## PRESIDING OFFICER:

Good morning. If you would be kind enough, please, to take your seats so that we might commence today's hearing. I'm Michael Edmiston, the presiding officer assigned to conduct today's public input hearing. Before we begin, please turn off all cell phones, beepers and Blackberries so as not to disturb the speakers or other attendees. Thank you.

Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board public input hearing for Category 3 Slot Machine License,
Applicant Bushkill Group, Docket Number 1567-2010, is called to order. The date is September 2, year 2010.
The time is 10:09 a.m. And the location is the Middle Smithfield Township Country Club of the Poconos
Clubhouse, at 1445 Big Ridge Drive, East Stroudsburg,
Pennsylvania, 18302. This public input hearing is convened by the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board,
pursuant to the directive and authority found in
Section 1205(b) of the Gaming Act, and the Board's regulations at 58 Pennsylvania Code, Section 441A.6.

This public input hearing was advertised on the Board's website, announced at a previous meeting of the Board and advertised in local

newspapers. The Board members present today for this hearing are, on my right, Commissioner Raymond Angeli, and on my left, Commissioner Kenneth Trujillo.

At this early stage of the hearing I would like to note that I'm certain there are other Board members who would have preferred to be here with you today. However, they are attending the funeral of one of the Gaming Control Board lawyers, who was taken away from us somewhat unexpectedly, a nice young man and a good lawyer, whose name is Troy Beaverson, who is being buried in Harrisburg this morning.

The Board and Board staff thank Middle Smithfield Township for making its facilities available today for this hearing. This is the third public input hearing in a series of four hearings conducted by the Board for the purpose of allowing applicants for the remaining Category 3 Slot Machine License to present their plans before the Board and the public and to allow individual members of the public, community groups, elected officials and local government representatives to express their thoughts and share their concerns with the Board about the proposed Category 3 slot machine projects.

The order of today's speakers will be as follows. The first presentation will be made by the

1 Applicant for a Category 3 Slot Machine License, 2 Bushkill Group. Then, in the following order, we will hear from legislators, local government 3 representatives, community representatives and individual members of the public who have registered to speak. The time period permitted for each category of the speakers is as follows. Bushkill Group will have 45 minutes to make their presentation. legislative official will have five minutes to speak. 10 Representatives from the local government bodies will be given 30 minutes to speak. Community group leaders 11 will have ten minutes each. Individual members of the 12 13 public will each have three minutes to speak. Your 14 presentations will be timed, and you'll be asked to 15 wrap up your comments at the end of your allotted time. If your time runs out and you have comments 16 remaining, please submit them as written comments for 17 the Board's consideration. 18

I would like also to remind everyone, if you choose, you may submit written comments that will 21 be included as part of the evidentiary record of this public input hearing. Such written comments may be as an alternative to live testimony today or in addition to live testimony and may be submitted at this hearing or any of our other public input hearings. You may

also submit such written comments via the Board's website, which can be found at www.pgcb.state.pa.us, or you may mail or fax written comments to the Board's clerk. We will be accepting written comments for 60 days after the close of this hearing today, that is at the close of business on Monday, November 1st, 2010, when the evidentiary hearing for this public input hearing will be closed.

As to protocols for the speakers, each speaker should begin their remarks by stating his or her name, the municipality and state where he or she resides, and if speaking on behalf of an entity, state the name of that entity. All public speakers will be sworn in as a group before the start of the public comment portion of this hearing. If you are a speaker today and have written notes from material from which you read during your testimony, when you are finished, please give a copy of that written material to the court stenographer, who is the gentleman seated on my far right. That would be helpful.

In addition, a copy of the Code of

Conduct for this public input hearing was available as

you entered the hearing room and was also available on

the Board's website. All in attendance today are to

adhere to the Code of Conduct for this public input

hearing.

# PRESIDING OFFICER:

Bushkill Group, if you're ready, you may begin. Just by way of reminder, you have 45 minutes.

# ATTORNEY JONES:

Thank you. Good morning, Commissioners, 11 | Hearing Officer Edmiston, Marie Jones from Fox 12 Rothschild here on behalf of the Bushkill Group. With me today for our presentation is Andy Worthington, president, chief executive officer and shareholder of Bushkill. Next to him is Holly Freeman, Director of Special Projects. We also have in attendance a number of the shareholders of Bushkill Group; Mark Turner, Gina Bertucci, Kevin Lavelle and Thomas Casale. Josh Herschlag is also present. All of these individuals are residents of Monroe County. And this is not only their business but where they live and an important community to them. With us is also our management company, Penn National Gaming. We have Steven Snyder, 24 Senior Vice-President of Corporate Development; John 25 Finamore, Senior Vice-President of Regional

Operations; Carl Sottosanti, Vice-President and Deputy General Counsel; and Thomas Auriemma, Vice-President and Chief Compliance Officer. You will not be hearing from all of them today.

We would like to thank the Board, the public officials and the public for being here today. We're pleased to be before you to continue pursuit of the Category 3 License. Bushkill clearly is the type of resort facility that the legislature intended to hold a Category 3 License. However, this is the last Category 3 License they can apply for. There has been a limited additional license added with the new table games legislation that becomes effective in 2017, but there was an increase in mileage limitations. So Bushkill is diligently continuing their pursuit of this license.

As you will hear, the Bushkill project has been enhanced since our last presentation. We're pleased to have Penn National Gaming with us, who will bring their vast gaming management experience, as well as financing the project. You will also be hearing from them during our presentation.

Based on the recent addition to the legislation and the addition of table games, the Bushkill project will include the same. This will

increase the number of jobs, bring additional revenue
to the township, the county and the Commonwealth and
will overall make this a better experience for the
Bushkill Group. I would like to reserve time at the
end of the presentation for any rebuttal or concluding
remarks, and I would now ask Mr. Worthington to begin
the presentation. Thank you.

#### MR. WORTHINGTON:

Good morning, Commissioners,

Representative Siptroth, Commissioner McCool, township representatives and members of the community. As

Marie said, my name is Andy Worthington. I'm president of the Applicant, Bushkill Group and Fernwood Hotel & Resort.

I would like to begin our presentation by thanking Middle Smithfield Township supervisors for their support and for agreeing to host this meeting today. I would also like to recognize our many employees who are in attendance today. Many of them asked to speak on our behalf, but in the interest of time you'll only be hearing from one of them today. I want to publicly thank all of our employees for their support throughout this process. There are also several individuals from the community, including Robert Phillips, CEO of the Pocono Mountain Chamber of

Commerce, who came out today just for our license application. Bob spoke on our behalf at the last hearing. He'll be submitting written comments on our behalf after this hearing.

Meyerer (phonetic), representing CapitalSource Bank.
CapitalSource Bank, in the spring of this year, became our new commercial lender and has provided us with an ongoing source of funds to expand our business. Even though Tom is not speaking today, we appreciate him coming from New York City to support our application and to answer any questions the Board might have of him. We'd like to begin our presentation with a brief video that describes the resort, our proximity to New York and New Jersey and our year-round amenities.

## MR. WORTHINGTON:

Three years ago we applied for the Category 3 Resort License after Nemacolin and Seven Springs withdrew their applications. We did so because we believe we ideally fit the legislation as a well-established resort with at least 275 rooms and a full range of amenities. We have customer visits in excess of 425,000 people annually, primarily from out of state. We can demonstrate a history of successful

operations, are good community citizens and have a diverse employee and vendor base. The addition of a casino will be an ideal resort amenity available to guests and to those who spend a \$10 minimum on our 440-acre property.

From this slide you can see a layout of the resort and some of our extensive amenities. proposed casino location is in the upper right-hand corner of that map, right at the Fernwood Hotel, in an existing building. The remainder of the property is mainly our villas surrounded by our golf course. Also, it's interesting and important to note that on three sides our property is surrounded by part of the 70,000-acre Delaware Gap National Recreation Area. We've always had a very close relationship working with the park and their superintendent and officials. We continue to have that sort of relationship. expect that to continue in the future. They have not opposed our application, and we're very proud to say that we support the National Park Service in what they're doing in the Delaware Gap National Recreation Area.

As we've presented before, the casino will be developed in the Fernwood Events Center, an existing structure, using existing infrastructure, and

will help us support the local economy through jobs, 1 2 taxes and philanthropy. I'd like to emphasize that no additional zoning permits are required to begin 3 construction. As a result of placing the casino in an existing building on the resort, we're able to receive building permits and begin construction immediately after the award and license. Based on these factors, we will be the applicant best able to be operational quickly. Property tax relief from the project will be 10 approximately \$10 million per year. Furthermore, we will generate \$10.4 million in taxes annually, almost 11 12 doubling the \$5.4 million we now pay. And that's for state, local, you know, sales, employment taxes. 13 So 14 it's a significant increase.

Construction of the gaming facility will produce approximately \$36 million for the Pocono region and support approximately 180 on-site construction jobs. Stabilized casino operations will result in approximately 900 new jobs, which includes 360 new casino employees and 535 new regional jobs. The local and regional economy can expect indirect spending of approximately \$72 million and indirect spending of \$27 million. And of course, you know, one of the things we pride ourselves on is our philanthropic efforts, and we fully expect those to

increase as a result of the addition of the casino.

We are a good community citizen, and through testimony and many letters of support, we'll offer examples and demonstrate that commitment. The resort and its employees have contributed to many local organizations, such as the United Way, Meals on Wheels, the American Cancer Society, Bushkill Outreach, Fitzmaurice Community Services, the Trooper Miller Memorial Fund and Toys for Tots. A complete list of organizations benefiting from our charitable efforts was submitted with our application, and these efforts will undoubtedly be increased when we receive a license.

