My name is Linda Lloyd, and I'm the 4 5 Presiding Officer today at this public input hearing, 6 conducted by the Gaming Control Board, addressing a petition filed by SugarHouse --- HSP Gaming, LP, doing business as SugarHouse Casino, seeking the Board's approval to modify its Phase 1A Expansion Plan. 10 Before I begin, I would ask that everyone please turn 11 off or vibrate your cell phones, et cetera, so that we don't disturb the speakers and those in the audience 12 13 today.

As the Presiding Officer, I call to order this public input hearing addressing SugarHouse Casino's petition to modify its expansion plan. The date is Tuesday, May 7th, 2013, the time is two o'clock, and the location is the National Constitution Center, Kirby Auditorium, 525 Arch Street, Philadelphia, PA, 19106.

This public input hearing is convened by the Board pursuant to and as required by Section 1205(b)(1)(ii) of the Gaming Act, which directs the Board to conduct a public input hearing before approving a structural redesign of a licensed facility

1 located in a city of first class.

The Board members present for the
hearing today are, to my immediate right, Chairman
Bill Ryan; going down the table, Commissioner John
McNally and Commissioner Jim Ginty; to my immediate
left, Commissioner Greg Fajt, Commissioner Keith
McCall. And we will be joined by Commissioner
Annmarie Kaiser, when she arrives, on the end.

As a result of an accident late last year that required corrective surgery last week,

Commissioner Tony Moscato is not physically here, but will be viewing the hearing via our live video stream.

So, nice of you to join us, Commissioner Moscato.

On May 6th, 2009, the Gaming Board approved the petition filed by SugarHouse Casino to amend its development plan, including a modification of the Phase 1A expansion. On April 5th, 2013, SugarHouse Casino filed a petition now before the Board at Docket Number 3103-2013, seeking to modify the Phase 1 Expansion Plan that had been approved by the Board on May 6th, 2009.

Today, SugarHouse will present to the public a short presentation outlining the changes it is seeking permission to make to its Phase 1 Expansion Plan that was previously approved by the Board. After

the presentation, we will hear from those individuals
that have registered to speak. Public officials will
have ten minutes to speak, community representatives
will have five minutes, and individual members of the
public will have three minutes.

Each speaker should begin their remarks by stating your name, the municipality where you reside and, if you're speaking on behalf of an entity, the name of that entity. We do have a time clock down front that will remind you of your time. When the light turns green, your time has started. When the light turns yellow, you have 30 seconds to wrap up your comments. And when the light turns red, I ask that you please sit down and --- for the next person to be able to speak.

If you have written notes or testimony from which you will read, when you're finished if you could give a copy to the court reporter, that will be helpful. The court reporter is sitting down here, off to my left.

Please note it is the intent of the Board that it will hear again from SugarHouse Casino at the Board's public meeting on May 15th concerning the proposed changes to the 2009 building plan. And it may or may not be in a position at that time to

1 make a decision to grant, deny or condition the
2 requested changes.

Before we begin with SugarHouse's presentation, I understand that Councilman Mark Squilla is here and would like to make some comments to the Board. And before you begin, if you would have the court reporter swear you in, that would be helpful.

here today. I just wanted to say a few things about
the expansion of the SugarHouse Casino. Chairman Ryan
and members of the Gaming Control Board, my name is
Mark Squilla. I'm the Philadelphia District
Councilman that represents the SugarHouse Casino area.

I'm here today to express my support for

the SugarHouse Casino's Petition for Approval to

impressed with how SugarHouse has conducted itself as
a corporate citizen since I was sworn into office
January 2012. Their community benefits agreement with

The funding has provided critical 5 support for neighborhoods that badly need such 6 improvements. This allows them to decide and to work with the Penn Treaty Special Services District on how it should be spent. Further, SugarHouse is involved in many events, institutions of great importance in 10 our city and especially my district, including the 11 Mummers Parade, New Year's Eve fireworks, Welcome 12 Festival, Susan G. Komen For the Cure, Philadelphia NAACP, Philadelphia OIC, Welcome Center for New 13 14 Pennsylvanians, William Grady (phonetic) High School, 15 Police Athletic League, and the Citizens Crime 16 Commission for the Delaware Valley.

SugarHouse has also helped the bottom line of our city and the school district as well. Through March 31st, 2013, SugarHouse has produced total revenues of nearly \$300 million generated to the City of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. \$34.8 million went directly to the City of Philadelphia, with \$15 million of that going to the Philadelphia School District. Of course, the tax revenue that was sent to the state has helped to

reduce the city wage tax as well.

