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## PROCEEDINGS

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## CHAIRMAN:

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As I indicated earlier, we have one public hearing scheduled today regarding a Category 1 License Renewal of the Washington Trotting Association, which operates The Meadows Casino. Can we have the representatives of The Meadows come forward, please?

Before we begin, I'd like everyone who is going to be speaking on behalf of Meadows to stand and be sworn in at this time. But before we do that, I guess we should have each of you identify your name and spell it and everything for the court reporter.

9 please stand to be sworn? 1 2 3 WITNESSES SWORN EN MASSE 4 5 CHAIRMAN: 6 You may proceed. ATTORNEY JONES: 8 Good morning again. We are pleased to be here after ten years. It surprised me when I 10 realized when we went to do this renewal that it's 11 been that long. It seems like yesterday we were before the Board with the initial Application 12 13 indicating what we anticipated The Meadows would be able to do. We're pleased to say that you will see in 14 15 the PowerPoint that Mr. Sullivan will give in a second that The Meadows has succeeded, and we continue to 16 17 operate and look forward to the future in the 18 Commonwealth. 19 And with those brief opening remarks, 20 I'm going to turn it over to Sean to proceed with the 21 PowerPoint. 22 CHAIRMAN: 2.3 Thank you. 2.4 MR. SULLIVAN: 25 Thank you, Commissioners, Chairman,

Officio Members and Members of the Gaming Control
Board. It's a pleasure to come before you and discuss
The Meadows, a look at our history, our most recent
past and share some, we think, formidable numbers with
you and ideas. And as Marie says, it's been a while,
but as Bill Paulos would say if he was here, promises

made, promises kept.

So, we're proud to be able to present this to you today. Just looking at our presentation --- a lot of visuals, but this picture here, the first slide after the introduction --- or the cover page, shows you just a short period of time ago what Racetrack Road looked like. There wasn't a lot of development. There was basically a track. Things that weren't there are exhibited on the next page, and this is some of it, some of the more influential projects.

We have the Tanger Outlet Mall that showed up. Back in the '70s, we had 138 hotel rooms in the area. Now, we have over 1,600 rooms in the area, 1,000 of them on Racetrack Road alone. There's been residential development, some small things there. If you squint, you can see we opened up a new Hyatt Hotel, part of our campus --- we refer to it as our campus, 150-acre campus. A 150-room Hyatt opened June

1 of last year.

The Street project has 93 residential apartments, as well as retail, three restaurants currently opening, and more development coming in every day. The right-hand corner is an exciting project that's putting in more apartments and restaurants and everything. So, Racetrack Road in Washington County, specifically North Strabane, has really benefited as a partnership.

And The Meadows, we'd like to think
we're the economic engine that brings this forward and
has produced the numbers that I'll share with you.
Here's a picture looking at the old track days. As
you guys know, racing is a challenging program, a
challenging product, but we're proud to have it. We
work very closely with the Commission. We work
closely with our MSOA, our horse owners, and we have a
great partnership with them.

This grandstand photo here, that's gone. The Meadows is where that is now, which is exhibited on the next page. And again, we've developed quite a campus there. It was originally 170 acres, I believe. We've shared some of that acreage with the Hyatt project and the Street project, so we're closer to 150 acres. And we've got an approximately a \$700 million

1 | investment there, so quite substantial.

Again, this is a front view, parking,
the building itself, two parking garages on the right
side. In the back is our backside area, where we just
recently spent \$11 million upgrading the entire
experience. This just shows you a couple of quick
snapshots of what The Meadows is. We have a
five-eighths mile harness racing track. We race 186
days this year, over 2,600 races.

And again, a proud relationship with our track. We believe it helps dramatically in our brand of safety and security and comfort. We have 1,000 seats in what we'll call dining facilities. The Bistecca Steakhouse is our upper scale experience. That's a lease relationship, another partner, if you will, in our project. And then we have the Carvery and food court and so on.

The casino is, at this particular time, 3,173 slot machines, 6 game tables, 14 poker tables and quite an impressive high limit attention, VIP attention. We do a lot of high roller stuff; you know? They used to call them the whales. We live and die a lot in table games with really heavy betters. Sometimes it drives you batty, but when you win, you win, so it's good news. But entertainment --- we

primarily have outdoor facilities.

