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PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN:

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All right, ladies and gentleman. We will now have a public hearing. We will first have a public hearing today on Presque Isle Downs Petition to reduce the number of Slot Machines and Table Games they presently have on their gaming floor. I see all representatives from Presque Isle are here. I would ask everyone speaking to please state and spell your name for the court reporter prior to your presentation. And also, because this is a formal proceeding, I would ask all non-attorney witnesses to please stand and be sworn in.

ATTORNEY SCHRIER:

Good morning Mr. Chairman, members of the Commission, Ex-officio members. What I'll do is I'll introduce the folks that we have, I'll have them stand up and then they can be sworn in in case they need to testify in the process.

CHAIRMAN:

That's fine.

ATTORNEY SCHRIER:

Okay. My name is Stephen D. Schrier.

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                 CHAIRMAN:
                 Thank you, gentlemen. You can sit down.
   Mr. Schrier?
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ATTORNEY SCHRIER:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. The Petition that's before you today seeks some very simple relief. It's a reduction of slot machines and table games at the Presque Isle Facility. The reduction is from slot machines from 1,720 to 1,580, which is 140 games, or an 8.1 percent decrease. And the tables, it's a

1 reduction from 46 to 42, for a nine and a half percent 2 decrease in tables.

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Very briefly, the reduction that is being sought today by Presque Isle is primarily driven by the significant changes in the market conditions in the Erie region since the Gaming Act was passed and since the last time that Presque Isle Downs was before you approximately two years ago.

The presentation that we have for you today will illustrate the increase in competition in the region and actually will serve as the first step in Presque Isle Downs' plans for a significant capital investment in new amenities for the property. They also seek in adding these amenities to create the right mixture and size, number of machines and games at the property to be more productive while enhancing their customer's experience.

Once you approve this Petition today,
Presque Isle Downs intends to work closely with the
Board's staff and BIE on its enhancements and its
exciting new floor plans. We're here today because
under the Gaming Act and the regulations, a Petition
is required to be filed if the reduction in slot
machines exceeds two percent of the current amount
authorized, or if the reduction in tables is more than

ten percent of those authorized tables.

Presque Isle Downs filed its Petition
with the Board on February 18th and the Office of
Enforcement Council (OEC) filed its Answer with
confidential exhibits on March 18th. OEC did not
object to the relief, but did request that certain
conditions be imposed.

What I'd like to do is introduce again

Jeff Favre who's the General Manager of Presque Isle

Downs who will provide you with the background and the reasons for today's requested relief. And the others that we have here are standing by to elaborate on any questions that you may have. So, with that, I'd like to introduce Mr. Favre.

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16 JEFF FAVRE, HAVING BEEN PREVIOUSLY SWORN, TESTIFIED AS

17 FOLLOWS:

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A. Thank you, Steve. Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, Control Board staff. I'd like to thank you for the time today and the opportunity to be in front of you. As Steve said, the Act requires that we must file a Petition for the Reduction of Games. But it's really more than a reduction of games in our opinion.

It's more of an opportunity to enhance our floor,

create an ambiance and atmosphere in an environment that has more energy and creates the excitement that we believe that the guests desire.

The competitive environment in western PA with Ohio coming in line as grown very immensely and it's much more intense than it was many years ago. In fact in 2007 --- we'll kind of go through it. The competition in 2007, you'll essentially have four casinos, one of those being us. But then in 2013, of course, you had more come online with the Horseshoe, kind of starting that in May of 2012. Then in 2015, we have 11 casinos, which includes us.

So, you know, the primary battle and challenge that we have is without a doubt certainly competition. You've had an increase in supplier inventory of approximately 40 percent since 2011. It's a very competitive market that, you know, we have to find our way to compete and when. And we believe that the enhancements and the changes that we intend to make will certainly help us do that.

The Petition being filed is in our opinion, my opinion, a result of the enhancements and the changes that we want to make. So, certainly, you know, that's essential in getting approved and necessary before we can actually move forward and start these. The timing

of it is very important also because we consider or
peak season starting on June 1st and it continues
really into October then starts to die down. So,
getting these down prior to that going into the peak
season, so we have very little interruption or
disruptions to guests, is in our best interest as well
as the Commonwealths.

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So, you know, the competition has certainly had a big impact on our gross Gaming revenues. Since 2011 through 2014 we've seen approximately a 28 percent decrease in gross Gaming revenues. We feel that we would start the level off, so to speak, or it's kind of --- its reaching it's, you know --- it's made a point of impact, we think. The brunt of the storm is Again, we have to find our niche and find behind us. a way to compete. And we believe that these changes is the beginning of that. It's an opportunity to right-size our floor, to generate a better pattern flow, traffic flow, ingress, egress, a more comfortable space environment. Not too crowded, not too tight. Better sight lines, symmetry. As better, you know, group banking's and the way that we lay out our floor, as well as designate a smoking and non-smoking floor, which I'll kind of touch on a little bit later.

