I 3 have made many a trip to Vegas. But I think it's time for a lot of us to come to Pennsylvania to see what a beautiful state we have.

So, on that, the Meadows has been very good to our community. They've given back so much I will never be able to name everything that they have done. I want to thank Sean Sullivan and his staff, Bill and all of their lovely staff to work with, they 12 help everybody.

So, on that I'm going to turn the rest of my time over to Nelly Chester, who can explain more about the food bank. As I've said, I appreciate all of the help you've all given to us and I sure hope you, the Gaming Commission, helps them back. I thank you all.

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20 NELLY CHESTER, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED

AS FOLLOWS: 21

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MS. CHESTER:

24 My name is Nelly Chester, C-H-E-S-T-E-R.

25 I'm from Somerset Township. We seem to have quite a

few of us here. The most popular is our Senator,

Barry Stout. I would just like to say thank you. You have been a terrific friend to the food bank. I've been with the food bank for 25 years as a coordinator, running a pantry out of the Ellsworth/Somerset Area, and eight years as a --- as past President.

And until you came along, we did not have --- we didn't have the food that we needed in order to fix emergency boxes. Emergency boxes go out to people that are in a situation where maybe they've gone to get their Welfare or food stamps and they have to wait a couple of days. And they've waited long --- too long in order to go get some help. So whenever they are told that they're going to have to wait another week or two in order to get their Access Card, they don't have anywhere to turn. So, what we had been doing prior to so much help from the Meadows, the casino, was the churches, all of the schools doing food drives for us. This has helped us immensely.

We also help anybody going from City
Mission to a home, from Washington Christian Outreach
needing help. We provided food that we had collected
at the casino. We provided them truckloads of food in
order to help them out. If they're going from the
women's shelter and they need an emergency box, we'd

use that to provide for that.

enough. I've been there when --- at the food bank when --- I went in 10, 12 years ago. We didn't have what we have now. Not only you, but the community has stood behind us. I'd just like to give you --- and I have to take my glasses off to read. An example of how much food that you have provided to the food bank from '07, '08 and '09, \$554,000 --- or I'll take the money --- 554,000 pounds of food in those food drives was collected. Just unbelievable. We've had reporters taking pictures of the food, that it's just --- you just can't believe it.

And Barry mentioned we got our last check
April of last year for April, May and June from the
state for the food that we get. We didn't get any
more money in until the end of December. The food
that we gave out from July, August, September,
October, November and into December, the last two
months, a lot of it was boxes. We took all that food
in --- Washington Community Service, the prisoners
came in and helped us box all that up. That was what
the people got in Washington County in order to get
them through food-wise until the budget was --- not
only was it after the budget was passed, we waited for

88 about a month and a half in order to get money in, 2 maybe even longer. So, in that period of time, we had 3 to get food out to the people. And this really did help us. 5 We feel that you are a friend because you've proven to be a friend. And just appreciate very much what you do for us. Thank you. PRESIDING OFFICER: 8 9 Thank you. Ray Hamm. Okay. He's on 10 today's list, we'll look for him tomorrow. George Crawford. 11 12 MR. CRAWFORD: 13 Mr. Chairman, I'm going to defer to Mr. 14 Dillon to speak. 15 CHAIRMAN: 16 Okay. 17 MICHAEL DILLON, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, 18 19 TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS: 20 21 MR. DILLON: 22 Good morning, Mr. Chairman. My name is 23 Michael Dillon, D-I-L-L-O-N. I live in Hampton 24 Township, Cumberland County, near Harrisburg,

25 Pennsylvania. I'm presently serving as the Acting

Executive Secretary of the Horseracing Commission and the Harness Racing Commission of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Today with me is Mr. George Crawford.

George is the Director of Harness Racing for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Thank you for being here today, George.

Preliminarily I would like to make a couple of acknowledgements before I deliver the prepared remarks. I'd like to say, it's great to see Senator Barry Stout. When he was younger, I was a resident of Washington County. Barry was the Senator then. He was a great Senator then and he's a Senior Statesman for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania today. So, thank you for being here today, sir.

Representative and today it was nice to hear the remarks of Representative Solobay. We greatly support you. We greatly thank you for your strong support in agriculture. A lot of people don't realize that both the Harness Racing Commission and the Horseracing Commission are located within the Department of Agriculture. The Secretary of Agriculture, Russell Reading, is on the Board of Chairman Fajt. He is an ex officio member of the Pennsylvania State Gaming Control Board.

We have two current Commissioners serving on the State Harness Racing Commission. They are Chairman Roy Wilt, formally Senator Wilt, who served with Barry many years ago. And we have Commissioner Rick Welch. Our third Commissioner, Art Manuel, recently retired due to illness. So, on behalf of our two current Commissioners, I have two minutes' worth of remarks.