We do have a headliner showroom, kind of a Las Vegas lounge. We have bowling, 24 lanes. Four of those are private. We have a VIP --- or our Vibe Lounge, which is our center bar, a cigar bar and we just put up a sizable 8,000-square foot tent for this year, starting in March going through October. So, we'll have our boxing and our MMA kickboxing, some concerts I'll share with you momentarily, but a quite impressive property. And then our big feature is our outdoor concerts. I'll show you in a few slides who we've had and who's coming up.

Again, harness racing --- a legendary track. It started in 1963, an expensive operation, but we're committed to it. It's the reason we're there. We're proud of it, and we believe it adds greatly to our guest experience. A couple of the benefits is 132 related jobs racing, 1,500 horsemen and not mentioned is the breeders and the things that support racing that you'll find. \$130,000 average daily persons, up from \$47,000 in 2003.

A couple of little stats here on property tax and so on, payer mutual, \$4.5 million towards horseman purses. So, an active program at The Meadows, as you can see there. All our restaurants

are oriented to look out on the track, so we share the track. Whether you wager on horses or not, you're going to experience horses when you come to The Meadows.

Here's an aerial view of our backside improvements. We built six brand new barns. The horses are very happy. They have all new facilities. It's safer. We have a video system in there, a fire suppression system. We've really, I believe, done a good job at preparing one of the most impressive backsides in the country. Smiling horses here, an example of the barns, well done, well put together. And that project of \$11 million that started, you know, seven to nine years ago ---

## MR. SULLIVAN:

--- has just finished, actually, in the last month. We have our 50th year anniversary of the Adios, impressive race. The one race alone, the main race, Pace For The Orchids, a \$500,000 purse. So, as I mentioned, a great brand for us, a great cultural recognition. We have legendary guys, some of the personalities. Dave Palone, he owns the world record for winningest driver in harness racing. At the time

- 1 he broke the record in 2014 November, 16,754 wins.
- 2 He's now up over 17,400 wins. His home track is The
- 3 Meadows. He races elsewhere, but he's at The Meadows
- 4 day in and day out.
- 5 Ron Burton, North American trainer,
- 6 record, \$28 million he's made in the racing business.
- 7 It's not easy to do. I mean, he's got it down to a
- 8 science and does well with it.
- 9 And then we're really proud of Roger
- 10 Huston. He's been at The Meadows over 40 years, I
- 11 believe. And he's in the Hall of Fame for announcers
- 12 and so on, but a great guy. Still comes up every day
- 13 to work, announces our racing and gives it quite a
- 14 brand in itself.
- Triple Crown events are really big for
- 16 us. We do Kentucky Derby, Preakness, Belmont.
- 17 Obviously, if the horse keeps winning, you know, each
- 18 race is exciting. The Kentucky Derby is a slam dunk.
- 19 It'll be crazy packed. This is a picture of last
- 20 year's, I believe, or the year before's Kentucky
- 21 Derby.
- 22 We show it live, and we also race live
- 23 on those days. So, we're constantly trying to keep
- 24 racing front and center with our guests to help us
- 25 generate the revenues necessary to make sense out of

- 1 this operation. But Belmont is a big one. Adios is a 2 big one, and Preakness is a big one.
- We also do, as I mentioned earlier,
- 4 | concerts outdoors. This is a snapshot of --- I think
- 5 | it might be Willie Nelson; I'm not sure. But a couple
- 6 of the artists that we've had out there; Patti
- 7 LaBelle, Smokey Robinson, the Beach Boys, Huey Lewis
- 8 and the News, Willie, Larry the Cable Guy, Joan
- 9 Rivers. This year coming up, we have John Fogerty,
- 10 | who was the legendary singer with Creedence
- 11 Clearwater. We have Kool and the Gang. We have some
- 12 other events out there as well with the community. We
- 13 have, of all things, a Pittsburgh food truck festival
- 14 where there's 27 food trucks. We have the Corks and
- 15 Kegs, so there's a lot of things that happen in the
- 16 summer on our racetrack.
- 17 As I mentioned, we also have a tent,
- 18 about 8,000 square feet. We do things, smaller
- 19 concerts. We do boxing. We have three dates next
- 20 week, April 9th. They're right around the corner.
- 21 April 9th, we have the Karpency Brothers, who are
- 22 | local fighters in our region, and they put together a
- 23 great card. We also do King of the Cage out there,
- 24 the MMA stuff. We have three of those events.
- There's always something going on at The