I think it would be appropriate now to provide some information about the Pocono Mountains and its proximity to major metropolitan markets. As the current chair of the Pocono Mountain Visitors

Bureau, I contribute to the efforts of the Bureau in guaranteeing the sustainability and viability of the Pocono Mountains brand. The Poconos are located just 70 miles from New York City. Currently, the region draws over 23.8 million visitors annually. The adjoining Delaware Gap National Recreation Area itself draws five million visitors. There are over 7,000 quest rooms within Monroe and Pike Counties. There

are 38,000 vacation homes within a five-mile radius of the resort. As far as our marketing goes, we have an existing data warehouse that allows us to mail, e-mail, text, and call into a market area of over 26-and-a-half million adults who reside within a hundred-mile radius of the resort. We are clearly a drive-to resort, and we are very easy to get to from the major metropolitan areas of New York and Northern New Jersey.

10 As one of the major resorts in the Pocono 11 Mountains, we sent over two million e-mails annually, 12 experience 350,000 visits to our website, and attract 13 84 percent of our 425,000 customer visits from outside 14 of Pennsylvania. Here's a breakdown of those visits. 15 We think this is a very important part of our application. We've been providing vacations to the 16 17 Pocono Mountains from guests out of state for many, many years, and as you can see, 84 percent of our 18 quests will be coming to spend money at the Bushkill 19 20 Group Casino from out of state, almost half of them from New York if we can maintain our current customer 21 22 base. And that's certainly where our marketing is focused. We currently spend about \$5 million on 23 marketing to potential quests. Gaming will add 24 25 another \$6 million to those efforts. And of course,

that will be directed by Penn National, using their extensive databases and expertise in gaming marketing.

We're pleased to have Penn National as our gaming operator. As the Board is well aware, Penn National Gaming has agreed to provide management and development services for the casino and funding for the project. Their proven experience in gaming operations throughout the country makes them the ideal manager for the project. I would now like to turn this over to Steven Snyder from Penn National.

12 Thank you, Andy. Thank you, members of the Board, the Hearing Officer, and thank you for the 13 14 public for being in attendance at such an important 15 consideration here in the township. Worthington mentioned, we have been involved in this 16 17 project now for over nearly a year. We met with Mr. Worthington, his management team, his ownership team 18 last year and began discussions around this project as 19 20 a result of the last round of Category 3 applications, 21 not this most current submission that began in April 22 but began these conversations even before that commenced. So that's how these discussions between 23 Penn National and the Bushkill Group began. We view 24 25 our responsibilities with Mr. Worthington and his team as he said as the developer for the casino. We've had our project construction folks spend a great deal of time on the campus, at the facility, identifying critical issues such as how this will relate to the existing resort amenities, how customers will get in and out of the facility, how the facility will be serviced and serve the public patrons that will be coming into the casino enterprise.

We also recognize our role to be the financing source. That has been one of the challenges historically for the Category 3 applicants, given the financial market turmoil that has taken place here in the United States over the last 18 to 24 months. will provide 100 percent of the financing necessary to complete the casino project. So if you do select this applicant to proceed, you can know with assurance that the project will be constructed, the project will be opened, and it will be opened on a very timely basis, again, based on the experience we bring to the table, as well as the facility. And finally, we will serve as the manager and the operator of the casino facility. Mr. Worthington had mentioned the new financing source for the balance of the resort. are looking at providing financing for the casino operations, the casino development and the operations

of that facility.

As I mentioned, we began our 2 3 participation and our discussions with Mr. Worthington and his management team last year. We got very excited as we learned more about the demographic opportunities here, about the nature and the character of this facility and its existing customer base, its fit with the intent of the original racetrack enhancement legislation that led to the slot machine 10 casino facilities here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and really the ability for this project 11 12 to be a catalyst not only for the further build-out of 13 the Fernwood facility, with its existing timeshare and 14 ancillary amenities, but also the entire region by 15 driving incremental traffic here into Monroe County.

Just to move a little bit more into our background, you have before you a slide of the Penn Management team. I would like to think that we are second to none in the industry in terms of depth of the management team, in terms of experience as a senior management team. We have well over a hundred years of experience in the gaming industry, again, as a testament to the ability to get this project completed if this project is selected.

I'd like to introduce John Finamore, who

is our Senior Vice-President of Regional Operations.

John will be the person at Penn National responsible for the direct oversight of this project.

Thank you, Steve. Commissioners, good 5 morning. Hearing Officer Edmiston, good morning. 6 know that you're very familiar with Penn National Gaming, but I just want to take a few moments to talk to you about the company. I think you know we're the 10 largest pari-mutuel operator of facilities in the United States. We're also the third largest 11 12 publicly-traded company in the U.S. And we are very 13 familiar with properties in this region of the 14 country, of course. We operate Hollywood Casino at 15 Penn National Racecourse, Hollywood Casino at Charles Town Races, and we will be opening Hollywood Casino in 16 17 Perryville, Maryland later this month. So we're very familiar with this region in particular. All told, we 18 operate 22 facilities in 16 jurisdictions throughout 19 20 the United States and Canada. As this next slide 21 shows, we are very proud of our diversified locations. 22 And again, as I said, we are the third largest 23 publicly-held company in the gaming industry. 24 Here's some comments that have been made 25 by Wall Street analysts, primarily Wall Street

analysts and investment bankers regarding our company. 2 I think it speaks to the reputation our company has as being, again, very diversified, a company with a very 3 strong and healthy balance sheet, a company with a very strong and experienced management team, as Steve Snyder indicated earlier.

Our workforces in our respective properties are reflective of the surrounding communities, and we're very proud of our record in these communities. All told, on a national basis our workforce is comprised of 52 percent women employees and 28 percent minority. We consistently meet or exceed the goals put forth on projects and workforce targets around the country. Quite simply put, our priority is to hire locally and to purchase locally. And that is the way our properties operate within their communities.

This is an update on some of our most recent construction projects that, again, highlights our MBE and WBE practice --- business practices in these communities. We're very proud of the goals, as you see down the right side of the slide, and the progress we've attained in hitting these goals with 24 MBE and WBE purchases. And a number of these --- in fact, all of these projects were built with

substantial union labor as well.

2 Something we're probably most proud of as 3 a corporation is our Penn National Gaming Foundation. This foundation was originally started by the company right after Hurricane Katrina, and it was done in an attempt to reach out and help our employees who lost their homes on the Gulf Coast and our properties and, indeed, lost their jobs for an extended period of time. But it has evolved from much more than that. 10 It is a 501(c)(3) private foundation. It is administered by a Board of our corporate executives 11 12 with quarterly meetings. And it has evolved, as I said, into a supplement to the charitable activities 13 at each of our existing properties. 14

In 2009 Penn National Corporation and its casinos provided \$3 million in donations across the country. And I think something we're even more proud of is Penn National's employees donated over 5,000 hours of community service in 2009 as well.

Let me ask Steve Snyder to come back up and continue the presentation.

#### MR. SNYDER:

I think that's more than enough about us.

I think it's more important now in this public input
hearing to get into the facility itself and what the

facility itself will produce for the Commonwealth of 1 Pennsylvania and for Monroe County. What you see in 3 front of you on the slide is the master plan of the corner of the facility. Again, that's one of the things that we found most attractive when we began our discussions around this project. This is simply one component of a multifaceted destination facility. You'll see at the corner of River Road and Highway 209 in this overhead the location for the casino facility. It's labeled as the existing building. 10 It was originally constructed as a tennis facility, a tennis 11 12 barn. It is now used for mixed-use purposes, for 13 really a number of various uses. But as Mr. 14 Worthington mentioned, because of its existing 15 infrastructure and the fact that it is there and it's current zoning, it is something that we feel upon 16 17 selection we can mobilize very quickly and be open as 18 quickly, in fact, more quickly than any of the other Category 3 applicants. 19 20

The existing building at the corner is where the casino will be located. We'll drill into it on a later slide. It is immediately across from the existing public areas, which provide the restaurant, the meeting space, guest registration, check-in, those types of things. So that you can see, everything is

very convenient. It's all within a very short distance and a very easy walk. We have, as a result 3 of the table games legislation, which was not in place before --- or when we first started these conversations, looked at expansions of the building to the right and to the left, which would be the north and to the south, to accommodate not just what was originally contemplated to be 500 slot machines, but now the potential for table games. So that's why you 10 see those additions on each wing of the building, to accommodate the full complement of what is now 11 authorized for the casino at the Fernwood facility. 12

The other attraction, as was mentioned in the video, this has a drop-off point for the trolley system. So we can very easily move the guests of the resort back and forth to the gaming facility, as well as currently exists with the other amenities of the resort development itself. As we sort of zoom in, this takes you right to what will be the casino facility. The white building to the right or in the right-hand corner is the existing public area, with the meeting space, restaurants, guest check-in, et cetera. The browner building is what will be the casino, what currently exists now as the recreation center, the gaming center --- the arcade, excuse me,

not that kind of gaming, and with the expansion on both sides of the building, including that porte-cochere around that round circular driveway that drops people off right at the entrance to the casino facility.

Moving in, as we get into the building, and again, our architects, our design team, have spent quite a bit of time on this facility so that we know it has the capability to accommodate this footprint.

As you move into the facility from that porte-cochere on the right, for all those in the audience, as well as the Board, you will come to a gate because of the sensitivities with respect to the guest requirement for a patron of this casino, so that there will be a security checkpoint immediately inside the front door. No one will be able to get onto the casino floor until they have been identified as a patron of the resort, as required under your rules and regulations.

Moving into the building, sort of the upper right-hand corner, you'll see a footprint for a ten-table poker room. You'll see a floor layout that includes 500 slot machines with room to grow. There's plenty of space in the aisle ways to add additional games. And in the middle of the facility you will see that 16 table game pit, all of which have room to

grow, depending on market demand. But it is this
footprint that we've utilized and employed in coming
to our revenue projections for both our opening and
interim years of operation. So we feel very
comfortable that the facility can accommodate the
necessary gaming positions and equally comfortable, as
we'll see in a later slide, as to the revenue
projections of this facility, based on the population
and the capacity of the facility.