As part of their deal with the city to build and now expand, SugarHouse has signed an Agreement to Negotiate by Mayor Nutter's team that will have the casino pay \$32.8 million to the city over the next ten years, while also insuring public access to the Riverfront walkway, critical infrastructure improvements in the neighborhood.

The casino looks like Philadelphia.

SugarHouse's 1,063 employees are 58 percent from

Philadelphia, 49 percent minority, 41 percent women,

and 69 percent Pennsylvania residents. It spends

within the region, as well as with 41 percent of

Philadelphia businesses and 64 percent within the five

surrounding counties.

The concerns expressed by naysayers about crime have not really materialized. As Captain Mike Crane from the 26th Police District recently testified, crime has gone down in the area surrounding SugarHouse since the casino has opened, yet SugarHouse is not yet what everyone hoped for either.

My constituents would like to see more jobs available. They want a garage for parking. Like to see more amenities and casino-like restaurants and banquet space. They want to see more waterfront space

and a continuation of the Riverwalk trail. They also would like to see additional tax revenue for the city and for the school district. For these reasons, the City of Philadelphia needs SugarHouse to expand as soon as possible.

This particular expansion proposal is an effort to balance the needs to the city, the local neighborhoods and SugarHouse. SugarHouse consulted and met with the community and the city on their original expansion plan and have developed a plan that addresses their concerns and is best for all parties. I am confident that the expansion will finally allow SugarHouse to realize its potential and further deliver on its promises. For all these reasons I respectfully ask you to approve SugarHouse Casino's plan for expansion. And I thank you for your consideration on this matter. Thank you very much.

2. Good afternoon, Director Lloyd, Mr. 3 Chairman, and members of the Board. Today we're going to give you an overview of the proposed modifications 4 5 to the approved 2009 expansion plan, explain the 6 rationale for why we're making the proposed modifications, and why it is a better plan and design than what the Board approved back in 2009. With me today to my immediate right are Terry McKenna, the 10 Executive Vice President of Keating Consulting; Greg 11 Carlin, the CEO of SugarHouse Casino; Ian Cope, principal with Cope Linder Architects; and Wendy 12 13 Hamilton, the general manager of SugarHouse Casino. 14 And with that, I'm going to turn it over to Greg to 15 begin the presentation.

MR. CARLIN:

Thanks, Michael, Director Lloyd,
Chairman Ryan, members of the Board. We are very
happy to finally be here, seeking approval of our
expansion plans.

As most of you probably remember, our original plan was delayed significantly by local opposition. And when we got started on our construction, we were actually the first casino in the country to get financing after the great recession.

So, after two-and-a-half years of operating, we feel that our expansion plan before you today is actually a much better plan than the original plan that was approved in 2009.

2.

Post approval in 2009, we purchased additional land north of our site, a five-acre parcel, and we've incorporated that additional land into this new plan. We worked closely with the city. After the previous approval, they were concerned about our garage height. In the original plan it was a ten-story garage. They really wanted us to be lower, a seven-story garage. They also wanted us to work on access to the river and we've improved the access, extended the river path that's open to the public, and we've also incorporated a bike path on our new plan.

We've also incorporated over two years of operating experience and lots of customer feedback that we received during the design process. The result is a better plan than the one that was originally approved. The parking garage is better designed and it's --- the mix of surface parking and cover parking we think is better. We also believe that the gaming mix is better. The original plan did not include any poker tables, and this plan has poker tables.

We've also designed a larger gaming floor than what was in the original plan. You know, one of the --- lots of feedback we get from our customers is that it's very tight in the current SugarHouse Casino. If you look at square footage per gaming position, today it's roughly 22 square feet for gaming position, which is on the low end for most casinos. In the new plan I think we're going to be about 29 square feet per gaming position. So, we're actually increasing the amount of space for our patrons which meets support.

We also have a better design in the gaming experience. We've got a dedicated gaming area which was not in the original plan. We've got more food and beverage options. And we've added a meeting and function space, similar to what we've done in Pittsburgh, which has been a big success in Pittsburgh, at the Rivers Casino there, and so we --- this was something that was not in the original plan in the SugarHouse expansion.

We also believe that the plan allows for better future expansion. We can expand the garage, we can expand the casino. We've got a pad to add a hotel if demand warrants down the road. So all in all, we believe that this is a better plan than the one

previously approved in 2009.

Just to go over some numbers. We planned our current budget for this expansion plan. It's \$155 million. If you add that to what was previously spent, the total project, we will have invested about \$550 million in the plan, once the expansion's complete.

We're currently working to secure financing. We expect to close on our financing by the end of this month. And we also expect that we're going to put 1,600 construction workers to work on this project and create 450 new permanent casino jobs. Those are primarily table game dealers and also food and beverage workers.