1 Meadows to fulfill our entertainment destination 2 positioning, so exciting things going on.

As I mentioned, the Hyatt place opened recently, June of last year, 155 rooms. There's a connecting walkway to The Meadows, so it's not our property. We don't own it. We sold them the four acres that they built it on, but it acts like our property. It is our closest property, and it's part of our campus. They have a place called the Parlay Lounge, a very nice property, for sure the top in the area.

Here's just that accelerated growth.

You see that arrow on your left, the room growth up to

1,600 rooms in the nearby area. Hotel tax going from

under a million to a million seven last year. A

little bit of softening with the gas and oil business

out there, so a million six in 2015.

But exciting stuff. And I think if there's anything we take pride in, it's about being the anchor tenant, if you will, in our mall area. You know, the economic engine that allows jobs in hotels, allows jobs in other places, restaurants and so on and so forth. So, a really nice graph here of increasing opportunities.

Part of that conversation is we sold

about eight acres to a local developer, and he built 1 2 what's called the Street at The Meadows. Again, not 3 our project, but 50,000 square foot of retail, 93 4 luxury apartments, restaurants. These are already 5 open; Primanti Brothers, Markook Mediterranean, 6 Buford's Kitchen, the Great Clips haircut. They're filling in the retail as we speak, but again, another part of our campus and another attraction to get people to The Meadows to come out and visit and so on.

In the last shoot, maybe three years --this is just a snapshot of what's happened on the
campus, and we refer to the campus --- the minute you
turn off Racetrack Road then you're on Meadows
entrance road. We call that our campus. So, the
casino, we put a substantial amount of money, six and
a half million in slot machines.

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We built a new poker room. We upped the ante in our high limit experiences and our Adios

Lounge. Just finished a brand new surveillance system in December, have HD capability. And we're no longer dependent upon the analog, and some of the things that were pretty scary as things get older and antiquated in trying to find parts for. So, we're out of the woods on that. Casino carpet, all of these things you can see.

Entertainment venues, we added a parking 1 2 It's been a few years, but it's all, you know, relatively recent. And then \$25 million 3 invested in the Street project --- not our money, but 4 5 again, part of our campus. And then the hotel, give or take \$25 million. We did pay for the walkway, 6 \$750,000. The most expensive walkway I've ever seen in my life, but it works. People enjoy it. 9 Kind of a 30,000 foot look --- and we're 10 proud of this. You know, The Meadows has basically, 11 through 2015, gross terminal revenues of over \$2 12 billion. A 61 percent net effect of that goes towards property tax relief, race horse development and so on, 13 14 purse enhancements. So, just over two --- \$1.25 15 billion, and then there's a little bit of a listing of

development fund, local share ---. It's nice to put those local share monies out there. You see a lot of projects that have nothing to do with casinos that are really good for communities along the river, the Monongahela area and areas that need help. So, again, proud to be a partner in that.

where those --- that \$1.25 million goes.

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Table games started in July of 2010, so not the numbers you see in slots. But again, \$179

- 1 million in revenues and dispersed in this manner.
- 2 About 45.6 percent of that includes the initial gaming
- 3 licensing fee of 16 and a half million when we
- 4 started, but a lot of money going to help worthy
- 5 causes.
- Again, another thing that we're
- 7 extremely proud of is our family of employees. We
- 8 have, give or take at any given time, 1,300 employees.
- 9 We coined the term, you know, family-sustaining jobs.
- 10 When you look at what they're getting paid, the
- 11 benefits they get, the tips they get and so on, the
- 12 average is in the ballpark of \$44,000. And again,
- 13 that doesn't include tips. There's 52 percent of our
- 14 employees that, on top of that, get tips.
- An example is a dealer who's getting
- 16 paid --- and nobody gets paid less than minimum wage
- 17 | at The Meadows. But a dealer who --- our lowest wage
- 18 is \$7.85 --- is making \$27 an hour when you take into
- 19 consideration gratuities. You know, so they're doing
- 20 | well, and more power to them. And they're smiling
- 21 because of it, so we're happy to provide this.
- 22 Our benefits cost --- interestingly,
- 23 this year, we budgeted a 15, almost 16 percent
- 24 increase, a million five in incremental benefit costs
- 25 this year alone. And the owners, Bill Paulos, Bill