The last item I will point out, in addition to all of the --- the back of the house and the service areas on the left side of the building is a food and beverage operation, a restaurant right off of the casino floor, which is the lighter shade of brown. Sort of it's in the bottom middle, off --- just slightly to the left of center. So that we do believe that we can provide all the necessary amenities on the casino floor or immediately adjacent to the casino floor for casino patrons, as well as the multiple offerings of the balance of the resort that do currently exist.

With that I think it's important to look at what are the economics? We've talked about us as the operator. We've talked about the facility, the speed, the market of the facility. What is the

economic opportunity for the Commonwealth of 1 2 Pennsylvania and for this facility? We've looked at 3 initial-year visitation for the casino of slightly over 800,000 patrons. We will get to the next slide which shows you where they're coming from in a minute. But based on that level of visitation, and that is based on demographics of folks that do live within a 60-mile drive time of this facility, we feel the facility can open in its first year and reach nearly 10 \$65 million in gaming revenue. And as the facility matures because of its location, because of its 11 12 proximity to New Jersey and to New York and because of 13 --- as the director of the Lottery Commission of the 14 State of New York mentioned just the other day, the 15 lack of current gaming penetration in the New York metropolitan market, we feel that this facility can 16 17 easily exceed \$100 million of gaming revenue within five years, as it approaches a stabilized operating 18 19 environment.

We think that's important again because it does not take revenue from existing gaming facilities in the Commonwealth. It produces revenue from neighboring locations. And as we look at the next slide, which really is a map, and I apologize, it's not very easy to read, but those demographics

that we've identified in that previous slide and that revenue potential is strictly in that ring of 60minute drive times to the east, not to the west, 3 because of course, of the existence Pocono --- Mohegan Sun at Pocono Downs and the existence of Mount Airy. So we look at the ability to penetrate the New Jersey marketplace into New York. And quite frankly, as this facility matures, it will be the only gaming facility in the mid-Atlantic region that has a timeshare 10 component to it. There, of course, are timeshare units available in Atlantic City, but they are not at 11 or in conjunction with any of the casinos, making this 12 a very unique destination, not only in the mid-13 14 Atlantic region but throughout the United States.

With that level of amenities, that ability for timeshare sales and that facility with a casino, we feel very strongly that we can penetrate even more deeply into the outer boroughs of New York and the New York suburban counties, Bergen and Passaic in New Jersey, as well as Westchester, Rockland and Orange in New York, to really not only achieve those revenue projections that you've seen, but probably end up being a bit conservative and exceed those revenue projections in future years. So we thought that it was important for the Board, as well as the public, to

recognize as we look at this economic model where we see the opportunity coming.

The challenge, of course, will be, as it always is, what happens in New Jersey. And I think, very comfortably at least for the foreseeable future, given the reports that have come out of the current administration with respect to casino gaming in the State of New Jersey, I would not envision that there would be any facility in Northern New Jersey that would come about that would compete with this facility before such time as it is able to mature as a full-blown destination with those timeshare amenities as really a unique destination here in the Poconos of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. So with that, I'd like to turn it back to Andy.

## MR. WORTHINGTON:

Thanks, Steve. To conclude our presentation, we'd like to do some --- just cover all of our bases in terms of what we need to present to the Board for our local impact. We are a strong supporter of Middle Smithfield Township's plan growth. We have a longstanding agreement with the township, where we provide trash and snow removal on the roads surrounding the resort. Our proposed plan supports the county's growth objectives for open space

preservation. And as I stated earlier, the infrastructure on our resort and in the township are more than sufficient to support the addition of the casino. And we have some bullet points supporting that on the screen.

I'd like to say police, fire and safety services are provided on the property by the Pennsylvania State Police, Bushkill Ambulance Corps, Bushkill Fire Company and our in-house public safety department, and we have close working relationships with all of those organizations. Those services already exceed the required service levels and will continue to be more than sufficient with the addition of the gaming facility.

With respect to traffic, we've operated our existing event center for many years, and we've brought in many national acts, including Bill Cosby, Gladys Knight and lots of ESPN televised boxing.

Those events have drawn as many as 2,000 people to the center, with a concentrated arrival and departure time, all of which pose no excessive traffic load. By contrast, gaming traffic patterns reflect random arrivals. And with the use of our resort shuttle, guests will park once and go to the casino from their rooms. Additionally, the construction of the final

phase of the Route 209 bypass project began last month. That project will alleviate any remaining traffic issues in Marshalls Creek when it is completed.

With respect to responsible gaming, we're committed to working proactively to address the issue of problem gaming. We drew up a comprehensive plan, addressing both issues of problem and underage gaming. Our employees will be trained in the necessary aspects of responsible gaming and identification of underage gamblers. We will treat persons who request help with confidentiality, professionalism and respect. We are committed to working with the Board staff to maintain policies and programs.

One of the things we're proud of is the diversity of our existing workforce and our active Diversity Committee. We're committed to maintaining a talented staff of employees who reflect the diversity of our region and of our guests. We employ approved vendors and suppliers to ensure a fair representation of minority and women-owned businesses. We offer our employees many benefits, such as a company-sponsored 401(k), paid vacation, holiday and sick time, company-paid life and health insurance. We offer tuition reimbursement to our employees, health fairs

with free medical screenings, assistance with smoking 1 2 cessation and weight management and discounts on property amenity usage. We also believe in higher 3 education and work closely both with Northampton County Community College and East Stroudsburg University in developing student internship programs and on-the-job training. In addition, we've made contributions to their capital campaigns and scholarship programs. The addition of the gaming 10 facility will enhance our commitment to the community, provide an additional amenity for our resort quests 11 and add jobs, all of which will help strengthen the 12 local, regional and state economies. 13

new jobs for this region,, will generate \$10 million in annual property tax relief, will draw mainly out-of-state players, will be the only applicant in this state with more rooms than authorized gaming positions, which I think is important for a Category 3 License to be able to show that they will be generating enough traffic from the guests at their resort. And we will generate approximately \$46 million annually in state tax revenues. Again, our zoning is already approved, and that means we'll be the quickest to market as well. So that's the end of

my presentation. But as Marie said, I would like to reserve any remaining time for rebuttal. Thank you.

Good morning, Hearing Officer Edmiston, 12 members of the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board. I appreciate you giving me this opportunity to present before you. My name is John J. Siptroth. I am State Representative for the 189th Legislative District for Monroe and Pike Counties. I am here today to present the case for awarding the final Pennsylvania Category 3 Gaming License to the Bushkill Group for the Fernwood Hotel & Resort Casino.

I have been a lifelong resident of the 21 region and after serving in the United States Navy began my career in public service 40 years ago as a volunteer firefighter. I served as a Smithfield Township Supervisor for 15 years and was elected to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives in 2005.

this capacity I stand before you today.

2 My support for the Bushkill Group 3 application is both for their experience in the Pocono Mountain hospitality industry and the economic benefits that would be returned to Monroe and Pike Counties with the addition of gaming venue within its borders. Unlike other counties who receive tax revenue from gaming, Monroe County is unique in its mandate to share the gaming tax with surrounding 10 counties. This fact adds to the argument that awarding a license in the Poconos benefits a larger 11 12 geographic area.

I have known the owners of the Bushkill Group for many years and can vouch for their integrity, expertise and civic pride. Fernwood Hotel & Resort is a recognized leader in resort vacation experiences and has been operating in the Pocono Mountains since the 1920s. It draws its customers from primarily outside of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, therefore the taxes taken from its current operation, compounded with the addition of gaming, will represent tax revenue to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania that is primarily paid by nonresidents without the traditional associated service costs.

The Fernwood Casino project is expected

to bring into the state gross gaming revenues of over 2 \$107 million per year when stabilized. 3 translates to a state tax contribution of over \$46 million and projected property tax relief of \$10 million. In a time when our state budget has significant deficient issues, this is much needed The awarding of a license to Fernwood will revenue. also bring an additional 360 casino jobs, 180 construction jobs and additional resort operation jobs 10 to Monroe and Pike County in a time when our unemployment is in double digits. 11

I recognize that there are residents who think the addition of the casino on the Fernwood site will create additional traffic congestion. I respectfully disagree. I have personally attended many events at the Fernwood Center --- Event Center, with over a thousand people in attendance and never experienced any difficulty getting here. Fernwood Resort hosts numerous festivals throughout the year which attract large crowds in addition to its registered guests and those families vacationing in the timeshare units.

Significant road improvements have already been made at Fernwood as a part of the first phase of the Marshalls Creek bypass project, including

enhancements to the intersections and traffic lights 1 here on Route 209 and the addition of turning lanes 2 3 into the resort. These improvements have resulted in greater public safety and better traveling conditions on Route 209 through the resort throughout the year and during special events and festival days. traffic conditions are set to improve further. month's groundbreaking or the final phase of Route 209 project represents the accumulation of years of my 10 hard work in Harrisburg on behalf of my constituents to complete this longstanding road improvement. 11 Construction of the traffic relief project will begin 12 13 shortly and continue through 2011 and will result in 14 superior flow of traffic to and from Bushkill and the 15 Marshalls Creek exit on Interstate 80. This traffic corridor is used by a large proportion of the current 16 17 and anticipated out-of-state quests to Fernwood 18 Resort, who use this interstate to enter Pennsylvania 19 at the Delaware Water Gap toll bridge.