I'm going to now pass over to Ian Cope, who's our architect based here in Philadelphia. He was the original architect when we built SugarHouse. And he's designed the expansion as well. Thank you.

MR. COPE:

Thank you. Thank you and good afternoon. We're very happy to be here needless to say. What I'd like to do first is kind of refresh you on where we are now, which is consistent with the plan you approved, this body approved, in 2009 and provide an update on the expansion plan on what we currently

refer to as Phase 1A. I'll try to concisely provide
both a qualitative and a quantitative comparison and
what was previously approved and revisions and what we
consider to be substantial improvements that we are
now proposing.

As Greg mentioned, in 2009 sometime after the Board's approval of the plan, we acquired an abutting lot of about five acres. The advent of this additional land provided tremendous opportunities to more thoughtfully rethink the expansion plan, as well as meet the city's objectives for an enhanced and extended waterfront experience.

The slide here is something of a side-by-side comparison of the May 2009 scheme on the left, and the image on the right represents the current approved plan by the City of Philadelphia. This was approved in 2011 by the city as we were going through their process.

On the left you can see a very large ten-story garage that Greg referred to that really gets very close and approaches Delaware Avenue. The fly in the ointment with that garage design was based on site limitations and size of our parcel, was that you had to construct the entire garage at one time. It couldn't be phased to meet market demands. Sort of

1 a one-shot deal.

The image on the right depicts a different garage. Because, with the advent of the additional land to the left and the north, we were able to lower the garage, as Greg said, to about seven stories. So, we've knocked off about three stories, a considerable amount of height, and keep the footprint, at least for now, far back off Delaware Avenue and accomplish a much better, safer garage for customers.

Now, I would like to address a more quantitative comparison. The figures on the left represent the figures from the 2009 expansion plan, and on the right, the modified plan that we're proposing today and then one that was already approved by the city.

The gaming floor area proposed in 2009 are now comparable at 80,000 square feet. In fact, we think we'll have a little more square footage on the actual gaming floor proper. And subject to approval, future approval by this Board, we may even be able to expand within the confines of that with added gaming machines as market conditions warrant.

I should also point out, as Greg said, the gaming floor has been right sized to permit a more spacious and a less dense layout of all the gaming

positions throughout both the existing building and the future building. We think our customers will appreciate this.

With respect to the number of proposed gaming positions, you may recall that table games had not been approved back in 2009, when we had proposed only 3,000 slot machines. Since the presentation of that plan, and shortly before SugarHouse opened in the fall of 2010, the enabling legislation for table games came through, and we quickly revamped our casino plan to accommodate same.

As you're aware, there's been very significant and robust demand for table gaming among our customers. So, the proposed mix of gaming has changed somewhat. We're presently proposing a total of 1,900 to 2,200 slots and between 80 and 90 total table games, plus an additional 25 to 35 poker tables in the dedicated poker room.

The number of food and beverage venues, which would include restaurants, food courts, and lounges has actually been increased from a total of seven to eight such venues in the new facility to serve roughly a comparable number of patrons that we envisioned back in 2009.

Suffice it to say, SugarHouse customers

will be afforded many choices in the type and price
point of their dining options. You may also note that
back in 2009 we proposed a total of 3,645 parking
spaces, which included that mammoth ten-story garage,
with a little over 3,200 spaces. And surface parking,
which by the then current city ordinances which has
since been revised, was limited to ten percent of the
total parking to be provided.

As I mentioned, for logistic and site constraints, it wasn't feasible to design and then build the garage in phases. So, we would have to build the whole thing far exceeding any rational market demand and far exceeding the required parking by the current ordinances, which has proven to be more than adequate. By contrast, the current city-approved plan calls for the construction of a 1,500-car garage, seven stories in height, and approximately 940 surface parking spaces, which some customers actually prefer, arrayed around the site and properly landscaped lots. The city whole-heartedly endorses a smaller garage and this new approach to the site plan.

Equally important, as Greg also noted, the new garage is much safer and much more customer friendly, with fewer ramps and at each level provides patrons with broad flat floors and parking aisles that

1 take them right to the elevator, which descends to the 2 casino level. This is a vastly-improved garage.

Space allocation for gaming support, such as the cage, the Gaming Control Board and State Police offices will remain unchanged in the new plan. One major change between the 2009 plan and the proposed iteration now, is the addition of the new multi-purpose event space above the casino level on the second floor. Our 2009 plan had no such large floor and assembly space. We simply didn't have space for it on the north side. This new event center will essentially be a flat-floor ballroom, very flexible, of about 12,000 square feet, with a capacity to handle live performances and modest concert events, sit-down social and large banquets, tournaments and large-scale promotions, and will have more than ample breakout of pre-function spaces, not to mention a large outdoor deck overlooking the river.