Wortman, took that burden on themselves. There's no passing any of that cost to the employees. They get the same benefits, and the company paid a million five, which is --- it makes a position like mine really rewarding.

meals daily to our employees. Again, a good package of medical benefits, free dental, free vision. We have a 401(k) contribution. We have paid vacation. We pay for their gaming licenses. So, in the area, I would hold us up to anybody. I know some of our competitors don't pay minimum wage. They use tip compensation to get to above minimum wage. The Bill, many of you have talked to him. He wouldn't sleep at night if he had to do that. So, we're proud to be a part of that.

And then we believe that there's a variable or a multiplication of our payroll, which is \$52 million a year, \$53 million this year.

### MR. SULLIVAN:

Well, \$53 million times the economic factor for what it does in the region with those wages being spent gets you up to \$520 million, give or take,

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1 for economic improvements in the area, if you will.
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- Diversity, we're proud of this. Mike
- 3 Keelon down here keeps us in perfect alignment here.
- 4 | We are good with our community, Washington County.
- 5 From a gender perspective, 49 percent of our workforce
- 6 is female, just slightly below what Washington
- 7 | County's average is. Our management team is just
- 8 about 39 percent female. We're proud of that.
- 9 Minority, 5.2 percent. The county is only 5.1
- 10 percent, so we're in keeping with that. Our
- 11 management team is 7 and a half percent considered
- 12 minority, so we're above the average there.
- Residency, another good one. Everybody
- 14 lives in our region in Pennsylvania. Yes, we have a
- 15 | couple that drive over from Ohio, but 92 percent live
- 16 in Pennsylvania, so it is, indeed, benefitting
- 17 | Pennsylvania residents. We're conscious of and we
- 18 record our Meebee-Weebee vendors. We do well there.
- 19 We report that each month, each quarter, and we're
- 20 proud to be a part of that. So, diversity, we're in
- 21 | pretty good shape.
- 22 Training, committed to training across
- 23 all boards. I like the fact that we're thought of as
- 24 a good compliant company. Yes, we have curve balls.
- 25 Yes, a minor sneaks in. Yes, a self-excluded,

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whatever, but they're few and far between.
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   everybody is on their tippy-toes looking for that
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   stuff. I mean, it's amazing, because we're in a local
   casino, how many people know each other. So, slot
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   attendants, table games people point out self-excluded
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6
   people because they know them. So, it's a good
   environment where people are doing their darnedest to
   make sure we're constantly in compliance. And it's
9
   due to part --- this training, this type of training.
10
                 Community relations --- we have
11
   neighborhood partners. People can earn points by
12
   playing on our slot machines, and they can get gift
13
   cards or credit at these retailers, and there's many
14
   more. But nearly $5 million has been spent at
15
   neighborhood stores, neighborhood retailers,
   restaurants, and so on by playing slots at The
16
17
   Meadows. So, we like that, and we're proud of that.
18
   It's a fundamental program that CCR does, and it's
   been very beneficial. Our neighbors didn't get put
19
20
   out of business. Their business actually improved in
21
   the area, so proud of that.
22
                 Community relations, we keep a strong
23
   eye towards those that need various contributions.
24
   This is a listing of those. We're just under $2
25
   million in that area. It's rewarding to be able to
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help the food bank and the Washington Women's Shelter
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   and so on, so we do that aggressively. We also
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   started --- I guess about a year ago where we have
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   Tito boxes at the entrances of our property, and we
5
   pick a quarter, a worthwhile charity --- and this is
6
   impressive. The customers, when they have their ---
   in the old days, it'd be considered change; you know?
   They didn't want to take their change with them.
   They'd put it in a charitable ---. Here, it's Titos.
10
   So we collect Titos at our entrances. And each
11
   quarter, we're giving away approximately $6,000 per
12
   box on average to these worthwhile charities, but it's
13
   really not even The Meadows. It's the customers of
14
   The Meadows, so it's double impressive, in my book, as
15
   the customers are putting in their dollar Tito.
16
   don't want to worry about cashing it out.
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   drop it in the box, you know? Then, there'll be cash

   in the box sometimes. So, this is really fun, to be

   able to work with the various local charities.