As you are aware, this is the Bushkill Group's last chance in receiving a Category 3 License. When the table games legislation was passed, a third Category 3 License was added. But also added were changes in the distance requirements that will permanently prevent Fernwood from ever being eligible

to receive a license if this one is not awarded to them now. After four years and working with the Board to fulfill the requirements, find partners and to 3 secure financing in a severely depressed economy, the Bushkill Group is ready to move forward with a great project. Another applicant will have the chance to apply for the third license. Fernwood will not. will be a terrible blow to all of the great people at Fernwood and this region to not award them a license.

I would wholeheartedly support this application and respectfully request your full consideration in anticipation of a successful outcome. Thank you very much. The rest of my testimony is in the written form.

of today's hearing.

Middle Smithfield Township is a second-class township and is governed by the Second-Class Township Code. And the Code charges the supervisors with several responsibilities, and among those are governing the township, executing legislative, executive and administrative powers to assure sound fiscal management, and securing the health, safety and welfare of its citizens.

In 2008 I testified before this Board that the elected officials of the host municipality unanimously supported the Fernwood application at that time. And although the membership of the Board has changed, the position of the Board has not. Middle Smithfield Township's elected officials continue to remain unanimously in support of and fully endorse this Category 3 License application for Fernwood.

In their governance of Middle Smithfield Township, the supervisors understand that if this

license is awarded to Fernwood, the license approval 1 is another link in the chain of the sound fiscal management for the township. And that sound fiscal 3 management goes hand in hand with securing the health, safety and welfare of its citizens. The decision to unanimously support this application was thoroughly vetted by each of the supervisors individually, and it was a very easy one in the end for them to decide to unanimously support it as a Board. First and 10 foremost, the supervisors reviewed the township's own regulations and determined that the township zoning 11 ordinance already allows for casino use at this site. 12

The Fernwood Hotel & Resort has been developed over the past 80 years to provide opportunities for a mix of commercial, resort, residential and other compatible uses. The resort's master plan promotes unified and coordinated development with interior traffic access, and the overall resort has been designed to promote development that does not create conflicts with neighboring zoning districts and strives to preserve unique environmental features of the land. By following a unified and coordinated development scheme, Fernwood is able to boast a full-scale hotel with endless amenities, tantalizing restaurants,

exciting nightclubs, a Winter Fun Center, challenging 1 2 18-hole golf course and more. The opportunity for 3 continued well-managed growth at the resort exists with undeveloped land, simply waiting to add endless amenities. For these very reasons the Fernwood Hotel & Resort was approved in 2004 as a resort complex commercial resort development in Middle Smithfield Township. And the 2010 Zoning Ordinance of Middle Smithfield Township specifically provides that gaming 10 uses, including casinos, may be allowed as part of a resort complex if the establishment is licensed by the 11 Commonwealth. 12

Secondly, the township reviewed its subdivision land development ordinance. This project, as presented, will fully comply with these regulations. During the spring of 2010 the township approved a lot consolidation plan so no new subdivision applications are necessary for the applicant. Since the applicant intends to retrofit an existing arena structure into a casino, no new land development applications will be required either. The host municipality commends the resort on its development approach which strives to balance economic and environmental impacts with social vitality. Their strategy to reconstruct an existing facility fully

supports the smart growth objectives promoted by Monroe County. If awarded this license, Fernwood will not be delayed by township zoning, subdivision or land regulation, and they have sufficient sewer and water capacity at site. This project is shovel ready. And that simple fact of being shovel ready matters.

In Auditor General Jack Wagner's 2009 Special Performance Audit, the Department of Auditor General found that gaming jobs were indeed filled by 10 Pennsylvanians and that diversity hiring, i.e. women and minorities, has been positive, but the pace at 11 which the gaming jobs were being filled was slower 12 13 than anticipated because, at the time of the report, 14 only 8 out of 14 casino licenses were open and 15 operating. Fernwood's preexisting compliance with the township regulations, its partnership with Penn 16 National, a financially sound company and an industry 17 leader in diversity hiring, are all reassuring factors 18 to the township that this applicant, if awarded this 19 20 license, will further the Commonwealth's goal, as well as this township's goal to hire a diversified 21 22 Pennsylvanian workforce, and the township is reassured 23 that Fernwood will begin construction on this project in a prompt and efficient manner. 24

Thirdly, the officials examined the

projected revenues expected to be derived if Fernwood is awarded this license. The anticipated revenue that will be generated by the issuance of a Category 3 3 Gaming License in Middle Smithfield Township is significant. The resort is already the township's largest employer, with over 500 employees, and it is anticipated that the reconstruction of the arena into a first-class gaming facility will bring an estimated \$28 million in revenue to the region, plus another \$11 million in revenue from machines and other equipment 10 which will attribute to both the region and other 11 12 areas and will support approximately 180 local 13 construction jobs. The project, once completed, will create an estimated minimum of 360 full-time jobs. 14 15 That's 360 full-time gaming jobs, plus hundreds of additional resort and local area businesses will also 16 generate jobs, resulting from increased activity. 17

The addition of the gaming facility will also generate significantly higher tax revenues. The applicants project that if they are issued this license, the Fernwood casino will result in an additional \$10.4 million per year toward statewide property tax relief and in excess of \$4 million per year in additional local tax relief to help offset local property taxes.

Approval of the Fernwood Gaming License 1 2 is also expected to generate an additional 151,000 3 visitors per year to the resort, a substantial increase from their already 425,000 annual quests. The host municipality is excited that the proposed expansion is projected to create both temporary and permanent jobs and additional tax revenues, particularly because 34.8 percent of the land in this township is tax exempt. Stated differently, 11,493 acres out of 32,960 acres is not subject to taxation. 10 And this is because that land is comprised of state 11 game land, state forest, National Park Service 12 property and so forth. Awarding Fernwood this license 13 14 will generate much needed revenue for the municipality 15 and it will allow the township to continue making municipal infrastructure improvements while 16 17 maintaining sound fiscal management and it will bring 18 additional revenue to local businesses by increasing the anticipated number of visitors per year. 19 20

Township officials then shifted their focus to the health, safety and welfare of its residents because they want to be certain that the services provided before the issuance of the license and the services provided after the issuance of this license remain at a minimum status quo, and more

preferably, would be improved for its residents. It's very important to the supervisors of Middle Smithfield Township that the issuance of the gaming license in their municipality does not overburden local emergency service providers, be they firefighters, ambulance crew members, police officers, and that the additional tourists generated by the license do not overburden our local road system.

3

The host municipality is served by the 10 Pennsylvania State Police. It is served by four EMS providers and three volunteer fire companies. 11 township contributes both financially and with in-kind 12 13 contributes to support these service providers. 14 Revenue from the gaming facility will allow the 15 township to be even more generous with their annual contributions. Officials believe that since the 16 proposal is for the conversion of an arena facility to 17 18 a gaming facility, no additional new burden will be 19 imposed on the service providers. The existing 2.0 service levels for emergency services at the Fernwood 21 site currently exceed level needs. Township officials 22 believe that future service level needs will also be fully met and that this license will not burden EMS 23 24 providers. The license will also not burden the local 25 road system.

In the past several years road 1 2 improvements have been made to Route 209, leading to 3 and from the Fernwood Resort. And the recent start of the final phase of the Marshalls Creek bypass, now commonly called the traffic relief project, PennDOT's road improvements to Route 209 can and will adequately handle all additional traffic generated by the gaming facility and will not overburden local roads. Fernwood has been working for the past several years 10 with the host municipality through public and private 11 partnership on road repair, snow removal, trash removal and maintenance, along with portions of 12 roadways that lead to and adjoin their facility. 13

Once the municipal officials determine that the governing ordinances permitted this proposed project, that sound fiscal management supported this project and that the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the community was supplemented by this project, the Board looked at Fernwood's community and corporate spirit.

The host municipality is very proud of all of its community and civic-minded residents and businesses. The Bushkill Group, Inc., and the Fernwood Hotel & Resort and its employees are fine examples of corporate and individual generosity within

this community. Corporate contributions to 1 2 organizations like the United Way of Monroe County, Meals on Wheels, Bushkill Outreach and Pocono Healthy 3 Community alliance, just a small smidgen of organizations that benefit from their contributions. They help to support these programs that benefit children and others in need throughout Monroe County. As Governor Rendell has noted, and I quote, the future of Pennsylvania's great places in part depends on our 10 ability to transform local economies and great jobs through tourism revenue. It is up to key stakeholders 11 on the front lines of economic development in their 12 13 communities to work together to promote tourism in a 14 way that preserves heritage and embraces progress. 15 Middle Smithfield Township is one of 16 Pennsylvania's great places. It is the gateway to the 17 Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area. 18 community is and has always been a year-round resort 19 destination. By supporting Fernwood's application,

opportunity that will transform its local economy, as well as the state's economy, by bringing new and temporary and permanent jobs, increasing tax revenue and increasing tourism revenue. With 26.5 million adults living within a 100-mile radius of the Fernwood

2 I started my presentation with a 3 reference to the Second-Class Township Code because elected officials must be quided by the laws that govern them when they are making decisions on whether to lend their support to a project. But with all decisions comes common sense and personal intuition. The supervisors, like myself, know the individuals that operate the Fernwood Hotel & Resort on both a personal and a professional level, and we know them to 10 be highly educated, highly motivated and highly 11 ethical individuals. 12

As members of the Gaming Board, you have two tasks. Your first task is determining who gets the license and where gambling facilities will be located throughout the Commonwealth. The Board should be pleased that you have an applicant before you that, to my recollection received no opposition at the first hearing, and to my knowledge, remains virtually unopposed. If awarded this license, Fernwood will not be delayed by township zoning, subdivision or land regulations. It is financially sound, and it is shovel ready.

