CHAIRMAN:

We will now move to the second hearing regarding Valley Forge's second Petition for Approval of its Gaming Floor Plan. Any new persons testifying on behalf of Valley Forge who are not attorneys, who were not sworn in previously, should be sworn before we begin.

ATTORNEY HAYES:

Mr. Chairman, there will be no additional witnesses.

CHAIRMAN:

Mr. Hayes, you can begin.

ATTORNEY HAYES:

For the record, Kevin Hayes, H-A-Y-E-S. Members of the Board, Mr. Chairman, the second matter which we would like to present for your consideration is Valley Forge's Petition for Approval of its Gaming Floor Plan. The Gaming Floor Plan, which has been designated as OP3, was prepared by Valley Forge's architect, Cope Linder. It meets all the specifications set forth in Section 467(a)(1) for the Board's regulations. Specifically the floor plan designated as OP3 depicts the location of each slot

machine, table game, ticket redemption unit and ATM, as well as the location and type of each surveillance camera which will be positioned over the gaming floor. In addition, this floor plan depicts the location of all security areas in servicing gaming operations, including the cage, count room, and armored car bay. To describe this floor plan in further detail, I will now turn it over to our CEO, Sal Scheri.

MR. SCHERI:

Thank you, Kevin. Sal Scheri, S-A-L, S-C-H-E-R-I. I believe that our management team and design teams have developed an innovative casino floor design, which is unique in many respects to what is currently available in Pennsylvania. Our gaming floor will be 33,222 square feet which is more than ample room to accommodate 600 slot machines and 50 table games. The focal point of the casino floor will be a 64-seat center bar and lounge.

In compliance with the Clean Indoor Air Act, we will permit smoking on 25 percent of our gaming floor, with the remaining sections reserved for nonsmoking. The smoking and nonsmoking areas will be clearly designated with conspicuous signage. Valley Forge has invested in a sophisticated HVAC system. It's an energy recovery system, which will remove or

replace the air on the casino level, 14 times every hour.

I am pleased to report that the Gaming Board's offices are located immediately adjacent to the gaming floor and the back of the house areas. We believe that this is an ideal location, which provides the casino compliance officers with easy access to the gaming floor and the gaming public.

I would direct your attention to this slide, which shows a public version of a gaming floor plan. Here you see the main entrance, which is located at the bottom of the slide. And you can see the entrance and the electronic games where you will enter the casino. It also depicts the center bar, which is a good point of reference. The high limit table games area to the right, all the way to the right of the plan, the high limit slot area, which is your top left of the plan. And if you were to look to the left, it's not depicted on this screen because it's part of the back of the house area. But the PGCB offices are to the left of the high limit slot area.

On the next two slides you will see our artists' renderings of our gaming floor plan. And the focal point of our gaming floor is the 64-seat center bar and lounge area. You can see that it is actually

is a very good depiction of the carpet which has already gone down. And it's nearly --- I'd say it's probably about 75 percent complete down. And really when you see the carpet and how it comes together with the flooring of the center bar, it really is a great dynamic area. We're very excited. We can't wait to see it with the table games there as well.

If you notice a little bit here and then I think on our next --- maybe our previous slide, are the ceilings. If you recall, Valley Forge Convention Center --- there is the slide, thank you --- had some very high ceilings. They were called coffers. We had five of them. And the ceiling heights were very high, actually a little too high for the operation. designer created this ceiling with four different reliefs, if you will, or levels. And it's in a waved pattern almost. And it matches up with the carpeting. It matches up with the wall coverings. And it really just all ties together. So, it's really dramatic. As you walk into the facility and you reach these areas with the higher ceilings, it just feels like it opens up to you. And it's very welcoming. And that's really the goal of what we're trying to create here.

Because we are a smaller facility, we want to create an area and experience that was really

in line with a different kind of customer, a resort customer. So, someone that's coming, staying in a hotel, meeting at a convention or a wedding, something 3 like that where they would actually have an opportunity to visit multiple times, we didn't want them to feel that it was just repetitive. So, it was almost like each area you go into is a little bit different. And we're a little bit excited, so it kind of keeps them coming back. They come back to visit us 10 either, you know, in a month, or maybe they're attending an annual meeting. It doesn't get old. 11 And that was the whole design. And I think we're on our 12 13 way to accomplishing that.

Again, thank you for your time and I will turn it back to Kevin. I'd be happy to field any questions you may have regarding this petition.

Mr. Chairman, we have no questions. We also have no objections to the plan; however, subject to 19 recommended conditions, which we filed as part of our answer, and we have nothing further to say.

CHAIRMAN:

Any members of the Board?