So, the reduction of game count is required because of the Act, but really it's an opportunity to enhance and improve the atmosphere and ambiance of the environment of our property and to compete in this, you know, intense market.

To talk about Eldorado, you know, the Eldorado philosophy is very, very guest focused. Not to say that we wasn't focused before Eldorado because we certainly were, but I think the focus on the guests has even been enhanced more. We all understand that the reason why we exist is because of our guests and we have to make them our primary focus and make sure that they have the experience that they desire. So, you know, Eldorado being very focused on the guest experience primarily with food driven and, you know, the slot experience, slot signage, these games, new technology, you know, putting capital back into our property and give yourselves the opportunity to compete.

So, you know, Eldorado is certainly supportive and behind us and willing to support us as well as the Commonwealth. And it's going to be a great partner. I'm excited about the things --- of course the, you know, merger didn't take place until September. But here we are at the beginning of the new year and I can

tell you that my experience has been very good and
very supportive. And there's no doubt in my mind that
Eldorado's going to have a positive impact for the
Commonwealth as well as Presque Isle Downs.

Of course the relief requested, as Steve stated, the reduction in game count to 1,580 units of slots and 42 in table games. We believe that is the right number. We, you know, did a lot of research, did a lot of analyst, did a lot of, you know, backwards with looking and trying to do some forward thinking.

And, you know, 1,580 games on slot side doesn't put us in any harm in any way in regards to utilization.

Utilization being, you know, the number of games being in play with the total count. We don't really see those being a problem because the game count for 850 games, with 1,580 games totaling with 54 percent utilization.

850 is about our average in peak season on a Friday and Saturday. And peak time being really between 6:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. We would be at 60 percent with 950 games, 66 percent of 1,050, 73 percent at 1,150 games. During that peak season last year from June 1st until October 1st, we only exceeded 1,250 games of play one time. So, we don't believe that utilization by reducing the game count will be an

1 issue. We actually think that it will help us in many 2 ways.

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For example, we have approximately 1,100 games that are not supported by the manufacturers anymore. They give us an opportunity to reduce, you know, those games that are no longer supported. Those 140 games that come off, we're able to strip them of their parts to be able support the remaining games within our footprint, so therefore reducing, you know, our maintenance costs or our supply costs to maintain those games to keep them on the floor while we move in to future capital cycles to replace those. And that process will continue until we replenish those older cabinets that's on our floor.

Balancing the removal of the right games. So, take, for example, you know, IGT is the vendor that has the largest presence on our floor. So, of course we'd want to try and remove more IGT games then balance that with the different vendors on our floor, so that we can maintain those part supplies and keep the right manufacturing mix on our floor. That allows us to do that. And then future capital cycles allows us to eventually replace all those games and continue to refresh and enhance our floor for our guest because at the end of the day, you know, 90 percent of our

revenue comes from, you know, our slot customers and,
you know, they're chasing the best games and the best
programs. And I think that this will certainly help
us, not hurt us.

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Win per unit. We believe win per unit will certainly go up. Part of the reason for that is reduction in the game count. But also the game mix of --- your denom mix as well as having some newer programs on your floor. Some of the older programs have less, you know, approved games in the library. Therefore you're limited in what you can actually put in play and the guests can play. New games refresh capital. That allows us to put better games, better programs. So, that will help as far as with the win per unit. So, we don't see win per unit going down.

In fact in 2011, we had 2,070 units. The win per unit was 223. In 2012, we reduced it down to 2,031 units. The win per unit was 202. 2013 is when the last reduction took place when they were originally in front of you. Win per unit actually went up \$4 in 206. And in 2014, 1,720 units and a win per unit if 190.

It's not really the reduction of units that is the problem. The problem is competition. You've had an increase of about 40 percent in supply. Right in

our, you know, primary market. That's the challenge and the hurdle that we face. And reducing down to 1,580 is only rightsizing our self. Giving us the opportunity to enhance the amenities, the ambiance, the environment, create the center bar, enhance and improve our high limits, improve the interest and the exterior façade to LBV Steakhouse, enhance the north sidebar by giving it a facelift and improvements. So, a lot of these things are really what we believe is going to help us improve the guest experience.

As a result of that, the game reduction is why we're in front of you today. The 46 games down to 42 in table games, we currently have four games on our floor that we don't even have floats on them. For example, we have two blackjacks, one roulette, one craps that we have no chips on those tables at all right now. So, reducing those four games, technically, they're not there now. They're like a piece of furniture because they have no action, no chips. So, table games we really see it as zero impact because they're never in play.

To kind of give you an idea, and we're excited about it, is to show the pictures in the presentation --- it's kind of a global overview. Go back to the overall. So this is kind of the overall --- and I'll

kind of walk you through it. The A part is the center bar, which is right in the center. That's why we call it the center bar. We believe that's going to kind of be the hub, the focal point, the meeting point. As you can see right below that, if you went straight down from A, the center part, that's our valley entrance, main part ---. So, you have a nice sightline coming in from that entrance.