As members of the Gaming Board, your second task, once the license is awarded, is equally

imposing. And to quote your Chairman Fajt, your 1 2 second task is, as I quote, to closely watch casino 3 operations to protect the interests of all Pennsylvanians by implementing a fair regulatory framework to ensure that the gaming industry in this Commonwealth is held to the highest ethical standards. Middle Smithfield Township officials believe that by awarding a license to Fernwood, you will have completed your first task and you will have made your 10 second task that much easier because you can rest assured that Fernwood's corporate officers will 11 12 operate their casino to the highest ethical standards. 13 For all these reasons, Middle Smithfield Township 14 respectfully requests the Gaming Board to award 15 Fernwood Hotel & Resort the Commonwealth's final Category 3 License. 16 17 On behalf of Middle Smithfield Township, 18 the Middle Smithfield Township Board of Supervisors and myself personally, I thank each and every one of 19 20 you for your time today and for the opportunity to 21 make this presentation. # MR. WUNDER:

Good morning, members of the Gaming
Commission, Gaming Control Board and distinguished
guests. My name is Ralph Wunder, and I'm the Public
Affairs Director for Middle Smithfield Township,
speaking on behalf of the members of the Middle
Smithfield Township Board of Directors and
Supervisors. And by the way, Suzanne, I promise I'll
be very short.

The township may have to redo its own sign ordinance to post our message large enough to the Bushkill Group. Your project is welcome here. The applicants for this casino license, the Bushkill Group, are people very well known to us in this community. As the owners/operators of the historic Fernwood Resort, we know what a class act they are as individuals and what a well-managed establishment they run. Fernwood has long catered to family vacationers, providing them safe healthy, wholesome, quality family entertainment. Their pride in the resort is exemplified by the immaculate condition in which the resort is kept, the professional skill with which it is operated and by the loyalty of generations of

returning patrons. There's no guess work about whether your experience during a visit to Fernwood will be a positive one. Today they seek a casino license. We have every reason to believe they will excel at the operation of such an enterprise as well. In fact, there is evidence aplenty that these are exactly the kind of trusted neighbors you would want at the helm of a locally-owned and operated casino.

Andy Worthington worked for years as a member of the company who ran the locally-founded Fernwood Resort before acquiring the resort through his own investment partnership, and is a well-known and respected member of our community. The same is true with the other members of the Bushkill Group. These are exactly the kind of neighbors and local community leaders you want operating a casino. To put an even sharper point on it, what they are not is a group of drive-by investors running the operation from a tax-sheltered hammock in the Caribbean. These are our neighbors, friends we've known for years, people we trust and whose efforts bear the hallmark of integrity and quality.

Middle Smithfield Township welcomes the

Bushkill Group's efforts to operate a casino at

Fernwood. Thanks in large measure to the vigilance of

the Pennsylvania Gaming Commission, the history of gaming in Pennsylvania is that of a well-managed endeavor, free of a lot of the problems that have plagued casino operations in other states. And that's no small consideration as we weigh the impact of such an enterprise on our township.

And speaking of impact on our township, let me underscore what the economic impact of the casino will be to our community, although I think a lot of people have touched on this already on several occasions. At a time when the county and state are losing jobs at a historic and alarming rate, this business will bring an estimated 900 new temporary and permanent jobs to the community, a number of them well-paying positions. The impact of this enterprise to us is significant. It is estimated the new casino will bring \$107 million in annual revenue to the community. Once this region generated a great deal of income for the state in its heyday as a resort and entertainment mecca in the '50s, '60s and '70s, rivaling other renown entertainment centers, such as New York's legendary Catskills Resorts and similar areas. But after a period of contraction and change, the natural evolution of business, the Poconos are beginning to blossom anew as today's investors see a

new vision for the area. Data centers, financial services, high-tech laboratories, medical facilities are beginning to diversify the economic profile of the region. Even the nature of the entertainment industry itself is changing, as evidenced by this popular resorts casino application.

Indeed, statistics prove that only two years ago as much of the rest of the state was experiencing flat or negative growth, Northeastern 10 Pennsylvania was leading the entire state with roughly three-percent positive annual growth. And I would 11 12 suggest to the Gaming Board that the very reason for that positive growth is also the reason this casino 13 14 will very likely prove to be the most successful 15 business generator for the state out of all the applicants currently under consideration. 16 17 has a name. It is called Route 80. Or perhaps I 18 should call by its formal name, Route 80, the New York 19 to Eastern Pennsylvania Commuter Corridor. Every day 20 30,000 new Pennsylvania residents commute from their 21 homes in Pennsylvania to jobs in New Jersey and New 22 York and every weekend even many more come from 23 America's greatest metropolitan population center to 24 vacation, shop and find entertainment in Eastern 25 Pennsylvania. It's very clear to see from looking at

1 a map of our region how strategically it is located to serve tens of millions of people, new revenue brought to Pennsylvania from beyond the state's borders. believe the Fernwood Casino is strategically located, even predestined, to be a success. And our success is Pennsylvania's success.

Good morning, members of the Commission and Hearing officer. Could you tell me how much time I have? I wasn't quite clear on whether I'm the three-minute or the five-minute type speaker.

## MS. MCCOOL:

I won't do that to anybody. Okay. My 14 name is Suzanne McCool. I'm the Chair of the Monroe County Board of Commissioners. I live in East Stroudsburg. I have lived in Monroe County my entire life. I'm a retired educator, and I flunked retirement and became a County Commissioner, one of the reasons why I'm here today.

A County Commissioner wears many hats, 21 and we have a plan for our county. And years ago we 22 wrote a plan called Monroe 2020. What will our county look like in the year 2020? I believe we have fulfilled one part of that plan in a very big way and that is the open space program that we've had. We

1 have preserved almost 20 acres of beautiful open space and agricultural lands since we did that. Another arm 3 of our plan is for economic development and to make sure that our citizens have jobs. And I believe that economic development at this point is one of our number one --- or is our number one priority. that is why I am really in favor of the Fernwood Bushkill Group getting this Category 3 License. know what it will do. I know what has happened with 10 the Mount Airy Casino taking a brown field and making a beautiful resort there. And the monies we've 11 12 received in the county we have been able to put to very, very good use through our local share account. 13 14 And I have to admit, I am one of those people that 15 contribute to that share account every week when I go up to Mount Airy with my girlfriends. 16

Now, Fernwood, of course, with a Category 3 License, this will be more like an amenity to the people coming here to this beautiful resort. And many people come here for the horseback riding or the winter sports or the beautiful hiking. But you know, in every family they have different interests. Some of the people will like to play the slot machines, like I do, or they may want to do the table games.

Fernwood is a well-known resort, and the

And Pennsylvania really, I won't go through all the figures that were given to you, but 11 stands to gain a great deal of revenue from this 12 13 resort.

The Poconos is just such a wonderful place to live, and there are so many things happening here. There's so much to choose from to do. And I know with Mount Airy and the wonderful talent that they get there in the clubs, my friends and I have enjoyed it. And I know Fernwood has had many festivals and many of the other great talent that comes to the area. So we don't always have to travel anymore out of our area to get, you know, some of the best entertainment there is.

I don't have prepared remarks, because

I'm the type of person that gets up in front of people

and I wing it, but I would like to say some people make gaming into a moral issue. And maybe I did at 3 one time until I was honest with myself and realized that people have played games for centuries. Gaming is something people do, you know, whether it's Christmas morning and you're trying out all the new board games or video games with your kids or whatever. People like to be entertained. And slot machines and table games are just another form of entertainment. 10 And I don't look upon it as a moral issue. I'm a person that goes to church and a type that sings in 11 the choir and things like that, and yet I truly enjoy 12 going and seeing people having a good time, you know, 13 up at, let's say, Mount Airy, where I go. 14 15

Now, I know people in different regions feel differently about it. I have relatives in Gettysburg, and their tourism is heritage tourism.

And I understand there's a group --- a large group that is opposed to that because they look upon the battlefield as hallowed ground, and I do, too. And I visit my relatives every couple of years, and we always visit the Visitors Center and the battlefield. So I'm not sure that that is what Gettysburg needs, and I know we're shovel ready to go up here. I don't know much about the other resort that is vying for it

from Southwestern Pennsylvania. I do believe all of these places want the economic growth and the --- you know, the money that will come to their area. But if the State of Pennsylvania is to make the most money, they should go with the venue that is really going to do that.

It's terrible to get anything through with the permitting. Everything is ready to go here and I really think that it would be an ideal location for it. And I will be happy to see the tax revenues as a result of all of that. So if I were a gambling person, which I am, I would place my money on Fernwood as the best bet. Thank you.

And by them coming to our facility, of course, they then patronize the 10 restaurants and other great things in our community. And I think it's important that as the Poconos 11 continues to develop, as it changes back to a leader 12 13 in tourism, I think we were away for a little while, 14 as we start to come back from that, it's important 15 that we have things that attract people to our region, and of course, indirectly or directly attract them to 16 17 our performing arts center, which is funded by ticket sales completely. So it's important that there's new 18 people coming to our region, that they enjoy what 19 20 they're going to do and that they have choices. we'd like to be one of those choices. 21 22

With Fernwood's application, with their --- I believe that they'll have more rooms filled. We are certainly a benefactor of the hotel tax in attracting people, and so I believe that, you

know, it's going to continue to support what we do as an organization and what our focus and goal is, which is economic development for our entire region.

Definitely, Fernwood is --- I looked at the applicants. I'm sure they're all great. But when we look at what Fernwood does in our community, before they ever even thought about getting a gaming license and perhaps what they'll do after getting a gaming license, I think that they stand head and shoulders above all the rest.