Here's some schematic views of the proposed project. The uppermost image is what you might see if you were sort of hovering over the Delaware, sort of looking west. That's the Waterfront trail in the foreground. You can see the existing casino is on the far left. That's the one-story piece. You can see where it pops up to the proposed

1 two-story podium, and then the seven-story garage in 2 the background.

On the lower right, a little hard to see at that scale, but you can see what will be seen from Delaware Avenue, from the west side, sort of approaching the casino with the new garage in the foreground on the left, the two-story podium in the middle. We're also applying living green walls, much larger in scale than the ones that at the current entrance that you may have see, but they tend to soften up the mass of the garage, make it a more appealing and attractive entrance.

The highlights of the salient parts of the new plan, we will be relocating a combined sewer outfall, drainage pipe if you will, on Shackamaxon Street to permit a more seamless horizontal expansion all to the north and across the new lot. The new seven-story parking structure will be erected north of the existing casino, as originally contemplated in the 2009 plan.

A new centralized loading dock will be under the garage and entirely away from customer view. We're also incorporating the Delaware River Waterfront Corporation's Riverfront Bicycle Trail into and across the property. And this is already well underway.

We'll be further extending the public promenade right
along the river to get it all that much closer to
nearby Penn Treaty Park. For any of you that may not
be familiar with the promenade, it really is very
nice, well maintained and relaxing civic space used by
customers and neighbors alike. Extending this path
was very important to the city in their vision for a
publicly-accessible waterfront.

I should have also noted that we're proposing to relocate the northernmost, or Shackamaxon Street, entrance to our site by shifting the signalized intersection to the northern edge of our Ninth and Delaware Avenue footage. This will permit easier traffic flow in and out of the site and guide our customers right into the new garage.

Once the new garage and its central loading dock is operational, we can finally demolish the current loading dock, which we always viewed as temporary, as it's a bit close to the main front door. And this will be replaced with high-demand surface parking near the new entrance and the new poker room.

The orange on the slide represents the continuous gaming floor. The yellow represents food and beverage outlets. And the gray indicates back of house spaces and employee areas, which extend well

underneath of the garage, at the ground level. 1 While 2. it may be hard to get overly excited about back of 3 house spaces, if you're operating a facility it sure is important to management and employees alike. 4 5 know this will further improve casino operations and 6 customer service. The new facility will provide ample space for a new employee dining room, lockers, lounges and other amenities, storage and warehousing facilities, and a secured cash route to a new armored 10 car bay. In addition to the main porte-cochere entrance and a smaller valet entrance that we already 11 12 have within the existing building, we're also 13 proposing to add one more additional public entrance 14 facing west. I think that's highlighted up there. 15 And this will coincide with where the new elevators from the garage land. So, it will become a primary 16 17 access point. So that, obviously, will be a secured 18 and manned entrance.

As always been our goal, we'll be adding a number of new venues to the riverfront proper, each with splendid and dramatic views, including space for two new restaurants, a steakhouse and an Italian restaurant. A new high limits area and lounge as Greg suggested, a new featured bar or lounge, which will serve as the focal point in the middle of the expanded

gaming floor, and below the garage, a new floor outlet food court, and again, the 25 to 35-table poker room.

The cage and all the other gaming support spaces will also be relocated within the new expansion, but will be of comparable, if not somewhat larger, size than

what we proposed previously.

I'll step lively through these next two images because I know you're time pressed. 8 Fortunately, though, based on precedent and the way 10 the city's zoning and master plan approval process works, we were given considerable latitude to make 11 12 interior program changes and plan adjustments within a 13 broad range of permitted uses, so long as the basic 14 footprint, the site access, the public amenities and 15 the exterior aesthetic conditions remain consistent. 16 Towards that end, we haven't been idle since the 17 city's approval in 2011, but, in fact, have made many 18 refinements to the interior gaming floor and amenities, with more detail and careful consideration 19 20 given to what we've since learned about our specific 21 customer preferences in terms of gaming choices, 22 dining and other amenities. And this is simply a view 23 of the upper level event space and ballroom, which 2.4 we're confident will attract additional patrons and

new bookings, permitting SugarHouse to continue to be

the preeminent entertainment venue in Philadelphia.

I hope that we have demonstrates the proposed expansion plan represents a substantially similar program and layout to what was initially presented in 2009 with some appropriate, noteworthy and market savvy physical and aesthetic enhancements, to make this an even better facility for our customers. With that, I would like to turn it over to Terry McKenna of Keating Consulting to address basic timelines.