And then over to the far left where F is is our primary entrance for the north side where the bulk of our parking actually takes place, south parking. You have a nice sightline to the bar from there as well. And then over to the far right is our south side entrance, which you'll have a nice sightline into that center bar as well. So trying to create the sightlines into that center bar, being a focal point, the hub of energy and kind of the meeting point is the concept, with nice TVs, nice sound package. That it will be, you know, the energy that kind of bleeds out from that point.

B on that is basically an existing bar that we look to close in and make a service bar as well as storage. Because one of the things that we're doing with these changes is --- right now, I'm kind of embarrassed to even say this, but we have plastic on

our floor as far as cups and glassware. We're looking to change that to actual glass and try and improve the guest experience to the perception of value. So, you know, we need a place to store some of the stuff because we don't have it currently. So, really there's a service bar and storage area.

If you look down to the bottom right, that is D which is basically our high limit room as it currently sits today. So, we're looking to enhance that area, give it, you know, a better feeling, you know, better energy. We'll show pictures here shortly that will kind of give you an idea of what we're actually looking to do and what it will look like as its end product.

E is where the La Bonne Vie, our steakhouse is,
LBV. If you was to walk by LBV right now, if you
really wasn't paying attention, you probably wouldn't
even know there's a restaurant there. It's probably
one of the best restaurants in Erie and we're proud of
it. And I can tell you that it's actually getting
better with Eldorado's, you know, improvements and
changes they're making. It's a shame that, you know,
you don't really know it's there unless you just
happen to stumble on it. So we want to try and
actually create a, you know, point of entry, make it

stand out. So, that's the LBV.

And then F is the north side bar which currently exists. And we're just going to refresh it and enhance it, put new TVS in and tie it into some of the same, you know, finished materials, color patterns and materials for it, to kind of start to tie it in and make it all one look and feel. To kind of give you an idea, if you look at the first slide, that's the LBV entrance, kind of what it would look like. Again, try to give it a point of entry, give it some appeal so where you actually see it rather than not see it as you walk by it.

The next one is the high limit room. Give you an idea what that looks like. You know, we have made some changes to high limit within the past year that have already had a positive impact. We originally had only two blackjack tables there. And more games did not have a very good feel and we changed it where we put five games in; four blackjack one mini bac. Changed the game layout, the configuration. And we've already seen, you know, quite a bit of improvement.

We believe that by doing what we intend to do here, that only gives the opportunity to improve it even further and potentially recapture some of the play, particularly the play that we've lost around the

Cleveland area when the Horseshoe opened in May of 2012. May of 2012 when the Horseshoe opened, it made a material, negative impact that we want to try and recapture some of that. And I believe that we have recaptured some of it. And this will only help us, including some of the Asian play that we've made a focus and trying to recapture, which we're starting to see some of it resurface.

And then the main one, which is the center bar, again, being right in the center bar, center of the floor. Nice TVs, trying to make it, you know, the place where you want to go watch a game and be at in Erie. You want to make it the, you know, place hey, let's go to Presque Isle Downs and make it that focal point and get it to bleed out from there.

So, you know, these are the reasons really in my opinion why we're in front of you today. The Petition is essential because of the Act. But those changes is really what --- you know, it's the catalyst that got this moving and started in that direction. To kind of give you an idea of the end product which what it will look like when all is said and done. So, today with the Petition, you know, we're asking for the reduction in game. We can get started. The end result of what you see, that will not be that way until December

because we will work with OEC and BIE, as well as the --- you know, onsite and all of our routine submissions to make sure that we do everything as required and necessary in all of our projects to get where we need to be. So, that will be ongoing.

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Once we get the approval, we would begin immediately in removing the games in that center bar area, as well as some games from the LBV entrance and the high limit room to start construction and try and expedite it as quickly as possible and try and get done by that June 1st date.

As soon as we get done with that and the construction gets turned back over to us, then we would start back on our regular OP processes to basically reconfigure the floor to get the smoking and non-smoking designated areas as well defined. That's going to take some time because the last thing that I want to do is going into our peak season is have our floor all messed up and disrupt the guests and create frustration.

So the concept is to, you know, start on Monday morning, figure out exactly what our game count will be for that project. Say if it's, you know, 60 games, we work on doing those 60 games for that week. We're starting in the section that is our most least played

section and work through the most least played section 1 2 all the way up until we get into the busy sections 3 during that peak season, so hopefully we get out of peak season. And now, we're going to the more busier 5 part of our floor.