                 We're committed to compulsive and
   problem gambling. Mike Keelon is our chief steward on

   this and works well with the Control Board. And we

   try to do our very best when it comes to minors, self-
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   excluded, serving and all the regulatory, you know,
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environment that we're in. So, we're proud of our

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   record on that. Obviously, there's always
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   opportunity, but we'll hold ourselves up against

   that statement. The Meadows management team,

### ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET:

Good morning, Chairman Barasch,
Commissioners. Carmelia Estriplet for the Office of
Enforcement Counsel (OEC). Just a few questions for
Meadows.

Turning to the Hyatt Place hotel in slide 17, you mentioned that there's a bridge between the casino and the hotel. What kind of efforts do you do to keep underage and excluded patrons, and has that been an issue since that bridge opened?

### MR. SULLIVAN:

You know, it hasn't been. The bridge is a pedestrian bridge, and it's directly from the fourth floor of the hotel to our parking garage. So, really, it's not a direct entrance into the casino. They still have to come through, in this case, our parking garage. And every entrance, of course, as you know, is secured with scanners, officers ---. So, it really hasn't made any difference whatsoever.

And if anything, it gives us a partner that can explain to families that check into the hotel

27 that kids are not allowed into the casino, so we're 1 2 hitting them really early in their journey. And it's 3 not necessarily a kids' experience. It's more a 4 business traveler and elderly folks. 5 MR. KEELON: 6 And there's surveillance. MR. SULLIVAN: And there's surveillance all along the 8 way, cameras and so on. So, we haven't had any 10 additional burden because of that. 11 ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET: 12 Has there been a significant change to 13 the number of employees since the public input hearing in June of 2015? 14 15 MR. SULLIVAN: 16 We're in that region of 13. 17 mean, during the summer when we get into our special 18 events, seating and so on, that'll go up a little bit. 19 In the winter, it'll go down a little bit. But Mike, 20 I think we ---. 2.1 MR. KEELON: 2.2 It's consistent. 2.3 MR. SULLIVAN: 2.4 Yeah. Thirteen (13) has been the number

for a long time.

# ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET:

And you mentioned that you have tip eligible employees. Are employees also eligible for bonuses?

### MR. SULLIVAN:

2.0

There's a bonus pool, which consists of maybe 25 people, key management positions, discretionary bonus put together by the owners and by corporate offices related to property performance, overall company performance and so on. The employees get an annual longevity check based on how long they've been there. So, it could be 50 bucks if they were there one year, \$250 if they've been there longer. They get their annual Giant Eagle gift cards for turkeys and Christmases and those types of things.

But the only real bonus pool is that upper level management group, if you will. Then, now, there's commissions for hosts who bring in players and a function of that, but no.

## ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET:

And with regard to your community involvement for your employees, have you seen any increase in participation or volunteering by your employees since the public input hearing?

## MR. SULLIVAN:

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We did. We just helped with the food
1
   bank. The food bank is one of our favorite charities.
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3
   It's surprising how many people are in need, but in
   the school months, they get the local colleges to
   help. For example, they call it Produce to People,
5
6
   and every month they give out produce that they get
   from the various retailers. And in the summer, they
   don't have any kids to do it, so our team jumped
   forward. We probably had 40 employees at every one of
10
   those things handing out food for eight hours a day.
11
                 We have a program we developed --- we
   mentioned it the last time --- called Helping Hands.
12

   We get out there. We get out there and help. We show
14
   up at various things. The food bank just comes to
15
   mind most immediately, but we're out there.

                 MR. WOODS:

                 Just two quick questions. You mentioned
23
   1,600 hotel rooms and the Hyatt specifically.
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   you know what the --- I guess, the average night at
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   --- capacity would be on that?
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## MR. SULLIVAN:

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Yeah, up until the gas slowdown, which 3 is about a year now, maybe it's eight months. were doing 82 percent occupancy, which is fantastic 5 anywhere in the country. The average rate was getting about \$130 a night. So, they were doing bang-up 6 business. That's suffered a little bit. They're down to about 74 percent occupancy. The average daily rate is down to probably 98 bucks right now. It'll come 10 back up now that the --- there's no weather issues and 11 so on.