MR. MCKENNA:

Good afternoon, Chairman Ryan, members of the Board. As Michael and Ian indicated, my name is Terry McKenna. I'm with Keating Consulting. My charge on the project is the overall development manager. Today I just want to give you a very, very brief overview of where we're at relative to permits and approvals and the planned overall construction schedule for the project.

As this Board is aware, we provide monthly updates to the Gaming Control Board staff on where we're at on the permits and approvals process for the project. And within those updates, we summarize back to what initially was our first approval on this back in 2011 working with the City

1 Planning Commission to get approval of the plan that's

2 | in front of you today. So, we have City Planning

3 | Commission's approval of this plan so from the city

4 | side we can initiate the permitting process, obviously

5 only if this Board approves it in the coming weeks.

But we're set from the city side.

In addition, relative to the Ogotten (phonetic) parcel that was purchased to the north of the property, we have secured this submerged land license that covers that property. So, now all the property owned by SugarHouse Casino has a submerged land --- approved submerged lands license to --- whatever impacts to the state-owned riverbed are covered under those licenses.

We've obtained miscellaneous City council ordinances to cover some minor variations in our plan relative to how it ultimately works within the Zoning Code. So, we're covered from the Zoning Code currently. As the end of April of this --- last week, actually, we submitted our traffic impact study, updated traffic impact study to Pennsylvania

Department of Transportation and Philadelphia Street.

That report essentially reaffirms that SugarHouse

Casino has had virtually no impact on traffic within the Delaware Avenue corridor and that there's plenty

of access capacity for that project.

We continue to work with the Department of Environmental Protection on our earth disturbance permit, which remains active from the first phase of the project. So, we're covered in that regard. And we continue also to work with the other city departments on any of the other approvals that will be required for the project. In fact, our next meeting in that regard is scheduled for Tuesday, May 14th.

Regarding construction schedule, just very briefly, we anticipate that we have approximately a 24-month period from when this Board approves the amended plan to when the new facility will be open. Working in there is a roughly 20 --- I'm sorry, a 16-month actual construction schedule for the new expanded facility. And as both --- as Greg indicated, there will be a total of 1,600 construction jobs that were created. That's about approximately a thousand direct positions and 600 indirect positions. So, with that, I'll turn it over to Wendy Hamilton, the general manager for SugarHouse.

MS. HAMILTON:

Good afternoon, Director Lloyd, Chairman Ryan, members of the Board. I think it's safe to say that nobody is happier to be here today than I am, so

thank you for your time.

I want to just take a minute and talk to you a little bit about what SugarHouse has become in the two-and-a-half years that we've been open. workforce, and Councilman Squilla alluded to this, looks very much like Philadelphia. We employ just over a thousand fabulous hospitality employees, 41 percent women, 49 percent minority, 58 percent Philadelphia residents, and 69 percent Pennsylvania residents. Our management team is 39 percent women and 36 percent minority. Ninety-two (92) percent of our workforce are full-time team members, the balance tend to be dealers that also, you know, still work at some of the houses in Atlantic City. Half of our employees are day-one employees, they've been with us since the day we opened. And 191 of our team members have been promoted internally since we opened.

On this next slide it looks like we have a little spacing problem. As you can see, what this is meant to say, the 2009 --- the plan approved in May of 2009 showed a total of 1,100 job positions after Phase 1A was complete. As this plan stands, we're at just under 1,100 today. And after this plan would be complete, we'd be at approximately 1,500 full-time employees.

We have a really great employment package because we have really great employees. worked very hard to find great people. We auditioned them for their enthusiasm and their energy. best thing that we can do from a business standpoint is make sure that they want to stay with us and that they're happy and motivated. And so competitive wages, every year we go out and proactively do a wage survey in the area among all other similar hospitality organizations and make sure that our wages are at or better than the local going rate for any particular job. In addition, we offer Blue Cross and Blue Shield medical benefits. Seventy-five (75) percent of our eligible team members are participating in the company medical plan. That's a high number when you consider that many employees also have the option of a spouse's plan.

Seventy-eight (78) percent of our eligible team members are participating in the company dental plan and we do fund the majority of healthcare premium costs. It depends on which plan you choose, but it's 80 percent plus that SugarHouse covers.

The 401(k) is really a terrific plan. The company matches 100 percent of your first three percent contributed and 50 percent of the next two

percent contributed, with a hundred-percent immediate
vesting. So, when a person joins the 401(k) upon
being hired, that's a hundred-percent immediate
vesting. And 93 percent of our eligible team members
are participating in that company-sponsored plan.