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That way, come Friday, you know, my objective and mandate to my team will be that come Friday when the quests --- which is our busiest time where we make the majority of our revenue on Friday evening on until, you know, Sunday evening, I don't want any disruptions to the guests and I don't want them to be frustrated. I don't want to be an obstruction zone. Games are back in play, it seems normal to them. Come Monday morning, we start it again. And, you know, Friday, they're back in play. You know, it seems like everything is back to normal. So that process will take from June well into December to methodically do So, we minimize and mitigate the frustration and it. disruptions to quests, so we don't have any further, you know, revenue erosion.

When all said and done, there's no doubt that I believe that we're moving in the right direction. we're certain to be the right thing to do. Otherwise, I wouldn't be sitting in here in front of you today asking you for this if I didn't think it was the right thing to do. I think that when we're completely done with it, the first full 12 months, that we will actually see a revenue increase, both from slots and tables, from what our trailing 12 months was previously before that.

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The smoking and non-smoking designation in our opinion gives us an opportunity to market to both the smoker and the non-smoker. Of course, Ohio is non-smoking. Ohio is where we've had the biggest impact of course from competition. And we believe that if you can have an entrance where I'm a non-smoker and go into the entrance and have access to a restroom, have access to the cage, have access to the food and beverage venues, have access to the table games without even having to go through a smoking section, that gives us an opportunity to have a competitive advantage. We believe that we will be able to do that.

So, you know, the Petition today allows us to just get the project started. Thereafter, through the regular OP submissions, we will eventually get to the non-smoking, smoking destination where we're able to market to both of those guests. And we believe that, you know, we have that done. It's going to need, you know, a little bit of tweaking but we'll tweak that

through, you know, the OP submissions process once we get done with the projects to eventually get there.

And as always, we'll work with the architect as well as your team to make sure that everything that's being done and being done in the right way and compliant.

And at the end of it, we certainly believe we'll be better positioned to move forward and recapture market share and make positive things happen. So it's kind of it in a nutshell. You know, I've tried to answer as many of the questions before we go into questions. So, we won't have any reduction in force or staff. In fact, we think that it actually helps us a little bit to improve our guest service because now, you know, we're able to kind of refocus some of these resources and pay more attention to the guests.

And, you know, so no reduction in force. We believe the game count is right-sized. And we believe the smoking/non-smoking with the enhanced amenities and offering is a good plan. And we certainly appreciate your support and approval to move forward and give us the opportunity to execute it and prove to you that we all made the right decision.

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ATTORNEY ADAMS:

- 7 Thank you. Good morning, Chairman Ryan
- 8 and other Board members.
- 9 CROSS EXAMINATION

10 BY ATTORNEY ADAMS:

- 11 Q. Jeff, you talked about how Ohio is non-smoking.
- 12 Do you believe the fact that you're going to have your
- 13 segregated non-smoking and smoking sections will help
- 14 bring the Ohio customer-base back to Presque Isle?
- 15 \mid A. I believe it has the potential to. You know, we
- 16 have our guest surveys that, you know, we receive on
- 17 the daily and weekly basis. And, you know, one of the
- 18 major complaints is, you know, that they have to go
- 19 through smoking to get to non-smoking. You know, of
- 20 course, you know, smoking always performs better than
- 21 | non-smoking. And, you know, the Clean Air Act of
- 22 being 50/50 balanced is --- really, it's a difficult
- 23 chore and something that we must comply with and we
- 24 understand that and we intend to do so.
- But trying to position the non-smoking to where

the non-smoking to have the opportunity to not go
through the smoking, as well as give them the right
game mix to where it's attractive to them as well as
having the table games right there to create energy
--- Because the last thing that we want to do is
create dead pockets to where you have a non-smoking
section and you go in and it just seems like wow, man,
this place is not too busy. And then you go into the

And you're trying to balance that is really a challenge. But we think that, you know, the plan that we have addresses that and gives us the opportunity to go back and market to the Ohio guests as both smoker and non-smoking.

smoking section and it's hopping.

- Q. And after your last reduction of slot machines and table games in 2013, Presque Isle implemented a pretty aggressive marketing campaign to draw more customers to the casino. Do you guys have any plans for any new marketing campaigns once the reduction and enhancements have been completed?
 - A. Since I've been here, which about 15 months ago, we haven't stopped. We will continue various plans that are actually in place now. There will be more plans that we will be ruling out here shortly. We are testing things that is actually in the field or in the

market as we speak. Those tests kind of give us an idea of where we need to make adjustments or modifications to eventually kind of rule it out to the entire population.

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We have certainly had some positive results in what we call the battleground area, which is right across the state line, going into Ashtabula and to Mentor, that area, which is really a key area for not only ourselves, but for Hollywood Mahoning Valley, Horseshoe Cleveland, Thistledown and Hard Rock because they're right there. And it's almost, you know, same drive time to any of those places. But we believe that our location, you know, give them the opportunity to basically get right off the exit, you're at our doorstep, not having to go through Cleveland or any other traffic. And the drive time is not any, you know, worse really than going into Cleveland.