We do expect the oil and gas business to return, but they kept building because they were filling them. The Hyatt is doing really well. get a higher than average rate because they're connected to The Meadows, and they're the newest product, but no. It's a healthy business. They're missing the gas and oil right now a little bit, but it'll be back.

# MR. WOODS:

Do you track in some fashion the number of visitors to the campus, as you call it, or specifically to The Meadows on a yearly basis? what do those numbers look like over the last few years?

## MR. SULLIVAN:

We do. We have a room commitment, room guarantee with the Hyatt where we agreed to rent 5,000 rooms from them each year. So, we got a special rate for those 5,000 rooms. That we fill in our sleep. It's 25 rooms on the weekends, 10 rooms midweek. We fill in an additional 2,000 rooms at other hotels that the Hyatt can't provide capacity with, because the rate is a little less than they can get from the retail. But we fill about 7,000 rooms.

We find the average daily gaming worth of people staying in hotels two to one from what they would be if they weren't staying in them. So, the hotel program, to us, is very important, and those are the comp rooms, if you will, and some of the discount rooms we use with our better betters. We also have, at every hotel, a flyer that if they come in, they can join the club and get \$5 free play. They can come in and get discount towards their meal.

So, we're active in all 1,600 rooms, but we're extremely connected for 7,000 rooms a year. And it's growing. I mean, ---.

## MR. WOODS:

How about overall visitation just to your property? Not the hotel, but ---.

# 32 1 MR. SULLIVAN: 2 Yeah, those are the rooms we use, but 3 you know, we ---. 4 MR. WOODS: 5 I mean outside the hotel. 6 MR. SULLIVAN: Outside the hotel? MR. WOODS: 9 People coming in and things. 10 MR. SULLIVAN: 11 I mean, we've dealt with 5.2 million 12 slot players last year. 1.3 MR. WOODS: 14 Yeah? 15 MR. SULLIVAN: 16 Just under a half a million table games 17 players. We've served over two million drinks; you 18 know? I mean, we were just doing this in an employee 19 meeting yesterday, and there's one going on now, where 20 we were looking at the stats. And it's amazing. 21 mean, we get tremendous visitation. And more 22 impressive, six out of ten visitors to The Meadows 2.3 live closer to where another casino is more convenient 2.4 to their residence. 25 So, it's an impressive statement for

customer service, safety and the things that we believe are working. They go by or away from a casino that's closer to come to The Meadows. Hotel rooms help with that.

### MR. WOODS:

Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

### CHAIRMAN:

So, Keith?

# MR. MCCALL:

Thank you, Mr. Chairman. First of all, I just want to make a statement on that. You know, just looking at the PowerPoint and you telling the story --- I mean, you have a heck of a story to tell. And it's an impressive one. And when you look at page two and page three of your PowerPoint, and you see the investment that has been made, the spinoff investment by virtue of the establishment of your casino, it's pretty darn impressive.

And I certainly just want to commend you for the work that you have done in community development, community revitalization and community investment, because it's really an outstanding job and a story that needs to be told. You know, I can tell you that living in Carbon County, I would love to have this casino there with that type of investment and

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   spinoff jobs that have been created by it.
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                  But I have a couple questions.

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                  MR. SULLIVAN:
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                  Uh-huh (yes).
                  MR. MCCALL:
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                  --- since you, being the Category 1 ---.
   The $11 million that you've spent on the backside,
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   now, there was a statutory requirement of a ---
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                  MR. SULLIVAN:
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                  Right.
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                  MR. MCCALL:
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                  --- $5 million investment. Is that in
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   addition to a ---? Not to diminish that investment,
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   but is that in addition to the $5 million? Or is that
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   $11 million total over the ten years?
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                  MR. SULLIVAN:
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                  That's included in that $11 million.
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                  MR. MCCALL:
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                  That's it? Okay.
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                  MR. SULLIVAN:
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                  Yeah. It's $6 million, give or take,
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   above that statutory requirement.
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                  MR. MCCALL:
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Uh-huh (yes). Now, and what about the racing numbers? Are they increasing, decreasing as far as attendance, people coming in and watching the live racing and ---?