In addition, because we value our great employees so much, we make sure that we make them comfortable in every possible way. As you know, Federal Medical Leave kicks in after one year of employment. We offer our employees SugarHouse leave, which is a similar program. They are eligible for it day one of their employment with us. In addition to that, they have four SugarHouse days, which are kind of like freebies, and 16 paid time-of days. We offer tuition reimbursement up to \$5,000 a year for any related coursework to any eligible employee, domestic partner benefits. We have no-cost employee vision coverage, no-cost long-term disability, a service bonus program, which allows any frontline employee to earn up to \$150 per quarter for customer survey results. For the record, we have two statements that were provided today, one by Senator Lawrence Farnese, the other by City Council President Darrell Clarke. Neither individual, although they wanted their statements placed into the record, could be present due to other obligations, and they asked that I --- each be read into the record.

The first statement by Senator Lawrence M. Farnese, Jr. Senator of the 1st Senatorial District here in Philadelphia. Dear Chairman Ryan and Board members, I am pleased to have the opportunity today to address the Board in support of SugarHouse Casino's proposed expansion. Since it opened in 2010, SugarHouse has grown to employ nearly 1,500 workers, the majority hailing from Philadelphia.

Management has worked closely with local neighborhoods, city officials and law enforcement to ensure that it is a good neighbor, and they have succeeded. Activity has been added to a waterfront area which was dormant for too long. Concerns about parking and traffic congestion have been addressed. Through partnerships with the Philadelphia Police Department and the creation of the Penn Treaty Special

Services District, SugarHouse annually contributes 2 \$500,000 or more to local needs.

As I mentioned in my testimony regarding Philadelphia's next casino, the Gaming Act has many goals, revenue, job creation, support for tourism and economic development. SugarHouse's proposed expansion will further each of these goals. The expansion will increase gaming facilities, bringing the gaming floor from 51,000 square feet to approximately 90,000 square feet, increased gaming space will increase revenue to the Commonwealth, as well as the city and the school district through local share assessment.

The expansion will include meeting space, new restaurants, a parking garage and increased access to the Delaware waterfront. I applaud and encourage SugarHouse's effort to work with Philadelphia's planning community to ensure that they are good stewards of waterfront development.

Most importantly, the expansion will bring more than 700 construction jobs and 500 new permanent jobs to my district, many of which will be locally sourced from the surrounding neighborhoods.

SugarHouse was named to the Best Places to Work List in 2011, and I'm glad that they will continue to provide even more family-sustaining jobs.

These all fall into the larger context of what I believe to be lacking, which is a cost/benefit analysis. We've heard a lot about the benefits. I don't think we've heard anything about --- enough about the costs. And I urge you to look at both sides.

Number one, gambling addiction. 1 2. SugarHouse --- here's the question. At SugarHouse, 3 what percentage of the revenue comes from problem gamblers. SugarHouse has stated publicly that 75 5 percent of its business comes from within 10 --- I'm sorry, 12 to 15 miles, and that a large percentage of its database comes three, four, five times a week. SugarHouse knows who's gambling, how often and how much they lose. So, what it the data about frequency 10 here at SugarHouse? In what ZIP Codes do the frequent players live? All casinos have this data it's part of 11 12 their database.

The PGCB has an obligation to protect the public interest. This means protecting citizens from any and all predatory practices of casinos that result in cultivating gambling addiction and making sure that we minimize the amount of revenue coming from problem gamblers.

So again, here's the question. What percentage of SugarHouse's revenues come from problem gamblers? And if you, the regulators, who have the responsibility to the citizens, do not know the answer to that question, then you should not approve an expansion.

Crime, in the packet of information that

- 1 I'm submitting, I submit for the record statistics
- 2 compiled by local and State Police for the year 2012.
- 3 | Specifically, as these records reflect, the
- 4 | Philadelphia Police Department was called to
- 5 | SugarHouse and to the area within 500 feet of
- 6 | SugarHouse a total of 994 times in 2012. The
- 7 Pennsylvania State Police do not report the number of
- 8 calls, but they do report arrests. And in 2012, the
- 9 State Police made 161 arrests. These are costs that I
- 10 urge you to look into.
- 11 Finally, three weeks ago SugarHouse, to
- 12 the tune of \$650,000, settled federal government
- 13 allegations that the casino dumped pollutants into the
- 14 Delaware River during construction of the casino. The
- 15 United States asserts that from 2009 to 2010
- 16 | SugarHouse and/or persons acting on its behalf,
- 17 discharged dredged and fill material into the waters
- 18 of the United States. Despite three cease and desist
- 19 letters by the Army Corps, SugarHouse performed
- 20 unauthorized work.
- I'll wrap up because I see my time has
- 22 ended. I believe that this is a statutory criteria in
- 23 compliance with laws, including environmental laws,
- 24 and I ask you to look into this to determine if
- 25 violations have, in fact, occurred. And if so, to put

1 that into your decision of cost/benefit analysis. I
2 want to thank you for your time, and good afternoon.