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Good morning. We the Commissioners of 10 the State Harness Racing Commission, along with Secretary of Agriculture, Russell Reading, are very 11 pleased with the recent Table Games Legislation. 12 13 are particularly pleased with what is referred to as 14 Section 1211. Section 1211 provides for annual 15 reports by the Category 1 License holders such as the Meadows Racetrack & Casino located in North Strabane 16 Township. Section 1211 gives the Category 1 17 Facilities the opportunity to indicate what measures 18 19 will be taken to enhance live harness racing and 20 standardbred breeding in Pennsylvania. We expect the Category 1s to put their best foot forward to 21 22 demonstrate in concrete ways their commitment to live 23 harness racing and standardbred breeding in 24 Pennsylvania.

We expect the Category 1 License holders

to provide to us what steps they plan to employ to increase the handle and attendance at the respective racetrack in the ensuing year. The breeding and racing of horses in Pennsylvania are the keystones as to why Act 71, the Pennsylvania Race Horse Development and Gaming Act was passed by the General Assembly and signed into law by Governor Ed Rendell.

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With the enactment of Section 1211, there will be more of a focus as to what the Category 1s are doing to promote and enhance live racing and breeding in Pennsylvania. There should be a closer connection between live racing, slots and table games. should be recognized as part and parcel with the other. Expectation will be for the Category 1 License holders to get creative and innovative. Specifically, we fully expect the Category 1 License holders to promote live harness racing in a robust and a sustained manner. Specifically, we fully expect the Category 1 License holders to maintain a safe and professional backside for the wellbeing of the horses and the stable staff. Specifically, we fully expect the Category 1 License holders to support the offering of a significant number of races restricting entry to Pennsylvania bred horses. We are impressed by the serious progress regarding this goal by the respective

track management, the Horsemen's group and the breeders.

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3 Cooperation between the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board and the State Harness Racing Commission will be the hallmark going forward. The Category 1 License holders have a duty by law to enhance live racing and breeding in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. There should be closer links between the Category 1 License holders and featured live racing in something as fundamental as signage. When 10 you enter the Meadows Casino, you should immediately 11 12 be aware that live harness racing is being conducted 13 at the facility.

As a result of Section 1211, the respective Commissioners throughout Thoroughbred and Harness will have an active role at both the Category 1 Facilities and the respective racetracks to see the progress being made regarding the enhancement of live racing at all six Pennsylvania tracks, the three harness tracks, the Meadows, Pocono Downs and Harris Chester, and the three thoroughbred tracks, Philadelphia Park, Penn National and Presque Isle Downs.

Through the cooperative efforts of the 25 respective stakeholders in the industry, track

1 management, the Horsemen's organizations and the 2 Breeders' organizations, we have accomplished much over the years and we shall look forward to a bright 3 future for live racing and horse breeding in Pennsylvania, and the promotion enhancement of agriculture in our Commonwealth. We thank you for your attention and your consideration of these remarks. We would ask that you kindly file these remarks for the record. 10 Respectfully submitted Roy W. 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MS. ROBINSON-RITTER:

Good morning. I'd like to take this 4 opportunity to ask for your patience given my voice or lack thereof. Hopefully, I can continue on. have it in writing for you. My name is Michelle Robinson-Ritter, R-O-B-I-N-S-O-N, R-I-T-T-E-R. I live in Washington County, specifically South Franklin 10 Township, but I'm here as Executive Director of the Washington Women's Shelter, Incorporated. We're a 11 12 community organization that provides safe shelter and 13 support services to area victims of domestic violence 14 and their children.

I requested the opportunity to speak to you today in support of the Meadows Racetrack & Casino's Petition for Approval to Operate Table Games. There are a number of reasons why I support the Meadows Racetrack & Casino in these efforts. One noticeable and very positive piece of what the Meadows continues to do is to constantly promote itself as the Meadows Racetrack & Casino. They recognize their history and remain true to their roots.

Our state and localities have benefited greatly from the tax impact, and positive economic

impact in and around the Meadows is proof of their
promise to improve the area. Aside from the
beautification project that is the new Meadows, I look
around at all the hotels and the outlet stores, at the
road improvements and at the new construction, and I
see jobs. And most of these jobs are for local
people. This is a good thing for our area.

The Meadows' team is extremely supportive of our community. My organization is living proof of that commitment to improving the lives of their 10 neighbors. Just this past November, Washington 11 Women's Shelter, Incorporated, along with some other 12 13 local charities, was the recipient of \$15,000 as part 14 of something the Meadows called Charity Mondays. 15 non-profit corporation struggling through continuing grant decreases, Washington Women's Shelter, 16 17 Incorporated was extremely pleased to be the recipient 18 of the Meadows' generosity and commitment to community 19 services.

We're not a huge agency with an enormous and particularly influential donor base, so their gift to us was not a clever PR tool. The Meadows didn't have to make these gifts, no one would have been the wiser had they not. The Meadows Racetrack & Casino displayed their community spirit because they knew it

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was the right thing to do. Clearly, the Meadows
Racetrack & Casino has been and continues to be a
champion for bettering our community, and I
wholeheartedly support them in their efforts.