So that area is an area that we have really focused on and have seen some positive results. But, you know, our primary focus has really been in our backyard which is Erie County and, you know, making sure that we take care of the people that's right there around us.

Q. You said most of your competition for the new casino is obviously in Ohio. Since the opening of

those final casinos in Ohio, have you done any 1 2 tracking of the number of players or percentage of 3 players you've lost from the Ohio base? Well, I can tell you that, you know, the revenue 4 5 --- when you look at the revenue distribution, the 6 allocation of contribution by state, you know, prior to the Ohio casinos opening, the contribution to revenue was much, much higher than it is today, which kind of goes back to, you know, my comment on focusing 10 on Erie County. At one time, you know, Ohio was 11 closer to 50 percent of our revenue contribution, where today, you know, Erie County is 50 percent of 12 1.3 our revenue contribution. And that mix just, you 14 know, it's all due to competition. It just means that 15 now the Erie customers are more important. 16 And trust me, you know, I'll take, you know, any 17 quest from any jurisdiction in the state. And, you 18 know, we've identified the areas where we've had 19 erosion or what we consider inactive quests, at risk 20 quests, fading guests. And like I said, we are 21 testing some things to try and get them, you know, 22 back into our door. It's part of the reason that we 23 believe the enhanced amenities and atmosphere gives an 24 opportunity to recapture some of those, making changes

and go back out and be able to communicate to them,

- 1 hey, come see what we've done, you know, it's changed,
- 2 | that's new. And give them an opportunity and be able
- 3 to market that. So we believe that we certainly have
- 4 some potential to recapture.
- 5 Q. Okay. And you said that slot machines that
- 6 you're looking to be removed are no longer supported
- 7 and you're going that for parts for the future. Are
- 8 | the vast majorities of those machines owned by Presque
- 9 Isle or are they all?
- 10 A. They're all owned by Presque Isle. For the most
- 11 part of them, I'd say that all 140 have zero book
- 12 | value, been fully depreciated.
- 13 Q. And you talked about four table games being
- 14 removed that you don't even have chips on them at this
- 15 point, so you basically consider them dead tables.
- 16 What's the performance of the slot machines that
- 17 | you're looking to be removing, those 140 machines?
- 18 A. The process was, you know, of course first we
- 19 wanted to make sure that the 140 units that we would
- 20 be removing we be a part of the 1,100 non-supported
- 21 units. So it would be nice to remove those because
- 22 | they're no longer supported. So it kind of starts
- 23 your dead process. And then we looked at, you know,
- 24 the utilization of the occupancy. In other words, how
- 25 often is it played, then the coin in per unit as well

- as the win per unit. Then you have to take into consideration of how many of those units that we currently have.
- So, you know, if you just say, you know, Game A, if Game A has, you know, 15 of those on the floor, we're able to maybe possibly to remove move of those
- 7 than Game B where we only have three of them on the
- 8 floor. We had to take into consideration location,
- 9 smoking, non-smoking, the game count that you have on
- 10 the floor, the actual cabinet manufacturer. So, a lot
- 11 of variables went into it. We believe that we're
- 12 removing the best 140 games that we could remove from
- 13 that floor.
- 14 Q. Now, with the center bar, you are actually adding
- 15 | 11, I believe, bar table games; correct?
- 16 A. We're adding 11 bar top unit, poker units, into
- 17 | that bar.
- 18 Q. Okay. And you said that you hope to have the end
- 19 product done by December of this year. And with your
- 20 Petition, you filed the first three phases, I believe,
- 21 of OP 22. Do you know about how many more phases are
- 22 going to be before we end in December or is that going
- 23 to depend on how everything goes?
- 24 A. It kind of depends on how everything goes and how
- 25 aggressive we get or try not to be. I mean, it just

31 kind of depends of business volumes. If some of the 1 2 marketing programs that we're working on are more 3 successful, meaning that we're driving more volume in, 4 then that means we may have to slow down, you know, 5 the reconfiguration for the end product being in 6 December. Because I don't want to have, you know, any games down on the weekend unless it is absolutely necessary. I don't want to have it appearing like a construction zone and people have to walk around and 10 there's barricades or walls are put up. 11 So, the more successful we are with marketing, 12 the more that the other projects will be slowed down. 13 I hope that they are slowed down because that means 14 that we are successful in some of the strategies and 15 programs that we're working on. I believe that the 16 six-month window gives us enough time to get it done 17 because, you know, moving out of the peak season, we 18 should be okay then to kind of expedite it and get it done by the end of the year. 19 20 Okay. I don't know if you can also this for

somebody else. But Eldorado also owns Scioto Downs in Ohio and Mountaineer in West Virginia. Have there been like declines in customer base at those casinos with all the added Ohio competition, to your knowledge or ---?

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1 A. You know, I can have Mr. Billhimer, our COO, kind 2 of touch on that.