This organization has been around, they say, since 1901. It's one of the oldest parades, folk parades in Philadelphia. But in reality, this parade has been going on since the 1600s down in south Philadelphia. And it's part of Philadelphia. And we needed help, and when we put our hands out, they helped us.

Like I said, I don't have any big

speeches to read. I think that --- I'd like to thank

the Board for bringing them here. I've seen the plan

that they proposed. I think they lived up to their

end in the first part of their program. I think that

they are capable of living up to the second part of

their program. But as a Philadelphian, been a

Philadelphian for 64 years, a Mummer for 55 years, I'd

like to thank the Board for doing their job and ask

you, please, to support their plans. And thank you

for allowing me to keep this great tradition going on.

My three grandsons, Billy, Finnegan and Seamus would

be here dancing for your and would clap for you and

tell you, let's go, Pop. Let's keep this parade

going. Okay. Thank you.

Most of my guys walk to work, too. I may not look like I do a lot of walking.

We do things for SugarHouse like pressure wash the outside, pick up deliveries, ground maintenance, et cetera. A few years back, when the economy wasn't so good, I was afraid to think what might have happened if our company wasn't a vendor for SugarHouse. Today we're a thriving company and I'm

Like I said, I'm president of a neighborhood group. It's called Ancient Order of Hibernians, which is an Irish Catholic organization. We represent approximately 300 families in Fishtown. And I can sincerely say there isn't one of my members that have not been touched in a positive way by

8 SugarHouse, by way of a job or through the Community 9 Benefits Agreement.

I was there in the beginning, when SugarHouse first came in our neighborhood and they promised many things. I'm here to tell you they delivered on everything they promised. I can't walk 20 feet in the casino without seeing one of my neighbors working.

Our neighborhood is the birthplace of our state. It's where William Penn made a treaty with the Native Americans. This happened one block north of SugarHouse. And in my humble opinion, SugarHouse is the best thing that's happened in my neighborhood since Mr. Penn signed that treaty. Thank you.

MR. GUBENO:

Good afternoon, Chairman Ryan, members

- of the Board. My name is Chris Gubeno, and I'm vice president of Urban Engineers, headquartered here in Philadelphia. For over 50 years Urban has been providing civil engineering and other design and
- 5 construction services to clients in the City of 6 Philadelphia.

- Today I'm not only here to testify on

 8 behalf of SugarHouse, but I'm also speaking on behalf

 9 of the owners and senior management of Urban. Being

 10 one of the larger engineering firms in the city, Urban

 11 has the honor of being approached from time to time by

 12 developers from other cities that are contemplating

 13 starting a project in Philadelphia.
 - Over the past five years, there have not been that many outside developers looking to start projects in the city. As the economy continues to pick up steam, hopefully this will change and those opportunities will start to grow.
 - One of those opportunities is this type of project which is in front of you today, the proposal for the SugarHouse expansion, of approximately \$150 million for the next phase. I've provided engineering and land development services in Philadelphia for the past 23 years, and this investment presents an outstanding opportunity for the

1 continued development of the Delaware riverfront, a 2 goal made a priority by Mayor Nutter.

In the short two-and-a-half years since SugarHouse Casino's opening, you began seeing initial changes of what Delaware Avenue and the waterfront could become. As the market begins to turn around, developers are beginning to purchase and improve properties along the corridor. The corridor will continue to improve through SugarHouse's investment, PennDOT's billion-dollar investment further north of Girard Avenue and the investments currently made by the local developers. These investments provide the North Delaware Avenue corridor with the potential to be the next great redevelopment area in the city.

To make this move, specific steps need to be taken, one of those being by this Board, approving SugarHouse's expansion plans. And then SugarHouse subsequently moving forward to build what is approved.

The City of Philadelphia has strived to plan and develop an active waterfront for the past 30-plus years. SugarHouse Casino can be an anchor to that waterfront plan, spurring subsequent substantial development as it is and providing even more jobs and tax revenue than the casino itself. This Board's

favorable vote will make a significant step in that direction, and I encourage the Board to vote in favor of the SugarHouse Casino's expansion plans later this month. Thank you.