When we talk about tourism, and I'm sure that other folks will talk about it, but again, we think a little bit more selfishly, I guess, because we recognize that tourism is what drives our performing arts center. The ability to attract world-class acts often is based on our proximity to world-class facilities. In this day and age, people look for other entertainment items, and gaming is certainly one of them. So again, I think that certainly Fernwood has great people. You're going to hear that all day long. I don't believe anybody will stand here and say that these are not upstanding citizens of our community. I don't believe anybody could stand here and honestly say that Fernwood is not going to be a responsible member of our community. I would hope

that everyone will stand here and say that the finances of our community in some ways are riding on Fernwood's success. They're not the only one, but success from one resort begets success.

And I can just use this little example. 5 If I look at --- over the last 80 years, and Sherman has been around for 80 years as well, of all the resorts that were in this region, at this moment, in this particular corridor of Middle Smithfield, this is 10 the only resort still standing. It's the largest resort. It helps bring lots of people to our region. 11 And we get to get a little piece of that and so do all 12 the businesses in downtown Stroudsburg and the 1.3 14 businesses in Smithfield Township. And of course, 15 through the support of the county and the hotel tax and other issues, other areas are going to be 16 affected. So although Middle Smithfield is excited to 17 have this, so should be the rest of our county and 18 community, as we continue to build our infrastructure 19 20 with support from gaming funds, with support from 21 corporate partners like Fernwood Resort, and we 22 continue to build the reputation of the Pocono Mountains. And by default, the rest of us also get 23 24 that reputation.

So it's important, I think, again, beyond

all the simple parts of gaming and the immediate 2 response to those that are very close, township and county, I think the rest of us that survive in this community based on tourism need the support of Fernwood. We need you to support Fernwood's bid to continue to grow, to be successful, and to be a great corporate partner. I appreciate it.

#### MR. WILGUS:

Good morning. My name is Carl Wilgus. 17 live in Tannersville, Monroe County, and I am the president and CEO of the Pocono Mountain Visitors Bureau. On behalf of the nearly 27,000 people employed in the hospitality industry, I'd like to 21 | welcome the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board to the 22 Pocono Mountains of Northeast Pennsylvania.

We are the official tourism promotion agencies for the counties of Carbon, Monroe, Pike and Wayne. We represent the tourism, visitor and

1 hospitality industry in the region. As you may know, but it does bear repeating, tourism is the state's second largest industry. And in the Pocono Mountains 3 it is the number one industry. The economic impact of a tourism-based economy in the 2008 data tells us that more than \$2.1 billion in visitor spending took place, resulting in \$302 million in federal, state and local taxes and an \$811 million payroll. While these are impressive numbers, we know that the travel and 10 tourism industry is a very competitive business. 11 just because our past has been successful, it does not 12 automatically mean our future will be. We must always be striving to pay attention to our customer needs and 13 14 expectations.

15 The Pocono Mountains are going through a renaissance of some significance these days. 16 17 Historically well known as the destination of choice 18 for honeymooners, our survival as a destination 19 requires that we be highly regarded in other facets. 20 Sizable investments in private industry in the hundreds of millions of dollars over the past few 21 22 years and into the future, in new lodging facilities and attractions, are laying a foundation for a new and 23 24 improved tourism experience for visitors to the Pocono 25 Mountains. But even with all of this, the visitor

experience is not complete without an equally robust supply of amenities, such as shopping, dining and various entertainment options. For more than 24 3 million persons, 78 percent of which are adults, who visit the Pocono Mountains on an annual basis, we desperately need to make available a plethora of options for these millions of visitors to gleefully part with their hard-earned cash. The addition of gaming to the Fernwood Resort, which I understand 10 draws 84 percent of their nearly half a million annual visitors from out of the Commonwealth, will be a 11 welcome enhancement to its already rich amenity 12 environment. 13

In a 2006 report done by the Travel Industry Association of America on domestic travel, it clearly indicated that six percent of the nation's 234 million leisure trips take part in gaming. That is a market opportunity of more than 62 million household trips. For this group of travelers, gaming can be seen as a recreation and/or entertainment expense that is integral to their overall travel experience. From both a professional and personal perspective, it's my observation that the Bushkill Group day in and day out 24 have continually stepped up to the plate as one of the most philanthropic community-focused businesses in the

Pocono Mountains. As a well-established locally-owned 1 2 business that has been operating since 1921, they know and appreciate the importance of giving back to the 3 community and practice it on a daily basis. I know they will act as a responsible operator, conduct themselves professionally and provide a quality experience for our visitors.

I'm speaking for the more than 500 business members when I say granting a gaming license to the Bushkill Group will continue to improve the 11 positioning of the Pocono Mountains as a favorable 12 destination for leisure travelers and will improve the 13 business climate not only for the Fernwood group but 14 also for the businesses throughout the region. Thank you.

# MR. LEONARD:

24 Good morning. I appreciate the 25 opportunity to appear in front of you today. My name is Chuck Leonard, Tobyhanna, Pennsylvania. I have
been in the --- spent 30 years in the economic
development business. I presently am the Executive
Director of Pocono Mountains Economic Development
Corporation. And we have a number of affiliates in
which I'm in charge of, and they include Monroe County
Industrial Development Authority, Pocono Mountains
Industrial Park Authority and Pocono Mountains
Industries, all of which I represent today in support
of this application.

A lot of what I was going to say has already been said. And I'm going to try to edit myself so I'm not redundant today. There are a lot of people here that don't think I can do this in ten minutes. But I think as a result of the fact I can do some editing, I think I will stay within my time frame.

Obviously, our interest in this project is related to the jobs and the tax base it will generate for the community. These things are very critical at this time. We're in a down economy, and any jobs that we can attract to this community is absolutely critical for our future. Add to that the county and the municipal revenue. It's estimated \$4 million on an annual basis. It's critical to our

local municipalities and our county government stability to deliver services to the people of Monroe County.

This project will --- and this gaming 4 license will help grow the business and it will attract dollars here that we don't presently have. Everyone has mentioned the jobs, the 360 casino jobs. I saw a number, 900. That was a new number to me. But I think that definitely the spinoffs that we'll 10 enjoy from this project will be significant. And we need every job we can attract in the community. 11 12 the reason for that is that in recent months we've had 13 closings and downsizings that have laid over 1,100 14 people off. And so as a consequence, and we're 15 running around a 10.5 percent unemployment rate, and any job that we can attract is important. 16

I should mention, as a matter of disclosure, our agency, the Monroe County Industrial Development Authority, is an eligible applicant for the local share account monies that have been made available through the Mount Airy facility. And this money has been absolutely critical to around 17 projects that will ultimately create somewhere between 1,500 and 2,500 jobs. And so we're very enthusiastic about the potential for increasing that pool to do

projects within Monroe County.

Carl has already handled the tourism side quite well, but I'll have to --- in order to use up some of my time I do want to add some emphasis to what he said. You know, travelers have been visiting the Poconos for more than a hundred years. And as he indicated, most of those years it was extremely successful. And while some of our competitors have frayed as the years have gone by, the Poconos still remains the number one rated attraction in the State of Pennsylvania. And I think that that's a significant issue in regard to the building on Market Place and the attraction of people to the community and the success of the future casino.

Our community also retains a series of advantages that will deliver a positive return to the State of Pennsylvania in regard to visitors, as we've mentioned already, and it's related to the Delaware Water Gap National Recreation Area. Millions of people come to that. I don't think anyone mentioned the Pocono 500 and the NASCAR races that are here. And millions of people come to the Poconos and millions of people --- that's potentially millions of people that can entertain themselves at the future casino.

mentioned in previous testimony that they've undergone
--- we've undergone a renaissance in the Poconos.
We've had new amenities come. We've had some
attractions, new attractions come to the community.
We've had some destination hotels come to the
community. And in order to continue to grow
Fernwood's market share and base of 425,000 guests per
year, the casino will be a critical component in
growing that marketplace.

It's already been mentioned that more 11 than 84 percent of the customers come from outside the 12 13 state. It's an expert industry. We're exporting 14 services to New Jersey, New York and other locations. 15 I think that the fact that we're sending services to other states and bringing their dollars here I think 16 17 is a critical aspect of the quality that we can 18 deliver here at Fernwood. It will help the state maximize a return on putting a license here in Monroe 19 20 County. And we also hope that Bushkill --- the 21 Bushkill Group will receive the recognition that they 22 deserve for being persistent and pursuing this I think that they've worked very hard and 23 license. have done a great job staying in there and slugging it 24 25 out as we go forward.

Now, this is truly a homegrown business. 1 2 I think as we go through the campaign coming up, 3 you're going to hear a little bit more about that from the two gubernatorial nominees who both, in their economic development papers, have emphasized growing local industries. These people live here, they work They have decades of experience in this business and they contribute to the community, and we hope that that is an issue that this committee will 10 take into serious consideration as you make your decision. 11

In closing, we believe that the Bushkill Group is your best applicant. They are a Pennsylvania-based tourism enterprise with a successful track record selling Pennsylvania to thousands of visitors every week. We believe that the Poconos and the Bushkill Group will deliver the best return to the State of Pennsylvania for this license. People of the Poconos are accustomed to welcoming the world to our location. It has been our business for 21 more than a hundred years. We urge you to award the license to Bushkill Group. Thank you very much.

I'm the past president, as well as a current Board member. My family has lived in Monroe 10 County since 1973, when there was only three banks in town. I'm a commercial loan officer. Now there is 11 over 12 banks, and there are 30 branches in Monroe 12 County. When I moved here, there were only ten. So 13 14 that's a testimony to the growth of this fine 15 community. Working as a commercial loan officer for 16 17 the last 30 years, I witnessed firsthand the unconditional financial support and time commitment 18 the Bushkill owners and employees have made to the 19 20 Monroe County community and the resort industry. They 21 are a critical component to the ongoing business 22 success and community enrichment of the Poconos. 23 About 11 years ago --- after 11 years of the United

Way not having a golf tournament, the United Way went

to Andy Worthington and asked him to help restart the

golf tournament. He offered his complete commitment 1 and support to that event. In two weeks the Fernwood Resort will host the Tenth Annual United Way Golf 3 This event has become the largest spectacular. special event that the United Way has each year and totally has raised over \$200,000 towards their annual campaign. This event would not be possible without the gracious donations of the golf course for the event and the assistance of key company employees who 10 donate their time to make this event a very great Sixty-five (65) percent of the revenue from 11 success. that tournament comes from local vendors and the 12 contacts that Fernwood Resort has outside of Monroe 13 14 The Chief Legal Counsel, head of purchasing County. 15 director and manager of financial services, and the golf course manager have put many hours in in 16 17 preparation of obtaining golfers, sponsors and prizes. 18 It has evolved to become the top fundraising golf 19 event in the Poconos.