MR. BILLHIMER:

Hi. Joseph Billhimer,

5 B-I-L-L-H-I-M-E-R, Executive Vice President and Chief

6 Operating Officer for Eldorado Resorts. Yes, we've

seen declines in West Virginia as a result of the

8 | competition in Ohio, as well as Pittsburgh over the

9 years. Outside of Downs, we have not. We've seen a

10 steady and slow market growth in that mark.

ATTORNEY ADAMS:

12 Well, I guess now specifically with

13 Mountaineer, have you had to do any enhancement slot

14 reduction of the table games, with that casino due to

15 | the market saturation?

MR. BILLHIMER:

17 Yeah, we've gone from well over 3,000

18 units down to about 2,100 units in that particular

19 facility over the last three years.

ATTORNEY ADAMS:

21 And have you seen improvements in the

22 customer base or the revenues coming in since you've

23 done this?

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MR. BILLHIMER:

We've seen, as Jeff mentioned earlier, a

1 higher win per unit, a more efficient property, as we 2 downsized the property.

ATTORNEY ADAMS:

So, you've seen it actually helping
Mountaineer then with the changes you've made?

MR. BILLHIMER:

Yeah, you know, as Jeff was saying we don't want dead sections within the property. And if you have too much supply, it has a lack of ambiance and excitement.

ATTORNEY ADAMS:

Okay. Thank you.

MR. BILLHIMER:

Thank you.

15 BY ATTORNEY ADAMS:

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- 16 Q. And I think, Jeff, my last questions are going to
- 17 be for you. You said with the final floor plans that
- 18 | you plan a more segregated smoking/non-smoking area.
- 19 Do you know what the breakdown of the number of slot
- 20 machines and table games will be in each area?
- 21 A. Yes, let's see. The slot count for smoking will
- 22 be approximately 919 and then the non-smoking will be
- 23 661. And then the square footage is, you know,
- 24 approximately the 50/50 ratio.
- 25 Q. Okay.

- 1 A. And of course, like I said, we will work with you
- 2 guys on every time we do those and have the architect
- 3 involved.
- 4 Q. Okay. And I believe you said earlier that you're
- 5 | planning on offering the same type of slot machines in
- 6 each area; is that correct? Like the type of games
- 7 and ---?
- 8 A. We're trying to do our best to, you know, spread
- 9 | the game type, game type being manufacturer, as well
- 10 as being theme, as well as denomination. And you try
- 11 and balance that as best as you can, in smoking and
- 12 non. I can tell you that it's not a perfect science.
- 13 And I'm not sure that we will ever get there as far as
- 14 | it being a perfect science. But we will do our best.
- The challenge is that, you know, spending the
- 16 capital dollars as wisely as we can to get the best
- 17 return is sometimes difficult in managing that
- 18 process. I believe that the mix that we're going to
- 19 have in the non-smoking is more attractive than it is
- 20 today, while not reducing or minimizing anything in
- 21 the smoking section.
- 22 Q. And I'm assuming that's going to be the same with
- 23 table games; do you plan to have both smoking and
- 24 non-smoking table games available ---
- 25 A. Yes.

- 1 Q. --- once you finish?
- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 Q. Okay. And you had talked about having a
- 4 | non-smoking entrance. Which entrance would this be at
- 5 | the casino, if you know?
- 6 A. That entrance would be the south side entrance.
- 7 If you show the slide, I can kind of point it to the
- 8 right ---. If you look, it's really --- it's the one
- 9 to the far right. For those of you that's familiar
- 10 with the property, that is the parking that's near the
- 11 administration building.
- 12 Part of the reason why we chose that is because
- 13 the parking on the north side is our primary entrance
- 14 as the most guest counts entering in through that
- 15 door. But it's also into our smoking section, which
- 16 is our busiest section, performs, you know, much
- 17 better than the non-smoking. In fact, I think, you
- 18 know, it does about 70 percent of our total, you know,
- 19 slot win, which is in the smoking section. So we have
- 20 more smoking places than we do have non-smoking, so
- 21 | naturally you would want the parking to be on the
- 22 | north side.
- 23 Q. Okay. And you talked about being able to go
- 24 navigate through the casino without leaving the
- 25 non-smoking section. And I believe you talked about

- 1 being able to go up to the bar. Is that the center
- 2 bar that they'll be able to get to without leaving the
- 3 non-smoking section or is there going to be another
- 4 bar area?
- 5 A. They will have their own bar. When we close the
- 6 one bar and turn it into a service bar and storage
- 7 area, the bar then is currently back in --- which will
- 8 be the entire non-smoking section near the mutual,
- 9 which actually is our --- currently our best bar on
- 10 the property right now which is really not in use
- 11 except on weekends which is a shame. We're going to
- 12 change that and put it in use all the time, which will
- 13 be the non-smoking bar.
- 14 But they will also have an opportunity on some of
- 15 the center bar to enter into, some of it being
- 16 non-smoking. So we're trying to balance that as well.
- 17 The only venue that they will not be able to get to
- 18 while having to go through a smoking section would be
- 19 the La Bonne Vie Restaurant. Outside of that, they
- 20 | will be able to go into the Clubhouse, Parrot Café,
- 21 the buffet and the gift shop without having to go
- 22 through smoking.
- 23 Q. And do you plan to market the fact that Presque
- 24 | Isle is going to have this more segregated
- 25 | smoking/non-smoking areas?