And I am confident that it will provide more job opportunity development for the staff, who I know are up to the task. Thank you very much, and have a great afternoon.

Good afternoon. My name is Joe Rafter.

I'm a paid consultant for SugarHouse Casino. Until

this past July, I was the Chairman of the Special --

Casino and to date has received \$1,675,000.

As you heard from Tim Breslin, Maggie
O'Brien, among others, the money has been put to good
use in our community. The SSD has helped senior

The additional employment opportunities at the casino, especially many construction jobs, that is union construction jobs, that the expansion will create.

should approve SugarHouse Casino's expansion plans 1 2. later this month. Good afternoon, members of the Board.

- 1 | My name is Chip Laux. I'm the project
- 2 | manager/estimator for Gordon Group Electric in
- 3 | Feasterville, Pennsylvania. Gordon Group is one of
- 4 the larger electrical contractors in the Philadelphia

months, through the worse winter on record in the city relative to snowfall, SugarHouse pushed forward with the construction in order to --- for the facility to open and begin generating much-needed revenue for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the City of Philadelphia, including local communities like Fishtown.

Over that period, in excess of 83,000 man hours of work were created for local electricians employed on that project. At a time when construction projects within the City were quickly drying up and no opportunities on the horizon, SugarHouse Casino's project was a key component to the Philadelphia construction marketplace and employed electricians, who would otherwise be laid off due to lack of work.

Furthermore, it's my understanding that approximately 1,100 direct, permanent and many thousands of indirect jobs have been created by the operation of the casino since its opening two-and-a-half years ago. Again, these jobs would have otherwise never been created without the Board's approval of the SugarHouse Casino's license. Clearly SugarHouse is a success relative to the promise of the

creation of jobs and revenue of the state and city.

Good afternoon, Chairman Ryan and members of the Board. My name is Guy Pigliacelli, and I am the Philadelphia County Business Agent for the United Brotherhood of Carpenters Metropolitan Regional

Council of Philadelphia. Edward Coyrell is the Executive Secretary/Treasurer of our Council.

This afternoon I come to this Board to speak on behalf of unionized construction labor in the City of Philadelphia and provide testimony on behalf of SugarHouse, HSP Gaming, LP, as to why I believe this Board should approve their Phase 1 expansion plans.

The focus of my comments is on jobs, specifically construction jobs, as well as the integrity of a licensee that has provided the opportunity for hundreds of city and state residents to earn a living wage during a time that very few private corporations are coming into the City of Philadelphia or Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and even fewer large construction projects that are moving forward.

As this Board is aware, unemployment over the last few years within the City of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania has been at levels not seen since the early 1980s. And the construction trades in this city have been especially hard hit. In fact, for the vast majority of people in this room today, the economic environment over the last five years has probably been the worst

1 that they have experienced during their entire working
2 career.

Now more than ever, it is important for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the City of Philadelphia to attract quality corporations that can provide citizens the working opportunities that they deserve.

In 2006 this Board initially selected SugarHouse, HSP Gaming, LP, for a gaming license in the City of Philadelphia. And given the results, to date, over the short 30 months that they have been in operation, and it's clear that this Board made the proper decision at the outset. SugarHouse, HSP Gaming, LP, is the leading example of the type of corporation that this state and city needs to attract, to remain competitive with neighboring states and the remainder of our country.

To that end, it's important that this
Board permit SugarHouse to expand their facility so
that they can remain competitive with the other gaming
operations, both in state and out of state. But more
importantly, at least to this Board, it is that
expansion will allow SugarHouse to be in a better
position to actually grow the gaming marketplace in
Philadelphia, which will ultimately create more

1 revenue for the state and city and more jobs for its 2 citizens.

To date, SugarHouse Casino has created over 500 construction jobs, 500 jobs and over 1,100 permanent jobs. Nowhere else in the city or state, with the exception of the other casino projects, have that many jobs, been tremendous success. And moving forward we need to ensure that it remains competitive with other programs around the country. There are proposed 140 ---.

At Schnoll, we had the pleasure of working for SugarHouse Casino through its initial construction to present day, most recently completing an assignment last week, which hopefully will enable SugarHouse to proceed with their expansion plans.

I hear today that SugarHouse's expansion proposal will have a price tag of over \$150 million. Speaking as a contractor, that size of project is a huge opportunity for the City of Philadelphia and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to capitalize upon. While the painting portion of a construction project is fairly limited, all construction projects have a painting component. As a result, we have the honor of participating in lots of construction projects, some small and some large, but no recent in the neighborhood of that proposed sum. I applaud the SugarHouse ownership for moving forward to create a first-class casino destination that the city and state can be