Combined with their annual corporate financial support, the employee campaign at the Bushkill Group continually ranks among the top five businesses every year in total dollars given to the United Way. Employees also donate hundreds of hours every year of approved time off for participating in

the Annual United Way Day of Caring and assisting local nonprofit social service agencies. United Way is truly gracious for the support the Fernwood Group has given to us over the years.

On a personal note, my wife Ann is a job coach with the Intermediate Unit 20. 2 Good morning. My name is Elizabeth 3 Koster, and I am the president and CEO of Fitzmaurice Community Services. I have been a resident of Monroe County most of my life and have been leading Fitzmaurice Community Services since 1966, which was founded by my family -- I've been leading since 1976, which was founded by my family in 1966. I testified on Fernwood's behalf three years ago, and I'm here again in support of their application, a fact that is 10 even more significant now that this is Fernwood's last 11 12 opportunity for a license.

At Fitzmaurice Community Services we provide community support for individuals with developmental disabilities and mental illness. Our services include community housing, personal care homes, independent living supports, clinical supports and recreational services. Most of our work is conducted through contracts with Carbon-Monroe-Pike Mental Health/Mental Retardation programs and directly with the State of Pennsylvania. These funded services provide for the basic needs of individuals, and so if a need arises beyond the basics we depend on the generosity of the community to help fund those needs. Some recent examples of this would be helping an

individual pay for his dental bill, paying for 1 medication for an individual while she's waiting for her insurance coverage, purchasing bus tickets for 3 individuals. We recently had an individual referred to one of our homes who had virtually no usable clothing. Our fundraising dollars paid for a complete start-up wardrobe for him until he could get on his feet. And it's interesting, I was preparing these remarks last week, and just yesterday I signed another 10 fundraising approval --- fundraising request for another individual who came to us just yesterday with 11 12 nothing, who needed our support to get on his feet.

Over recent years we have been recipient of the generosity of Fernwood with the snow tubing fundraiser that they have conducted for us during the months of January and February. These fundraisers have raised over \$10,000 for our special needs account, and we are very appreciative. A certain amount of each ticket that was sold was donated for Fitzmaurice on a designated night each week, and when our fundraising evenings came around, they invited our consumers to take part in the snow tubing at no charge. I have to say that those nights are very special for our folks, and it is my belief that you can —— the staff and employees of a business truly

reflect the philosophy and the culture of management. And when we come to our snow tubing events, our clients are not a typical resort participant. 3 differences are very apparent. I can tell you that all the staff, from the person manning that snow tubing machine on a cold Thursday night to the people in the food area, serving our folks, that there is a culture of acceptance, benevolence and compassion and customer service throughout Fernwood, and I think it is a reflection of the management team. 10 I know we've all talked about how great they are. We've known them 11 12 for years. It permeates the organization.

13 The snow tubing fundraiser has ended, but the welcoming of our consumers to the slopes 14 15 continues. They're always welcome and warmly received. Fernwood continues to extend their 16 17 financial generosity to us in other ways and are always willing to partner with Fitzmaurice in 18 fundraising ideas. They always keep our consumers in 19 20 mind when special activities come up that they know 21 they're going to be interested in, such as the 22 professional wrestler events, which is really tops on the list for a lot of the folks. Fernwood is on the 23 phone with the VIP tickets for them. 24

Fernwood has a reputation for being very

supportive of nonprofits and the work that we do in 1 2 the community. And I have to say this support started long before the gaming hearings. This is the culture 3 of Fernwood. I'm very proud to be associated with them and can vouch that they are good corporate citizens and good people who are a deserving recipient of this license. Thank you.

Wayne Bolt, resident of Middle Smithfield 2 3 Township for 23 years. Members of the Pennsylvania Gaming Board, as I said, my name is Wayne Bolt. I'm a retired New York City homicide detective. And as a second career, I was assistant general manager of the Fernwood Hotel & Resort, from which I am also retired two years. I have served on the community as a Middle Smithfield Township Supervisor, Chairman of the Middle 10 Smithfield Township Planning Commission. currently active with many area nonprofits, including 11 the Prince Hall Golf Tournament at East Stroudsburg 12 13 University, which serves --- gives two full 14 scholarships to inner-city kids, completely full 15 scholarships, which Andy Worthington is a member of that Board. I am Chairman of the Julianna V. Bolt 16 17 Scholarship at East Stroudsburg University, I'm on the 18 Board of Directors of the United Way, and I'm also on the Bushkill Diversity Group. 19 20 I've known the owners of Bushkill Group 21 for many years. And as a retired police officer, 22 community active, and a business person, I can vouch 23 for their integrity, sincerity and benevolence. give back whenever asked to. Organizations such as 24

Meals on Wheels, Bushkill Outreach, the United Way,

East Stroudsburg University, the Pocono Medical Center and others, I spoke on their behalf three years ago and I'm back again because I believe in these people.

The Bushkill Group provided jobs for over 500 employees from the tri-county region, people who have paid taxes and raised their families through various touch economic times. The awarding of this license can only be a positive force in the local economics and increase their ability to pay good wages and offer medical benefits and continue to give charity groups. It will bring new jobs, generate taxes and help reduce property taxes, which we all have a problem with in this township.

In my years of experience in the police force, township politics and tourism, I have met many people and consider myself an experienced judge of character. There are no political insiders. They are hard-working, tax-paying people, who have, for the past several years, been trying to bring economic growth to the Bushkill area. I ask you, as a member of this community, to grant this license for these people because they are genuine and they help out a lot. I have to say the Julianna V. Bolt Scholarship is my wife's scholarship, and with the help of the Bushkill Group it has paid. Thank you very much.

Over the years I have had the privilege of working with several of the owners of the Bushkill Group on various Shawnee and Fernwood joint marketing efforts and tourism-generating projects, including ski-and-stay packages, special events, major festivals and many successful regional marketing initiatives generating overnight guests from the lucrative markets of Metro New York, Long Island and Northern New Jersey.

Here in the Eastern Pocono region, we're less than 80 miles from Manhattan and the majority of our resort business comes from out of state, while generating significant in-state tax revenue. I have always found the Bushkill Group to be very knowledgeable, cooperative, capable, and above all, professional resort business people of high character,

good corporate citizens. I have long witnessed the many --- witnessed the Bushkill Group giving generously to many local charities, most recently, again, donating the Fernwood Resort facilities, staff and resources, while hosting the 2010 Pocono Wing-Off, the critically important annual fundraiser for Monroe County Meals on Wheels.

economic times, now more than ever I am proud to

Good morning. I'm a retired --- I am retired and I've 1 2 lived in this area for five years full time, but I've owned a home for 25 years. I'm the former president 3 of the Saw Creek Estates Community Association, which comprises 2,900 homes and about 10,000 residents. Many of the residents in this area, I'm not sure if you're aware, they commute to their jobs in New York and New Jersey, many taking the Motts bus system into the --- or Route 80 into the city. The area, needless 10 to say, has been negatively affected by the current economic environment. Many of our homeowners are in 11 12 foreclosure. And certainly the unemployment rate is 13 extremely high.

This area of Pennsylvania has also had some recent disappointments. The much touted Wall Street West project never came to fruition. The closing of Mount Laurel Performing Arts Center. And recently, resort closings at Pocmont and Penn Hills, which puts an added tax burden on the local residents. The state was very prudent in adopting casinos. I've lived in New York most of my adult life, and citizens went to New Jersey and Connecticut casinos, and then revenues and, you know, regional development taxes left the state. My recent school tax bill reflected an almost \$400 tax credit, thanks to you, gentlemen,

This area depends heavily on tourism, and certainly granting the Bushkill Group a Category 3 License will provide substantial capital investment, an additional attraction for visitors to stay in the area, additional employment opportunities for our local residents and certainly additional tax relief. #### ATTORNEY VOGT:

Monroe County and Pike County have unemployment rates that continue to rise and in 2010 are in excess of ten percent. Home foreclosures continue to rise. They are projected by the Monroe County Prothonotary to reach almost 2,200 in 2010. That's four times the level of 2005, only five years ago. Through my personal knowledge of the owners and many of the employees, I can confidently say that the company is operated 24 professionally and ethically by a hardworking, 25 | hands-on team. They will, without a doubt, represent

1 the Gaming-Board well by operating a successful casino with the utmost integrity. The company is one of the largest employers in our area, providing jobs and 3 excellent company benefits for many local residents. The resort also produces much-needed revenue for the local area and gives back to the community by supporting numerous charities, such as Meals on Wheels, the United Way, the Trooper Joshua Miller Memorial Fund and one that is especially close to my 10 heart, the donation of the golf course for a tournament in memory of my nephew, Gershom Litts, to 11 raise money for his daughter's college fund. A casino 12 13 at Fernwood would provide much needed local property 14 tax relief, give a significant boost to the overall 15 economy in this area of the Pocono Mountains and would allow the resort to further their philanthropic 16 17 efforts.