### MR. SULLIVAN:

Yeah. On-track revenues continue to suffer. I mean, we moved racing to Saturday afternoon. We've seen a real nice response to that, but on-track revenues are difficult. You know, it's not the days when people came out to the day of the races; right? But we have our feed, our races' simulcasts sent out to 600 locations, Europe, everywhere throughout the world.

And that's where we're seeing growth.

For example, just in February, off track revenues, we call it, was up 19 percent. On-track revenues continue to suffer.

## MR. MCCALL:

Uh-huh (yes).

# MR. SULLIVAN:

But we keep fighting. We keep slugging it out. We moved the race dates to Saturday. We are working closely with the MSOA to jointly invest in a new campaign that will rebrand racing and get some energy out there. As mentioned with the events, we

1 try to introduce people to the track. I mean, you can
2 come to The Meadows. If you don't go to a restaurant,
3 you may not even know we have a track.

### MR. MCCALL:

Yeah.

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# MR. SULLIVAN:

know there's a track with our events and activities.

So, we're not giving up on it. We're fighting for it.

The MSOA owners' association works with us hand in hand to create events and so on. But yeah, it's a challenge to get people out to the track like the '60s and '70s.

### MR. MCCALL:

But the impact of the Race Horse

Development Fund has been a positive one, I'm

imagining, with, you know, the money that has been
provided.

### MR. SULLIVAN:

Yeah, I think if it --- if that didn't happen, that'd be the end of racing, period, end of story. And then you have to look at the connectivity through breeders and through all of the supporting groups of people for racing. So, it's a big question. I mean, it's tough. I mean, at times, you just hope

people get that bug again and want to race, but it's a difficult proposition. But I would say if it wasn't there, racing would implode for sure.

#### MR. MCCALL:

And the operating costs, \$25.5 million, that's --- well, that's a big number to me.

#### MR. SULLIVAN:

Yeah.

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# MR. MCCALL:

Can you just boil down that number just a little bit so I under ---? Is it mainly personnel? I mean, that's the ---. What's driving that cost?

# MR. SULLIVAN:

Yeah, it is, indeed, a lot to do with labor. It's a lot to do with operational expenses. My office is the only window that's out looking at the track, and I'm telling you at 2:00 a.m., 3:00 a.m., midnight, they're always grooming the track. I mean, the track is a real specialized business, and it requires a tremendous amount of attention. We have 50 security officers that patrol the backside area.

So, it adds up relatively quickly in addition to the cost for materials, more limestone. These things are always eating up limestone, to refresh the track, but it is expensive. You know, we

get it, and we're there for them and vice versa.

One of the trends you start to see 3 nowadays is some people are getting less and less into

4 the backside business and becoming ship-in only barns

5 or tracks. And that would reduce expenses, but no,

6 when you're running an operation as big as ours, it's

7 highly expensive.

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## MR. MCCALL:

9 Very good. Thank you, Chairman. Thank 10 you for a job well done.

## MR. SULLIVAN:

Thank you.

## CHAIRMAN:

Greq? Yeah.

as follow-ups, so thank you.

16 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. Again, I will 17 echo Commissioner McCall's comments. I thought the 18 presentation was very well done. Obviously not your first rodeo here, but you know, things like, you know, 19 20 the number of employees, the average salary, whether 21 or not it includes benefits, whether or not it 22 includes tips ---. I mean, you laid that out very 23 well. And I know that's questions that we always have

Ms. Estriplet, how many Consent

Agreements have The Meadows signed over the last year in 2015? Do you have that information available?

## ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET:

There are two. There are actually copies that have been provided to the Board, and we're going to seek later on to introduce them into the record. Those were both entered into on May 7th of 2015, and this Board approved them on June 10th of 2015.

## MR. FAJT:

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Thank you very much.

## MR. MOSCATO:

I don't really have a question, just a comment, to congratulate you on a great presentation and the success in your casino. It's wonderful to see what's happened down there in Washington County. Congratulations.

# MR. SULLIVAN:

Thank you.