MR. SOJKA:

Yeah, I have a couple.

MR. FAJT:

I have questions, too.

MR. SOJKA:

Again, thank you for the detailed floor plan and your explanation of it. And I know it's --- we've talked about this as we looked at the coming together of the whole plan. But as we actually look at this floor plan, with the central entrance point, and the high limit slots, where our office will be and

everything, can you orient this in the hotel complex for me? And could you tell me for sure that there is one and only one entrance point, and that's the one we're looking at?

MR. SCHERI:

Sure, absolutely. If we can go back to the slide. So, just let's first --- address the first part of your question, which is the orientation of the casino. So, at the bottom of the screen, where we have --- and that's our main entrance, the bottom of 10 the screen is the main entrance. And if you were to 11 just further go below that, that would take you 12 13 outside the building near the room --- do you remember 14 the scanacon entrance, right there? That's where you are. Okay?

MR. SCHERI:

So, if that helps orient where you are.

MR. SOJKA:

Okay. Great.

MR. SCHERI:

So, that is the main entrance of the casino. Just outside of that main entrance and to the left, you're still inside the building, okay, and that

is our food court area where we have a seating for 120 people. And there is a lead wall that separates that area from the casino. So, the only way to gain 3 entrance from that area is to go through the electronic gates. That's the only way to enter from that bottom area. Okay.

Now you asked, your second part of your question was if that's the only entrance, well, no, of course, it's not the only entrance and it's not the only exit. There are a number of exits that are emergency only exits, as part of the agreement required by code. Okay.

Now at the top of the diagram, where the 14 high limit slot area is, there is an entrance there. Okay. That entrance is a use as needed entrance. what we have done is we've created an entrance with the ability --- with cameras, with surveillance built That in the event we have overflow coming from in. the Radisson side of the hotel, they come down the stairs and they go in there, and the way we handle that is we have a security quard would be manned there. That position would be manned as the entire 23 time that that entrance would be open. They would 24 have a hand-held device that would sweep. Exactly, exactly.

MR. FAJT:

Okay.

MR. SCHERI:

And there's one other entrance, I'll bring your attention to it. It's all the way over. So, if you follow the top of that diagram to the right a little bit, you'll see there's a little bit of an opening. That's the employee entrance. Okay. There is an opportunity for us to escort VIPs, from either a performance or guests that would be attending that performance, into that entrance. We see that happening very rarely. But in the event we do, we have cameras, the exact same situation, staffed by a security guard and with a portable swipe device. And that person still has to meet all the access requirements.

MR. SOJKA:

That's a very complete answer. And that makes me feel better. Thank you. The other issue is we repeatedly at virtually every one of our facilities get complaints about air quality and smoking. And you've got your data about how much. Mr. Hayes, you mentioned 14 turnovers per hour of the total volume. But you mentioned something about an energy conservation system. Does that mean you're holding

the heat or you're holding the cooling?

ATTORNEY HAYES:

That was actually Mr. Scheri. HVAC is well out of my expertise. So, I'm going to hand that over to Sal.

MR. SCHERI:

The system that we have purchased it's a very sophisticated and high tech system that uses a combination of outside air and recovers the energy that we are --- when we take air out of the casino, we use that air to condition the air that's coming in.

The way that happens is it's not that oh, this is the smoky air that we're taking out of the casino and it's mixing with that air. No, it's not that at all. It's the temperature. There's coils that go through it.

And it's warming or cooling the air as it comes in.

And that is actually a very efficient way to do it.

MR. SOJKA:

Okay. That is helpful. Again, just for industry standards, is the 14 times turnover per hour considered to be a very high flow, compared to what most people would have?

MR. SCHERI:

We consider it to be very high.

MR. SONJKA:

16 It sounds like it. 1 Thank you. That's it. 2 3 CHAIRMAN: Anyone else from the Board? Greq? 4 5 MR. FAJT: Yeah. One quick follow up to Gary's 6 comment was about the air quality. And as I said to you, Mr. Scheri, when we toured your facility, it is still the number one complaint by far of casino 10 patrons. So, I appreciate what I heard today about your ability to clean the air. Obviously there's some 11 12 concern because of the small nature of your gaming 13 floor, smoke doesn't stop at the end of the smoking 14 section. So, that's something that we will pay 15 attention to. So, thanks for your comment. 16 CHAIRMAN: 17 Okay. Anything else from the Enforcement Counsel? 18 19 ATTORNEY MILLER: 20 No, sir. 21 CHAIRMAN: 22 Okay. Thank you all very much. 23 ATTORNEY HAYES: 24 Mr. Chairman, before the record 25 closes ---