I spoke at Bushkill Group's last public hearing almost two-and-a-half years ago. I am glad their perseverance has stood the test of time in this process. I felt I would be remiss if I did not come before you again today to demonstrate my support and reiterate how much the resort and this area deserves this license. Thank you for your time.

Good afternoon. Thank you. My name is Matt Rumph. I reside in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, down in Monroe County. I am here today representing the Pocono Family YMCA, which we're located in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania, as a community partner with 12 Fernwood. Over the years I've been working, the support that Fernwood has given the YMCA has been overwhelming, not only financially but also through their employees' involvement with our association. need community partners, community leaders, to help us quide the YMCA. And they've stepped forward with several of their people to come on our Board, volunteered to be on committees and also volunteer their services to further our mission here in Monroe County.

In looking at the benefits of Fernwood 23 and what you've been talking of today, the YMCA also --- in the back end, we're also one of those people that would benefit greatly by this. We did

this year receive part of the fair-share money from the Mount Airy. If this would increase --- of course, we would be one of the entities in the community that 3 would benefit from that increased money coming into the community. Two would be --- it would decrease the people that we serve right now technically with our financial assistance, because if more people are employed, the unemployment rate would go down. have several people that we do give financial 10 assistance to, to go through our programs, childcare and also just general membership. That money, of 11 12 course --- to subsidize that money, we do look for support from Fernwood, which they've been gracious to 13 14 do that over the years.

The families that they serve would greatly support that, too, because the increased tax dollars coming in there --- because right now we're seeing a strain in East Stroudsburg and this area and a tax burden in the school district. That burden on the taxpayers just to support the school district is also coming on us because then they can't afford our services. Now, with our mission of doing --- we turn no one away due to the inability to pay, that does put a burden on us because we have to continue offering those services to those people who are in need.

## MR. HISCHAR:

Okay. My name is James Hischar of 22 Blackwood, PA. I recently retired after serving over 23 25 years with the Pennsylvania State Police. The last 20 years of my career I was assigned to drug law enforcement, and the last six-and-a-half was full time

with the Drug Enforcement Administration as a task 1 2 force officer. During that time I've worked with the FBI, IRS, ATF, Customs and Immigration, Secret Service 3 and many other agencies, state and local, on various cases, including drugs, stolen vehicles, organized crime, arson, burglary, credit card fraud, robbery, In those cases I've conducted interviews of murder. persons arrested for felonies and gleaned intelligence information on other cases and persons of interest 10 committing crimes. Not once was a member of anyone in the Bushkill Group or their resort mentioned as 11 12 committing any type of unscrupulous acts.

The Pennsylvania State Police had a close relationship with the Fernwood Police Department, which was the only professional police department at a resort community in the Poconos. The Fernwood Police were the go-to agency when we needed information in Eastern Monroe County. They were always very cooperative and would go out of their way to help us. In or about 1992 I had the extreme pleasure of meeting with the applicant, Andrew Worthington. At the time he was an Assistant District Attorney with the Monroe County DA's office, and I worked several cases very closely with Mr. Worthington. He was a hardworking prosecutor, and he would work day and night, guiding

the State Police through legal steps in the investigative process. Mr. Worthington ensured that cases were done both legally and ethically from start to finish. I, as a State Trooper, learned a lot from Mr. Worthington on how to build a successful case, which would result in a conviction.

In 1997 Mr. Worthington moved on to a position with Fernwood as a corporate attorney and later on as CEO. During that time I called on Mr. Worthington without hesitation for advice and 10 assistance with investigations in the Fernwood Resort 11 I also had the pleasure to meet other members 12 area. 1.3 of the Bushkill Group that were as dedicated as Mr. 14 Worthington to running a clean business and ridding 15 the community of the criminal element. I believe Mr. Worthington misses the days of being a prosecutor, and 16 to this day has law enforcement in his blood. 17 18 like to cite one particular case with an Albanian national organized crime figure who lived near 19 20 Fernwood. I called on Mr. Worthington and the 21 Fernwood Police, who provided all sorts of assistance 22 with surveillance and maps and ownership information, 23 anything they could do to help. That person received 14 years in a federal prison. 24

#### PRESIDING OFFICER:

102 Mr. Hischar, if you can wrap up, please? 1 2 MR. HISCHAR: 3 In closing, I ask the Board to consider the Bushkill Group application over other applicants because of the thorough knowledge I have of the character, honesty and dedication to community that they have. I'm certain you'll find these qualities in your background investigation as I have found over the last 23 years. 10 PRESIDING OFFICER: 11 Thank you. Our next speaker scheduled is 12 Salvatore L. Manda. 13 SALVATORE L. MANDA, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, 14 15 TESTIFIED AS FOLLOWS: 16 17 MR. MANDA: 18 Good afternoon. My name is Salvatore Manda. I reside in Schuylkill Township, Monroe 19 20 County. Good afternoon. I am the president of 21 Property Management Professional, Inc. 22 PRESIDING OFFICER: 23 Mr. Manda, if you can please speak up. 24 MR. MANDA:

Okay. I'm sorry. My company represents

over 3,000 timeshare owners at a timeshare resort
approximately six miles from the Fernwood. It's known
as Eagle Village Property Owners' Association. It is
obvious that our guests and owners will openly welcome
gaming at Fernwood, as they presently use and have
access to many of Fernwood's amenities, such as the
18-hole golf course, snow tubing, horseback riding,
live entertainment and many of their restaurants.

In 30 years as a resident --- it seems a 9 10 lot of us have been here 30 years, as a resident of the Pocono Mountains, I have seen substantial 11 commercial and economic growth. However, where I live 12 1.3 and where Fernwood is and where I work, the 209 14 corridor north over Marshall Creek has unfortunately 15 not seen the same type of growth. In fact, the region has experienced some negative economic impacts 16 resulting from the closing of the Old Tannerwood 17 18 (phonetic) Resort, the Mountain Laurel Center for the Performing Arts and the Pocmont Hotel. All have 19 20 occurred in the last five years or so. Allowing 21 gaming to come to this region will not only help 22 Fernwood but will promote employment, help many of the local businesses survive and prosper in these 23 economically challenging times and be the start we all 24 25 hope of a new beginning to this region of the Pocono

1 Mountains.

My experience managing properties for the last 20 years or so in the region gives me insight to the market potential of adding another gaming facility to this part of the state, particularly this part of the county. Because of our proximity to the state line, most of the guests at Fernwood and the guests at my resort come from outside the State of Pennsylvania and are primarily from the significant New York and New Jersey markets. In addition, there are residents in the gated communities surrounding Fernwood that own or rent their vacation homes and they're very close in proximity, of course, to the proposed casino. These are people who, on a regular basis, return to spend leisure time in the Poconos and are looking for things to do.

Lastly, you've heard it before, but I've been associated with the principals of the Bushkill Group as long as I've been a resident. I know them as honest, hardworking individuals, dedicated to their families and their communities, and their goal to carry on Fernwood's history as a major employer ---

--- and a recognized leader in the hospitality industry. Thank you.

I am a single homeowner residing in Delaware Township, Pike County, PA. I'm here today to speak in favor of Fernwood Resort receiving a Category 3 License. My reasons are as follows. For the past two years my property taxes have decreased by 20 percent. This year I received a three percent decrease on my school tax bill from the Delaware 21 Valley School District. These decreases are due to the Act I Exclusion Bill, which is funded primarily by 23 the gaming revenues of the state, and this benefits me greatly. I worked for Fernwood in my high school

career and my college years in the recreation

department. I've also worked in their corporate

offices before I pursued employment in my career. I

can speak firsthand that as an employer they were more

than fair providing healthcare and a safe workplace.

I point this out because they are committed to hiring

locally. And with the job losses in the recent years,

it would serve our area greatly for them to increase

workforce employees.

I have read the papers, and I do not agree with the naysayers about the increase in traffic. A Category 3 License is for guests of the resort who already patronize Fernwood. You cannot just drive up and play, unless you're already a resort customer. Also, in a recent study done for the improvement of Bushkill Falls Road, it showed that most traffic coming up Route 209 North in fact continues past Fernwood and up into the communities of the mountain. Therefore, traffic is not of a significant concern.

In conclusion, I am a tax-paying citizen that supports awarding a Category 3 License to Fernwood. I know the owners. They are good people, excellent employers, and they give a lot of their time and their energy back to the community. In my opinion, they will very successfully run this casino.

Thank you very much. My name is Nancy Shukaitis, S-H-U-K-A-I-T-I-S. I live in Smithfield Township. I spent 16 years as a county commissioner here and more than 30 years of coordinator of the Delaware Valley Conservation Association, a group who was active and proactive in bringing about the Water Gap National Recreation Area and defeating the Tocks Dam, which was a poor geology lease.

10 Monroe County has a casino. Most of us didn't know you could have more than one casino in a 11 12 county. The map you show on your website shows nine major casinos in Pennsylvania, all well spread apart, 13 14 looking like an intelligent way to deal with casinos. 15 I think a great consideration today which is going to 16 be --- in my case make me an opponent of the Fernwood, 17 although I'm very good friends with the Fernwood 18 founders and all of the generations that followed because I lived not far from them. I've known them 19 20 very well, and all of the good things you heard today 21 are true. So I happen to be looking at this whole 22 scene from a different angle.

The Fernwood Resort was one of the few major resorts that the government did not bulldoze in this National Park; this National Park, 72,000 acres,

over 12,000 private tracts of land taken, huge communities. Maybe you know the history. And the Fernwood is inside the boundary of this park, within 3 the Act itself and the maps that were with it from the beginning, 1965, which makes it a much different scene from afar and brings up the view of all National Parks and recreation areas and what is going to be okay and what is not. The government --- it's private property. The government did not buy it. And there 10 are other instances of the same. But those that remain in some parks, National Parks, are called 11 in-holdings, and they are permitted to stay. Am I 12 finished? 13