## MR. RYAN:

And I would add mine to that, too, also, Mr. Sullivan. I remember the days when I'd be out there driving up to Pittsburgh when there wasn't much there. You go through that area now, it's unbelievable, the transformation. And you and the

people out at The Meadows have done a really
superlative job. You really have.

# MR. SULLIVAN:

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Thank you. And I would reiterate the team. I mean, trust me, it's a ---. I've been doing this 35 years. I've never had a better Director --- set of Directors. Corporate has provided a tremendous amount of support. Everybody works, I believe, well with Gaming, respects them, appreciates them. So, it truly is a tremendous team effort, and all of the accolades should be spread to 1,300 people.

#### CHAIRMAN:

Enforcement Counsel, do you have an actual presentation?

#### MR. JEWELL:

Let me go.

### CHAIRMAN:

Oh, I'm sorry.

#### MR. JEWELL:

Yeah. Yeah. Okay. Thank you. One question and one comment. On your contributions, you said a million eight, and that is from when business began through today? Do I understand that correctly?

It is.

# 1 MR. JEWELL: 2 And does that average out per year to 3 divide those? Has it been more lately, or ---? 4 MR. SULLIVAN: I think you could probably do that, and 5 6 you'd get close to it. What it doesn't take into consideration is the free play we give for people who bring canned foods, for example. All right. A comment I'd make is this, and I'll do this quickly. But something I ran into at The Meadows that I didn't know was there --- I found it fascinating. In one of my previous lives, I was the college president in the local area, and we were after a young man, an outstanding quarterback, so the

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   coach and I went to mom and dad's house in the South
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   Hills. And that fellow's dad was Joe DiDonato, who is
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   the pastor of the church. There's actually a robust
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   church congregation at The Meadows.
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                  MR. SULLIVAN:
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                  Yep. Yes, there is.

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                  And he is the full-time pastor there,
   and I realized and learned that they have these
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   relationships all around the country.

Uh-huh (yes).

#### MR. SULLIVAN:

So, we're actually contributing together to make sure Pastor Joe succeeds in spreading his message. Another non-recorded charitable thing is all of the things he does for the horsemen in collecting clothes to --- we just had our last dorm on the facility close. There was 24 people there. Pastor Joe put together a program where every one of them moved into an apartment either together or reunited families. I mean, it was almost a forgotten world.

### MR. JEWELL:

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Sure.

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#### MR. SULLIVAN:

Twenty-four (24) people living in a dorm
that you just couldn't say was the right place to be
living, but they've been doing it for, you know, their
life. And it was really a proud accomplishment, and
he gets letters now saying, thank you. I didn't even
know that I could have all these things, so he's a
fine guy, absolutely a great guy.

# ATTORNEY ESTRIPLET:

No, the OEC does not intend to call witnesses or to put forth a presentation. However, we do have representatives available should the Board have questions. We'd like to note for the record that an updated letter from the Racing Commission confirming that WTA remains in good standing was provided in connection with renewal materials.

Additionally, we have a few supplemental exhibits to enter into the record.

OEC has an updated report from the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement stating that

- 1 | there are no citations or adjudications pertaining to
- 2 | Meadows on the record. That letter is dated March
- $3 \mid 25$ th, 2016 and has been --- and should be marked as
- 4 Exhibit 2A to supplement the existing record.
- 5 Additionally, there were two enforcement actions taken
- 6 by OEC since the public input hearing on June 3rd.
- 7 Those were, as you asked about,
- 8 | Commissioner Fajt, the two Consent Agreements. One
- 9 dealt with promotions. The other dealt with
- 10 self-excluded and excluded patrons. Those were both
- 11 entered into on May 7th, 2015, and the Board approved
- 12 them on June 3rd of 2015. And we would request those
- 13 be entered into the record as Exhibits 5A and 5B,
- 14 respectively.
- 15 Additionally, Washington Trotting
- 16 Association, Inc. and its affiliates and Principals
- 17 | timely filed renewal applications. And the Board's
- 18 BIE has completed its background investigation. WTA
- 19 fully cooperated with BIE during the course of its
- 20 background investigation. BIE did not identify any
- 21 information that would preclude a finding of
- 22 | suitability for WTA's affiliates or Principals.
- 23 Therefore, we would recommend and request that WTA be
- 24 found suitable for renewal of its Category 1 License.