A. Absolutely.

2 ATTORNEY ADAMS:

3 | Okay. I don't have anything else.

4 Thank you.

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CHAIRMAN:

Does OEC have any presentation?

ATTORNEY ADAMS:

I do not. However, representatives from the Bureau of Investigations and Enforcements (BIE), specifically the Financial Investigative Unit and the Bureau of Casino Compliance, are present here today if you have any questions.

Essentially we do not have any objection to Presque Isle Downs Petition to reduce the number of slot machines and table games pursuant to the OP 22, phases one through three that they've already filed. We would request that --- that you approve --- that the approval is subject to the 13 conditions set forth in our Answer filed March 18th. And it's my understanding that Presque Isle does not having any objection to those conditions.

A. No, we do not.

CHAIRMAN:

Okay. Why don't we see if any questions

25 from the Board. Greg?

MR. FAJT:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Mr. Favre, you mentioned this and I didn't write the numbers down.

4 But you're currently proposing 1,580 slots and 42

5 tables. What was the high watermark for both slots

6 and tables at Presque Isle?

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7 A. You know, I can't speak for the tables. I'm not 8 entirely sure there.

MR. FAJT:

10 Okay. I'm more interested in slots.

11 A. The slot side, it was 2,071, if I'm not mistaken.

MR. FAJT:

2,071, thank you. You also talked a little bit about utilization and specifically on the weekends. And with the new proposed number of slot machines at 1,580, I recall that your high utilization on the weekends was, you know, somewhere around 1,260 I thought you had mentioned.

Why not reduce slot machines even more?

I'm not proposing that because that causes us angst

from a tax standpoint and the horse racing revenues

and all that. But why not do that? And is this going

to be a two or three step transaction where you're

going to come to us six or nine months from now and

ask us to reduce slots even more?

I surely hope not. In fact, if anything, I'm an 1 2 optimist, meaning that I believe that some of the 3 changes that we've already made and the changes that 4 we will be making will drive our utilization higher. 5 MR. FAJT: 6 Okay. But again, if you're proposing 1,580 and you're high water, you know, utilization is 1,260 and that's on your busiest weekends, why not propose a reduction of even more? 10 ATTORNEY PITRE: 11 Commissioner Fajt, I can answer that 12 question. MR. FAJT: 1.3 14 Thank you, Cyrus. 15 ATTORNEY PITRE:

They can't go below 1,500 slot machines.

17 | The Act won't allow it.

18 MR. FAJT:

19 Got you. Thank you. I forgot about

20 that.

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MR. BILLHIMER:

I would also add, too, that even 80 percent utilization is a good number, too. We definitely don't want to be at 95 percent utilization where people are walking around and don't have access

to various devices. So, it's a pretty good number for any of our jurisdictions given that 70, 80 percent during peak periods, outside of the New Year's Eve and occasional, you know, crazy busy day.

MR. FAJT:

Okay. Thank you. Your timeline for completing your reservations, Mr. Favre, I think you said by the end of this year, by the end of 2015 all the renovations that you outlined; is that correct?

A. The actual enhancements, renovations and the addition of the center bar ---.

MR. FAJT:

You wanted to do this summer?

14 A. That, we would love to get done by June 1st.

MR. FAJT:

Right.

A. June 15th at the latest depending on how quickly we can get started and how well things go. Being that we don't run into any obstacles or roadblocks that delay the time. So ideally, June 1st. And then thereafter, we would start submitting the routine OPs like we normally would to get the reconfigurations done by the end of the year, while minimizing and mitigating floor disruption and, you know, revenue erosions to the best extent possible.

41 1 MR. FAJT: 2 Okay. Has capital already been 3 allocated to do all the renovations that we talked 4 about today? 5 A. Yes, sir. Been allocated, approved and we're 6 waiting for, you know, wanting to be spent, ---7 MR. FAJT: 8 Right. 9 --- work to be done. 10 MR. FAJT: 11 And one last comment. You know, the 12 non-smoking entrance I think is a smart idea. Again, I've said this before. It is the number one complaint 1.3 14 that I hear and that I think other Board members hear 15 when we're out doing speaking and just talking to our friends and neighbors. So the ability to enter a 16 17 casino and play, you know, have a drink, have 18 something to eat, without going into a smoking area, I 19 think is a smart play. And I can tell you that the 20 legislature is also looking at issues like that. So, 21 thank you very much, Mr. Chairman. 22 CHAIRMAN: 2.3 Thank you. Keith?

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MR. MCCALL:

I'm good.

CHAIRMAN:

John?

MR. MCNALLY:

I have just a couple questions. If we can pull up the photos, the screens from pages 14 and 15 on your program. There's no graph. I'm assuming that the black tables are non-smoking and the red tables are smoking; correct?

A. Yes.

MR. MCNALLY:

So based on that presentation with your end product, you're not going to have any table games back in your non-smoking area; is that correct?

A. No. The non-smoking will actually be on the --- if you look at center bar where --- kind of the purple ---

MR. MCNALLY:

Uh-huh (yes.)

A. --- and you go to the far right, those will be the smoking tables that will boarder all the non-smoking slots from that entrance. And I can tell you that, you know, by the time we submitted this and having conversations with the OEC, you know, we would've probably moved some of that around to make it flow better and have it segregated better, which we

1 | will have the opportunity to do once we submit the OPs

2 and work with the OEC making sure that we get the

3 | right mix and the right flow because I think that we

4 can actually do a better job than what's on this

5 drawing. But we were kind of out of time. And not

6 being able to get the architect to do everything that

we need to do to be able to be here today. So I think

8 | we can actually improve it from the way that it sits

9 today to have a better flow to keep them segregated to

10 the best extent possible.

MR. MCNALLY:

12 I think you had indicated that there

13 | would be no reduction in staffing; is that correct?

14 A. Yes, sir.

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MR. MCNALLY:

With regard to the staffing. Would

17 there be designated staffing for the non-smoking area

18 versus the smoking area?

19 A. Yes, sir. I mean, there already is today. So

20 really it's just a matter of, you know, changing the

spread a little bit and reallocating the current

22 resources.

MR. MCNALLY:

24 And with regard to the non-smoking

25 entrance, at that chokepoint, I assume that there will

1 be a security stand outside?

2 A. Yes, sir. It's there today.

MR. MCNALLY:

4 Are there any changes contemplated to

5 | your live racing or your pari-mutuel areas?

6 A. Not at this time. We've had some discussion,

thinking about some things, potentially for next year.

8 | The improvements that we are making this year is not

9 material in regards to changing the existing floor

10 layout or configuration. It's just making

11 enhancements and improvements to what's already there,

12 you know, making the guest experience better.

We've worked with the HBPA and the Racing

14 | Commission on those projects and the desired

15 approvals. And we've actually started some of those

16 projects, I believe last week or the week before, in

17 enhancing that experience for our racing guests.

MR. MCNALLY:

19 No further questions. Thank you,

20 Chairman.

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CHAIRMAN:

22 Dave?

MR. WOODS:

(Indicates no).

25 CHAIRMAN:

Tony?

MR. MOSCATO:

No, thank you.

CHAIRMAN:

I guess one question, Mr. Favre. Has Pennsylvania's policy on smoking, especially vis-à-vis Ohio, has that helped you up at Presque Isle get back and of the business you at first lost to Cleveland?

A. You know, I certainly believe that --- the fact that we do have the ability to offer, you know, a smoking experience is a competitive advantage. And without a doubt gives us the opportunity to protect some of the Ohio play that otherwise we might lose entirely if Ohio was smoking.

CHAIRMAN:

Ex-officio members?

MR. REDDING:

Mr. Chairman, thank you. As you know, one of the many legislative reasons for the enactment of the Racehorse Development and Gaming Act was to enhance live horse racing and breeding programs through the infusion of monies into the racehorse development fund based upon gross terminal revenues. We are concerned as a department, as time goes on that more slot machine operators reduce the number of slot

46 machines at their facilities, it will threaten to 1 2 lower gross terminal revenues, which ultimately 3 negatively impacts the equine racing industry as a 4 whole. We would like to go on record. 5 CHAIRMAN: 6 Okay. Thank you very much. Any other 7 questions? ATTORNEY PITRE: 9 Mr. Chairman, just one change. We'd 10 request that based upon the presentation today, which 11 I assume will be moved into the record, that we change 12 OEC conditions H and I to reflect instead of 120 days, 13 that they be given until December 31st, 2015 to initiate all phases and implement them. 14 15 CHAIRMAN: 16 Agreed, Counselor? 17 ATTORNEY PITRE: 18 I'm sure you won't have an objection. 19 ATTORNEY SCHRIER: 2.0 No, sir. 2.1 CHAIRMAN: 2.2 Okay. That will be done. 2.3 ATTORNEY SCHRIER: 2.4 Yes. And thank you, Cyrus, for 25 reminding me that we should move our presentation into

47 1 the record as evidence. 2 CHAIRMAN: 3 Okay. Any objections? 4 ATTORNEY PITRE: 5 No objection. 6 CHAIRMAN: 7 So moved. Anything else? No. I want to thank you very much, members of Α. the Board, Ex-Officio Members and members of 10 Enforcement Council and your staff for your 11 consideration today.
